❖ SUMMARY OF DCC MONTHLY MEETING – 2nd JUNE 2009 ❖

The monthly meeting of the Community Council was held on 2nd June; the treasurer informed the meeting that the annual collection was running slightly below last years figures for the same period.

There has been considerable local interest and widespread opposition to a planning application that proposes to allow vehicles along part of the pedestrian right of way between Knocknaree Rd and Torca Rd. We have similar concerns which we have voiced to the DLRCC planning department.

There have been several complaints about bushes overhanging the footpaths around Dalkey; residents are advised to cut these back in the interest of public safety.

Concerns were expressed that several of the bins in the Castle Street area were often overflowing with rubbish and appear to be missed by the refuse collection service; we will contact DLRCC to try to resolve the problem.

MY GARDEN – Philippa Thomas



What absolutely super colour, texture and variety of planting at the entrance to Dalkey Quarry and also that little enclave of burst of colour on the petrol station side of Ulverton Road. Again, all our Dalkey planters have been painted and beautifully prepared with fresh soil and appropriate planting. Let's watch and admire their progress. They should, as usual, be spectacular by mid July/August, as they definitely were last year.



My little cherub, 'Precious', (a King Charles Ruby) now ten months definitely has worked out how to upset me! He seems to sense what I value, so today he ate one of my smaller aloe vera

plants on his way out to our back garden where he then whirled his way through our little herbaceous border, beheaded several Alliums in their priceless burst of beauty and then tore his way through one of our prize large-leaved tropical plants. Having said all this, he is worth it and by tomorrow, our Dalkey weathering agents will have taken care of his crazy outburst and all will appear as normal again: energised by our spasmodic rainfalls and general outbursts of sunshine!

Would you believe it all this raging and scampering about was to chase a large bumble bee that he spotted initially drinking nectar from our giant Forget-Me-Nots (*Myosotidium Hortensia*).



Two of our remaining beauties, - Alliums liliaceae. There is a genus of bulbous plants with 280 species

The 'Cup and Saucer' climber. I have grown this from seed several times. It is a superb climber and literally zooms its way wherever you give it the opportunity. It is self-clinging, so doesn't need tying in. It's a beautiful bell-shaped flowers appear in late July and will continue right through to November, perhaps even December, in a sheltered spot. Its



bell-shaped flowers are really large and there is also a white form, 'Alba'; it generally spreads approximately 3 metres. It has over-wintered for us, successfully, for several years.

TIPS – Watch and Grow!

It's almost magical watching a plant burst into life in front of your eyes and it's a brilliant way of getting children 'hooked' on growing things. All you need is a plastic bottle and plants that will root easily in water. This way, you can all watch them root before your eyes. Mint roots in weeks, Fuchsias, Willow and Busy Lizzies are also good candidates. House plants such as Spider Plants, Wandering Jew can also be propagated in this way. Take new shoots from this season's growth. Remove the bottom leaves and keep two or three pairs at the top. Place in your water-filled bottle and don't let the water level drop. Take a few cuttings of one type and you'll soon have enough to share with friends.

On the note of our treasured Dalkey children, I think one of the best ways to get them into a garden is to build them a den and give them a space they can call ‘their own.’ Plant around it in order to make it private for them. You can choose robust plants that they can run through and brush against such as Phormiums, etc.

If you want to extend the height of your seed trays for seedlings that have long roots, put the inside cardboard tubes from ‘loo’ rolls into the seed tray and fill with compost. Sew your seeds into the cardboard rolls. You can plant the cardboard tubes directly into the ground to avoid root disturbance. This is particularly suitable for Sweet Pea, Sunflowers and any



plant with a long root system.

Most herbs can be chopped and then frozen in ice cube trays, topped up with water. Parsley, chervil, dill, chives and any soft-leaved herbs are good preserved this way.

If the mood hits you, you could try dropping the frozen cubes into soups, stews and sauces. Borage flowers and the smaller varieties of mint leaves look great in summer drinks.

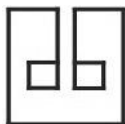

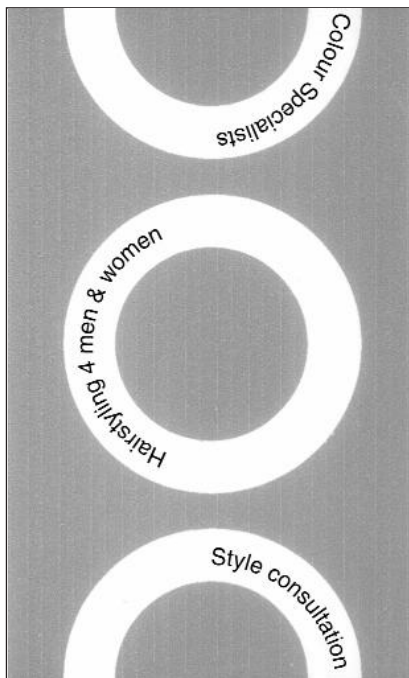

❖ A BOOK TO READ ❖

“IARNROD ÉIREANN - 20 YEARS OF PROGRESS” by Tom Ferris,
published by Ian Allan Publishing.

In 1987 C.I.E ceased being a public transport operator and became the holding company for Dublin Bus, Bus Eireann and Iarnrod Eireann which took over the Dublin City bus service, long distance bus service and rail operations respectively and this particularly excellent photobook recalls the first 20 years of Iarnrod Éireann in 80 pages of pictures showing the various types locomotives, liveries and rolling stock used during this time period. All the colour photographs are to the extremely high standard that is the hallmark of Ian Allan Publications and come complete with notes and dates. Its only when reads through this book that one sees wide range of locomotives and rolling stock, a lot of which has since withdrawn, used by the company in the first decade of it's operation. There are at least 3 photographs of trains in the Killiney area. All in all this is an excellent book for the railway enthusiast, railway historian and general reader.

❖ COMPULSORY RETIREMENT OF COUNCIL MEMBERS ❖

Every year in January the Dalkey Urban District Council (1899 to 1930) held an annual election to fill one third of the seats on the Council with the electoral procedure being subject to the scrutiny of the Local Government Board (up to 1921). The alternate system was to hold an election for the entire Council every three years but in 1899 when Dalkey Township Commissioners became Dalkey Urban District Council following the passage of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, the councillors opted to hold an annual election under which one third of the board would stand for election every year - term of office was three years.

In January 1905 Mr. A. M. Fullerton was elected to the Council but once the Local Government Board reviewed the election results it very quickly discovered that that there was a problem with his election. Fullerton was a civil servant employed in the Valuation Office and under the Civil Service regulations was prohibited from serving as an elected public representative.

Fullerton had two options - either resign from the Valuation Office or resign from the Council. The Council was advised of Fullerton's ineligibility to sit on it and given that his job was permanent and pensionable, Fullerton opted to withdraw from the Council with it deciding to co-opt Mr. Daniel Murphy, whom Fullerton had defeated by four votes, at their next meeting.

LOVE AFFAIR WITH NEW ZEALAND

As the month of May gallops to a halt, June, on the doorstep, just doesn't relate to winter - really can't get my head around it. It is still the time when one should be finishing up for yet another school year and looking forward to a long summer ahead - *helas!* we head into mid-winter with June 21st being our shortest day. We have mid-winter plunges in the sea, full roast turkey dinners to celebrate what it might feel like to have a cold, wintry Christmas and a score of the other mid-winter events to keep the brain and body active over the quieter, slower winter months. (Temperatures have been 14-19 Centigrade this past while but with quite a bit of rain which makes the whole picture damp. Yuk!).

It's been a good year so far. We started off in the beautiful Bay of Islands, up North with friends visiting from Perth. They were blown away with the beauty of New Zealand and we were blessed with fabulous weather which brought out the full splendour of this area.

Our most recent escapades during the Easter holidays took us first of all to Napier and Hastings on the East Coast, known for its long hours of sunshine and fine Art Deco style. We then headed deep into the centre of the North Island, via Lake Taupo which is quite spectacular as the largest lake in New Zealand. (I cycled the 160 km around it last November). Across the volcanic plateau; this area is the main ski field of North Island and with just a smattering of snow on top, we climbed the boulder-strewn slopes of Mount Ruapehu in beautiful clear mountain air. Really amazing. There are three active volcanoes that combine together to make the wonderful central volcanic plateau: Ruapehu, Ngauruhoe and Tongariro. It is a fantastic melange of barren rock fields and native forest that provide amazing walks and picnic areas that are too good to leave! The kids grumbled from time to time, but got on with it and were happy enough in the end. However, they did give up at one point on Mount Ruapehu and sat down on fine flat rocks until David and I returned from our trek to higher ground. The sun shone for most of our visit which made ALL the difference. The ski centre officially opens on June 20th - but compared to skiing in Europe this looked so dangerous and challenging - so we'll give it a go July time.

We ventured on down the Wanganui River and up to the region of Taranaki where we travelled on some beautiful scenic roads climbing through rain forests and high up into the subalpine zone of Mount Egmont. It was incredible to go from rainforest area, so typical of New Zealand with twisted, moss-covered trunks to stark alpine environment, where the trees suddenly stop growing and it becomes a cloud forest leading up to the steep beauty of Mount Taranaki. This is also a ski resort, not very commercial and only for the extremely committed skier as the climb to the ski lifts and Ski Lodge is a challenge and a half. We did it without snow or skis and it was a heck of a climb. It is a cluster of dormant volcanic cones with the peak known as Mount Egmont. It last erupted in 1755! It all makes amazing outdoor entertainment and changes rapidly; however, we did not make the summit of 2,515m that day! Next time we visited friends living not far away from this very picturesque landscape, near a small town called Stratford, named after Shakespeare's birthplace (I'm not too sure why, mind you!) They run a sheep farm in the hills not far from the town and the children get to run wild and free for a few days. They didn't want to leave - maybe there is a message there with their feeling of 'attachment' to the land!!

We hit the 'Hidden Highway' for our return to Auckland; again, an area we had not yet discovered - kilometres of rolling hills, winding rivers and the odd old hidden farmstead or old wooden shed rotting as time almost stands still. We drove along kms of loose gravel roads as the tar-seal has not managed to get this far!! It is incredible how 'untouched' this land appears in parts - like getting back to Nature and a step back in time.

Auckland is so built-up like any city but to feel so quickly enveloped in houses, schools,

BERRY TIME

VARIETIES AND NUTRITION

Strawberry – A native fruit of America. Red skin covered with seeds. Wild strawberries are smaller than cultivated. Excellent source of Vitamin C, niacin and folate. Good for healthy skin and mucous membranes. They can help the body deal with stress. Strawberries can cause allergies particularly skin rashes in some people.

Raspberry – Grown on climbing canes. Excellent source of dietary fibre, Vitamin C and Folate. Raspberries activate the body's natural self-cleansing ability. Improve skin, hair, and liver function. They boost energy and encourage efficient metabolism of protein. Available fresh or frozen. They can be eaten on their own with cream or made into smoothies, sorbet and preserves.

Blueberries – Small, very dark blue berry. Originally wild but they are now grown commercially. Eaten raw with cream or made into pies, jams and preserves.

Blackberry – This nutritious black fruit decorates country hedgerows in late Summer and early Autumn. Blackberries are thought to aid infections of the mouth and throat. Good source of Vitamin C, Folate and Vitamin E. Eaten fresh they make a refreshing dessert

Gooseberries – Enjoyed in Europe since the Middle Ages. They are a summer fruit with a very short season. Sweet varieties make a pleasant raw dessert. The tart variety makes excellent preserves. A great source of Vitamin C, dietary fibre and Iron.

Black/Redcurrants – Sold in clusters. Great in cooking. Dipped in lightly whisked egg white then frosted with white sugar they make a simple decoration for the table or dessert dish.



BLACKBERRY AND RASPBERRY SORBET

This makes a scrumptious treat on a sunny summer's day

Makes 1 litre

Ingredients:

550g blackberries
250g raspberries
150g sugar

Grated zest and juice of 1 lemon
Water -check method
2 tbs Framboise
1 egg white beaten



1. Place the berries, lemon, zest and sugar in a saucepan. Bring slowly to the boil and simmer for about 3 minutes. Remove from the heat.
2. Strain into a measuring jug, pressing as much fruit as possible through the sieve. If necessary add water to achieve 1 litre of pulp.
3. Cool completely and stir in the Framboise. Taste and add extra sugar if desired. Chill.
4. Fold in the beaten egg white and serve immediately with fresh raspberries.
5. The remainder can be frozen.

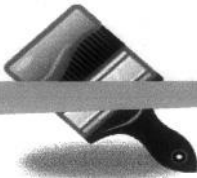

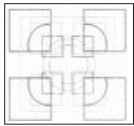

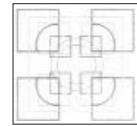

ANCIENT DALKEY PEDESTRIAN RIGHT-OF-WAY MAY BE THREATENED

In glorious sunshine this morning, I met a very fit looking 92 year old local resident on the ancient right-of-way footpath which connects Knocknacree Road to Torca Road. If you have walked there you will recall seeing

the magnificent Eucalyptus trees on one side and the old ivy covered wall on the other. In places views over the wall extend to Sorrento Point and the sea below. Shaw's Cottage is at the southern entrance. The 92 year old walker mentioned that there is a planning application to change the use of this ancient public pathway for access by private vehicles to a new proposed development. He remembers walking along this pedestrian right-of-way as a child on his way to collect the milk from local Dalkey farmers!

A bird's eye view shows how fortunate we are in the Dalkey / Killiney area to have public access to some unique unspoiled pathways and walks over the hill. You can see the overgrown pathway running diagonally across the photo and the dense vegetation on both sides - Knocknacree Road to the right and Torca Road to the left. We all know that these pathways are priceless and once lost are gone forever. This narrow pathway can be seen in this photo and the surrounding mature trees and vegetation are a wonderful local amenity. It is used by hundreds of locals and visitors.

Many in the Dalkey / Killiney area may not be aware of this possible development. A pedestrian pathway converted to an access road for vehicles would have a profound impact on this wild parkland. Once opened, who knows what further developments might follow?

It would be nice to know that the children and grand children and great grand children of my fellow walker could get as much enjoyment from their public pathway as we got this morning.

Do you really value this ancient Dalkey public right-of-way? Do you want to see mature trees put at risk and the limited number of natural public walkways reduced even further? This is a public pedestrian right-of-way and has been so for endless generations. If you want to help secure its future, PLEASE send your message of support to this e-mail address. We are the Public. 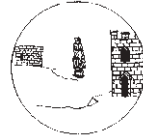

I could see a male Blackbird perched on a branch, tail held aloft, evidently agitated while a Wren was firing out its machine gun like rapid call. I thought it might be a squirrel that had alarmed

them so trained the binoculars at the foliage. Almost instantly I found I was looking at two big yellow eyes whose large black pupils were staring back at me. A big feathered 'ear' tuft protruded through the leaves where an owl sat motionless. Although the ear tufts (they're not really ears just feathers) gave it a similar appearance to our most common owl, the Long eared owl, its huge bulk marked it out as, yes, him again, the Great Horned Owl. A family pet, there are posters pasted up on trees saying he had escaped again from his home in Ballybrack over a month before. A few years ago he had spent a few weeks around Dalkey making startling appearances on balconies, in back gardens, regularly at Castle Park School and on top of a garage in Hyde Road.

Although evidently well capable of surviving in the wild he was actually very approachable and you could stroke its feathers without causing it any distress. At the same time any owl should be treated with respect. Their talons are very powerful, capable in this bird's case of killing rabbits, and some species of owls are one of the few species of wild birds that will actually aggressively attack humans if they think their nest or chicks are in danger. The Ural Owl is probably the only bird in European bird field guides whose description has a warning to be very careful of it during the breeding season since if you get near its nest it may well attack, going for the eyes with those powerful talons. One of the most famous owl experts and photographer Eric Hosking lost his left eye when he was attacked by a tawny owl which gave the name to his autobiography *An Eye for a Bird*.

But we don't get Ural owls in Ireland, none of our native owls are known to be aggressive to people and this Great Horned Owl was apparently a much loved family pet who was very good with children but is now not so popular with the local birdlife. I hope he gets back home.

The last week in May found us in Poland on a birdwatching trip organised by the South Dublin Branch of Birdwatch Ireland who took a coachload of people around the east and northeast of Poland. Passing through lovely countryside, fields filled with wild flowers, towns and villages with wooden houses and neat gardens was like stepping back in time.

But what I found most impressive and very heartening was the miles and miles of forest we drove through. And they were forests, not like the commercial plantations of dark lifeless Sitka spruce that dominate so much of Wicklow in Poland the conifer woods had Scots Pines sparingly planted among native Oaks, Limes, Hornbeams and Birch with very little ground cover (I don't think we saw a single bramble for the whole trip) permitting extensive views through the trees and along the forest floor. But all the vast woods and forests paled into insignificance beside the Bialowie – a forest which crosses the Belarus border into North East Poland. This is the last remnants of a vast forest that once stretched across Europe many centuries ago and it is under very stringent protection with access to some of the oldest areas only

permitted with a licensed guide. We had hired a official guide and he led us through the grounds of the old Czar's palace beautifully landscaped in classic English Capability Brown style with vistas of rolling meadows leading the eye through majestic trees, many of them hundreds of years old. The track to the protected area of forest led through a meadow of waist high wild flowers and grasses out of which the rasping calls of Corncrakes escorted us. We came to the enormous wooden gates and then we were in the forest.



The forest still supports a sizeable number of European Bison, wild boar, beaver, packs of wolves with at least 15 Lynx holding territory in the forest as well as pine marten, red squirrels, many other mammals and of course many species of birds including nine species of woodpecker and several species of owl ranging from the tiny Pygmy Owl to the formidable Eagle Owl.

It was a very calm day and not a breeze moved the leaves in the trees towering above us. The height of the tree canopy prevents much sunlight penetrating to the forest floor where only a small covering of early wild flowers grew. As you'd expect lots of huge oaks but some of the most impressive trees were huge lime trees literally twice as big as we'd ever see them here. The only conifers in this particular forest were native Norwegian Spruce and since the forests management plan includes no intervention in the natural development of the forest many of these trees have died, usually of natural causes or old age and stand bare of foliage, waiting to topple whenever their time comes. The dead trees provide lots of food and nest holes for woodpeckers and when they do fall they provide lots of nutrition to the forest floor and home to many species of insects.

As our guide commented, when and where the old trees fall is a constant source of speculation and a vested interest to him and the other guides since they walk under them most days. I did wonder about how the forest had fared during the Second World War but thought it a bit insensitive to ask but then the guide showed us a simple plaque which was between two graves whose borders were simply marked by interwoven branches. This was a memorial to local villagers who had been murdered by Nazis for supporting the resistance fighters who lived in the forest. But apart from that poignant moment the forest was a heartening place to visit and it was great to see such a value placed on the unique habitat.

Back to Ireland in the heat wave. Next morning we were up Killiney Hill, as lovely as anywhere in the warm sunshine! Unfortunately, like the heat brings flies to a barbecue, the heat brings drink parties to the hill and we came upon the remains of a marathon drinking session which ironically are nearly always held in the nicest parts of the wood as if they've planned to find the nicest place to desecrate. Cans, plastic cups, plastic bags, dozens of bottles, some shattered, strewn around the smouldering remains of a fire where cans and plastic bottles smouldered. We filled a discarded bin bag and three plastic bags with bottles, broken glass and cans before bags and time ran out.

Earlier that morning we had seen a much more positive sight. Three young ravens on top of the telegraph tower on Dalkey Hill, living proof that the Dalkey ravens had bred successfully again. Flying with great confidence, like many young birds their inexperience is only obvious when they come in to land, crashing on to branches or tottering awkwardly on top of rocks.

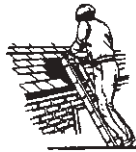

DALKEY SCHOOL OF MOTORING NEWS



It is now a legal offence with a fine of up to €2000 and/or a six month prison sentence for a driving instructor to teach for reward if they are not an RSA (Road Safety Authority) registered ADI (Approved Driving Instructor).



This process requires the applicant to complete the Garda vetting process which provides an added layer of protection for young learner drivers, and to be fully tax compliant with a current Tax Clearance Certificate.

Then there is a stringent three part test. The first part is a very detailed theory test. The second is an intensive Driving test and the final stage is to show that the applicant has the ability to teach successfully. Only after this procedure will the applicant be issued with an ADI identity card with his photo, registration number and expiry date shown.

What this means for the learner driver is that once you make sure that the instructor you wish to use is an ADI (a full listing is on www.rsa.ie) you know that you are getting an instructor of good character, legally able to teach and also know that he/she has the professionally approved ability to teach this very important skill correctly and safely.

So when you book a driving instructor for yourself, son, daughter, family or friend, ask and make sure that they are an ADI, most of who will advertise with the above logo, so you know that you are in safe and capable hands and being taught by a legally qualified instructor.
