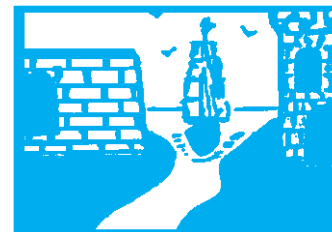

The DCC AGM was held on Monday 5th March in OLH at 7.30pm. The secretary read the minutes from last year's AGM. The meeting received and adopted the accounts for the year-ended 2006 and re-elected the Council Members who retired in accordance with the Articles and who offered themselves for re-election. Two new members were elected and Ann Perry was re-appointed as Company Secretary.

AOB: Dumping of litter is still ongoing around the area and garden rubbish in black plastic bags has been dumped at the gazebo in Dillon's Park.

❖ **FEELINGS — NOTHING MORE THAN FEELINGS** ❖

Feelings or emotions are a very complex part of our make up as human beings. A feeling can be described as an involuntary physical response brought about by chemical changes in the body. An event happens, we interpret it, then release hormones, experience further physical sensations and then we react. In particular situations, what we need to ask ourselves is whether our reaction is appropriate or not?

Inappropriate feelings can cause difficulties in relationships. This is when feelings from the past (often from childhood) are triggered by similar events in the present. Because of this unconscious memory our reactions may be inappropriate to the event that has just occurred. While it is always important to trust our own true experience i.e. what feels right to each of us in the moment: it is equally important to be able to re-evaluate these feelings. It is always in our power to change the way we feel about something.

Ability to communicate how we feel, especially in close relationships, is important. Rather than allow these emotions to build up and become overwhelming, it is always good to talk. Therapy also helps people to become more aware of what they are feeling, it can help them find the language and enable them to express these feelings.

ST BEGNET'S GRAVEYARD – The Graveyard has been cleaned up and the paths restored. All of this was made possible by:

- The funding from the Heritage Office of DLRCoCo towards signage & info panels €9,000.
- Dalkey Community Council's donation of €5,000 paid for gravel and materials for restoration of footpaths.
- EBS gave a grant under their community initiatives of €1,500.
- Dalkey Tidy Towns donated their prize money of €500.
- Dalkey Credit Union gave €500.
- Physical help and support was given by the Parks Dept DLRCoCo.
- Oracle IT Company did valuable manual work on a team building day.

At end of the year the Heritage Council in Kilkenny came up trumps with €15,000 to finish off the restoration and illuminate the church. This work will be done later in the season.

New promotional leaflet: You can pick it up locally. It gives an overview of all of the activities of the Centre: In-house Tours, Guided Walks and Living History etc.

Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre has secured the necessary finance to run the Living History programme for all visitors from beginning of May to end of October. The Community Dept of Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown Co Co. is the main sponsor. The Living History will be provided by Deilg Inis Theatre Company, based locally.

The Dalkey Guided Walks on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays will begin again in May and continue to the end of August. The package provided includes the Guided Historical Walk, half price admission the Centre and Special Offer price on lunch locally.

BUILDING WORK (Revamp of Centre).

A Guarantee of €400,000 has been received from DLRCoCo and an **Application to Dept of Art Sport & Tourism under Access 11** has been submitted by the Centre Manager. The result of the application is due any day. This will provide: a new entrance, office space and a revamp of the old committee meeting room upstairs.

The Art Gallery is booked out for some months already. A number of the national organisations are now holding their annual Art Exhibitions in the Gallery. There is still some availability. An info pack can be sent out if you email diht@indigo.ie

The Schools Living History Programme is currently on where the schools from the area spend the morning with characters bringing the past to colourful life. The medieval merchants of Dalkey deal with questions of trade with Bristol and Chester and the unique defensive features of Goat Castle. The archer demonstrates the use of the longbow and the language of archery (rule of thumb, keep it under your hat, another string to your bow etc.) and the medieval maid outlines the living conditions, the food they ate and how they cooked it. The Victorian era is dealt with by a character from Dalkey Quarry, based on factual research. To finish with a flourish, the King of Dalkey (with all his titles) presents each child with a scroll as a memento of the visit to Dalkey.

FÁS continues to place a **Community Employment** programme in the Heritage Centre which provides valuable work experience for participants and is a valuable resource for the Centre, without which it could not operate successfully. 225g raw sugar cane brown sugar	140g chopped apricots	370g plain flour
500ml milk	100g raisins	2 teaspoons coconut

1. Pre-heat oven to 180degreesC or Gas Mark 4
 2. Whisk the eggs and sugar together, add the milk and vanilla. Mix well
 3. Add the sunflower oil, apricots and raisins
 4. In a separate bowl, sieve the bread soda and salt with the flour, add Porridge and stir into the wet mixture, mix in the coconut
 5. Mix again and cover until needed
- Cook for 15-20 minutes or until set and golden brown. This oat muffin mixture keeps perfectly in the fridge for 30 days. It gets tastier as it sits. You can cook up a few muffins daily. For some tasty alternatives grate some fresh carrot into your mixture or fresh lemon or orange rind. You can of course add grated apple, fresh berries or prunes.

TRAFFIC MATTERS

Latest research indicates that 'driver fatigue' may be a contributory factor in up to 20% of fatal crashes/driver deaths in Ireland. It is also said that driving when very tired is as dangerous as driving while over the drink drive limit.

These disturbing facts were revealed in October 2006, at the launch of the Road Safety Authority's winter Road Safety Campaign. It also means that this silent killer could have been a contributory factor in almost 200 driver deaths in a recent five year period.*

The people who are most at risk of being involved in a driver fatigue related crash are drivers who try to fight the effects of sleep when driving. Tactics such as turning up the volume on the radio and opening the window do not work, explained Noel Brett, CEO of the Road Safety Authority.

As soon as you realise you are fighting the urge to sleep, you should stop driving, park in a safe place, drink two cups of coffee and take a fifteen minute nap. Caffeine takes about 20-30 minutes to enter a person's system and start working. So, by the time you wake up the caffeine should have taken effect. Following the nap, stretch your legs and get some fresh air.

The critical points at which driver fatigue related collisions happen are between 2a.m. and 6 a.m., and mid-afternoon between 2 pm.and 4 p.m. when our body clock is at it's lowest point.

Eventually, a driver will drift in and out of consciousness and experience 'micro sleeps' which can last up to ten seconds. In this time a driver has NO control over the vehicle.

Driver fatigue not only impairs driving in a similar way to alcohol, but it also magnifies the damage alcohol does. It is estimated that alcohol is twice as potent mid-afternoon and in the early hours of the morning because we are more likely to be tired at these times. Consequently, people who think they are driving under the legal limit should be aware that even small amounts of alcohol consumed at these key times when we are tired combine to render a driver totally unfit to drive.

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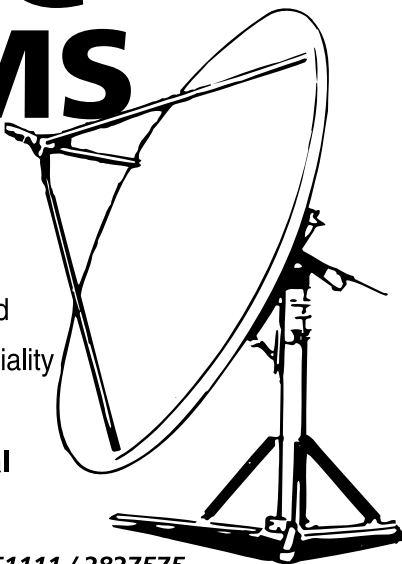
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THE GOOD, THE BAD, AND DUN LAOGHAIRE

An English man's view

As an Englishman living locally for three and a half years, I have naturally formed a personal view of Ireland.

Every viewpoint is of course relative to the origin of the observer. My background was a fortunate one. I lived in a small East Midlands village close to a market town with all facilities and surrounded by beautiful unspoiled countryside. As a result, my opinions could be notably different to that of someone coming from say, suburban Birmingham. But, for better or worse, these are my impressions of Dun Laoghaire and district.

GOOD: A superb public transport system. I have heard of complaints, but I find it second to none. I am most grateful to have left my car in England.

BAD: Excessive traffic, parking on footpaths, private cars regularly George's Street Pedestrian area with impunity.

GOOD: Fine town centres of period buildings and shopfronts in Dun Laoghaire, Dalkey and elsewhere.

BAD: Contemporary Irish architecture. Utterly grotesque and aesthetically bankrupt. Office and apartment blocks that would not be out of place in Warsaw or Ulan Bator. What IS that monstrosity over the road from the Dun Laoghaire DART platforms?

But then, developers have no interest in aesthetics, do they? As for the dubious practice of charging people to appeal a planning decisions, - astonishing, and highly questionable.

GOOD: Irish people in general, (if you can find them among the cosmopolitan throng). It is not unusual, as I have found, to be smiled at and greeted by people I have never met. It's a pleasant experience.

BAD: Charity muggers on the High Street. Having run the gauntlet the these every few yards and being hailed as a lifelong friend. Their wages would be better directed to the needy themselves.

GOOD: Irish pubs and food. Wonderful!

English pubs are fine, even world renowned, but there is something indefinably great about Irish pubs. The atmosphere is warmer, waiters will bring you your drinks, and the no smoking law is of huge benefit. As to the food, suffice to say I have never enjoyed food to the degree that I have in Ireland.

BAD: Eastern European accordion music. Fun in Eastern Europe! On Irish streets, under compulsion? No, thank you! In Ireland I want to hear Irish music.

GOOD: The Piers. Better without the Banjo player, but wouldn't you miss them if they weren't there? Sunday afternoons would never be the same.

BAD: Graffiti. How it degrades the environment! The authorities seem to have no will to counteract it. How much more attractive the area would be without these ugly scars. It would lift the quality of the environment immeasurably.

GOOD: Sandymount Beach, Bray Head, Killiney Hill, and its views, the Vale of Avoca, Skerries, Dalkey, the People's Park, and so on.

So there you go. These are things I will remember when returning to England. There's good and bad everywhere, but that's how one outsider living among you sees the area. It may be exactly as you do.

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NATURE CORNER – by Michael Ryan

A lot of birds will have built a nest by now due to the mild spring but not all and sometimes birds that nest early can lose their early clutch through sudden drops in temperature or disturbance. Birds that nest in dense bushes aren't to know somebody is going to be coming along soon with hedge clippers or mechanical trimmer to cut it back, leaving their newly constructed home destroyed or exposed. If birds are nesting in your garden they're going to make sure you don't see them going into the nest so it's recommended that the best way of checking hedge or bush is to get down low and look up to see the mass of twigs silhouetted against the light.

If you have a nest box at least you'll know where the birds are. It's very enjoyable watching the adults come and go never failing to wonder at the work the parents put in constantly feeding their young, making hundreds of visits during a single day. A big industry has developed in Europe and the US making nestboxes with built in video cameras which connect to a monitor or to your television so you can watch what's happening inside the nest box, the eggs being laid then hatched, the chicks growing and being fed and eventually taking their first flight.

Nest boxes can also serve a useful function outside the nesting season as birds use them as a safe, warm roosting space in winter when a number of birds may cram in to a box together. Apparently somebody has recorded over thirty wrens piling into a Blue Tit nest box together!

Many years ago I bought a House Martin nest box, a little plastic dome nicely finished to resemble the moulded mud of a real nest. I fitted it under the eaves of the house outside the kitchen where it would be out of direct sunshine. To the best of my knowledge no House Martin ever even looked at it, let alone tried to nest in it but it did serve a function. One evening in mid summer I saw a adult wren clinging on to the pebble dash wall a few inches below the nest box urgently calling. Suddenly young wrens started appearing out of the bushes and the adult bird seemed to be ushering them into the nestbox. It was a complete reversal of the usual procedure when adult birds urge fledglings to leave the nest to which they rarely return but it was probably due to a peculiar aspect of wrens breeding habits. Sometimes before a brood of wren chicks are fully reared the female will start brooding



and hatching another clutch leaving the male to look after the previous family and I imagine this was what was happening, the male adult wren taking the first family to safety in the nest box.

I've seen the wrens nesting in it subsequently and suspected one might be roosting in it in winter. One night in late winter I slammed the lid of a bin and saw a wren darting out of the box closely followed by another.

And another. Then one more. Then two more. Six birds came out before

I went back indoors afraid of keeping them out of their warm refuge so there may have been even more squeezed in there. Fiercely territorial during the breeding season they can all cram in together when the need arises.

Buds on Ash and Oak trees will soon start to open containing the tightly packed leaves which have been storing up energy since last autumn. Apparently scientists are studying buds of hornbeam trees to develop practical applications from seeing how they can compress so much into a very small density.

Usually the first buds I notice opening on a tree is on a particular Horse Chestnut on the Vico Road whose own micro climate brings them out early in March but this year there were leaves on elder bushes in January. Buds opening early due to a milder climate can spell trouble for wildlife since complex feeding chains have developed over millions of years with caterpillars feeding on the fresh young leaves then birds eating the caterpillars or in the case of Great Tits feeding then to their newly hatched chicks. If the leaves open too early they'll be too tough to digest by the time the caterpillars emerge and subsequently they won't thrive to feed the birds and their chicks.

Dalkey has a good range of native mammals including fox, badger, rabbit, red squirrel and possibly even stoats and it's urban wildlife that will be the subject of a illustrated talk by conservationist Billy Flynn at the Kingston Hotel in Dun Laoghaire on Tuesday 3rd April at 8.00. 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NATURE CURES

Common plantain *Plantago major* and ribwort *Plantago lanceolata* belong to the Plantaginaceae family of which there are more than two hundred species. These common weeds which are ubiquitous on town and country paths, roadsides, gardens and waste ground are native to Europe and the temperate regions of Asia but have spread as far as North America and the South Pacific where they are called 'Whiteman's Footprint'.

These perennial herbs have strongly ribbed or furrowed leaves in a basal rosette with very small flowers packed onto a slender wiry stalk. The common plantain has a broad leaf somewhat like a wide tongue. The ribwort has a lance-like leaf and grows much taller. Many of you will recognise this plant as it can cause great disfigurement to lawns as it rapidly multiplies and destroys the grass that originally occupied the spot usurped by its dense rosette of leaves!

Plantain and *Plantago* mean the sole of the foot in reference to the lie of the leaves. They were recommended for keeping inside the socks to keep the feet fresh and free from blisters and fatigue! Medicinally the common plantain and the ribwort may be used interchangeably and both have invaluable healing properties. Known as 'the healing plant' in Gaelic it may be applied to any type of wound, sore, bite, sting or ulcer. It is an excellent first aid remedy, especially if gardening or in the country as the leaves applied whole or bruised in the form of a poultice to any sting or bite will bring relief in seconds. In fact plantain is more cooling than dock leaves for nettle stings! The leaves help staunch bleeding and encourage the repair of damaged tissue. Taken internally it acts as an expectorant and anti-catarhal while soothing inflamed and sore membranes making it ideal for treating respiratory complaints including sinusitis, hay fever, allergic rhinitis and the common cold. The ribwort is considered especially effective for lung conditions including long standing bronchitis, tuberculosis and persistent irritable coughs.

It also used in the treatment of many digestive system complaints including gastritis, diarrhoea, dysentery, haemorrhoids, gastric ulcers and IBS. In fact it may be used to treat almost any condition from the mouth down! It makes an excellent eye wash for conjunctivitis and drops of the fresh plant juice may be used for ear infections. Poultices may be made of both plantains to draw out abscesses and boils.

Farmers apparently used to twist the leaves as a guide to humidity so they could judge the fire danger to their hay! How this worked I don't know! The leaves are used preferably fresh and although they are out from April onwards they are best used when in flower from May to June.

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MY GARDEN

The name of this month, April, is derived from the Greek word for 'opening'.

“Soon, o'er their heads blithe April airs shall sing; A thousand wild flowers round them shall unfold. The green buds glisten in the dews of spring.”

J. Keeble from “The Country Diary of an Edwardian Lady.”

. . . So, another spring, another chance and then, . . . another summer. April is our spring time in blossom. We can look forward to months of garden delights. Some of these April days are great for being out there in the garden. Almost everything now is in leaf, full of vigour and vitality. One of the nicest things about being in our little garden this morning was its greenness all around me. When I think of April, I always reflect on those starch white, lacey flowers of candytuft, (iberis semperervirens). As a child, I used to lose myself making “May Altars” with these flowers and likewise decorating old tree trunk stumps, making them into fairy forts. A must for an old cottagy effect.

Now is the time to tease out all those weed seedlings before they begin to grow more rapidly. Young trees, too, look their best when kept free of grass and weeds; so a clean circle cut around the trunk at the base will reduce all unnecessary competition and thus, also provide better nutrients for the young tree.

I must say it has been so nice to see those masses of daffodils growing so lovingly in St. Patrick's Square and at the entrance of Old Quarry. The Burgage too, looks splendid at present. The gardens there are beautifully kept. What a wonderful idea: - those two enclosed compost heaps close to the Burgage entrance. They blend so well into the landscape there as they are built and painted appropriately.

Why not plant a bit of excitement in your garden this spring so that when you out there, in the morning or evening, you will simply have to stop in your tracks and say ‘Wow’! I made this happen; I helped to make that grow; it's a wonderful feeling. A nice thing to remember is that just as some families like being together, so, too, some plants thrive on being together, i.e. a group of different types of ferns, hostas, or Eucomis bulbs planted in plain terracotta pots can make a superb display/statement.

I find it extremely helpful to simply walk around our local Dalkey areas, homes/residences and just observe; see what our neighbours are growing in their soil, their containers and in their front gardens. ‘Zoom in’, on whatever takes your fancy mentally, or even inquire. Then, why not make a ‘splurge’ and treat yourself to a similar plant and then ‘off you go!’

Indoor Plants – You may feel like chucking out some of your pot plants but first spare a thought for them. Take time to examine your plants carefully. Remember, this plant was once very much alive and may still have some little fibre of life buried deep down inside that pot. Tease out the old dead roots and start watering and feeding sparingly and maybe you will nurture your plant back into full health. (Other pot-bound plants can be completely re-potted this month before new growths begins) Plants really do want to please you, they want to live, not die; most want to reproduce. So, believe in them and respond to their needs. It's amazing how your little darling plant will perk up once it is cleaned with a damp cloth, etc. If you were given a present of some dwarf, miniature daffodils this spring, don't forget to save them by planting the bulbs outside in your garden. Next spring you will have an inspiring drift to look at and admire.

Tip: Save your old newspapers in order to make starter pots for raising your seeds in.

Many visitors came to the school in the more than thirty years I was there. All of them were welcomed but some remain in my mind as memorable and special. The following is a selection - in no particular order - and each visitor was a treat for the pupils of the time.

In the mid-70s Dublin won the Sam Maguire. I don't know how many primary schools there are in Dublin but a school year wouldn't be long enough for the cup to be taken to each school. But, surprise, surprise, Sam arrived in our school one Spring morning. Two famous Dubs came with it: Paddy Cullen and Pat O'Neill. Lessons were abandoned as pupils touched the trophy and begged for autographs as they held out their pieces of paper and biro to the two Dub heroes. A photograph taken at the time shows me, a Westmeath mans, holding the Sam Maguire in the schoolyard. A dream?! Sam revisited in the 1980s and this time a local Dubs hero, Mick Holden, was greeted with roars of "Cuala".

Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council has an artist-in-residence scheme for schools. On the second occasion that I applied for it for the school we were delighted to hear we were successful. As the new school year started in 2000 we met a gentleman called Joonas Servio, and artist from Finland, who was going to be with us for the first term. First we discussed with him what the project would be. We mentioned that the school would be celebrating its centenary in January 2001. He then mentioned how impressed he was by the redbrick exterior as he approached the school that morning. "What do you need?" we asked. Each class then became involved in bringing in ring-pulls from soft drink cans, tea bags, nuts and bolts, cigarette paper from boxes and even shells from the seashore! The Parents Association supplied paint, glue and long wooden planks! The boys supplied vast quantities of materials and the room began to take on the appearance of a recycling plant. As teachers passed in and out, heads were shaken in disbelief that all this could end up as something artistic! Each day different classes got their turn working with Joonas. Slowly but surely a beautiful work of art took shape on the bare wooden frame. When Centenary Day came it was ready and hanging on the wall for all to admire. It was worth going to see in the Assembly Room in the school. Thank you Joonas.

History is part of the school curriculum. I was teaching 6th Class and it was probably in the early 1980s. During that school year I met a gentleman on Convent Road and we talked. His name was Mr. Armstrong and he lived on Convent Road also. He was an elderly man and during our chat I told him I was teaching in the local school. He said he would love to show the boys a wonderful historical object that he owned. We arranged a day and date. The day came and Mr. Armstrong came into the room carrying a long pole with the top covered. He removed the cover and there before our eyes was a pike. The class had come across pikes in their history books. Mr. Armstrong told us that is grandfather had been a bodyguard of Daniel O'Connell, the Liberator, and that this was the weapon he carried to do his job. Incredible, but true and all part of Dalkey. We were privileged to meet this resident of Dalkey and it just seemed to the boys he had stepped right out of their history books to talk to them.

I hope you enjoyed reading about people who visited our school at different times but left memories for us to treasure.
