❖ Summary of Dalkey Community Council (CLG) Public Meeting 2018 ❖

The 13th DCC Public Meeting was held on Monday 14th May in Our Lady's Hall.

The Chairman welcomed Minister Mary Mitchell O'Connor T.D., the Gardai, DCC members and members of the public to the meeting. Supt. Martin Fitzgerald opened the proceedings and emphasised the importance of communication between the public and the Gardai in the fight against crime. Sgt. James Malone Crime Prevention Officer for the DMR East Division gave a talk on the incidents of criminal activity and ways of minimising it. Among the matters that arose was the concern of speeding in the area and the Gardai have given an undertaking to monitor the situation and report back to DCC with their findings.

The presentation of the various reports from the sub-committees followed, and the many activities that they were involved in during 2017 were given. All the reports are published in the centre of this edition of the Newsletter.

The next DCC Monthly Meeting is Monday 11th June 2018.

DALKEY CASTLE & HERITAGE CENTRE UPDATE

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Dalkey Bloomsday Festival 15th & 16th June. Begin your Joycean celebrations on Friday 15th June, the eve of Bloomsday, with 'A *Joycean Evening*' in Dalkey Castle. The stage show, in the Heritage Centre, features Joycean extracts linked by music and song. You will get a whirlwind taster of Joyce's work at this highly-popular, annual Joycean event.

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A team of actors will perform fun and enlightening extracts from 'Ulysses', 'Dubliners,' and 'A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man'.

Baritone Simon Morgan and Soprano, Donna Malone will be accompanied by Josh Johnston in songs that James Joyce sang or which feature in his work. Gather a few friends and come along and join us. Refreshments will be served. Admission € 15.

On Saturday June 16th, the Dalkey Schoolroom Scene from 'Ulysses' will be re-created at 15.30. From the Nestor Episode, the schoolroom scene will be brought to life before your eyes in a memorable dramatization. It features Mr Deasy, Headmaster, and Stephen Dedalus (James Joyce). There are surprising Dalkey connections with James Joyce which will be uncovered in the guided Joycean Walk, led by an expert Joycean Guide immediately afterwards. Must be pre-booked. Admission €12.50. Bloomsday Festival is supported by DLR Festivals & Events.

The 'Maeve Binchy and Famous Irish Writers Walks' begin again on Fridays from 8th June. The walk begins in the Writers' Gallery at Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre. Here, the visitor can explore the Gallery which features the work of forty-five writers and creative artists, from Joyce to Bono and Beckett to Maeve Binchy alongside our contemporary writers.

From Dalkey Castle, along the streets, walkers will enjoy snippets from the work of the said Maeve Binchy, James Joyce, Hugh Leonard and Flann O'Brien, with surprising site-specific references.

Maeve Binchy Memorial Garden. The walk will finish in the beautiful Maeve Binchy Memorial Garden in Dalkey Library where there is a mosaic by ceramicist, Laura O'Hagan. Here, also, the 'Rosa Gordon Snell' that Maeve commissioned for her husband, Gordon, flowers in season. The walk lasts just under one hour and is fully microphoned to the lead tour guide for ease of listening

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

Good news from Killiney Hill where a recent round of trapping by park staff and a squirrel researcher found the baited traps had caught three reds including a female red squirrel who they found was lactating so evidently had recently given birth. She wasn't in the trap for long before being recorded, weighed and then released to return to her little family. We hadn't seen any reds for a while ourselves when one of the park staff told us he'd seen one at the base of Dalkey Hill. The following day we had a look near the car park and the sound of a larch cone dropping to the ground alerted us to a red squirrel on a branch overhead. A magpie took exception to its presence, began to attack it and off it dashed through the treetops. It stopped a few minutes to have a scratch on an-ivy covered trunk then was off again, moving very high along the huge Monterey pines, throwing itself from tree to tree, crossing over the path where the trees meet, then up Killiney Hill. We were hard put keeping it in sight but we followed it all the way then saw it come down on to a fallen trunk and a minute later it sat eating something before disappearing into a clump of ivy.

In last month's Newsletter I wrote about a pair of Long Tailed Tits that were building a nest in our garden but I expressed concern for them, citing figures that show there is a very high failure rate for that species' nests. Sadly the article hadn't even gone to press before my pessimism was proven correct. We'd picked up some feathers in the woods the day before and left them for the pair to collect. They took most of them but the following day some feathers remained uncollected and as the day progressed there was no sign of the pair who, for the previous weeks, had been buzzing in and out of the tree dozens of times a day. I thought maybe one of the pair had been predated on as the nest was almost directly on the flight path of a sparrowhawk that darts in low over the garden wall and glides swiftly a few feet above the ground before heading around the corner of the house and across the back

lawn hoping to take a hapless bird on the feeders by surprise. Its below radar flight helps it avoid early sighting by birds who will set up a chain of high pitched alarm calls to warn other birds. Much as I love to see sparrowhawks I always hope they'll miss their target or have the illogical hope that if they catch a bird it'll be in someone else's garden. Later we saw the long tailed tits nest had been damaged, there were feathers and bits of moss underneath it on the lawn indicating the nest had been raided. But a glimmer of hope appeared a week later when Lucy spotted a pair of long tailed tits in the back garden. No way of knowing they were the same pair until we

followed them around the garden and they both individually flew into the little tree where the nest had been, emerging a few seconds later before flying off so we thought there was every chance they were the same pair, maybe recycling material from the failed nest for a new one they were building.

That sparrowhawk we'd regularly see in the garden was a male, with grey wings and back and russet striped chest but a few weeks later it was a much larger female we came across in the woods. I'd have blundered out and inadvertently scared it away but Lucy spotted it

on the ground holding down a woodpigeon it had just caught and we froze. We weren't much more than thirty feet way and although we were standing behind a bush it was hard to imagine she hadn't seen us as she frequently stared directly at us. But we watched her for over ten minutes as she stood astride the unfortunate bird, wings spread protectively and tore at it, rending off bits of flesh but always alert to her surroundings. A woodpigeon is probably the largest bird a female sparrowhawk can take and when they do catch one they probably do so by flying down and forcing it to the ground so it was very impressive feat of strength to witness when, as two walkers approached, she picked up the remains of the pigeon and carried it off to another more secretive part of the wood.

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




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Loreto Primary School Musical – The Sound of Music

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

From very small beginnings in 1968, Dalkey Meals on Wheels has evolved to become one of the principal non-denominational voluntary services in our Community and we are celebrating our **50th** Anniversary this year in 2018.

From premises at 11 Kilbegnet Close in the heart of Dalkey, we continue to provide nourishing, tasty dinners on five days a week to any person in our area who needs the service. At present we provide approximately 50 meals per day and the cost to the recipient is € 3.00 which includes a main course and dessert.

Dalkey Meals on Wheels is run by a team of dedicated volunteers, both cooks and drivers, who faithfully turn up every week, regardless of the weather. We all know what a long, hard winter we had this year, with Storm Ophelia, the Beast from the East and the worst

snowfall for many decades. Despite the weather conditions, the service continued uninterrupted. with some drivers delivering meals on foot during the worst of the snow and cooks continuing to provide hot meals as usual. The ethos of the service is thus continuing, providing regular food and a friendly house call, as provided by so many of our volunteer friends and colleagues over the years since our inception.

General Litter – can we check our frontages and bin any mess?


Graffiti – call on our Tidy Towns Team for removal help?



BACKGROUND

Dalkey Community was born out of a tragedy when the entire Howard family was lost in a house fire in 1974. With such an amount of community and, indeed, national grief, it was felt that an active community-based organisation was necessary to assist and support the growing community of Dalkey at that time. The Community Council was formed on the back of the success of the Ladies Club and a formal inauguration was held in Hyde Road presided over by the then President, Erskine Childers.

Ever since, the Community Council has striven to build on the initial goals through its Memorandum of Association, having being incorporated in recent years.

This has been done through the following goals as listed in the Memorandum:

- 1. To represent the residents, businesses, clubs and organisations in Dalkey.
 - (a) To increase community harmony and fellowship.
 - (b) To foster the well-being of all the inhabitants of Dalkey without any distinction of any nature whatsoever.
 - (c) To foster facilities in the interest of social well-being, health, recreation and leisure.

The overall improvement in the general well-being of people in Dalkey during this time is marked. One of the methods used successfully has been the regular publication of a Newsletter, which is believed to be the longest running free community-based newsletter run entirely on a voluntary basis. Indeed, the entire Community Council is run by residents who are volunteers in their community and new members are always most welcome.

This Supplement represents the Reports from the various parts of the Community Council at the recent Annual Public Meeting held in Dalkey. We would like to sincerely thank all those who contributed Reports to the Meeting.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2017 FOR MAY 2018 PUBLIC MEETING

As can be seen from the various reports, the Community Council is involved in many areas and continues to liaise with the County Council, An Garda Síochána and other organisations etc. We work very closely with Dalkey Tidy Towns, many of our members being involved in both organisations. The result of this community involvement is very visible around us as Dalkey continues to improve its score in the national Tidy Towns competition, winning Gold for the second year running.

Our Newsletter is going from strength to strength with Road Representatives delivering it to every house in Dalkey. Our circulation is increasing as more homes are built in our area and now our circulation is at 3,500 each month.

We are aware of the increase in planning applications for Dalkey which we monitor every month and publish the monthly Dalkey list in the Newsletter. We send our observations to the planning department of DLRCC if the community or public realm may be affected.

We also work with the Dalkey Castle and Heritage Centre; a representative from the Community Council sits on its Board and reports back to our monthly meeting. The success of the Seven Castles project was a result of cooperation with Dalkey Tidy Towns and the Heritage Centre and other organisations.

Our Community Garda, Ailbhe Boyce joins us at our monthly meetings and updates us of any issues which we should be aware of and answers any queries that our members might have.

The Community Games was initiated in Dalkey by the Community Council many years ago and we continue to give them financial support. It is a great opportunity for children to take part in; "Dalkey Dashers" meet every Wednesday during the summer to train for the annual Community Games competition in Santry. More details of their activities can be seen in their report. We also have an excellent swimming team that has does Dalkey proud, bringing home several gold medals this year.

Our Functions team continue to organise events for both the public and our members, including the Annual Garden Competition, the Garden Outing and the Art Exhibition. We continue to organise the Annual Christmas Event when Santa visits Dalkey and meets hundreds of our children!

All these activities require funding and I should like to thank all of you who donated to our Annual Collection; without your support we could not continue our work for the community.

We are always looking for new members and would welcome anyone who would like to become involved with us; it is a great way to make new friends and become part of an active community organisation that benefits us all.

I should also like to take this opportunity to thank all our members for their work throughout the year.

DALKEY CASTLE & HERITAGE CENTRE ANNUAL REPORT 2017

The Living History Tour featured on Nationwide in October. Anne Cassin was the presenter. The Tour with the costumed characters from Deilg Inish Theatre Company and historical content from the Manager filled the first half of the programme. We got a lot of positive feedback from this, with people still turning up 6 months later saying that they saw it.

Awards: There were several awards won during the year: most recently, Dalkey Castle among the top 5 in Dublin to receive the **Failte Ireland Customer Service Excellence Accreditation Award 2018.**

Other awards include CIE Award of Excellence 2017 and TripAdvisor Certificate of Excellence Award 2017.

Visitor numbers continue to improve, mainly from the USA. We had 33,791 visitors in 2017 up by 5%.

DLR Spring and Summer of Heritage Programmes with free tours for the locals, sponsored by DLRCoCo were fully subscribed. Contact the Centre if you would like to refresh your local history by coming on one of these free tours.

We had, as usual, a number of highly successful literary events:

Bloomsday Festival on 15th & 16th June, where we celebrate all the Dalkey Joycean connections. Check it out on our website for the coming festival.

ECHOES Maeve Binchy and Irish Writers weekend event last Sept/Oct. For this, we had people travel from all over the world to attend. Maeve Binchy fans know no geographical bounds. We get fans of her work into the Heritage Centre constantly. With this in mind, we set up 'Maeve Binchy and Irish Writers' Guided Walks during the summer months. We are very grateful to Dalkey Library staff who facilitate the entry of these groups to the Maeve Binchy Memorial Garden at the Library.

We hosted a number of events for Dalkey Tidy Towns. These included:

A re-cycling evening, the commissioning of an expert from the National Monuments Service to identify the locations the Seven Castles of Dalkey, followed by a guided walk to their locations. Local man, Charles Smith (Society and Economy in a Small Medieval Town) was most helpful in this also.

7 Castle icons: The Castles project came to fruition, and the Castle icons were inserted along the street by Dunwoody & Dobson, for which Dalkey Tidy Towns sourced the funding. Dalkey Castle hosted the launch event for Tidy Towns when the Cathaoirleach unveiled a plaque at Archbold's with a Map of the Castle locations. Dalkey Castle compiled the brochure to accompany the launch, now freely available in the Heritage Centre and Dalkey Library.

Dalkey Town Hall was the venue for the rehearsals of RTE's 'Dancing with the Stars' with Deirdre O'Kane and her partner John Edward O'Connor. The beautifully refurbished hall by DLRCoCo looked magnificent in the TV footage.

Cuala Win: we delighted in, and supported the PR around Cuala's qualification for the All-Ireland Senior Clubs finals in Croke Park on St Patrick's Day. We were proud to fly the Cuala flag from the castle in honour of the occasion. In the event, the game went to a replay which Cuala won. This was their second year in a row to win. Congratulations! History in the making!

Thanks:: The Chairman of Dalkey Irish Heritage Town Company, Martin Allen of DLRCoCo has retired and will be replaced by another DLR Executive. We thank him for his years of chairmanship and support of the Manager and the Heritage Centre.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH REPORT 2017

Neighbourhood Watch is a crime prevention and community safety program for urban areas. It operates as a partnership between An Garda Síochána and the public. It works on the basis that every member of a community can help to improve the quality of life in the area by keeping a look out for neighbours and reporting suspicious activities to the Gardaí.

NW Steering Committee for F District met four times during 2017. These meetings were held in Foxrock Pastoral Centre where NW co-ordinators from the various districts and Community Gardai from F Division area came together to report incidents of crime, suspicious activity, traffic problems, etc. and exchange information and advice. The WhatsApp/ texting alert that is operational in some areas is proving to be a successful tool in pre-alerting residents of any unusual activity/behaviour in their area and for security updates.

This year we lost our Community Garda Cathy Burke and she was replaced by Garda Marion Power. Garda Marion was not long with us when she was assigned to overseas duties. At the end of the year Dalkey welcomed Garda Ailbhe Boyce as our new Community Garda.

The Garda Clinics are held in Our Lady's Hall twice monthly where the attending Garda can assist with forms, authenticating signatures, etc. These clinics are held on the first and third Thursday in each month.

Dalkey does not suffer from serious crime but burglaries are prevalent, followed by theft from vehicles and criminal damage. The graffiti problem is very well managed by Des Burke-Kennedy and his small team of volunteers who erase the tags as soon as they appear and keep the town free of defacement. If charged with a graffiti offence it can lead to a conviction and a criminal record that can have a negative impact for the future.

DCC has a good relationship with the Gardai and there were two meetings with Superintendent Fitzgerald and Inspector Condon in February and October in Dun Laoghaire Garda station. The Gardai are kept informed by the Community Garda who attends the DCC monthly meetings and any the significant matters of concern are discussed at the higher level meetings. We appreciate the "open door" policy that Supt. Fitzgerald has extended to Dalkey Community Council.

We would like Dalkey to be a welcoming town and one that visitors come to spend time in and leave with the best of impressions of the place. There has been an influx of "new" residents and more people want to live in the area, it is very important that we maintain the standard of it being a safe and good place for all to live in.

It is very important that all incidents should be reported to the Gardai in order to help them in their fight against crime.

The swimming team managed by Ian Rowlands had another very successful year. Dalkey won 4 individual gold medals, 2 silver and the U13 girls relay team won gold in the Dublin County Community Games competition on 26th March. In May Dalkey representing Dublin at the Community Games National finals in the National Aquatic Centre brought home 2 Gold, 2 Silver and 1 Bronze from the County Finals. The swimmers are a very young team and they have a very bright future ahead of them.

DCC thanks the swimmers who train very hard throughout the year and the coaches and parents who organise and prepare them for the competitions.

This year the DCC McCabe Sports Cup was awarded to The Cuala Senior Hurling Team who had a very successful year being crowned All Ireland Senior Club Hurling Champions. It is very encouraging to see so many young people from Dalkey involved in sport and representing the area at such a high level.

Community Games is a child-centred organisation and the focus is on **participation** rather than winning. Children take part in friendly competition, in a fun and healthy way. With the support of Dalkey Community Council and the many local volunteers Dalkey Community Games offers the children of the area an opportunity to perform and enjoy sport in the true spirit of the Community Games.

NEWSLETTER REPORT FOR THE 2017 ANNUAL PUBLIC MEETING OF DALKEY COMMUNITY COUNCIL LIMITED

EDITORIAL: Last year was another very successful year for the Newsletter. The regular contributors continued to maintain a steady flow of interesting and readable material for every issue. Our readers also enjoyed what we gave them. Our regular contributors were wonderful in the way they delivered their material in accordance with our production schedule. The most popular subjects were Nature Corner, Gardening, Planning, Local History, Schools' Updates, Heritage Centre, Tidy Towns, Letter(s) to the Editor. etc. with the occasional other article of general interest. We have been approached by a number of local residents with a view to being published in the Newsletter. It appears to be hitting the spot in Dalkey in terms of interest from local residents.

PRODUCTION: Printing costs were maintained at the same level again this year in keeping with the general trend in the industry. We kept a grip on costs and deliveries with our current printer during the year. We also investigated other print quotations but, whilst apparently good, they were not good enough to warrant changing to a new printer and typesetter. Our conclusion is that we are getting a good price for the service we expect from both the printers and the typesetters.

We streamlined the Newsletter's publication scheduling even further during 2017 which has proved quite successful. This manifests itself in the fact that every Dalkey resident gets a regular delivery of the Newsletter and this must, inevitably, improve our local profile as a reliable and a worthwhile community service. We also received an increasing number of enquiries from potential advertisers outside the Dalkey area. Clearly, our 'reach' is increasing; we also have some regular readers who view it on our website as another means of keeping in touch with events in Dalkey The average issue size during the year was 48¾ printed pages.

ADVERTISING: Last year saw our advertising income maintain at a high rate thanks to the excellent work of Ms Helena Feely, Advertising Manager and the attractiveness of the Newsletter to regular and potential advertisers. The continued use of colour advertising has also been an attraction to many of our advertisers. We found that we had to squeeze in some advertisements and balance them with the actual editorial copy. This is a direct result of our overall success with the Newsletter's readership which is obviously of keen interest to advertisers.

The fact that we accept full-page advertisements is a significant help in covering our costs.

Again, special mention must be made in that we are most fortunate to have had the benefit of the experience and knowledge of our Advertising Manager, Helena Feely, throughout the year. She has been an excellent contributor to our Editorial Team and has maintained an excellent relationship with the advertisers, even those who are regularly late with payments!

DISTRIBUTION: The sorting of the Newsletter normally takes place on the last Thursday of the month before the cover date of the Newsletter being published in Our

Lady's Hall. Road Representatives collect their own bags as well as the bags for some others in their nearby areas. This has actually resulted in a more efficient distribution of the Newsletter, despite initial concerns. We delivered more than 38,500 copies of the Newsletter in Dalkey last year. As always, there will be minor hitches mainly to do with Road Representatives not delivering their Newsletters quickly after publication; this can be due to family commitments, illness, holidays, etc. In this regard, special thanks are due to our Distribution Manager, Danny Merity, who, with his wife, Rita, has done a terrific job in 2017 and continues to do so this year. Danny is a great organiser. Our thanks are also due to Christine Feely for her great contribution to the Newsletter sorting.

COSTS: The overall cost of the Newsletter is in the region of €42,000 per annum. This is entirely offset by the income from Advertising with the balance coming from a tightening of the issue sizes where possible. We have maintained our advertising charges at the same levels as in past years but have expanded (*a little*) the number of pages available to advertisers. This overall approach has resulted in every issue's costs being covered during 2017. The loyalty of our regular advertisers is to be very welcomed. Also, we are fortunate in that we are getting more and more people interested in becoming contributors. We welcome this as long as we can maintain control on our costs and reflect what is happening in Dalkey generally. Finally, we can report that the Newsletter returned a (*very small*) profit in 2017, which marks an improvement on some past years.

DCC also thanks Reverend Bruce Hayes and The Select Vestry for the use of the room in St. Patrick's, Harbour Road. The Editorial Team use this venue each month to review the content for publication in each month's newsletter and discuss its distribution.

The main matters to be addressed this year were: the traffic issues, parking and the sustained increase in the volume of vehicles with particular reference to Barnhill Road and Castle Street. All these matters are ongoing with the local authority.

DCC met Supt. Fitzgerald and Insp. Tom Condon in February and October where policing of the town was discussed.

I attended NW meetings during the year and it is good to see that this scheme has been revitalised and is enthusiastically steered by an energetic committee.

Blathnaid MacGinty began a campaign for lifts at Dalkey DART station and with the help and input from Alan Winter this is being progressed further. Thanks to the Transition Year Students from Loreto who also supported the issue by placing the petition online.

I assisted the Advertising Manager with the VAT sheets for the Newsletter and submit the lodgement figures each month to the accountant in order to make a VAT return for Revenue.

I relay the information for the meetings, details for scheduled events, fundraisers and other pieces of information by text. I do remind members that their mobile numbers are never given to third parties without full permission. There have been meetings to redesign the DCC website and it is a work-in-progress. It is hoped that the project will be completed in 2018 and DCC looks forward to raising the profile of the organisation and to interact on another platform.

I thank my Assistant Secretary Elaine Feely who supports me and my appreciation also to the Chairman and members of the Executive for their assistance in 2017.

MAJOR PROJECTS 2017

Dalkey Seven Castles Project: DTT initiated the creation of 7 specially commissioned bronze icons that have been inserted into the pavement along Castle St at the original castle locations. As one of the most significant DTT projects of the past year, the planning, design, development funding, and instillation of the icons, and related information panel at Archbold's Castle also required a major community involvement over the past year. This included the following. The Heritage Council, D.L.R.C.C. Dalkey Castle and Heritage Centre, An Pobal, our Dalkey Tidy Towns Group and Dalkey Community Council. We would like to thank DCC for their financial support which helped to make this project possible.

Dillon's Park: This involved the restoration of public access to large areas that had become inaccessible, the removal of large quantities of litter, the removal of invasive vegetation and the restoration of vistas across to Dalkey Island that had been lost for years. This work is ongoing.

Bullock Harbour: *Harbour Improvement Programme*: This programme involves working and liaising with the owners, Dublin Port; this has resulted in the structural monitoring of the 200 year old piers to confirm their stability, reconstruction of the main slipway, installation of new safety ladders, new pier lighting and installation of toilets, resurfacing and cleaning of the quayside outdoor boat storage area.

Maintenance Programme: DTT accepted the responsibility for the day-to-day maintenance programme agreed with Dublin Port Co. This includes ongoing painting around the harbour, grass cutting, tending the flower bed etc.

DTT with Bulloch Harbour Preservation Association spearheaded a major community response to address a large scale inappropriate quayside development at the former Western Marine site. We also organised a public meeting to inform the public of the various issues surrounding the proposed development.

Ancient Well at Dillon's Park: This was discovered after the removal of very heavy

overgrowth at the lower part of the park close to the shoreline. We hope to further research its history and install an information panel at the site.

Sorrento Park Summit Viewing Area: In April 2017 DTT and DLRCC completed the installation of the new Sorrento Park Summit viewing area complete with benches and a stone compass. We had an official Easter Monday opening ceremony by An Cathaoirleach Cormac Devlin.

We hope to work with DLRCC to upgrade this park where the pathways have been allowed to disintegrate and the green areas to become totally overgrown resulting in a shameful neglect of one of our most beautiful amenities. We have been looking for the renovation of this park for many years but have been met with a reluctance to engage with us by the Council; we will continue to press for this park's restoration for the benefit of locals and the many visitors who come to Dalkey.

Vico Road Blitz: DLRCC cut back the overgrowth of the gorse and brambles along Vico Rd which uncovered accumulated rubbish both along the wall by the road and the pathways through the Vico Fields. DTT removed 21 sacks of rubbish which had been revealed following the annual spring clean by DLRCC.

Tidy Towns works throughout the year on general maintenance around the town;

Graffiti: When this is reported to our team, the tags are photographed and then removed as speedily as possible. Last year there were 424 tags removed. There was a surge in numbers during the school holidays. We have an ongoing problem with the removal of graffiti from the Dart Station especially on the bridges, due to problems with access onto Iarnród Éireann property.

Sites on our Maintenance List; This usually involves the cleaning and removal of excessive vegetation and litter from these areas.

In addition Dalkey Community Council works with DTT, DLR and other local organisations to maintain and improve Dalkey and to keep it a lovely place for both residents and visitors to enjoy.

PLANNING REPORT FOR YEAR 2017 FOR MAY 2018 PUBLIC MEETING

There were 93 planning applications during 2017 in the Dalkey area compared to 77 applications in 2016. 14 applications were declared invalid, usually as a result of problems associated with the site notice; however the majority applied again successfully.

There were 5 applications for retention and 4 of these were granted permission, the other was refused permission.

Additional information was requested in 10 cases and supplied in 8 cases; the remaining 2 applications were decided this year.

There were 4 applications for an extension of duration of permission last year –this was a category that appeared several years ago as a response to developments for which the permission had lapsed during the recession.

85 decisions were made, of these 67 were granted permission, 18 were refused and 2 other applications were withdrawn.

16 decisions were appealed to An Bord Pleanála; of these 10 were 1st party appeals against either refusal for permission or the conditions imposed by the planning department of the County Council. There were 6(no) 3rd party appeals lodged against the County Council's grant of permission.

An Bord Pleanála handed down 14 decisions during the year, of these 6 had previously been granted permission by the Council and then upheld by the Bord.

4 decisions were refused; 1 other appeal was withdrawn.

There was a small increase in the number of applications last year; planning applications are still nowhere near the numbers applied for during the "boom" years.

However, the number of construction sites around Dalkey this year has increased significantly compared to last year.

DALKEY MANOR (BARNHILL RD): In January 2015 a proposal for the demolition of the house known as Dalkey Manor and its entrance gates and walls and the construction of 57 apartments in two blocks on the site was lodged with the planning department.

There was widespread unfavourable reaction on many grounds by residents throughout Dalkey. These included overlooking and overshadowing of adjacent properties, removal of large numbers of trees from the site, impact on the adjacent Protected Structure-Dalkey Lodge and traffic issues along Barnhill Rd amongst others.

Residents held meetings to discuss the issues raised- something which has rarely happened for a residential development in Dalkey.

The application was withdrawn in March before a decision had been reached by the Planning department.

The developer, Pegasus, had decided not to proceed with the aim of developing the site for 'later-living' due to 'planning issues' and put the site up for sale.

In February 2016 a proposal for the demolition of the house and the construction of 29 houses was lodged with the planning department.

Similar objections were raised as for the previous development - overshadowing,

inadequate open space, traffic issues and the impact on the adjacent protected structure, Dalkey Lodge.

Permission was refused in April 2017 for a variety of reasons that had been highlighted by the public and ourselves but interestingly the planners felt that the proposed density (number of houses per acre) was too low for the site due to the inappropriate mix of housing types (ie. too many large houses).

This decision was appealed by the developer and we sent in our observation to Bord Pleanála. Bord Pleanála refused permission in November 2017 for three reasons-the impact on houses in Old Quarry, the impact on the protected structure Dalkey Lodge and an inappropriate mix of house types.

A further application has been lodged this month for 13 houses and 23 apartments; we would urge neighbouring residents to lodge their concerns with the planning department.

BULLOCH HARBOUR: In December 2016 a proposal at the former Western Marine site for 7 commercial units with 6 2-storey residential units above them and 3 large three storey houses with roof terraces at the rear of the site was lodged in the planning department.

Additionally, there was a second application for only the demolition of the current warehouse and sheds

There was huge public opposition to the development involving not only local residents but also the wider public and additionally, opposition from people living abroad who had known Bulloch Harbour previously.

A Facebook page was set up which was very important in informing the public about the proposal and publicising various aspects of concern.

A public meeting was held in January 2017 at Fitzpatrick's Castle organised by Bulloch Harbour Protection Association to outline the concerns. We are part of that association with Dalkey Tidy Towns, local residents, boat owners and local businesses at the harbour.

An audience of almost 500 people attended the meeting, including local councilors and TDs.

The main concerns about the proposal included the impact of such a large scale residential development on the Harbour in a variety of ways and the possible negative effect on the existing commercial businesses. Future public access to the rocky coastal area at the rear of the site was also highlighted. Other concerns included parking, inadequate open space for the development, drainage issues, overlooking, flooding. It was felt that the proposal did not integrate with the local community at Bullock harbour and did not respect the historical and natural history of the area.

Over 400 hundred observations were lodged with the planning department, something which had never previously happened for any other planning proposal in the area.

The planning department refused the application with an extensive list of reasons for its decision.

The developers did not appeal this decision

A further application was lodged in December 2017. This time the development consisted of a 3 storey tower block at the end of the pier consisting of 2 apartments with parking for them on the ground floor level and a café. A separate boat building facility, a

small area for community use with some changing facilities, 3 small units for the owners of the "sheds" that are currently located along the pier and 3 very large houses at the rear of the site were also proposed.

The developer suggested that should permission be granted for the development, they would "gift" the rocky coastal area at the rear of the site to the County Council for public amenity use.

However, as the public has had access and the use of this area for generations and the access gateway would still remain in the ownership of the developer (as indicated on the planning drawings accompanying the application), this could not be considered a planning gain for the County Council.

A public meeting was held in January in the Royal Marine Hotel, Dun Laoghaire where approximately 300 people attended in addition to several County Councillors and Minister Mary Mitchell-O'Connor.

The concerns remained similar to the previous proposal but the major concern was the issue of flooding and over-topping. These concerns were highlighted when storms occurred in February and March of this year resulting in major over-topping with flooding of the site and the pier resulting in serious damage to the pier.

The planning department refused permission in February of this year; this time the developer appealed the decision to Bord Pleanála in March; we are waiting for their decision which will be made later this year.

We should like to thank all the members of the public who took the time to attend meetings and lodged their concerns and objections to the planning department and Bord Pleanála to help to protect this much loved public amenity.

CHARLEVILLE, HARBOUR RD: An application for 56 units in 4 4- storey blocks over an underground car park was lodged in August. There were widespread concerns regarding the proposal mainly its scale, density and massing, the impact on the surrounding properties particularly the Protected Structures St Patrick's Church, Sexton's Lodge and Rocklands House and the visual impact on the streetscape. We have serious concerns in regard to the potential impact of the traffic generated from the proposal. Harbour Rd is seriously compromised already due to high volumes of traffic as it is the main access road to the 3 schools in the area.

The planning department refused permission on the grounds of loss of amenities due to the scale and massing of the development and also that the development does not provide a suitable mix of housing types as it proposes only apartments.

The developer appealed the Council's decision in October. We await Bord Pleanála's decision any day now.

CASTLEPARK SCHOOL: In June an application for 50 units in 8 blocks of three and four floors over an underground carpark for 80 cars in the grounds of Castlepark School was lodged. The proposal is located amongst the wooded area necessitating the removal of 53% of the trees; it is to be accessed via the entrance gate to the school, but construction traffic is to be routed through Castle Close and out through Castlelands. This new access point to the site was proposed to remain a pedestrian and cyclist access after the development was completed. Castle Close is a cul-de-sac and these proposals caused serious concerns to the residents.

There were other concerns relating to the scale of the development, its proximity to the Protected Structure Castlepark School, the loss of the woodland area and traffic issues in an area that already has severe congestion with traffic generated by the school. The removal of vast quantities of granite (10,000 sq. mts) from the site is also a concern.

The planning department refused permission in July on the grounds of excessive scale and massing, uniformity in design, its undue prominence in the area which would detract from both the Protected Structure of the School and also the adjacent residential areas. It would also seriously injure the visual and residential amenities of No 5 Castle Close due to its proximity and height on rising ground and the loss of the woodland area at this part of the site.

The decision was appealed in September; we heard at the beginning of this month that Bord Pleanála had upheld the appeal and granted permission for the development with some alterations to the block adjacent to 5 Castle Close to lessen its impact. The Bord did not agree with Dun Laoghaire Rathdown's planning department and took the opposing view that the development would not be injurious to the amenities of the area, or have a detrimental effect to either the setting of the school or to the residential housing adjacent to the development.

34 BARNHILL RD: In August an application for the demolition of the existing motor service /sales garage and the construction of 10 duplex units and a 1-bedroom apartment and the refurbishment of 2 existing town houses was lodged.

We had concerns about the density and height of the development and the potential for overlooking and overshadowing adjacent properties. Other concerns were the lack of both adequate private and public open space, lack of parking provision, and traffic issues along Barnhill Rd.

The planning department concurred with our concerns and refused permission in October.

ARD MHUIRE PARK: In June, an application for the demolition of 2 Ard Mhuire Park and the construction of 2 semi-detached houses and one detached house was lodged.

There were concerns about over-shadowing, overlooking and overbearing of adjacent properties; Traffic concerns and local flooding issues were also highlighted.

Permission was granted by Dun Laoghaire Rathdown in August but was appealed by several residents. Bord Pleanála upheld their decision in February of this year.

REDAN HOUSE: In August an application was lodged for the demolition of Redan House and the construction of a terrace of 3 x 2-bedroom houses. We had serious concerns about the demolition of Redan as it is the last vernacular farm house remaining in Dalkey. We were also concerned about the height and length of the proposal as it would cause overshadowing and overlooking of adjacent properties at Dalkey Rock, 5 Ardbrugh Villas and the opposing properties across Ardbrugh Rd.

The flat roofed design is inappropriate at this site as it would intrude into the adjacent Killiney Hill Park.

Car parking provision and construction management details were also inadequate.

Ardbrugh Rd is presently the site of many new builds and its character is being radically changed by the building of very large houses that are intruding into the views from Killiney Hill Park with a loss of visual amenities for the public.

The planning department agreed with our and the neighbouring residents assessment of the application and refused permission in October.

The developer appealed the decision in November; we have yet to hear Bord Pleanála's decision

14 BARNHILL PARK: In October an application for a detached house in the rear garden of 14 Barnhill Park was lodged. Serious concerns were raised by the surrounding neighbouring residents in Barnhill Park, Saval Park Gardens and Saval Park Rd including over-looking of the gardens and the rear of some properties with loss of their residential amenities. Minimum separation distances between the rear of No 14 and the proposed building have not been achieved. Also the new access road into the proposed house requires that the garage of No 14 has to be demolished; notwithstanding that, an adequate width for the access road has not be reached between Nos 13 and 14.

We would be concerned that a development at this site would set an undesirable precedent for backland development in this area.

However, the Planning Department granted permission in December; this decision was appealed by the residents in January. Bord Pleanála has not yet reached a decision.

SUNNYSIDE: An application for the demolition of this house on the Vico Rd was lodged in March of this year. We have concerns that its removal will alter the character of this area. We are also concerned that no adequately reasoned submission for its refurbishment as opposed to demolition has been submitted. There are also significant concerns about the management of the construction phase of the development.

No decision has been made by the planning department at this time.

In regard to planning applications, I should like to stress to everyone, the importance of vigilance in respect of site notices. If one appears in your neighbourhood, it is important that you find the time to inspect the relevant plans for the particular application in the Planning Office in County Hall, Dun Laoghaire if you believe the proposal will affect your property or view it on-line on the County Council's website.

The applicant must lodge the plans with the Planning Department of the County Council within 14 days of displaying the site notice.

Following the lodgment of plans in the planning office, the public has 35 days to submit their observations and objections, accompanied with a 20-euro fee. If you believe you will be affected, it is vital that you write into the planning department to voice your concerns.

The planning authority will then make their decision.

Following the decision, the public has 28 days to appeal to Bord Pleanála if they had previously submitted the relevant objection to the planning department. The fee for this is 210 euros.

Following the lodgment of an appeal with An Bord Pleanála, the public has 28 days to submit their observations the fee being 50 euros in this case.

Our longest day of the year is June 21st. The extra warmth and light encourages our gardens to put on an exuberant burst of growth. The risk of frost has passed but maybe pause a thought for ten or eleven weeks ago, when our wonderful Dalkey was covered in Snow. And on this note, many plants are tougher or more obliging than we worry about and even up to today, see what I thought we had lost in our severe snowy conditions - , with new fresh green struggling growth. So, with the extra light and warmth weeds will invariably sprout up from seemingly nowhere. Try and keep on top of them by hoeing regularly in dry conditions.

Hopefully, this June will bring long sunny days, allowing us to reap the benefits of our Spring preparations with an abundance of growth and lush bright spectacular colours. Particular attention should be given to anything newly planted as it is imperative that they do not dry out while they are settling in – so water, is a vital part of our garden maintenance presently. Each day in the garden some new beauty shakes out the crease in her petals. Today, it is the turn of some poppies and the scarlet taffeta of these oriental beauties is brightly blazing in the hot mid-day sun – what a sight against the various sound levels of bird song. ...Now, enjoy planting up your containers, hanging baskets, plants etc. I heard on the radio this afternoon, how a former Consumer Research Manager found his Lifeline In Gardening; "It became my medicine. My physical and mental state significantly improved and it was clear in my mind that gardening was something so special.", so keep weeding and deadheading in order to maintain beds, borders, displays and water new and young plants before our Summer really heats up. ...Sowing made in curves rather than straight lines often creates a more pleasing effect.







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Maybe, Rediscover the Romance of Roses

June is our month for rapturous roses. Every rose will bring you weeks of pleasure this Summer and for so many years to come. ...Remember, roses can suffer from black-spot, rust and powdery mildew – all fungal diseases which thrive in damp, warm weather, ... Their new flower buds are also very attractive to greenfly, whitefly and blackfly, all of these problems can be addressed by spraying with a combined fungicide/ pesticide such as Rose Rescue or Rose Clear Ultra. Remove any leaves showing signs of disease, then an application of rose feed with enriched horse manure will ensure both good flowering as well as a healthy immune system for fighting pest and diseases.

Think, Just A Thought – Not Fantastic Plastic

Seed trays, pots, modules in black and green etc., plastic cloches, plant labels, fertiliser containers, compost sacks. ... These cracked pots that I binned yesterday could have been somewhere out there, more than three hundred years from now – maybe even in our Pacific Ocean poisoning our sea bed life. So maybe, consider going back to the 19th

century gardener – they gardened in a pre-plastic world. ...But then, aren't clay pots and wooden trays such a delight. Yes, they do need gentler handling, cleaning etc. but they are things of beauty and such a pleasure to use.

Do You Know – Seed tapes have carefully spaced seeds impregnated between two layers of paper. They work well if lightly buried with soil and kept well watered so the germinating seedlings can get through. They are quick and easy for gardening with children. The best selection of seed tape is available online.

Do You Know – There are approximately 60,065 tree species on this Earth. Wild populations of more than three hundred species are down to fewer than fifty individuals. **Do You Know** – That Phlox grows so well on moist-ish sandy soil (even a North facing bed) – such a site to us gardeners is like gold dust. The cooler shade helps them keep their perfume longer. Excellent varieties and ten out of ten are: -

Orange-red, *Prince of Orange* and *Monica Lynden Bell* which has pale pink flowers contrasting well with darker foliage. David has awesome white flowers that re-flower and re-flower. Mount Fundi – another excellent white.

Courgettes – were bred to be cut lengthwise and then cooked on the barbeque. They come in three colours; green, yellow and pale green. The oval fruits have firm flesh and are so easy to turn on the barbeque. These bushy plants have smooth stems so are pain-free to

A New Herb – *Wasabi Rocket* – A rocket salad leaf with a fiery taste of Wasabi and can be grown year round.

Turn Up The Beet – *Beetroot* – The increasing popularity of beetroot in restaurants, readymeals and juices suggest it has become a so-called superfood. Rich in nutrients, beetroot is easy to grow and can supply baby roots and salad leaves too – and all from a single row of seeds. It will even grow in a pot. Plants need little maintenance other than watering during extended dry spells to ensure they do not bolt.

Choice Cultivars – Boltardy - the most popular and won't bolt. Bulls Blood, ornamental and could be grown in a flower border –, it has deep purple leaves. Chiggia, candy-striped beetroot and is perfect for slicing raw – its red and white rings are so attractive in salads. Bettolla and Bona earned the award of Garden Merit in 2016.

MIGHT DO MAYBE JUNE JOBS

Maybe add splashes of bright colour and contrasts of form to your plantings, e.g. *Verve*. Pinch out the tips of your fuchsias to encourage a bushy habit and more flowers.

Feed your lawn, it will instantly green up and will

help strengthen it for extra traffic during our Summer.

Centipedes are a gardener's friend. They kill soil pests when they hunt at night. Maybe provide some cool damp places such as log piles to encourage more to live in your garden. Towards the end of June, if your hardy geraniums have finished flowering, cut them back to encourage new foliage and flowers.

Alyssum and Aubrietia, trim back after flowering to prevent plants looking tatty. Trim *Clematis Montana* if it's outgrowing its allotted space. A hedging shears is the thing to reduce long whipping growth.

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ASK THE PHARMACIST



Q. I have had constipation for the last three days. I have never had this problem before- what is the best way to treat it?

A. Constipation is normally classified that you have had a bowel movement less frequently than three times per week. It is often accompanied with a feeling of bloating and/or stomach cramps.

The most common causes include:

- Not eating enough fibre such as fruit, vegetables and cereals
- Not drinking enough fluids
- Not exercising or being less active
- Often ignoring the urge to go to the toilet
- Changing your diet or daily routine
- Stress, anxiety or depression
- A side effect of medication
- It is also common in pregnancy and after giving birth.

Often by looking at the cause of the constipation it will give the best idea how to fix it and is often easily rectified with lifestyle changes.

These include increasing fibre in the diet, drinking more fluids and increasing daily exercise including walking.

If these are not successful, then you can talk to your pharmacist about medications that are available over the counter to treat constipation. These are only designed for short term use and will normally work within a few days.

The most gentle of these are osmotic laxatives which increase the amount of water that goes into the bowel softening the stool and making it easier to pass.

Bulk forming laxatives increase the amount of fibre in the stool and give a feeling of fullness in the bowel which triggers the body into a bowel movement.

Stimulant laxative stimulate the bowel to speed up the movement of the stool.

Other options include suppositories and enemas.

If the use of these agents is not successful in the short term then we would advise a visit to your GP for a more long term solution.



A Matter of Vaccination Fees for the Dalkey Medical Officer for Health

In 1896 Dr. Wright, Medical Officer of Health for Dalkey, had lengthy correspondence with the Local Government Board over the vaccination of a registered child in his district who had moved from the district shortly after his mother had received the usual notice of vaccination. She later returned and then presented this child for vaccination. He asked if he could refuse to vaccinate the child while the mother was residing in another district and that if he did vaccinate the child, was he entitled to the vaccination fee. The Local Government Board advised him that he was entitled to receive 2s. for every successful vaccination or re-vaccination whether or not the person vaccinated was a resident of the Dalkey Dispensary area.
