

SUMMARY OF DCC DECEMBER & JANUARY MEETINGS

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Summary of the final DCC meeting for 2013 held on Monday 2nd December in OLH.

DTT: The DTT has worked hard through 2013 to keep the town tidy. The car park behind the supermarket proves to be a challenging area for littering and it is hoped that this situation will improve in 2014.

NW: The crime trend for the month was down considerably on the same period for last year. However vigilance is still called for and any suspicious incidents should be immediately reported to the Gardai. The Dalkey patrol area has been altered and is now on only the left side of Castle Park Road, all Barnhill Road, Killiney Road, Oakdene, Killiney Hill Road, Shankill and the coast to Bulloch Harbour. It is hoped that a second Community Garda will soon be appointed to help Garda Cathy Burke. Susan thanked Cathy and expressed our appreciation for her support in the community.

AOB: Attention is needed for the double yellow lines that have faded on the Vico Road and this matter will be followed up. The meeting finished and adjourned for refreshments.

Summary of the January Monthly Meeting held on Monday 6th in OLH.

TT: DTT are in dialogue with the Parks Dept and will have further meetings in the New Year. Included in the projects for 2014 is a refurbishment of St. Patrick's Square. The residents will be consulted to submit ideas and encouraged to participate in the upgrade of the square.

NW: There have been several burglaries in the area and the Gardai remind us all to be careful and secure our property. Also it is very important not to give personal or bank details to anyone calling door-to-door or soliciting on the street.

AOB: The Christmas celebration event was a great success. There were some complaints about the traffic problems that arose and this will be reviewed for next year's event. There is a plan to set up a First Responder Group in the Dalkey/Glenageary/Sandycove area and Andrew Patton is driving this worthwhile initiative. Please refer to page 35 for further information.



There is a growing demand for venues for civil ceremonies. In addition to the HSE, the humanist society has been licensed to officiate at weddings.

A BOAT SERVICE FROM COLIEMORE HARBOUR TO DALKEY ISLAND IS PLANNED TO RECOMMENCE FROM APRIL/MAY NEXT

Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council has agreed to permit the restoration of a boat service from Coliemore Harbour to Dalkey Island from April/May next. It has not permitted a licensed boat operator to ferry passengers from the harbour to the island during the past three years because of safety concerns for passengers embarking at Coliemore and at the slipway on the island.

The Council has decided to set aside €63,500 to carry out the safety improvements to the harbour which are deemed necessary in the short-term before the restoration of a ferry service can be permitted. These minor repairs are expected to be completed by April/May next. According to a consultant's report prepared for the Council further structural repairs to the harbour should be undertaken in the medium-to-long term. It seems the Council will apply for funding to carry out these repairs under a range of government programmes.

The Council has also prepared a plan to upgrade the slipway or pier on the island itself. This is deemed necessary on safety grounds also and is seen as part of the Conservation and Management Plan for the island which the Council adopted in Autumn 2013. An application for a foreshore license to carry out this relatively minor work was made to the Dept. of the Environment in January 2012. Some two years later the Council has not received a decision on its application.

While Council officials have commissioned a plan of the improvements which are necessary to the island slipway, they have selected a company to carry out the necessary work on the island and have set April/May next as the completion date for this project also, this timeline is increasingly under threat in the absence of the foreshore license. Council officials and councillors are pressing the Dept. to provide the foreshore license without further delay so that the restoration of the boat service to the island will not be put on hold for another year.



On Wednesday evening last, a small ceremony was held in the Grotto where a Palestinian and an Israeli Scout took a light from the flame and carried it to Tel Aviv airport. At the airport the Peace Light flame was given to a young Austrian Scout who brought it to Vienna. Last Saturday, a Peace Light Service was held in Vienna. The young Scout carried the flame to the font of the Church and lit the Viennese Peace Candle. Representatives of Scout associations from all over the World were then invited to light their lamps from this candle and to return to their homes with this symbol of Peace.

During the next few days, this Peace Light from Bethlehem will be taken by members of the Irish Scouting and Guiding to churches and

other places of Christian worship; to hospitals and to hostels for homeless people, across the length and breadth of Ireland.



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




Ciao, everyone!



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❖ DALKEY RESPONSE TO TYPHOON HAIYAN IN THE PHILIPPINES ❖

Like everyone else I was shocked by the loss of life and the total devastation caused by Typhoon Haiyan. However I was relieved that our son Shay was safe and well in Manila as a few days earlier he had been attending a conference in Tacloban - the city which was virtually wiped out by the storm. As a result I felt obliged to help the victims in some way. Hence the birth of the



Typhoon Haiyan.

Dalkey Drive. Well aware of the generosity of the Dalkey Community I contacted the Irish Red Cross and put the collection programme together.

Thanks to your response we have raised the substantial amount of €11,021 which has been lodged to the Irish Red Cross no. 2 account for the Philippines Haiyan Disaster Relief.

A special word of thanks to Gerard Byrne and Liz, who organised a musical evening in his Studio and donated €3,020 to the appeal.

Our friends in Kinsale ran a farmers' market and a coffee morning and raised €2,790.

Aoife Miller organised a ladies' coffee morning in her home and raised the very generous sum of €825.

Hewlett Packard staff in Broomhill Business Park, Dun Laoghaire, Rathdown Chamber of commerce, Members of Kilmashogue Golf Club and the D.A.R.A. Choir each made donations of several hundred euro from collections, raffles etc., organised by members and staff.

A website was set up in conjunction with the Irish Red Cross and €1,000 was raised from Ireland, England and Australia - so the Dalkey Drive became global.

The rest of the money was raised through the Irish Red Cross collection buckets in all three chemist shops in Dalkey, the Post Office, Supervalu and Dalkey News centre.

Powerscourt House also made a bucket collection.

Thank you to all the above for taking responsibility for the buckets and to the people of Dalkey for their generous donations.

A special thanks to Gerard Coakley, Gerard Long, Finbarr Madden, and Pat O'Farrell, who collected the buckets, counted the money and made the lodgements and to Margot Keogh who helped in various ways.

We are grateful to Father Devitt and Father Gallagher for allowing us to use the church facilities for the counting process.

We received the following text message from Miss Quibilan a marine scientist at the University of the Philippines, who is a colleague of Shay's.

"As a Filipino, from the bottom of my heart, I would like to personally thank the people of your home town for extending help to the victims of the typhoon. We still face a long and difficult road ahead, in terms of rehabilitation for the affected families, so any help in whatever form is very much welcome. God really works in mysterious ways.

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

Last year I mentioned that in the middle of winter a branch of a Horse Chestnut tree had produced new leaves at least five months before it should have. Again this winter the same branch on the same tree had bright green leaves unfolding in November but it wasn't the only one this time. Another horse chestnut on Killiney Hill had new leaves unfolding but once again it was only a little crop of leaves on one single branch. But elsewhere on the hill at least four Sycamores had new full bright green leaves appearing a month before Christmas, some shooting from low stumps but one tree covered in new growth on all its branches.

These freakish occurrences of plants blooming way too early and birds mating and nest building months before they should are now reported almost every year (a few years ago a large outdoor Christmas tree had to be left in place way after the season had ended because a blackbird had started to nest in it), sometimes cited as evidence of climate change and indeed the differences between seasons does seem to be becoming less well defined every year. The only constant that won't change is the length of the days and these are usually the signal that nature responds to, telling flowers to send up new growth and birds to start looking for partners, but when the temperature in November is often warmer then the temperature in April you can't blame some creatures or plants for getting confused.

In fact its usually in the new year that the weather gets hardest for little creatures and late winter and early spring can be very difficult for garden birds with the temperature low, frosty nights and all the natural food, seeds and berries, gone. Birds can't carry excess fat and they burn up a lot of energy keeping warm at night. If you're lucky enough to have Long tailed tits coming to your feeders (they seem to prefer fat balls and peanuts to sunflower seeds) you might notice they are often the last birds to visit the feeders in the evening. They are so small, with such a tiny body mass, they have to keep feeding till the last opportunity before dark. There was a fascinating bit of footage shown on TV where somebody had filmed a little group of long-tailed tits settling down on a branch to roost on a winter night. Two of them were perched huddled together on a branch then another bird arrived which, instead of perching on either side of them, actually landed on top of them and pushed its way down so it was between them. The next birds to arrive all did the same thing pushing their way into the middle where it was snug and warm. It might be the early bird gets the worm but it would seem in this case the late bird gets the best seat.

Currently I'm refilling four or five bird feeders every day and since there's such a demand from hungry birds I sometimes neglect to clean the feeders which could leave them as a potential source of infection. If the weather is mild and wet fungus and mould can grow on uneaten seeds or peanuts. Even if the food itself is clean, if any birds fly in to the feeders that themselves might have a disease that can spread to other birds.

A very nasty disease Trichomonosis (known as Canker when it affects doves and pigeons) became very noticeable in 2005 and caused a serious decline of some garden bird species especially Greenfinches which were very hard hit by the disease. Affected birds show signs of general illness (lethargy, fluffed-up plumage) and may show difficulty in swallowing or laboured breathing. Infected birds having difficulty swallowing food will sometimes vomit it up and if this is eaten by other birds it can spread the infection

The BTO (British Trust for Ornithology) recommends the following precautions to prevent its spread:

'Suitable disinfectants that can be used include a weak solution of domestic bleach (5% sodium hypochlorite) or other specially-designed commercial products. Always rinse feeders thoroughly and air-dry before reuse. Rotate positions of feeders in the garden to prevent the build up of contamination in any one area of ground below the feeders. Empty and air dry any bird baths on a daily basis.'

The disease is not transmitted to humans and does not have any potential to cause harm to us so don't be put off feeding birds when they need it most.

Apart from birdseed apples 'spiked' on branches or threaded on a wire are a great source of energy for the birds that don't normally come to the feeders like blackbirds and thrushes.

Most songbirds don't sing during winter, saving their song till the breeding season, but there are two very noticeable and welcome exceptions, Robins and Song Thrushes. Robins are one of the few birds to defend territory during winter and their song which often seems to have a slightly melancholy quality on short cold days but the singing Song Thrushes are a different matter. Beginning in November they pour out their song starting before sunrise and later serenading out the short days at sunset. It is reckoned that these song thrushes are young males who haven't bred before and you'll notice that the birds singing in winter will often have gone elsewhere by spring time. I always think the real sign that winter is over is when I hear my first blackbird singing. Last year I heard my first one singing on 6th February which was early enough but whether early or late this year I'll be very glad to hear my first one and his beautiful mellow song.

It proves very difficult to leave the beautiful Barossa Valley once you arrive and this February issue still finds me among its soft rolling hills and fertile soils. Temperatures are just above forty degrees at the moment which is helping the grapes to reach maturity, ready for the 2014 vintage, which should be in full swing by the time you are reading this.



Whilst touring around the vineyards of the Barossa I was

once again drawn to Bethany Wines. This time, however, I was lucky enough to meet with the director Geoff Schrapel whom I previously met while working with O'Brien's Wines. The Cellar Door is set in one of the most picturesque places in the Barossa (see picture). You can really get the most out of the Bethany Wines' experience by picking up their picnic platter and a glass of their award-winning wine at Cellar Door and enjoying it in their grounds looking at their panoramic views of the valley. While waiting for Geoff we were given a fantastic tasting by Helen who greeted us as we arrived. It was fantastic not only because of the exceptional wines but also because Helen had such a knowledge of the wines, the estate and the history of Bethany.....all up we tasted seven wines but unfortunately time is short and I would have to go into next month's issue to talk about them all, but for me, a few stood out.

The vineyards Cabernet Franc is the sole variety used to make Bethany's epic Rose wine. This grape is the baby of Cabernet Sauvignon and Sauvignon Blanc and is mostly used in France to make Rose and in Canada for their famous ice wines. It was sourced from their 40 year old vines which are positioned directly in front of their Historic cellar door at the base of the Barossa Ranges. This is a dry Rose with soft tannins which is balanced perfectly with its black cherry fruit. Match it with salmon or a spicy antipasto dish and you are onto a winner.

The Barossa Valley is most famous for its mighty Shiraz and mighty it is. The 2010 Bethany G6 Shiraz will shortly be on its way to Ireland vying for a place on the shelves of O'Brien's Wines nationwide. Looking at the vintage report is the only way I can predict how fabulous this wine will be because it is not sold in Australia. The 2010 vintage was a fantastic year and produced fabulous wines throughout the Barossa and if Bethany's other red wines are anything to go by it is one not to be missed. It is exclusive to O'Brien's Wines in Ireland. So pick up a bottle and enjoy because it is perfect for a cold night by the fire. I on the other hand will stick to their chilled Rose to get through this heat wave.



Solas Project currently has seven programmes running and further information on each programme can be found at www.solasproject.ie

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
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One of the major entries on the School's annual calendar is the celebration of CP Day on 15th

Each year group has a theme, for example, "how to be a better person" for the younger pupils through to study skills and personal development plans for the older

children. The Personal Development Days are structured with fun activities and games whilst also allowing the opportunity for the children to enjoy some quieter time focusing on themselves and their role within the school community.

A complimentary whole-school activity also introduced this year involves our entire extended community of pupils, staff and parents in the creation of a Gratitude Board. This has afforded the children and their families the opportunity to discuss, share and display what they are grateful for in their everyday lives whilst re-focusing on



the important (but sometimes taken-for-granted) things that make their lives positive and enjoyable.

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DALKEY COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONSE GROUP

The Dalkey Community First Response group is a new initiative currently being set-up in Dalkey.

Community First Responder groups have been running very successfully for a number of years in many communities around the country. These first responder groups are co-ordinated by the HSE National Ambulance Service and integrated into the emergency response in the community.

The group in Dalkey, the first of its kind in Dublin, will consist of volunteers from the local community who will be professionally trained in CPR and the use of defibrillators. Through participating in an 'on call' rota, the volunteers will then assist the ambulance service in responding to certain medical emergency calls in the community by providing life saving



treatment to critically ill people in the first few minutes prior to the arrival of an emergency ambulance. It is proposed that the group will respond to emergencies in Dalkey, Killiney and Glenageary but this has vet to be confirmed. 
It was a great day and we were lucky with the weather, which was mild and dry. It was a truly community event and it was great to see families of all ages enjoying the fun.

NEWS FROM CHURCH OF THE ASSUMPTION

As we roll on into Spring and the evenings get longer we look forward to new beginnings and new light in our lives.

2nd February is Candlemas Day. This ancient festival marks the midpoint of winter, halfway between the shortest day of the year and the spring equinox. In pre Christian times, this day was known as the 'Feast of lights' and celebrated the increase in strength of the life giving sun as winter gave way to spring. Feb 2nd is also the day of the year when we bless all of the candles which will be used in the church in the coming year, to remind us of Jesus' message that he is with us always to help and comfort us - a guiding light in the darkness. You can also bring your own candles to be blessed at 10am Mass on this day.

Lent begins on 5th March, Ash Wednesday. During Mass, the ashes which give Ash Wednesday its name are distributed. The ashes are made by burning the blessed palms that were distributed the previous year on Palm Sunday. The distribution of ashes reminds us of our own mortality and call to us with an opportunity to repent. This year we will once again, along with St Patrick's Church host the annual soup lunch on Ash Wednesday from 12 - 2pm in Our Lady's Hall and all are most welcome.

Ash Wednesday also marks the beginning of the season of Lent and the ever popular series of ecumenical Lenten talks, ably led by Rev Ginnie Kennerly from St Patrick's Church will begin again - so check out the notice board in Our Lady's Hall for more details.

Blessing of the Throats – Feb 5th is the feast of St Blaise and the Annual Blessing of the Throat will take place after 10am Mass. St Blaise was a 3rd century physician who became Bishop of Sebaste, Armenia, and his protection of those with throat troubles apparently comes from a legend that a boy who was brought to him with a fishbone stuck in his throat, was healed by Saint Blaise. All are welcome to the Mass and blessing.

Feast of St. Valentine – We celebrate the feast of St Valentines on Feb 14th. The most popular martyrology associated with St. Valentine was that he was imprisoned for performing weddings for soldiers who were forbidden to marry and for ministering to Christians, who were persecuted under the Roman Empire. During his imprisonment, he is said to have healed the daughter of his jailer, Asterius. Legend states that before his execution he wrote her a letter signed "Your Valentine" as a farewell. The relics of St Valentine were donated to the Carmelite Church Whitefriar St. where they reside to this day. Parish Pastoral Council – We would like offer a warm welcome to the 6 new members of our Parish Pastoral council who will now serve for 2 years. They include Gerardine Parkinson, Elizabeth Hogan, Frances Donnelly, Dermot Duffy, Brendan Flood and Valarie Hand. The Parish Pastoral council's role is to take responsibility for overseeing all activities which encourage a healthy Pastoral life in our parish, including identifying and working with the caring needs within our community.
