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At the invitation from the Board of the Heritage Centre the May Monthly meeting was held in the Centre at 8pm on Tuesday 3rd May.

The Chairperson opened the meeting and called for a minute's silence as a mark of respect for the late Mr. Donal Stevens who was a former editor of the Newsletter.

Margaret Dunne, the Manager of the Heritage Centre gave us a presentation on the restoration work that has been done to the old graveyard and the future plans that are envisaged for it.

**Tidy Towns:**

The area is experiencing an increase in illegal dumping and this should be reported to DLRCC immediately. Pooper-scoopers will be put into OLH and soon will be distributed with the Newsletters.

The Dalkey clean-ups will commence in June. The clean up for Castle Street begins at 10.30am every Tuesday meeting at Select Stores and at 11am every Thursday at Dillon's Park. All helpers will be issued with bags, pickers and gloves.

DLRCC have nominated Dalkey as one of their representatives in the nationwide "Pride of Place" competition that focuses on all aspects of the local community and how that community can work together.

**Planning:**

Tramyard: permission has been granted with a huge amount of conditions. The Planning Group have many concerns and an appeal will be lodged to ABP.

**Dun Laoghaire Baths:**

The proposal by DLRCC to demolish the existing buildings and build an eight-storey development consisting of one hundred and eighty apartments, a ten storey glass tower, a water world and indoor leisure complex was a topic of much discussion. If the development was to proceed it was felt that a worrying precedent would be set for further high-rise

developments along the shore.

There will be a public display of the proposed development for the Baths taking place from Tuesday 24th May to Friday 10th June in County Hall and it is important that as many as the general public view the plans and submit comments to DLRCC.

**AOB:**

DCC in partnership with DLRCC and TT will hold a ceremony next Tuesday 10th May at 11am to unveil the new Heritage sign at Killiney Towers.

### • USING YOUR COMPOSTING •

*Continuing from last month's article on Composting .....*

When your compost is ready, it will be dark brown/black in colour. You may need to dry it out until it has a crumbly texture. You can do this by laying it on plastic sheets to air (weather permitting) and then packing it into plastic bags punctured with holes. Leave the bags of compost in a sheltered part of the garden or in the shed until dry. The best time for using compost is in the spring or summer, before planting. Compost can be used for:

- Flower and vegetable beds – use a layer of about 8cm of compost and dig in to mix with the soil.
- To improve soil – use an 8-10cm layer and mix in to help improve consistency and drainage.
- Houseplants – use mixture of compost, soil and sand in equal measure.
- Mulch – when wet, spread lightly on soil. This will help retain moisture and add nutrients.
- Compost Tea – fill a bucket to half compost and the rest water. Leave to settle before draining the liquid off and using as a liquid fertiliser.

### •Zambian Immersion Project Report•

My name is Seamus Guidera and I am one of the 15 lucky CBC boys who went to Zambia last March. I would like to thank all those who so generously helped make the Zambian Immersion Project a huge success. Everything we brought out was needed and put to good use. The money raised from the Dalkey Parish went towards the local school, the Mother Teresa Aids hospice, which we visited, and the whole community. The community was a slum just outside the capital, Lusaka and really needed help. We worked in the school helping the teachers, we painted a mural in the community hall and we visited an Aids hospice. Many of the patients there were tiny-orphaned babies. Their crying stopped when we held them in our arms.

Three out of four people in the compound were HIV positive. Most of them were homeless and there were children dying on the streets because of disease and hunger. I will always remember the

extreme poverty but also the smiles of joy on peoples faces. They were so appreciative of everything we gave them. I would love to go back and do more work and I would encourage anybody who is thinking of doing anything like this to do so. Everybody thought it was a wonderful experience and as well as giving, we also got a lot from Zambia and the Zambian People. Thanks again for all the support.

## • PLACES TO GO – PLACES TO SEE •

### **Dublin Writers Museum:**

18 Parnell Square, Dublin 1 – celebration of literary Dublin situated in a magnificent 18th century house splendidly restored. Open Monday to Saturday 10am to 6pm (during June, July and August, otherwise closes at 5pm), Sunday and Public Holidays 11am to 5pm.

### **James Joyce Museum:**

Joyce Tower, Sandycove – Martello tower built during the Napoleonic scare. James Joyce (Blooms Day!) the author lodged here briefly as a young man. Open Monday to Saturday 10am to 5pm (closes for lunch 1 to 2pm), Sunday and Public Holidays 2pm to 6pm.

### **Marlay Demesne:**

Grange Road, Rathfarnham – 200 acres of parkland and gardens restored by Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council, also hosts an orangery, arbour and water features. Open daily during summer months. Walled Gardens open all year Monday to Friday 10am to 5pm, Saturday and Sunday 11am to 5pm.

### **Newman House:**

85/86 St. Stephen's Green – two 18th century city centre mansions combined to form the first Catholic University now University College. The plasterwork is among the finest in Ireland. Open June, July and August only. Public guided tours Tuesday to Friday at 12pm 2pm, 3pm and 4pm. Information taken from House, Castles and Gardens of Ireland

## • JUNE IN THE GARDEN •

- Plant out half hardy annuals.
- In hot weather damp down the greenhouse floor to cool and humidify
- Pinch out the side shoots of tomatoes and tie in as required.
- You can still plant container plants to fill any unexpected gaps.
- Dead head plants if you don't require to save seed this will give more energy to produce more flowers.
- Give hedges their first cut.
- Sow biennials.
- Lift and either divide and replant or store spring bulbs.
- Prune and deadhead spring flowering shrubs.
- Keep on top of mowing and weeding.
- Don't let pests build up on plants, spray as necessary to control or cut out infected growth.

Remember: June is one of the best months in the garden, everything has a fresh look about it, colours are clear and foliage is at its finest.

## • WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY - SUNDAY, 5 JUNE 2005 •

World Environment Day was established by the United Nations General Assembly in 1972 to mark the opening of the Stockholm Conference on the Human Environment. World Environment Day, commemorated each year on 5 June, is one of the main ways through which the United Nations highlights worldwide awareness of the environment and enhances political attention and action. The World Environment Day theme for 2005 is Green Cities and the slogan is Plan for the Planet! The main international celebrations of the World Environment Day 2005 will be held in San Francisco. However while you are here visiting not just Dalkey but Ireland please take some sensible safety precautions. Ireland is one of the lowest crime areas in Europe. Crimes of violence are especially low but it is important, nevertheless, that you do not take risks with your person or your property. If an emergency arises and you need the Gardai's help (police), dial 999.

- Do not carry your passport, travel documents, cheques or large amounts of cash with you, or leave them in your room. Use the security facilities that may be available at your accommodation.
- Use a handbag or shoulder bag that can be held securely. Mind your bag when in crowded streets, shops or when having a meal or drink.
- Do not leave luggage, valuables (cameras etc.) exposed inside a parked car or luggage attached to a roof rack.
- When visiting a city centre area, park your car in one of the controlled car parks and retain the parking ticket on your person.
- Always lock your car securely when leaving it unattended even for brief periods.

When checking into your accommodation, ask the receptionist about secure car parking.

- Do not give money to children or people begging – it only encourages this activity.
- Do not pitch tents or camp in open spaces, unapproved sites and public areas – camp only on approved sites.

Paying attention to these simple points will ensure that your holiday in Ireland is memorable for all the 'right' reasons. We want you to enjoy your time spent here.

## ● **COOK'S KITCHEN** ●

### **Father's Day Caramel-topped Cheesecake:**

#### **Ingredients:**

2oz butter (softened), 2oz soft brown sugar, 2oz self-raising flour (sifted), ½ teaspoon baking powder, 1 egg. Filling: 8oz full fat soft cheese, 3 separated eggs, 4oz soft brown sugar, 4 tablespoons condensed milk, 1oz plain flour, 6

tablespoons double cream. Topping: 6oz granulated sugar, 4 tablespoons water, ¼ pint double cream (stiffly whipped).

### **Method:**

#### **Base:**

Preheat oven to 160°C, 325°F, Gas Mark 3. Beat the butter, brown sugar, flour, baking powder and egg well for 2 to 3 minutes. Spread in an even layer in a greased loose-bottomed 7-8 inch round cake tin.

#### **Filling:**

Soften the cheese, beat in the egg yolks, soft brown sugar, condensed milk, flour and cream. Whisk the egg whites until stiff and fold lightly but thoroughly into the cheese mixture. Spoon into the tin. Bake in oven for 1½ to 1¾ hours or until firm but spongy to the touch. Turn off the oven, open the door and leave the cheesecake to cool for one hour. Brush the inside of the tin above the cooked cheesecake with oil.

#### **Topping:**

Dissolve sugar and water in a heavy-based pan over a gentle heat, stirring once or twice. Bring to the boil and boil steadily, without stirring, until the sugar syrup turns to a golden caramel. Pour enough caramel over the top of the cheesecake to give a thin even coating. Pour the remaining caramel on a greased baking sheet. Using a sharp knife dipped in boiling water, mark the caramel topping on the cheesecake into eight sections. Slide the set caramel from the baking sheet on to a chopping board and crush coarsely with a rolling pin. Ease the sides of the tin away from the cheesecake and lift it out. Pipe the cream on top and sprinkle with crushed caramel.

## ● SUMMER DISRUPTION TO DART ●

### **DART Upgrade Works**

The ongoing DART upgrade works necessitates a return to Southside DART stations in order to improve accessibility for all customers. To minimize disruption and inconvenience, it will be necessary to carry out this work at weekends. **Regrettably the result will mean no Southside services on Saturdays, Sundays or Bank Holiday Mondays during the months June to mid September.**

In order to minimize the inconvenience to customers who use these services at the weekend, Iarnrod Eireann have made special arrangements with Dublin Bus. **These arrangements allow for the doubling of existing weekend services on the bus routes that run nearest to the DART stations and include a special bus service to and from Dalkey.**

#### **Dalkey**

To/from City Centre: Special shuttle bus **7D** to be provided from city centre (Burgh Quay) every hour on the hour between 09.00 and 21.00 hrs and also every hour on the hour from Dalkey (Ulverton Road) to Burgh Quay. This will serve all stops Dalkey to Dun Laoghaire then Blackrock (Frascati), St. Vincent's Hospital, RDS, Merrion Square and all stops to Burgh Quay. The 11.00hrs and 13.00hrs services from Burgh Quay will serve Sandycove Station and Dalkey only. The 15.00 hrs and 17.00hrs services from Dalkey (Ulverton Road) will serve Sandycove Station and City Centre only.

**To Dun Laoghaire:** At junction Barnhill Road / Ulverton Road Route 59 to Dun Laoghaire.

**To Bray:** Passengers should travel to Dun Laoghaire for route 45A.

## ● Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre ●

### **HERITAGE REPORT TO COMMUNITY COUNCIL AGM – MARCH 2005**

The board of the Dalkey Irish Heritage Town Company, under the Chairmanship of Mr Howard Kilroy, is gearing up for the revamp of the Heritage Centre mentioned in previous dispatches. The board has been fortunate in securing half of the funding towards the cost of a feasibility study on the conservation issues in Goat Castle from the Heritage Council in Kilkenny. Resulting from the feasibility study the company hopes to carry out certain specified conservation measures to the medieval towerhouse and the medieval toilet

(Garderobe) and upgrade the upstairs former committee room. These works will be dependent on finding the money to finance them. The plan, among other necessary upgrades, is to make sections of the Centre comply with security and other conditions to house artefacts on temporary loan.

#### Visitor numbers

The numbers were adversely affected by the closure of the Dart service at the weekends all year until August. It was so bad that the Centre had to close at weekends until Bloomsday in June.

It is horrific that the Darts are being taken off again at weekends in the summer season. The works were not completed first time round.

Other visitor numbers were up and the Language School business continues to be very valuable

In other respects, the past year has been a very successful one, due largely to the input of financial resources from the EU for the link between Dalkey and Anglesey in Wales for Historical Tours.

The tours will continue in 2005 and those who haven't gone on a tour already, are encouraged to do so in 2005. The idea behind the project and the funding is to foster the development of cross border friendships, artistic connections and the linking of community organisations.

The tours have been very successful, very enjoyable, very good value at a breakeven price and are also indirectly supporting the Heritage Centre. Dates and details are on the flyers here tonight. We are also planning an additional historical tour which will be of particular interest to garden enthusiasts. Further details are available at the Heritage Centre.

#### FAS

Through the good offices of FAS, a Community Employment scheme operates in the Centre with 12 people on 20 hours per week. Without the support of FAS the Heritage Centre in Dalkey could not survive. We are extremely grateful for their support. We are glad that in return the placement record of participants in jobs after CE is very high.

#### Living History Interpretation

The Centre is currently in full swing with children from all the local schools attending the Living History programme pioneered by the Centre and now provided by the professional theatre company, Deilg Inis. It continues to be the most popular of the Centre's initiatives. It brings local history to colourful life in the form of characters in full period costume, from St Begnet to medieval archers, maids, merchants and the Victorian Quarry workers.

Dalkey Tourism The Heritage Centre is currently part of a marketing initiative to promote Dalkey as a destination. To this end the group involved, Dalkey Tourism is compiling a brochure with a street map and a complete listing of the scenic amenities, walks, activities, events, facilities and businesses involved in tourism in Dalkey. The brochure/map will also have its own website <http://www.dalkey.ie>. And will be available in all shops in April.

#### Walks

The Centre is offering a new product to the Tourist office in Dun Laoghaire in the form of Guided Walks in Dalkey from April to September. The guide will pick up participants in Dun Laoghaire and accompany them by Dart to Dalkey, where they will take in a two hour Historical or Literary Walk. Local hostelries in Dalkey will give discounts for lunch as part of the package.

Story Gathering (as already announced) Further to our Dalkey Remembered sessions The Heritage Centre is anxious to save the stories around the life experiences in Dalkey of the older generation. If you know of people who would be willing to share their stories (even on a one-to-one basis) about life in Dalkey back through the years, please let us know by

dropping a note into the Heritage Centre with your name and tel number and we will take it from there. We would hope to eventually build up an archive from them. We already have some but felt that there are a lot more. One of the Welsh artists on residency here last year, Tim Williams, has taped an extensive collection of stories from people in the Dalkey Community Care Unit in conjunction with photographs which evoked memories for people. Deilg Inis, the theatre company, will also be taking part in collecting and maybe telling the stories gathered.

Graveyard: The programme for the preservation of St Begnet's Church & Graveyard is continuing. Thanks to the Parks Dept for all their help. We are currently working on a presentation for interested parties which we will use to secure some funding to turn the graveyard into a tranquil place that we will all be proud of.

The Archaeological Conference in Town Hall Wed 23rd Feb revealed that the long lost seventh castle of Dalkey was underneath the street at the 'Squareabout' and the old Systems Printing where the new apartments are. The Archaeological Report still has not been made public, but we have the news from the horse's mouth!
