stage by Shay Linehan on Tuesday April 4th at 7.30pm. The show is directed by Margaret Dunne



As our days lengthen and our nights warm up, it's about enjoying 'These Precious Moments in Our Gardens, That Truly Is, what Matters'. April is, traditionally, one of the busiest times for seed sowing. The reality for so many of us, involves cramming our gardening activities into a dedicated hour or two of our wellanticipated and well-earned weekend, between chores and grocery shopping. Even so, most of us like to think of gardening as more of a fun activity that can help us to unwind, keep fit and encourage us to express our creativity.

At present, it is such a busy time in the greenhouse with plants to be sown, seedlings to be pricked out and larger plants to be grown on. It is best not to water in the evenings, as nights are still cool and damp conditions could encourage fungal disease. It's so beneficial to leave doors open on a sunny day as air circulation will enhance and boost healthy growth. Some tough little flowers that are easy to sow are Nigella, (Love-in-a Mist), Calendulas, Eschscholzias, (California Poppy) and Sunflowers. You can sow them where you want them to flower but for best, most reliable results, sow them indoors in modular trays and then plant them outside when they are bigger. Cornflowers: few blooms are as blue as these dazzling Centaurea Cyanus. Sow them in April/May in full sun, where they are to flower in high Summer. Raising plants from seed for some is simply exhilarating but some seeds are easier to sow than others....so, perhaps best to choose, plants that will thrive in your site and soil type. Sichizonthus, (also called Butterfly Flower or Poor-Man's Orchid), Zinnias and Cosmos can be sown on windowsills, indoors, now. My favourite flower grown from seed is Larkspur (Consolida Ajacis). They are an excellent cut flower for a vase, lasting a good two weeks and add height and a 'cottagey feel', to your Posy arrangement... Really, the joy of growing your own cut flowers is that, ultimately, you have the freedom to choose what you want to pick and arrange. So, isn't it important to consider how long a flower will last in a vase? It seems a shame to pick flowers that may last for weeks on the plant in the garden but once cut shed their petals within hours or overnight. Some flowers can have a vase life of up to a fortnight and some of these you can grow yourself and cannot buy in a supermarket or in a florist.

Did You Know?

Did you know that Spanish Bluebells were originally grown as garden plants but they have been crossbred with many of our native Bluebells? The sweet scent of our native Bluebells is one of the ways to tell them apart, as the Spanish ones are unscented. Spanish ones also tend to be a paler shade of blue and their flowers grow all around the stem which has a broader leaf. Our native bluebells flower mostly on one side and tend to droop from the top.

Bee - Active and Think About

Bees, from hefty buff-tailed bumble queens that look almost too large to fly, to tiny little species, (half the size of the print on this page) are vegetarians – eating only pollen and

nectar, so they are absolutely dependant upon flowers, but they have different tongues and flight periods, flowers of the right shape need to be in bloom at the right time of the year. A bee will visit several hundred flowers in one day. "Long-tongued bees need trumpet-shaped flowers, others with tiny tongues, need them flat-topped".

MIGHT DO, MAYBE APRIL JOBS

There is still time to dig up perennials, pull them gently into pieces with roots and shoots.

Get More Next Year – Liquidfeeding spring bulbs and deadheading them as their flowers fade will help you get more blooms next year, as the bulbs channel their energy into future flowers instead of making seeds. Better not to tie up daffodil foliage until it naturally turns yellow, as the bulbs need to make food.

Long-term container plants can be given a well deserved boost by carefully, removing the top of

compost and replacing with a layer of fresh compost with controlled and released fertiliser mixed in.

Cut back Winter Jasmine. (*Jasminium nudiflorum*) which can turn almost into an unsightly looking, ugly (though, never so!) bird's nest, if left to its own devices; so cut hard as soon as it finishes flowering and remember, it is most forgiving.

Instead of sowing annuals directly on the ground, sow the seed onto a thin layer of washed sand, silver sand, not builders sand. This will stop weed seeds from germinating: So, you will only get the annuals you want and not the usual tangle of weed seedlings.

Beat Slugs, the Easy Way – Apply some Vaseline around plant pot rims. This will help slugs and snails keep at bay. They also dislike sliding over a layer of horticultural grit.

You can plant your *Gladioli* bulbs in one go as these flowers naturally don't open, all at once.

- Were you aware that Lily pollen, which stains badly, apparently, is also highly poisonous to cats.
- There is a new pink flowered strawberry with a unique sweet flavour, apparently, full of aroma and flavour, (Thompson & Morgan Seed.)
- A breeding break through has created a new French Marigold with flowers in totally unique, russet/ pink, tones - , Marigold, 'Strawberry Blonde', has great weather tolerance and long season



MILK AND THE MILKMAN

A particular sound can revive memories of events from the past. In my case two milk bottles clinked together as I opened the door of a cupboard lately and I remembered hearing that sound for the first time in Dalkey in 1971. The bottles clinked in the hands of Tommy Kenny back then, who was, **The Milkman**.

Milk and milk products have been staple foods for millennia. Irish folklore has a version of the Cattle Raid of Cooley that reveals Queen Maeve being mortally wounded by a skim milk cheese



flung from the sling of her nephew. Another legend tells of an attempt to kill St. Patrick with a poisoned cheese. The Brehon Laws said that a divorced woman was entitled to one-sixth of the produce of the churn after her husband left her! A report sent to the English Authorities in the 16th century advised that the best time to attack the Irish was in February because in summertime they would have plenty of milk "which is their chiefest food".

By the late 19th century small family-operated dairies kept a few cows in urban yards, often in horrificly unsanitary conditions. The milk was sold loose, either over a counter or by a rounds man who called on his customers twice a day as there were no domestic fridges then. The horse drawn cart was king and the milk float was a common sight. The milk float carried one or two large churns or containers with taps at the bottom from which a large can was filled. Carried on the spout of this can were pint or half-pint measures, employed to decant the milk into the customer's jug. The milk was untested and unpasteurised and a threat to public health. In the last two decades of the 19th century and into the 20th century professional dairies began producing milk to the highest standards. One of these was the Hughes Brothers.

James Hughes, with his two brothers, took over his father's dairy herd in Rathfarnham in 1926 and was the driving force of the Hughes Brothers (H.B) bottle milk dairy. They made deliveries by horse and cart in south Co. Dublin. They invested in a pasteurising plant, becoming the first wholesale milk bottling plant to pasteurise milk. Within two years the brothers began producing ice-cream with surplus milk. Refrigeration was provided by generators imported from America. In 1966 Premier Dairies came about with the merging of Hughes Brothers, Dublin Dairies, Merville Dairies, Sutton and Lucan Dairies.

When Tommy started working in the milk business in 1954 he operated out of Mounttown, employed by Lucan Dairies. He was a Glasthule native and walked to his work each day for a starting time of 3.30am. He met and married Breda, a Kilkenny woman, in the 1950's and they had four children, Angela, Raymond, Brian and Eugene. Thanks to her, I learned of Tommy's working life.

After arriving at work he installed the electric battery that had been charging overnight into the car or float. The horse drawn carts had disappeared by now and had been replaced by these silent electric milk cars. Tommy's delivery area was Monkstown, Dalkey and Killiney. He loaded up the milk crates, butter, cream, eggs and, as time passed, yogurt. By 9am he would have his deliveries completed, but his working day didn't finish then. He had to keep accounts with Breda's help. The amounts he took from the dairy each morning, the amounts he delivered to his customers and the amounts he returned to the dairy had to be

reconciled and noted in his account books. He even delivered on Christmas day as customers wanted fresh cream on that day! His children helped him when on school holidays and at weekends. Friday evening was for visiting his customers to settle their accounts. He was accompanied by his large Alsatian *Queenie*, as his friendly security. I asked Breda, was keeping a lot of cash in the house a worry? She told me they had a large mat in front of the fire and Tommy put the money under the mat and *Queenie* sat on the mat. Safer than a safe! *Sheba* later took *Queenie*'s place as guardian of the cash.

When Premier Dairies came about in 1966 with the merging of different dairies, including Lucan, Tommy continued his work and lived in Dalkey on St. Patrick's Road from the early 1970's. So when I came to Dalkey and lived on Carysfort Rd from November '71 it was the clinking of the bottles on Tommy's silent milk car that I heard that winter morning. Later, when I met this much loved and respected Milkman and had the milk delivered to our doorstep, the clinking of full bottles arriving and empty bottles departing made early morning music on our road.

Tommy decided to retire in 1984 as Premier Dairies wanted their employees to own their own rounds. With all the resulting worries of being self-employed, he decided it was not for him. When Tommy died in August 2010 he had enjoyed life to the full with his family and, as Breda said, holidays in the sun gave added zest to his life. I met him on many occasions during his retirement and my mind would go back to the early mornings of clinking milk bottles, a rare and seldom heard sound nowadays in Dalkey.

Loreto's Trip to Dalkey Heritage Centre

On Friday 10th February, the fourth class pupils of Loreto Primary School visited Dalkey Castle and Heritage Centre. Our visit began with a tour of St. Begnet's Church and the graveyard. Our tour guide told us about the architecture of the church, including the archway windows, the roof made from wattle and daub, how the roof was constructed, the bell tower and the holy water font.

After the tour of St. Begnet's Church, we went inside and watched a short film about the history of Dalkey and Goat's Castle. We learned about the murder hole, the trip steps and the archers that guarded the castle up on the battlements. The castle was used to house imported goods that were transported to Ireland from different countries. Wine barrels were stored on the ground floor of the castle, and on the first floor, goods that could be damaged by water were stored, along with other precious items.

Next we looked at the writer's gallery. We saw famous writers, who have links with Dalkey, such as Maeve Binchy, Bono, and Bob Geldof. The gallery was interactive so we could click on a writer's name and find out interesting information about them.

The highlight of the tour was the living history production. During this part of the tour we met a Viking, a slave girl, the cook, Rupert the Archer, the rich merchant who owned the castle and the King of Dalkey. We saw how they would all have lived and worked in the castle. We learned about the food and how it was served, for example, the rich people ate their food off round pewter plates, the archer and warriors ate their food off square wooden plates (they had one "square meal" a day) and the servants and poor people ate off plates that were carved out of stale bread. We saw the barber surgeon's cart, and learned about how they practiced medicine during Tudor times, such as checking a patient's general health by drinking their urine and pulling sore teeth out with a pliers.

At the end of the tour we were awarded with certificates from the King of Dalkey. Our visit to Dalkey Castle and Heritage Centre was fun and informative! We would definitely recommend it and we hope to visit again soon!







ASK THE PHARMACIST



Q. My 6 year old son has been diagnosed with Asthma and has been prescribed a blue and a brown inhaler – what is the difference between these and why are they used?





Common triggers for asthma include allergens (such as dust, animal fur and pollen), other irritants (such as smoke, gases and cold air), exercise and chest infections. Using the right inhalers will relieve the symptoms and control the condition to minimise a flare up.

Asthma is considered to be well controlled if:

- -There are no daytime or night time symptoms
- There is no need to use a reliever inhaler more than twice a week
- The patient has good lung function

*

Treatment of asthma is usually by means of an inhaler although additional therapies may be added if this is not sufficient. Step one of treatment is a blue (reliever) inhaler. This temporarily opens the airways by relaxing the muscles. This is used to treat the tightness in the chest on feeling the symptoms or before exercise to prevent it occurring. It should not to be used routinely more than twice a week. They are generally very well tolerated with very little side effects.

The other type of inhaler used is the Preventer inhaler (usually brown but can vary in colour). This controls and dampens down inflammation and swelling in the airways which reduces the risk of a severe attack. They work best by building up in airways over time (up to 14 days) so it is important they are taken every day even when you are feeling well. They usually contain a low dose of steroids and the lowest effective dose is what is normally used. As they have a local action in the lungs very little is absorbed into the rest of the body which means there is no concern of the long term side effects of steroids. The main risk is of developing thrush in the mouth or hoarseness of the voice. This can be avoided by brushing your teeth or by taking a drink of water immediately after using inhaler.

If your asthma is still not sufficiently controlled (i.e. still needing reliever inhaler) you should contact your prescriber as they may need to add in additional medication.

An important aspect of asthma control is inhaler technique. Your Pharmacist or Doctor can observe you using your inhaler in case the technique is an issue. It is important the drug particles are delivered to the correct part of the lungs and not deposited on the back of the throat. Using a spacer device encourages the particles to deposit in the correct place and this is especially recommended with children.

If you experience an asthma attack – follow the five step rule:

Take two puffs of the reliever inhaler

Sit upright and stay calm

Take slow deep breaths

If no immediate improvement take one puff of the reliever inhaler every minute (up to 10 puffs in 10 minutes or for children up to 6 puffs in 10 minutes)

Call an ambulance if no improvement after following steps 1-4

High flyer – Just past the Aircraft Beacon on top of Dalkey Hill a little bird moving through the gorse bushes looked different enough to warrant a closer inspection and through the binoculars I was able to see it was a male Stonechat. Not uncommon along the gorse beside the railway line and often seen near the Ramparts below the Vico I can't recall seeing one so high up before, although they used occasionally be seen and probably nested on the lower, middle level of the quarry. Handsome, Robin sized birds, with a reddish breast, white collar and the male developing a smart dark head in the breeding season, the stonechat's name derives from their call, likened to the sound of two stones being knocked together. This little area on the top of the hill with a few scattered trees and lot of gorse resembles raised heathland or mountain side habitats and in the past has attracted linnets and whitethroats and some years ago even having a meadow pipit displaying, flying upwards singing and then gliding down, wings outstretched in what is known as a parachuting display. The fact it is potential meadow pipit habitat might also be the reason why, when paying their infrequent visits, cuckoos have often called around this particular area, meadow pipits being their favoured host species in whose nest they lay their own eggs.

After Doris Day – On our first walk over the hills after Storm Doris we could see it had inflicted some serious damage around the woodlands with the trunks of a number of mature trees split in half and some very large branches brought down. We were concerned about the fate of the red squirrels, hoping their drays hadn't been dashed to the ground while they sheltered in them. One of the most reliable parts of the woods for seeing them in proved empty but then, as we emerged from that Scots Pine grove, tearing around a oak tree in front of us was a pair of reds. Whether they'd gone into the securely positioned nest boxes or

moved to the more sheltered side of the hill they'd survived the ferocious winds and later further up the hill we saw two more reds. After wind gusts of up to 120km a hour had lashed the country bringing down power lines and tearing tiles off roofs, up in the trees, still in place, were squirrel drays and birds nests which, although constructed only with a pair of claws and a mouth or beak, had survived the worst nature could throw at them.

Running like clockwork – Recently, when opening a webpage on the BBC radio site, a recommendation for a programme brought me to a very interesting wildlife programme, The Countryside Hour, a weekly feature from Radio Norfolk. Questions and observations about birds would be sent to this radio programme where a specialist guest would answer listeners' queries. One man had phoned in to say he often had Treecreepers visiting a tree in his garden. Treecreepers always move upwards on tree trunks, never down, in a spiralling movement using their stiff forked tail to brace them against the trunk as they extract insects,

grubs and eggs with a slim curved bill. This listener had noticed any time he'd seen them they always circled the tree trunk in a clockwise direction, never anti clockwise, and he

wondered was that always the case. This query totally bemused the ornithologist expert who admitted he had no idea as he'd never noticed but thought it a fascinating observation and was evidently going to pay a lot more attention next time he saw a Treecreeper. Next time I saw one on a tree trunk I watched but couldn't figure what way it was going up the tree. When it wasn't on the farther side of the trunk out of sight it was at the front going vertically up the bark. Some years ago a few members of the South Dublin Branch of birdwatch positioned some nest boxes for Treecreepers on a few trees on Killiney Hill. The Treecreeper boxes have a downward slanting front and a small opening on the side. When putting up nest boxes in parks it's always important to have them out of the reach of curious people. Any of the boxes we put up could only be accessed by ladder so I was never able to check them out to see if there was any signs of occupancy. I don't know if any of our boxes were ever used, traditionally there's a low take up of Treecreeper boxes, especially if there's any good natural sites and since putting up the boxes we've found a number of natural Treecreeper nests in the vicinity, one in a dead trunk and others behind the bark of older trees.

The Jay Way – Birds will rub their beaks against branches to clean off remains of food but the jay I was looking at wasn't just cleaning its bill. It was too far away to see precisely what it was holding in its bill but it was either a fat insect grub or a caterpillar. As I watched, it meticulously wiped it backwards and forwards against the branch it was perched on as if it was cleaning it, sometimes laying it gently on the branch before delicately picking it up again, possibly turning it over before repeating the process. Some species of caterpillars have defences to make them

unpalatable to predators and are often brightly coloured to signal they'd be a bad choice for a meal. These caterpillars can be covered in urticating hairs, the word 'Urtica' is Latin for 'nettle' and these hollow hairs when broken emit the same painfully irritating fluid you'd get from a nettle sting. This should deter many predators and if they do ignore the discomfort and swallow the caterpillars the hairs are indigestible and have to be spat out. What many species of birds do and possibly what the jay I saw was doing, was brushing (or 'scrubbing' as it is known) a caterpillar against the bark to try and remove as many hairs as possible and make it more palatable before swallowing it. As they say with cooking, it's all in the preparation.

Flying into Hobart, the capital of the state of Tasmania, can be quite exciting on a Virgin Australia 737, passing between steep hills and swooping down to a short runway with a small apron and terminal (which is undergoing renewal and expansion).

Or you can always opt for the "Spirit of Tasmania" car ferry which leaves daily from Port Melbourne. Passing through "The Heads", a narrow channel between the Portsea and

Queenscliffe headlands which guard the narrow channel into Port Philip Bay with Melbourne and the river Yarra at the other end of it, the ferry quickly enters the notorious Bass Strait, by most accounts a wild and wonderful channel that separates Tasmania from the rest of the Commonwealth of Australia.

"Tassie" as it is affectionately

known, has a population 520,000 in total, with an area approximately the same as Ireland, and is the most southerly point in this part of the Southern Hemisphere: next stop Antarctica! It is the 26th largest island in the world and over 45% of the island land mass is, remarkably, still today preserved as reserve, national park and heritage site. Its capital,

Hobart, on the southern coast and a former whaling port, contains almost half the island's population with Launceston the other major conurbation, located on the opposite, northern coastline. Tasmania was first discovered in 1642 by the aptly named Dutch adventurer. Abel Tasman and called after him after his patron, Anthony Van Diemen. It was

subsequently part of the British Empire colony of New South Wales but was established as a separate colony in 1825 and renamed Tasmania in 1856. Used as a convict settlement for repeat offenders from the other penal colonies, and for infirm and aged convicts, Port Arthur was the main prison settlement on the island, with up to 2,000 inmates at its peak in the 1840s. Inmates were prevented from leaving the narrow-necked peninsula by a continuous "dogline" of 9 ferocious animals - "Every fourfooted, black-fanged individual

among them would have taken first prize in his own class for ugliness and ferocity at any show"- Herman Melville, 1840 (Crufts,

please note!).

The last of some 75,000 convicts to be transported to Tasmania arrived in 1853 and the settlement finally closed in 1877. Among its most-celebrated inmates was the Young Irelander leader, William Smith O'Brien, who had his own cottage there, after an unsuccessful attempt to escape from Maria Island. Port Arthur remains a major tourist attraction with a well-preserved and presented UNESCO World Heritage historic site. It was, regrettably, also the location of a random mass shooting in 1996 during which 35 people were killed.

Cradle Mountain, in a remote interior range of mountain peaks adjacent to The Walls of

Jerusalem National Park, has fine views for those able and willing to scale the 1,200 metre crag; a close encounter with a Black Tiger snake on the way did not deter your intrepid traveller!

A COSTLY LOSS

At the Monday 28 August 1911 sitting of Kingstown Police Court before Mr. M.C. MacInerney, a Mr. Charles Gordon, Albert Avenue, Dalkey, was summoned by Constable John Dillon for 'for having at Newtown Avenue, Blackrock, on the 27th July, driven a motor bicycle without an identification plate.' Constable Dillon gave evidence of stopping the defendant on the date in question for having no registration [number] plate on his motor cycle. In his defence Mr. Gordon said that at the time he was stopped he was returning from Warrenpoint and that when he had reached Dublin, he noticed that the plate was missing but that is too late to obtain a replacement. Mr. Gordon was fined 5s. [From January 1st 1904 vehicle registration was introduced with all motor vehicles required to display a vehicle registration no. plate].





I was walking along Hyde Park – Dalkey, Co. Dublin – not in Hyde Park – London, on my way to meet a friend, when the thought struck me- "What a good sort he is, entirely reliable". Gerry had promised the week before to give me a ring, and set up a Luncheon date.

He had done just that – 'phoned and we agreed to meet for the lunch I was heading towards. Nothing remarkable in that, you might say.

But I disagree. I think it remarkable that an Irish man or woman for all that, kept his word – not once but twice in the one action.

Be honest, ask yourself – how many times have you parted company with the words, "I'll give you a ring "and never do so. How often have you met someone who says "I must give you a call – what is your number?" "It's in the book"- "Great I'll get it so" – of course the book remains unopened. A modern version of a like encounter brings the question "Have I got your Mobile?" You know they haven't – give it and silence will reign. It is a classical "put-off"

"You must visit us" - "You must call in for a glass of wine" - "I'll have the neighbours in to meet you" - "I'll see you at the races/the show/the church/the funeral/the pub/the club, etc. etc." all of these phrases - for they cannot be considered as invitations, which are in common use in Ireland. They all have one common element - insincerity.

I used to think that the Oscar for insincerity belonged to the Americans – "So nice to meet you" and the classical "Have a nice day", but on reflection, it is the Irish who are the masters of unreliability and insincerity. "I'll be with you in 10 minutes" can stretch from a punctual 15 minutes to an average half-hour."

Try living in that mode in Germany – commercially you'd be dead, socially ignored.

There is a contradictory honesty with such words in France. Nobody speaks the truth so the game of disbelief and second guessing is intriguing – yes the French love intrigues.


In the Arab world, deception is prized especially if the deluded one is a gullible Christian. And so it goes around the world, does anyone mean what they say? What do the Canadians

mean by "You bet"? Yet for all the varied Nationalities I have met, some mentioned above, if an invitation is issued, it is meant and will be honoured.

So, whether it is to a neighbour, or to a distant friend, we Irish, so noted for our hospitality, the moment we issue the invite "You must call"— we silently hope that it will not be taken up. This is modern Ireland. It is a sad reflection on the past when our ancestors did earn the reputation and plaudits for Hospitality, often in very poor circumstances.

The insincerity, and unreliability of the affluent 21st Century Ireland is, I aver, an insult to the past. "Would anyone care for a Jar?"
