Electric Milk Float

It was in the days when milk was delivered by horse and cart daily and very early in the morning. The clip clop of the horse was heard about 5:30am and the horse knew where to stop and Billy the Milkman ran from house to house collecting the empties and delivering the full bottles with their shiny tops. Then technology intervened and a change came about as Billy got an electric Milk Float that whirred along with speed and the horse was retired to pastures green. Christmas was

approaching and excitement was in the air. Milk deliveries were 365 days a year and Christmas Day was no exception. Christmas morning was always a very early morning in our house as my younger brother was first up and making lots of noise. Mam put the kettle on around 8 o'clock and hoped that Billy would soon appear as there was very little milk in the cool box. We children were too busy playing with our presents from Santa to bother with breakfast when there was an almighty crash. We went outside to investigate and Lo and Behold there was the new Milk Float on its side at the end of the road and Billy trying to climb out of it.

Neighbours gathered and Billy was helped out. He was acting funny though. He was talking a lot and wishing everyone a Happy Christmas. He was shaking hands with the men and trying to kiss all the women. He was a quiet man but what was wrong with him now? Mrs. Murphy and Mrs. O'Leary grabbed him and took him off. The Dads held a discussion and the children were sent home to get dressed. When we went back out the Milk Float was parked by the side of the road and the broken glass had been swept up. Mr. McCullogh, one of the few car owners on the road volunteered to bring Billy home. Billy seemed a little better but he still walked with a wobble. Mr. McCullogh called into the Dairy after depositing Billy safely home and brought back a driver who drove the Milk Float back to the depot. We stood at the corner, nurses, mammies, doctors, cowboys and Indians and gazed in awe at the vast white lake that stretched out before us.

It turned out that Billy had received too many "Christmas Boxes" or rather "Christmas Sups" on that frosty morning and this had an inebriating effect on poor Billy. By the time he reached our neighbourhood he thought he was Santa! He had taken the corner too fast and to his detriment and that of our milk delivery as he turned over the Milk Float! After all it was a 'White' Christmas!

No matter what the weather, our local Dalkey Tidy Towns volunteers did not miss even one scheduled work date in 2017 – a total of 125 work sessions! In addition, our Tuesday Project Team met 54 times, including special task days. This enormous commitment was rewarded. In recognition, we were both surprised and overwhelmed to receive the five following awards: National Tidy Towns Gold Medal (Pop. 5001-10,000), Ocean Heroes Group of the Year Award (An

Taisce), DLRCC Tidy Districts Best Town Perpetual Trophy (Pop. 3,000+), DLRCC Tidy Districts Overall Winner Award 2017, and the Dalkey Community Council Endeavour Award. We thank all who have made this possible and also SuperValu Tidy Towns, DLRCC, An Taisce and Dalkey Community Council for their much appreciated recognition and help.

'And of course, in alphabetical order, we thank our relatively small team of DTT volunteers: Sylvia Briggs, Anne Sophie Bruley, Des Burke-Kennedy, Brendan Clark, Lynda Coleman, Malcolm Connolly, Julie Costello, Marius Covacian, Frank Dillon, Daphne Dukes, Miriam English, Kate Hammond, Brian Hanna, Etsuko Kanamori, Anna Kerr, Miriam Lee, Noel McDonnell, Susan McDonnell, Lisa McEvoy, Alan O'Brien, Flor O'Mahony, Penny O'Neil, Ann Perry, John Perry, Johnny Phillips, Martin Quinn, Mary Rigney, Paddy Rigney, Derek Spiller, Una Thornton, Terry Wheatley and Alan Winter. With so many DTT improvement projects this year, all we can do here is attempt to highlight a selection to reflect the enormous efforts made. 'Apologies if we omitted any of significance.

January – Organised with the Bullock Harbour Preservation Assoc. meetings to alert the community to the published development plans – 475 neighbours attended our meeting, 350 Observations were lodged and an Order to Refuse Permission was issued in record time.

February – The Clean Coasts Group and DTT collected 32 sacks of Beach rubbish with 30 volunteers. Our Facebook message alerting neighbours to a local burglary threat had a record Reach of 31,181 people.

March – Toilets installed in Bullock Harbour with support from DLRCC and Dublin Port and a new plinth constructed on the old Crane base.

April – Sorrento Park Summit Compass inaugurated with 72 neighbours, Bagpiper Archie and Cathaoirleach Cormac Devlin; DTT, An Taisce, Harold Boys 5th Class and 22 neighbours worked together on National Spring Clean Day and collected 24 sacks of litter; new DTT Logo unveiled with new blue HiVis jackets; St Begnets Graveyard upgraded with 41 hours of hard work, 3 tons of gravel, 38 graves and 15 hedges cared for; Rushe's SuperValu sponsorship agreement signed.

May – DTT, the Gardai and Harold Boys spearheaded the Bin Your Gum parade; cleared the entire Flags pathway, organised the refurbishment of seven Dalkey road signs, organised a major work project with 15 Salesforce employees and An Taisce in Dillon's Park: made Graffiti Prevention Presentation to Dublin Docklands Business Forum.

June – Village Gate, Cat's Ladder, Dalkey Avenue and Tram Yard all upgraded by DTT; An Taisce and Northern Trust joined DTT team of 14 in Dillon's Park work; Google team of 21 joined DTT in Dillon's Park; space fully prepared by DTT for the Book Festival Marquee.

July – Picnic Benches restored and placed in Dillon's Park; Navigation Light installed in Bullock Harbour; Dalkey Island clean-up day organised by DTT; gardening, weeding and improvements completed by DTT in Dalkey Avenue, Vico Road and Sorrento Road.

August – DTT and Salesforce team of 18 painted the Sorrento Park Bandstand, cut back overgrowth and cleared litter.

September – DTT worked with RTE on production of Tracks & Trails TV programme sponsored by DLRCC; DTT Seven Castles project began; rediscovered Ancient Well in Dillon's Park unveiled; Bullock Harbour upgrading continued.

October – DTT and DLRCC finalised plans for Boulder engraving for Dillon's Park; DTT team completed 48 days of extensive rubbish removal, habitat creation and upgrading for public health and safety in Dillon's Park; Winter weeding and gardening continued in

planted areas throughout Dalkey.

November – DTT combined forces with Dalkey Quarry Rock Climbers to clear cans, broken bottles, etc., in inaccessible locations; Graffiti removal continued with over 2,700 tags cleaned throughout Dalkey to date.

December – Major Dillon's Park three-year project completed providing a safe new and unique place of beauty for our neighbours, friends and visitors.

Throughout every week of the

Annual Points Score Trend is Encouraging

As already reported, it has been a unique year for Dalkey in the National SuperValu Tidy Towns Competition. In fact, the number of awards won by Dalkey caught us by surprise! These included: National Tidy Towns Gold Medal (Pop. 5001-10,000), Ocean Heroes Group of the Year Award (An Taisce), DLRCC Tidy Districts Best Town Perpetual Trophy (Pop. 3,000+), DLRCC Tidy Districts Overall Winner Award 2017, and the Dalkey Community Council Endeavour Award.


Over the 59 years of the National Tidy Towns competitions, scoring in the top 5% of all entries in 2017 was a very encouraging outcome. In plotting Dalkey's points awarded progress by the National Tidy Towns judges over the past 18 years, the trend is very positive, thanks to the enormous work done by over a generation of committed Dalkey volunteers.

So, what have we learned this year to help prepare Dalkey for 2018 and make this an even better place for all?

Here the actual points awarded by the National Tidy Towns judges highlight where we can make progress. On the positive side, we improved in Landscaping and Open Spaces,

Wildlife, Habitats and Natural Amenities, Sustainable Waste, Tidiness and Litter Control. However, we were disappointed in Community Involvement and Planning, Built Environment and Landscape, Residential Streets and Housing Areas and Approach Roads, Streets and Lanes.

The following suggestions would help to resolve these in 2018 and we really need your help to make progress:

- Encourage more volunteers to join us as so many other Towns have done.
- Remove unsightly wires and cables from Castle Street building facades
- Remove weeds from Castle Street chimneys and gutters
- Upgrade and paint buildings on Castle Street
- Add more planted areas to Dalkey approach roads
- Add more Information Panels in areas of historic interest

There was even a quiet room where the younger kids (and scared adults) could escape the mayhem.


Then we had the mid-term break to recharge our batteries, and we now look forward to the winter term.

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The theme of the week of 10th October was 'Maths in Sport' which concluded on the Friday with a cross-curricular STEAM day with pupils throughout the School engaged in a range of activities linking Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Maths. To start the day off the children gathered on the Astro pitch to fill in the shape 'CP STEAM '17'. After this, Prep pupils rotated around the School completing activities linking the STEAM subjects to sport. On the AstroPitch, they completed tasks such as show jumping and a goal scoring challenge and then moved on to endurance tests featuring 'Hang Tight' in the adventure playground.

In the Learning Resource Centre pupils enjoyed activities such as Lego robotics, Minecraft, Scratch coding and creation of stop-go videos also using Lego.


trails around the school, carried out experiments such as measuring, weighing and estimating and worked on sports themed art.

MATHS WEEK AND CODING WEEK AT LORETO PRIMARY SCHOOL

We celebrated Maths Week and Coding Week in Loreto Primary School from October 16th – 20th. It was a very busy week considering the school was closed for two days due to Storm Ophelia. A CHAOTIC CHRISTMAS

How could I ever forget that Christmas? The impact of what we could have caused really only occurred to me many years later when I had children of my own. I was six years old, the eldest of four siblings. Excitement was high! Santa was coming tonight!

We had loved all the fun we had during the week getting ready for Santa. It was all about Santa! The coloured lights blinked at us from the giant Christmas tree. The baubles, which we had hung on its branches, balanced precariously as we took the balloons on and off the tree. The best game was to have a race around the room hitting the balloon through the loops in the decorations. These hung, beautiful and colourful, in a kaleidoscope effect from the centre light in the ceiling.

Now we were having the most amazing fun, as Joey the budgie flew around or crouched in fear up on top of the pelmet. Yes, a budgie! Auntie Sheila had arrived for Christmas in all her glory – fur coat, suitcase and her new acquisition, Joey.

We thought he was great. He could even say hello! My mother didn't share our adoration of Joey.

Plum puddings and Christmas cakes had all been made with great care ages ago. But now the business of stuffing the turkey, preparing the vegetables, making mince pies and many more essential matters needed to be dealt with. Two more relations were invited for Christmas day. There was always an air of tension between my mother and Sheila, her unmarried sister. Not surprising when I look back and can vividly picture Sheila relaxing in the midst of chaos sipping a sherry by the fire. And now to add to the work overload for my mother, we had Joey to contend with!

Daddy was bustling around bringing in the coal and logs. Tea was nearly ready and all the adults were in the kitchen. We started to run riot in the sitting room! Memories of Halloween Sparklers had lodged in our little brains. SOMEONE got the ingenious idea that we could have our own Christmas Sparklers! We could light the sticks which were kept in the fireside box seat, specifically for the purpose of lighting the fire. So, we stuck them into the fire and when they lit we danced around excitedly swirling the sticks and watching the sparks fly – but not very successfully – not like the real Sparklers.

"Tea is ready" came the call from the kitchen, and someone was coming to collect us. We quickly threw the sticks into the fire, innately knowing what we were doing would not meet with approval – strange how that works without being told!

SOMEONE quickly came up with the idea of putting their stick somewhere else rather than the fire.

We ate, laughed and trick acted at the kitchen table. Suddenly strange noises emanated from the sitting room. Sheila recognized Joey's poor little squawk and raced off to tend to him. Hysterical screams and squawks followed! The sitting room was a wall of smoke. Pandemonium ensued. Daddy stumbled in. He opened all the windows. The fire brigade was called – more excitement or what for us children!

The source of the fire was quickly identified. The sofa! The sofa was billowing out black smoke. All were puzzled as to why. My poor mother was in a state of collapse. Sheila was in a state of hysteria. Joey was retrieved in a feeble ball of feathers – but not quite dead. Daddy was bewildered as he tried to cope with us children, all now confined to the kitchen. The fireman announced the cause of the fire. Murder ensued!

Would Santa still come? What about the chimney? Would he be able to see our slippers all in a row on the carpet in front of the fireplace? The adults were in shock but I can't

remember any chastisement. As we were put to bed Daddy had big heartedly taken the line of "count your blessings" and "what might have happened".

Our night prayers rapidly said we were tucked in having been told Santa would find a way to sort it – 'all will be well'.

The fact that on that Christmas day our blackened sofa was out on the front garden, the wallpaper limp and grey, decorations removed, carpet blackened, didn't dampen our spirits. After Mass and breakfast, as was the family tradition, we lined up outside the sitting room, youngest going first. As we rushed in, there in front of the fireplace by our slippers was a pile of boxes and toys. The rest of the day was spent in the dining room, especially the adults, in front of a well-guarded fire, Sheila cooing at Joey in his cage – the hero of yesterday!

SINTERKLAAS: A FEAST IN DUTCH TRADITION



Sinterklaas with his Black Peters

Sinterklaas or Saint Nicolaas is the patron Saint of Children. An elderly man with a long white beard and hair, he wears red bishop's robes, a mitre with a cross on it, holds a gold-coloured crozier and lives in Spain. He carries a big red book in which is written whether a child has been good or naughty during the year. He comes every year by steam boat to Amsterdam bringing with him his many helpers, the Zwarte Pieten (Black Peters). These are people with blackened faces dressed in colourful clothes with lace collars and feathered caps. There's quite an opposition now from black people to the fact that the helpers are black and they

want to change this tradition. (I believe there are now blue and green Peters).

As soon as Sinterklaas arrives in Amsterdam, he leaves his boat and travels through the city on his white horse, while his Peters throw *Pepernoten* (spiced tiny round biscuits) and sweets around for the children, who are lined all along the streets. This trip has become very elaborate over the years. Nowadays, his boat arrives with a kilometre long line of other boats and floats. It has become a huge spectacle, broadcast on T.V. for all to see. Although every town has its own arrival of Sinterklaas and his helpers.

When Sinterklaas is in town children lay their shoes beside the fireplace before their bedtime, along with a carrot and some hay for Sint's horse. Then they sing some of the special Sinterklaas songs. Usually they will find a large chocolate letter, the initial letter of their name, in their shoe, that's if they have been good! In my time – before psychology took hold – we were told that if you were bold black Peter would put you in a sack and bring you to Spain to teach you how to be good. You would certainly not get presents, but I never heard of that happening.

Sinterklaas is celebrated on his birthday, the Fifth of December. They were the best feasts during my childhood. If celebrated well they are the most creative ones and a lot of fun. This was the time presents were given, not on Christmas day like in Ireland. The givers usually didn't attach their names to the presents, although most of the time you had a good idea who the giver was.

In school we did the Kris Kindle system; everybody would put their name in a hat and take somebody else's name out of it to give a present to. A price limit was set, usually quite low. It was never about the value of the present but more about how you gave it. First of all you were expected to write a poem with it. The content might refer to why that present was chosen; there could be a bit of teasing in it, some bad habit highlighted. Or the present was made very hard to open. Once a present was wrapped in cotton wool and then covered with golden syrup. I still remember the boy trying to open it and in the process becoming totally covered in bits of sticky cotton wool. With forty children in the class it took all day for each child to read the poem and open the present with the full attention of everybody. We would be weak with laughter at the end of the day. And often these awkwardly composed poems could be very amusing too.

In our house it was great fun too, as my parents (who were deaf) were very good at it. Due to the difficulty with language deaf people are often good at practical jokes. My father especially loved them and I think I must have inherited some of that to the great discomfort of my husband, Frank. It would be quite normal to start thinking and working on the surprises and poems way in advance and to make sure everything would be hidden out of sight till the night of the 5th of December.

Here are some of the surprises that happened in our house:

My father, who knew that my mother would like a dog, but didn't want the bother attached to dogs, carved one out of wood and hollowed out the inside. He then put a present in it for my mother and asked us at some stage to tell her that we heard a dog barking outside the front door. When she opened the door she saw the dog with a poem in his mouth, telling her that he wouldn't be any bother and that his insides only needed to be relieved once.

Or at some other occasion when my sister's boyfriend and his brother, both from Surinam, spent Sinterklaas with us. They were both medical students. They were told at some stage that somebody very sick was at the door who needed medical attention. My parents, who had made a full human sized puppet out of a variety of materials, put the puppet against the door. So when the students opened the door the puppet fell on top of them with a poem explaining that he was ill and needed examination. All the presents for the whole family were hidden in the various body parts.

When it was Frank's first Sinterklaas experience in our family, I warned him about the possible practical jokes that might be in store for him. So, I advised him to turn the tables and dress up as Sinterklaas himself. When he did and rang the bell my father appeared as Sinterklaas and so did my brother later-on. That night we had three Sinterklaases taking charge!

Because I always thought it to be the best feast I have passed on this experience to my children and grandchildren. The Dutch Society in Dublin at the time was very active and had always a big feast in the Philips building. It included Sinterklaas's arrival on his white horse with his black Peters at his side and all the goodies such as the chocolate letters and the *Pepernoten* with a children's show.

Since travelling is so much cheaper now and everybody can order online the Dublin Dutch Society has petered out. I don't think it exists anymore. As I wanted to continue the tradition with my grandchildren I found a way of telling the story of Sinterklaas through puppetry, songs and some drama. Being able to order all the goodies online is a great help too. Every year we find a new way of finding the presents, usually through clues in the poems which they find in the letterbox, in their shoe or even now as a text.

This year because some of my family are in Australia, we had to find a new way of celebrating together. With the aid of Skype, the texting of poems, the special sweets and by being dressed up, we managed to hold onto some of the magic.

Winter temperatures in December and January can be at their coldest, making food and water a Wildlife Lifeline. Maybe, consider which berrying and seedbearing plants you can add to your plot to improve its wildlife value. Trees are the real stars right now, so let's embrace them – isn't there a stark

beauty about our Dalkey Trees when they are frosted? Maybe, illuminate your favourite tree to emphasise its texture and form. December is the traditional month to pollard trees, especially ornamental trees. Our Festive Season is traditionally associated with Holly, Christmas Trees, Yule logs, Ivy and Mistletoe. ... Why not try to grow your own Mistletoe, if you are lucky enough to have your own host tree such as Apple, Hawthorn, Lime or Popular. Simply, collect some berries from a Mistletoe plant and rub them into the

cracks of the bark, then let the Mistletoe flourish from your tree's nutrients – really, growing Mistletoe is fairly easy and this is why we see so much of it for sale at present. Every precious month of our year has its floral highlights and our Winter has a particularly beautiful palette of scented beauties such as: Mahonias, Saroccas, then Daphne Bholua whose scent is so powerful, it can travel for many metres. Again, there is Lonicera Fragrantissima, also known as 'Kiss-me-at-the-Gate' and 'Sweet Breath of Spring', and not forgetting Viburnum 'Winter Wonder'; it may look like an unassuming shrub but Viburnum gives off the most gorgeous scent in the coldest of weathers

MIGHT DO, MAYBE DECEMBER/ JANUARY JOBS

Many Hollies of moderate vigour make good choices for the average garden. Some can be planted as a potted standard, such as Silver Queen, making it an outstanding focal point, for year round interest. We need a female tree with a male tree nearby to guarantee beautiful berries. Confusingly, some cultivars with female names such as *Ipex Acquilfolium*, Golden Queen and Silver Queen are actually male plants. Black spot, sometimes appears on pansies and violas, the best

advice is to avoid growing them in the same spot each year.

Remove Hellebore leaves in late December. This will reduce problems with leaf spot diseases and allow you to see the flowers as they emerge in the New Year.

Young Bay Trees are susceptible to frost, so move them somewhere sheltered for the Winter.

A compost heap or log pile provides frogs and newts with a warm shelter to stop them freezing.

Give quality Bird Food Mix with ingredients such as flaked maize, sunflower hearts and seeds and peanut granules. Some cheaper mixes are often less nutritious. Birds actually fluff up their feathers to minimize the loss of heat from their bodies when they are seriously hungry. So, please don't assume that our birds aren't hungry when they look plump. Remember too, to clean and then add water to suitable containers for them to drink. Floating a tennis ball on the surface of your pond can stop ice taking over and keep your fish and pond wildlife safe.

Why not for this year, 2018, choose A Sedge With An Edge. ... There are numerous varieties out there, some are more varied and versatile in their garden uses than others and you know, they have become one of our most popular, stalwart perennials in our nurseries today, providing striking colour combinations, texture and movement, and in most cases require little or no maintenance. ... Japanese blood grass '*Rubra*' is a stunner as is 'Red Baron' with its distinctive upright bright green blades whose upper half turns cranberry – red in Summer.

Bush shrub roses such as Hybrid Tea, (also known as large flowered) flower best on strong new growth made during the current year. Plants that are left unpruned eventually produce a tangle of weaker new stems and few flowers. Annual pruning is essential to promote vigorous new growth with the maximum flowering potential. Best to prune after our worse Winter weather has passed.

You can still plant out ferns and grasses as they look as lovely covered in frost as they do in bloom.

Many house plants are from brighter, more humid climates so water and feed less now and remove from cold drafts.

Winter Break - A Chiffchaff was a surprising and very welcome visiting bird to our garden in late October. Once only a summer migrant, it's been known now for many years that some individual chiffchaffs will overwinter here and in the UK. One individual used to spend the winter months behind SuperValu in Deansgrange in the bushes along the banks of the stream that runs beside the linear parkland. Unless the water froze, beside the stream was always a good spot for insects and if the weather got really cold they could always take to the air and fly south which a lot of us do in winter as well.

Helping Hedgehogs – An organisation that deserves mention for the great work it does is Hedgehog Rescue Dublin run by Yvonne McCann. I spoke to Yvonne, who gave up her job as a keeper at Dublin Zoo to look after injured and orphaned hedgehogs full time and she said at that moment she was looking after 40 hedgehogs and was expecting another four to be brought in that day. Many are young hedgehogs which are still active and wouldn't have gained enough body fat reserves to survive hibernation so Yvonne's organisation takes them in and feeds them over winter before releasing them in the spring. She says autumn juvenile hedgehogs are still out and about, often found out in the daytime, and as it's now getting cold these young hedgehogs will not reach hibernation weight and will slowly starve to death. She states they need to be rescued so if you find one please put it in a high sided box with a hot water bottle, some cat food and some water and then get in touch with her organisation. Contact Yvonne, Hedgehog Rescue, Dublin Quay Road, Rush, Co. Dublin K56 TW62.

Many of the hedgehogs she takes in over the year are orphaned babies and underweight juveniles but she also takes in many injured adults. Many hibernating hedgehogs suffer horrific injuries from garden strimmers but Yvonne asked me to emphasise that one of the main causes of fatalities in hedgehogs is poisoning by slug pellets which contain methaldehyde and she says if even one person who reads this stops using them it will be worthwhile.

On Hedgehog Rescue Dublin's Facebook page there are wonderful photos and videos of some of her little guests which at the moment are housed in her garden shed. They released 57 hedgehogs into the wild last spring after caring for them over the winter but space is a big problem and she needs to build a new unit to house them. She plans on incorporating an incubation area and hygiene problems can be addressed much better in a purpose built unit. Her brother, who is a builder, is going to build the unit and the sum she's looking for is quite modest. All her funding is from donations and she has started a fund-raising page to fund building the new unit. There's an Adopt a Hedgehog scheme as well for which you get a sponsorship pack and you can name your hedgehog.

Furry Fellow on a Fir - Lots of cones lay underneath the grove of Douglas Fir trees



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above the car park but it was one that had been stripped of its scales that caught our attention. It had evidently been dropped by a squirrel but which species, red or grey, we couldn't know. But this time we were in luck, the pitter-patter of dropping cone scales was from a red, sitting on a branch above us gnawing away at a cone held in its front paws. Greys do prefer mixed woodlands of broadleaved trees while reds do much better in a conifer plantation but a big advantage the greys have is their capacity to eat acorns, a seed whose tannin content makes them toxic to reds until they are fully ripe but greys can eat them at any stage of their development. One theory as to why greys can absorb acorns better is that we only have two native oaks and there are many more oak species in the greys' native North America and the greys have evolved to make them an important part of their diet.

Richard Thorington, curator of mammals at the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History and a world renowned expert on the 285 squirrel species found around the world tells of research that found some fascinating behaviour by the greys in their native habitat as they collect acoms.

They can tell the difference between the acorns of white oak and red oaks and store them accordingly. 'Whites germinate quickly, almost as soon as they hit the ground,' said Thorington, 'and the squirrels tend to eat them immediately since a germinated acorn loses nutritional value. Conversely, red oak acorns don't germinate until spring, so the squirrels prefer to bury those for winter snacking.

A 1996 study in the journal *Animal Behavior* observed some squirrels biting through the embryo of white oak acorns, essentially paralyzing the seed's ability to sprout. The

squirrels then buried the modified white oak acorns as they would have with the reds. What's more, the scientists witnessed the squirrels digging up red oak acorns that they didn't need to eat over the winter, nipping off their embryos, and re-burying the food for later use.'

But back to the red above us. We've found over the years you can often find reds feeding on the same tree for a succession of days, or even months as we found last year when we saw one in a Scots Pine in November and it and other reds were still feeding in that and a adjoining pine till the following March,



We went back to the same Douglas Fir trees for over a week and the red squirrels were still there. We saw this one, which hadn't been trapped and marked with an ear clip so it was almost certainly a juvenile born this year.

A DALKEY 1922 CAR THEFT MYSTERY

In September 1922 Republicans were very active militarily in the Dalkey area and in the early part of the month, what was described as a 'very valuable motor car', the property of Major Bryan Cooper, 'Kyber Pass', Dalkey, who was in Britain at that time, was reported as missing from this address and following a thorough search for it, was recovered intact by the Dublin Metropolitan Police in Monkstown. It was noticed that very little petrol had been used but despite detailed inquiries the police were never able to discover who stole it or for what purpose. Was it stolen by Republicans for use in an operation or a joy rider of that era? That's a mystery that still waits to be answered.

The role and contribution to education by the Dominican Sisters and the De Salle Brothers is acknowledged while extensive coverage is devoted to 'Wicklow During the Troubles' which spans the key events between 1916 and 1923.

Three excellent addendums cover 'Wicklow's Church's – Past & Present', 'Wicklow's Oldest Buildings and Most Famous Ruins', concluding with a 'Pictorial Stroll through Wicklow's Past' featuring numerous images from the past to the present time.

All-in-all, a really excellent history of this premier County Wicklow Town – copies are available from Bridge Street Books, Bridge Street, Wicklow Town.
