

We have ongoing arrangements with a number of US universities to showcase how both the heritage and the literature of any area can be presented to those interested in developing tourism in their own areas. We are very fortunate in Dalkey to have plenty of scope to work on, in both of these categories.



Fr Desmond Forristal Tribute: The literary heritage will be to the fore again in the Fr **Desmond Forristal Tribute on April 17th.** We are involved with this tribute with members of the parish across the street. Fr Des, in addition to being PP in Dalkey, was a

highly respected playwright and member of the ground-breaking Radharc team in the 1960s in Ireland. He was also a passionate advocate of Cardinal John Henry Newman and wrote a booklet on Newman's time in Dalkey.

Fr Forristal's play **'Trial by Fury'** dealt with the trial of John Henry Newman for criminal libel in 1852. It concerned the reported dubious activities of ex-priest *Giacinto Achilli*. The incriminating documentation was mislaid and the outcome of the trial was in doubt right to the end. The play refers to Newman heading to Dalkey to open the Catholic University in 1854. Newman lived in Mount Salus while in Dalkey.

There will be a rehearsed reading of part of 'Trial by Fury' as part of the tribute evening. Admission, which is free, is strictly by ticket only. Tickets are available during opening times at Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre.

Ireland of the Welcomes: Our *Living History* tour got a five page full colour very favourable spread in the Ireland of the Welcomes magazine, written by Rebecca Brennan. The article entitled '*Medieval Life in Dalkey*' can be read on line at www.harmonia.ie. The magazine is circulated widely internationally and in the US.

❖ TRIBUTE EVENT TO FATHER DESMOND FORRISTAL P.P.


To mark the 30th Anniversary of the appointment of Fr. Forristal to the Parish of the Assumption in Dalkey, an evening dedicated to the performance of his works has been arranged in the Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre on 17th April 2015 at 7.30pm.

Fr. Dermod McCarthy of Radharc and RTÉ, a colleague and friend of Fr. Des has kindly consented to present a selection of readings from the many books written by Fr. Des which will confirm him to be not only an author of outstanding ability, but also a man of compassion and insight with a unique sense of humour.

Mr. Peter Dunn, the director of the Radharc Trust and brother of Fr. Joe Dunn R.I.P. co-founder of Radharc with Fr. Des will show a thirty minute film from the ground-breaking Radharc Series. This series was first broadcast by Telifís Éireann in 1962. Fr. Forristal wrote most of the scripts, and his skill and wisdom contributed greatly to the success of the series, which continued to be broadcast by RTE until 1996.

After a tea break, Ms. Margaret Dunne, Manager of Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre, will stage part of the play "Trial by Fury" which Fr. Des wrote here in Dalkey and which she directed at that time. The St Begnet's String Quartet will provide music for the evening.

Admission is by ticket only. Tickets are free and

may be collected from the Heritage Centre (closed on Tuesdays) opposite the church. Donations will be gratefully accepted on the night, to defray costs and to present a token in memory of Fr. Forristal to further the work of the Radharc Trust.

In addition to the many books written by Fr. Des five of his plays were staged to great acclaim in the Gate and Abbey Theatres. These were "The Horrid Popish Plot", "Blackman's Country", "The Seventh Sin", in which Christopher Casson played God, as well as his later plays "The Captive Audience" and "Kolbe". Many of these were translated and performed abroad. "The Crozier and the Crown" a pageant, was commissioned to celebrate the Dublin Millennium in 1988 and was performed in the Pro-Cathedral to a full house each night.

With the display of such literary talent one might suppose that Fr. Des did not have much time for pastoral duties. However, on the night of his installation as Parish Priest in Dalkey, he assured us, that he was first and foremost a priest, and not just a playwright.

His time in Dalkey was extremely fruitful. In 1991 he supervised the complete restoration of the Church of the Assumption as well as supervising improvements to Harold Boys' School. Likewise, Our Lady's Hall, the Parish Social Centre, was extensively renovated under his direction. He also commissioned the rebuilding of the century old church organ. Frequently, the faithful who slipped into the church for quiet contemplation were treated to an impromptu performance on the organ by Fr. Des, an accomplished musician, and left spiritually and mentally restored. His work with the choir was greatly appreciated by choir and congregation alike. Also his meaningful and concise homilies were greatly valued by the Mass going Congregation.

He formed the "Taize Group" about this time and they still perform at the Sunday evening Mass and the "Prayer Around the Cross" on Good Friday night. The Family Mass Group established by Fr. Des is still going from strength to strength. Children's Prayer Groups and a Youth Group were formed by him, and for many years he brought some of the young parishioners to Our Lady's Shrine in Walsingham in the South East of England to meet and pray with other young pilgrims from around the World. In his easy rapport with young children and teenagers we witnessed an unexpected gem among his many talents. Adult Prayer groups sprung up around the parish, fostered and encouraged by Fr Des's attitude which was to let people show initiative in their spiritual lives and these groups were supported by his prayers and example. To those who did not know him well he may have appeared rather austere but, as many soon realised, he had a keen understanding and empathy with the human condition.

Fr. Des established a close friendship with the Reverend Ricky Roantree, then Rector of St. Patrick's Church of Ireland parish in Dalkey. The relationship between the parishes and the respective communities has continued to flourish to this day.

His swift descent into Alzheimer's meant that as a parish we never had an opportunity to show our gratitude to him for his dedicated ministry.

The late Phyllis Totterdell, his faithful housekeeper, continued to visit him every weekday in Shankill, driven there and back by a loyal band of parishioners. Many other friends continued to visit long after the essence of Fr. Des had gone.

The evening of April 17th will be an opportunity to show that gratitude to Fr. Forristal P.P. May his generous soul rest in peace.



Fast-Ferry Returns? As reported in the last issue, it was the end of an era for Stena Line's HSS Dun Laoghaire-Holyhead service with the final sailing last taken place on 9 September 2014, however the harbour company subsequently invited submissions before the end of February this year for a new operator.

In total, seven operators have expressed an interest to resume the seasonal-only service. DLHC cited that should a new suitable service operator reopen, it would not be running until at least 2016.

Dublin Bay Cruises: By default the closure of the historic Ireland-Wales link leaves Dublin Bay Cruises, as the only large scale passenger service, albeit as a coastal excursion company to remain using Dun Laoghaire Harbour. There are other operators but running smaller private charter craft and yachts.

Like last season, DBC will resume cruises on 1st April, 2015, linking Dun Laoghaire, Dublin City Quays and Howth Harbours. During the evenings, Dublin Bay cruise No.7 also reopens from Dun Laoghaire to Killiney Bay which includes transiting our most scenic Dalkey Sound.

Kayakers: For those who want to take to the water and through a more hands on approach is through Bulloch Harbour based Kayaking.ie, whose activities capturing the magic of Dublin Bay got the Fáilte Ireland 'Living Bay' Tourism Video Treatment.

The YouTube footage, etc. features kayakers hugging our rugged coastline and marine wildlife on Dublin Bay. For more information, there are a variety of kayaking firms, classes and tours in the Dublin area.

As for the Aoife! – The former Naval Service OPV (see Feb. and Nov. 2014 issues) was in fact not put up for public auction but to be 'donated' to the Maltese Navy and a new career also in sunnier climes, but dealing with the harsh reality of people-trafficking.

Up to the time of this Newsletter's copydate, this plan remained uncertain as to whether the veteran vessel dating to 1979 would indeed head for the Med. The Irish Department of Defence remained strong in the belief that their deal would proceed despite issues raised by certain Maltese military quarters as to her suitability.

Notably, the Aoife's inability to easily deploy tender craft to deal with rescuing refugees and illegal migrants found amongst fragile boats fleeing North Africa.

D'Alton D-Day Veteran: As widely reported across mainstream media and online though www.Afloat.ie's specialist sailing correspondent, W.M. Nixon who reported on WWII, Irish veteran Michael d'Alton from Killiney who served the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve (RNVR) on the Normandy Beaches 70 years ago and was honoured *Chevalier of the Légion d'Honneur*.

The nation's highest military honour presented by French Ambassador to Ireland was held on board the naval tanker BCR Somme (A 631) during a visit to Dublin Port in late January. It should also be reported that further coverage of this notable item was published in the March issue of *The Obelisk*, the Killiney Parish Newsletter and where Holy Trinity Church News appears in this newsletter as a regular feature.

Our last IWebs (Irish Wetland Birds) count for the Winter 2014/15 season took place on a lovely mild bright Saturday morning in early March, A linnet was singing from atop a bush beside the Booterstown DART car park. Male linnets had been singing for weeks before but another bird bursting into song a few minutes later was a pleasant surprise. It was a blackcap, the first time this year we'd heard one singing although both a male and a female blackcap have been constant visitors to our garden throughout the winter, feeding on fat balls, apples and occasionally sunflower seeds. I've mentioned many times how lovely their song is, earning them the name of 'Ireland's Nightingale'. Within weeks Dalkey and Killiney Hills should be resounding to the sounds of male blackcaps who have arrived from southern Europe or Africa declaring their territory but here in Booterstown it was still only March and almost certainly this bird wasn't a summer migrant but a bird that had spent the winter here and would probably soon be setting off to summer breeding grounds. Wintering blackcaps have been trapped and, causing no discomfort to individual birds, have had stable isotope analysis done on nail clippings and feathers which have revealed the birds originated in areas of eastern Europe including Germany and Poland. So our wintering blackcaps are from there but the ones we'll have breeding throughout summer will have migrated back to us from further south.

Why birds would sing in places they're not going to try and hold as territory isn't known for certain, maybe they're just polishing up their vocal abilities before they try to attract a mate on their breeding ground.

Nice birds to hear and we were still in the car park! But we had a count to do so we applied ourselves to the task and checked out the marsh. Little spouts of water shooting up from the shallow tidal flow were a cause of speculation as to their origin later with the general consensus being they were caused by shellfish, probably a razorshell expelling water. We dutifully counted the birdlife in the marsh, Black tailed Godwits, Redshank, Dunlin, Greenshank, Teal, Grey Herons and Little Egrets, feeding in the shallow water or sitting on the banks, heads tucked in as they slept, all beautifully lit in the low early sunshine.

But once all the clearly visible birds were counted we turned our attention down to the reedbed in the corner of the marsh. That's where the snipe are found. Always a treat to see, particularly since it's sometimes a challenge to actually spot them. Often if you're scanning trees or undergrowth you might mistake a leaf or a flash of light on a branch for a bird. With



snipe they're so well camouflaged to blend into their habitat you get almost the opposite effect, you'd be looking at a clump of reeds which would suddenly move to reveal it's a snipe. Sure enough there were snipe, basking in the sun at the edge of the reeds and three of them actually walking out in the open, prodding the mud at the water's edge. All the birds in the marsh are handsome in their own way but there's something very endearing about snipe, their ridiculously long bill, big soft eyes and that beautiful zig-zag plumage that shines gold when the sun hits it. We counted 22 and no doubt there were many more hidden within the reeds. Sadly the snipe that breed in

Certified GIS GID Ireland are in serious decline and many of the birds that we see in the marsh are probably birds that are wintering here from Europe. Today would probably be the last time we'd see any till next winter so it was really nice to see so many in such good light.

Out on the strand, though the sea was choppy, there was real heat in the sun, so pleasant compared to counts in cold winds and lashing rain in December and January, even warm enough to leave off gloves. Disturbance can be a problem and when you're trying to count birds on the edge of the tide the last thing you need is a dog arriving whose idea of fun is bounding up and chasing them all as often happens, but today any of the dogs on the strand were content to wander along beside their owner or chase balls rather than waders, which seemed very considerate of them.

The group of Knot on the strand was reduced from its higher mid-winter number of over 2,000 but there was still a flock of over 700 which would suddenly take to the air and twist around in a dense flock like a swarm of bees. They were joined later by a flock of dunlin and all the birds bunched together on a rapidly disappearing spit of sand as the tide drew in.

We'd gone up to footbridge to have a last look

over the sea and the marsh from an elevated point and were about to call it a morning when we saw a Kingfisher flash along the stream below us. We knew it had landed in some dense undergrowth but couldn't see at first it as kingfishers, though a spectacular mix of deep blues, orange and turquoise when the sun hits them, blend in incredibly well with the colours of a riverbank when they're perched and motionless. Eventually we picked it up, perched on the base of a branch. The female of many species of birds is much duller then the male, an adaptation to keep them safe from being spotted by predators when sitting on their nest, but since kingfishers nest in deep holes dug into riverbanks the female has no reason to 'dress down' and has the same spectacular plumage as the male with one significant difference which allows male and female to be told apart. The lower bill, or mandible, in the female kingfisher is orange whereas the male has a totally black bill so we knew this was a female we were looking at. What a treat, and a lovely way to finish the morning.

Don't these lengthening days make this the perfect time to plan our gardens for the summer? So, let's get going now, unleash our creativity so that we can truly enjoy the fruits of our labour. Maybe, concentrate on transforming a dull tired area of your garden into a lush green paradise. Maybe choose from hot and tropical to shade loving to edible herbs, to summer flowering bulbs. What joy we find when we discover new plants that have self-sown; - imagine no soil preparation is involved. no cultivation Plants that do this readily are necessary. Feverfew (a perennial herb belonging to the daisy family), Cerinthes, Alchemilla Mollis, (Lady's Mantle), Aquilegia Vulgaris, (Granny's Bonnets), Meconopsis Cambrica, (The Yellow-Orange flowered Welsh Poppies), Forget-Me-Nots and Verbena Bonariensis. We can too, dig out, scoop up any of these self seeded seedlings and transplant or pot up to sell at charity tables or give to a neighbour or swop.

Again, isn't it such a therapeutic thing to keep our bird baths topped up with fresh water in order to encourage different species of birds into

our summer gardens. Likewise, as we watch our various types of Roses develop their shoots and buds, let's remember that they are generally very greedy feeders and will greatly benefit from feeding as they come into growth.

Rainwater – Honestly, I think there is no better quality water available naturally than rainwater. It seems to have magical properties. For some people, public water is treated with chlorine, fluoride and possibly some other chemicals so it can be a problem for tender seedlings and young plants. It's almost a bit similar to spraying a weak bleach solution on your treasured little darlings. Don't you feel sometimes, that when your garden gets a drenching, an avalanche of rain, (which has nitrogen properties) that it, simply comes alive in a totally different way to when we water with copious watering cans of liquid tomato food or seaweed fertilizer. It's like as if, with our April showers, that our various summer flowers are jumping up at us, waiting to be admired.

TWO IDEAS FOR APRIL

An Alpine Trough – How about making a miniature Alpine Garden in a trough or old sink? Using the right plants, soil and container, means that you'll never have to redo this container again. An Alpine trough can look sophisticated, almost like a small-scale landscape because it is filled with Alpine plants which are often miniature versions of popular perennials and shrubs. Choose perhaps Alpines with different habits, - Danglers, Pin-Cushions, Rosettes, Fluffy and so on. Best to use John Innes No 2 or 3 and

horticultural grit. Use your favourite pebbles to decorate surface and remember to leave all your root balls standing slightly proud, in order to prevent rotting in winter.

A Bug Box – Maybe, make a Bug Box? It will cost you very little and will provide the perfect habitat for beneficial insects, such as Ladybirds, Lacewings, Spiders and solitary Bees. Best to use untreated timber, perhaps a pitched roof, leaving the front open. Cut hollow canes such as bamboos into short lengths to fit into your bug box making sure that the holes are different sizes in order to accommodate different insects. Place your Bug Box in the sunniest part of your garden in order to

attract the widest range of insects.

MIGHT DO MAYBE APRIL JOBS

- Keep an eye on your seedlings, as soon as they have their first true leaves; prick them
 out into pots or modules for growing on. Pinch out the tips of Fuchsia shoots and Sweet
 Pea plants to encourage bushy plants this summer and keep an eye on house plants
 because the warmer weather and longer light hours will encourage them to grow and
 more than likely, they will need more water.
- 2. Beware of late frosts and keep vulnerable plants and new shoots protected at night, if frost is forecasted. Don't be tempted like me! in the past, to put out tender bedding plants until much later in this month.
- 3. Divide pot-grown Agapanthus, though they do like to be crowded but obviously it is necessary from time to time. "Miracles only grow where you plant them"

THE SINKING OF THE LEINSTER





John Ledwich was a postal worker. He is recorded in the 1901 Census as living at No 1, Dalkey Avenue - one of a row of small cottages now demolished - with his wife and six young children. The family later moved to a larger, 2-storey, house at No. 4 Coliemore Road, nearly opposite 'The Club'. The 1911 Census shows the addition of a seventh child.

John was not an ordinary postman: he was a

Sorter of Mail. He worked for the Royal Mail and his employer operated two ships, - the 'Mailboats' - R.M.S. Leinster and R.M.S. Munster which plied between Kingstown and Holyhead carrying foot passengers as well as the Ireland-Britain mail.

A typical day began by taking the tram to Kingstown where he joined 21 colleagues in the

Sorting Room on board the Leinster where they took charge of the bags of Britain-bound mail from all over Ireland. They worked for the duration of the nine o'clock sailing, handing over the sorted bundles to the crew of the 'Irish Mail' train en route for London. They had time for lunch before tackling the inward mail, to be sorted on the return sailing.

The morning of October 10th, 1918 was no different than any other. To start with - except for one thing: the upper decks were more crowded than usual with 592 soldiers - mostly young Irishmen in British uniform returning to their units in France and Belgium after a spell of home leave in Ireland. There were 180 civilian passengers and a crew of 77 on board as well

German Intelligence was well informed on 10th of October 1918 and the U-Boat, UB 123, under the command of Captain Schmidt was directed to the Irish Sea to seek out R.M.S. Leinster, believed to be a troop carrier. About one hour out of Kingstown the second and third torpedoes struck the Leinster and she sank rapidly. The Sorting Room was at the point of impact and John and all but one of his colleagues perished, 37 crew members, including the Captain, also died, as did 115 civilians and 354 of the 592 servicemen.

A number of ironies emerged: a bitter epilogue to a tragic story:

Most of those 354 soldiers would have survived the war as just a month and a day later the Armistice was signed. It was all over; Captain Schmidt and his crew headed for Bremerhaven after their triumph expecting to be highly commended, but UB 123 struck a floating mine en route and all on board were lost.

It was, they said, the War to end all Wars, - yet just twenty one years later, the world was at war again. It was the heaviest loss of life on an Irish ship, ever.

'Enhancing our locality'

Great Dalkey response to widespread graffiti vandalism:

The special February 18th Dalkey Town Hall Presentation was proof that our Dalkey neighbours will just not tolerate a continuation of the level of Graffiti damage being done to our Heritage Town. A total of 77 residents attended our meeting. To-date, 25 have already joined our *Adopt My Street* programme to take responsibility for cleaning their immediate area. Others are welcome to join. The Gardaí and DLRCC are actively involved. Cameras are in place. Our intention is to clean the damage quickly, identify the culprits and assist the Gardaí in taking action. Several have already been caught. A conviction may result in a criminal record which in turn can make it impossible for the vandals to obtain Visas to visit the USA, Australia, Canada, etc.

The DART station has been severely impacted by graffiti in mid- March but we are liaising with Iarnrod Éireann to rectify this situation.

Approach Roads: Part of our focus this year is on the approach roads to Dalkey. Basically, to make them more attractive so that the initial impression of visitors to the town is a positive one. Our intention is to place planters on two of the pedestrian/traffic islands at the 'Squareabout' (e.g. the junctions of Hyde Rd. & Ulverton Rd. -close to the Topaz station). Part of our programme for this year also includes putting in shrub beds at the Hyde Rd./Castlepark Rd. junction; also to improve the shrub bed at The Rise/ Barnhill Rd Jct. We have already partially tidied up the Barnhill Ave/ Rd junction.

Signage: The pedestrian 'Heritage' directional signs erected several years ago were part of

♦ ASK THE PHARMACIST



A Different Day – Easter Sunday 'feels' different. It is impossible to express exactly what makes up that 'feel' - a sense of new life, a new beginning, a freshness. Whether the day is wet or dry for me it always evokes memories of daffodils, bright green grass, pussy willows, brightness and whiteness.

Daffodils and green grass, they are easy to understand. But 'pussy willows'! because of childhood memories of going down a country lane with all the family to collect pussy willows to bring them home and put

them in a vase. They were and remain, magical things - silky, compact, new, yet comfortable.

Why brightness and whiteness? Since childhood I've always had the image of Christ rising from the tomb surrounded by light, dressed in glowing white robes. And there, ultimately you have it.

The resurrection can make sense of all things, take it away and there is no sense being a human being at all. On Easter Sunday, I always feel sorry for those to whom it is just another day, for those children to whom it means only Easter eggs or Easter chickens or God help us, the Easter bunny. For Christian people it is the core of our beliefs and the very wick of our lives.

Even the psychiatrists and psychologists tell us that those with a deep religious faith can best cope with the joys and sorrows of life. Let's get back to Easter, joy and hope.

The above passage was written for the parish newsletter Easter edition 1995 by Fr Des Forristal PP. It is with great fondness we remember Fr Forristal - playwright, biographer, television producer, Co-Founder of the Radharc series (running for more than 30 years) television script writer, talented pianist and organist - all these, but as he said himself, but priest first and above all else. We thank Morag O'Farrell and her team who have organised a Tribute Evening for Fr Des in the **Heritage Centre on 17th April 2015 at 7.30pm.** Presented by Fr. Dermod Mc Carthy it will feature a *Radharc film* and excerpts from Fr. Des's literary works. Admission is free but, due to demand, entry is by ticket only - available from the Heritage centre. 
