DALKEY SAYS 'I DO' TO ITS FIRST CIVIL MARRIAGE CEREMONY!

On Thursday, February 13th, Dalkey Town Hall had an exciting new development in its illustrious history. The first civil wedding ceremony was solemnised there. The couple making history were locals, Geraldine Penney and Tom Galvin.

The historic Goat Castle in Dalkey dates back to the 1390s when seven castles were built along Castle Street in Dalkey. The castles were constructed to store the goods coming in locally when Dalkey acted as the port for Dublin. In the 1860s, the upstairs room of the castle was used as a meeting room for the Dalkey Town Commissioners. In the early 1890s, Dalkey Town Hall was built onto Goat Castle to host community events. The castle became

the Foyer to the new Town Hall.

The Town Hall was recently completely re-furbished under the expert guidance of Bob Hannan and Noelle Sweeney from the Architects Department of Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council. The result is a beautifully decorated, creatively lit venue with unique features that retain the charm of the original structure.

Modern glass doors from the street give a welcoming and open feeling, through which the magnificent stone work and the barrel-vaulted ceiling can be viewed, by day and by night. Dalkey Town Hall is available for the solemnisation of civil wedding ceremonies and civil partnerships to those who are looking for somewhere unique that conveys an ambience of history, charm, dignity and vintage style elegance that is not found elsewhere. Both The HSE and the Humanist Society are licensed to perform the ceremonies.

The building has hosted 'dramatic' events since the early 1900s. Eamon De Valera addressed a rally there in the 1930s. Hugh Leonard frequently referred to it in his memoir 'Home Before Night' and in his play 'A Life' the young Desmond delivers a speech in the Town Hall. It has been a dance hall, a theatre, a voting venue, a library, a sports arena and continues to be a valuable 'living' community space with dance classes and community plays.

Following the re-furbishment, it now goes a stage further to become a venue for those very special occasions in people's lives.

Since the foundation of the troop in 1927, the 17th Dalkey Scouts has been without a permanent home its own. That was until our recently deceased leader Terry Connolly led the challenge in the early 1970s together with a highly motivated group of the scouts' parents and leaders to provide the group with a permanent home.

The den that was built from their efforts, opened in 1976 to great ceremony which was the culmination of a parade by all sections of the scout troop, from the Epworth Hall, down Castle Street and up the football field for the official opening. To the scout group of 1976 the new den was wondrous, bright and spacious but more important, it was ours. The new den replace a series of temporary homes that provided shelter to the scouts included the Town Hall, Our Lady's Hall, the Epworth Hall and the long since demolished out buildings of Loreto Abbey Junior School.

However, the Den as built was only ever designed as a temporary building. The vision was that the building of 76, was to be replaced after a short period of years by a permanent brick built den. One proposal was that the existing structure would be surrounded by the brick walls and then the metal shell be removed and yet another included adding an additional smaller hall to the rear as a venture room.

As of 2014 nearly 40 years on, the permanent brick structure or the venture room has never materialised, but thanks to Terry's vision and his continued dedication to its upkeep in the subsequent years, the 17th Dalkey still has its home and this despite the fact that it was only intended as a temporary structure.

In the intervening years the den has been the base for numerous adventures in to the Wicklow and Dublin hills, which are basically the scout's home playground and many other exploits across Ireland, England and Western Europe. The den has seen thousands of kids pass through it doors and seen them grow from young kids into adulthood many to return to join the band of leaders without whom the adventure would not continue.

Now that the Den has served nearly 40 Years it is showing its age. Time has come for the Den to be refurbished so that it may continue to serve our community for the years to come.

To that end, a recently formed group called the 'Terry Connolly Fellowship' which is a Parent and Friends Group of the 17th and aims to rekindle that 1970's pioneering spirit and refurbish the Den for the scouts.

The members of Terry Connolly Fellowship has set about developing a 3 year plan to survey, cost, fundraise and implement the works needed to refurbish the den and leave it ready and suitable for children of the 17th of the next 40 years.

Terry's favourite event of the year was the Scouts' Annual St Patrick's Day Church Parade. So to celebrate this and to kick start the fundraising, this year's Parade will culminate in a coffee morning in Our Lady's Hall, Castle Street. So come and join the fun and bring the family; everybody welcome including Old Scouts.

Our series dedicated in the memory of Dr. John de Courcy Ireland, continues **Dalkey Island Cruises:** As mentioned in the last issue, it can now be confirmed Dublin Bay

Cruises are to start in April, operating a new non-landing cruise: Dun Laoghaire Harbour (East

Pier) - Dalkey Island - Killiney Bay. In addition locals and tourists alike can take the 90 minute cruise (setting sail at 5pm and returning at 18.30) to view our spectacular coastline dotted with landmarks and to watch wildlife.

This new cruise will be served by the 100-passenger vessel, St. Bridget, which also resumes cruises in Dublin Bay, but unlike last year's launch, there will no longer be Dun Laoghaire-Howth excursions; having said that, there are now four new cruise options: Dun Laoghaire-Dublin city-centre (and vice-versa) involving passage through the East-Link Toll-Lift Bridge to berth opposite the National Convention Centre.

Also running are Dublin-Howth Harbour trips, likewise in both directions, and offering attractions of the peninsula. All passengers (one-way journey)

in both directions, and offering attractions of the peninsula. All passengers (one-way journey) are issued with a DART discount voucher so as to give flexible travel options.

During this forthcoming St. Patrick's weekend the excursion operator is to offer charter cruises. **Dalkey Island Ferry:** As previously reported elsewhere in the last issue, a licensed Coliemore Harbour-Dalkey Island boat service is due to start in April /May. In the interim period Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council intends to carry out some safety improvements at the harbour to facilitate the service.

DLRCoCo also intend upgrading the island slipway as soon as soon the Department of Environment issue a foreshore licence. The Council are pressing the Department to grant the licence as a priority so work on the island be completed before the breeding season of rare birds

around mid-May.



own 'Riviera', the direct continental Dublin Port-Cherbourg service operates every weekend, year-round as a 19-hour service. Subject to sailing conditions, the ferry will also sail parallel to the Wicklow Mountains and Leinster's eastern seaboard - a view not familiar to most Irish, let alone introducing the Emerald Isle to tourists.

A previous operator had also covered the same route, when P&O Ferries ran for two seasons, in which I had the opportunity to take a 'foot' passenger sailing during 2003, the year in which the service closed. The current operator, Irish Ferries, do not carry foot passengers, though such an option should, in my opinion, be revived!








Memories of our friend Derek Campbell, long-time Dalkey resident, who died recently in his ninety-fifth year.

Maeve and I first met Derek and Mary when we moved into our house in Dalkey, more than thirty years ago. The backs of our houses shared a lane, so we could call on each other easily.

One day we were chatting to him at our table, and he happened to see the miniature chess set we took everywhere with us, playing a continuous series of games. We were evenly matched, and played quickly with a minimum level of skill. In fact, Maeve once said that we played chess like a game of chance.

So when Derek, who was an expert, suggested we might play with him, we backed away modestly. Then he told us a fascinating tale of his days with the Great Northern Railway, working in their office in Dublin. He had

discovered that the station-master at Drogheda was a chess player, and they devised a kind of distance chess. They each kept a board and a chart of their moves, and the station-master would give a note of his latest move to the Guard on the train to Dublin, who would pass it on to Derek. Derek in turn would send his move back on the next day's train to Drogheda. Maeve got very interested in this ingenious system, and questioned Derek about the details. She told me later that she thought it could be the basis for a short story, with a mystery: one day, the move wasn't on the train....

It certainly gave Derek an idea. "We could use the same kind of system!" he said. "We could each go across the lane and post our moves through the back gate."

We thought it was a great idea. And so we began a series of the most enjoyable and unevenly matched chess contests. Derek put a smart brass letter-box into his green wooden back gate, and we posted the little chart of moves into it every evening. Next day he crossed the lane and put his return move in through our cat-flap.

The final score in the series was: DEREK - 65. MAEVE & GORDON - 2.

In spite of the obvious difference in our skills, as we stumbled from one defeat to another, Derek was always telling us: "I think you are definitely showing an improvement." But as the score shows, he never went easy on us by down-playing his own skill at the game. I think our two wins were due to momentary losses of concentration on his part, rather than sudden inspiration on ours.

It was great fun for all three of us, part of the general delight and privilege of having Derek as a neighbour and friend for so long. I will miss the chess games - and the help I got from him in my attempts at sketching. But most of all I will miss his company and his friendship. We talked about our families and friends, and all he had done in his life. He was modest about his own amazing range of skills, which included painting, furniture-making, meteorology, water-divining, and conjuring.

He was a great man, and a great loss to us all.

If you spend most of your life living in trees, commuting between them by jumping from branch to branch the last thing you need is days of unrelenting high winds. Leaping from one tree on to a slender branch feet away can be a risk at the best of times but when the branch you are about to jump on to is swaying wildly in the high winds it can get extremely perilous.

We were very concerned for a red squirrel we were watching moving through the tops of a group of Scots Pines on Killiney Hill on one of the numerous windy mornings we had for weeks. We thought if the squirrels were active they might stay on the more sheltered side of the hill but this individual was on a tree near the peak of the hill. It was heart in the mouth moments as it jumped from tree to waving tree but it moved effortlessly and didn't come to any harm. Although red squirrels don't hibernate, when the weather is bad they will shelter in a nest, called a drey, composed of twigs, hollowed out inside and lined with dried grass, fur and other soft material. Dreys are positioned high in trees often towards the centre

of the crown where they are safer from wind damage. Each squirrel might have up to four different winter dreys in which it will sleep at night and shelter from bad weather. Their metabolism will drop so they won't need to eat as much when they're inactive. Since the red squirrel reintroduction on the hill there are also a number of very secure squirrel nest boxes so if they need to keep their heads down for a while they shouldn't have any problem finding a cosy shelter.

A few years ago I was very lucky one November afternoon to be able to watch a red squirrel building a winter drey in a Douglas Fir, tearing around at a ferocious rate breaking off twigs and bringing them back to the construction. Maybe it hoped to have its shelter built before night time, it was certainly busy enough.

Last year the squirrel researchers trapped five red squirrels on Killiney and three of those were juvenile males, born last year. For a few months previously we were able to tell the young squirrels from the adults since they hadn't been ear tagged but when they were trapped they were all given their new body decoration for easy identification. Whether the one we'd seen on the windy tree top was one of last year's young I could only speculate but wouldn't be totally surprised to find that it was a young male acting a bit recklessly.

When the winds did turn bitterly cold in February it brought some welcome returning visitors to the bird feeders. Last year we had at our feeders our first ever visiting Brambling, a Scandinavian member of the finch family. They are regular but not common winter visitors sometimes appearing in small numbers among big flocks of chaffinches but also happy to take advantage of garden feeders. He was back in early February this year and the day after we saw him we had our first Siskins of the year at the nyger seed feeder. But while the cold weather was bringing in some birds to feed in the garden, at the same

time other birds' minds were on something else. We'd seen a lovely male Goldfinch doing a seasonally early display, singing from top of a ash tree above the Vico Road. Last year Goldfinches held a territory in a garden on the Vico Road and there was every chance this was the male of that pair.

A few days later we watched a robin perched on a bramble doing a fascinating little bobbing and weaving dance, a mating display, crouching then stretching out sideway and shaking his tail while the object of his desire, the female robin looked on. Later that day I was cutting a tree from a ladder when a pair of battling blue tits flew into a conifer then fell out a few inches away, totally oblivious of me as they grappled with each other. Presumably two males already competing for nesting territory.

It's always worth having a look at Dalkey Island to see who's visiting and at this time of year it can play host to a flock of feeding Brent Geese. They'll have flown down from Sandymount or the Bull Island where they would have spent the night. Every day many of the Dublin geese will continue down to Wicklow to feed at the reserves at Kilcoole and Newcastle but some will have saved themselves a flight by stopping to feed on the island if the goats have left

enough grass for them. Dalkey island is often one of the first resting places of Wheatears, one of our earliest arriving migrants and you can get a crossover of a bird that has just arrived from Africa while the geese feed up before their migration north to Arctic Canada. Leaving out dog hair at this time of year can provide a nice insulating lining for birds nests and it's never too late to put up bird boxes. Even if they don't use them this year they'll get used to them for next year and there's always the chance a pair of birds whose first attempt at nesting will have failed would be trying to nest again and would avail of them.



Recently St. Patrick's Dramatic Society played host to Dalkey Players in the Northover Hall, Harbour Road, where both groups presented their One Act plays prior to competing in the One Act Festival at the Mermaid Theatre in Bray.

The plays presented were "The Wine List", written by a St. Patrick's member - Mark Alyward, and "27 Wagons Full of Cotton" by Tennessee Williams. These played to a capacity audience who enjoyed the evening and a glass or two of wine afterwards made it a very convivial occasion.

Both plays enjoyed some successes at the Festival. Emma Jane Nulty of Dalkey Players carried off the Cup for Best Actress and Anni Dai of St. Patrick's was awarded Best Supporting Actress with Fiachra MacNamara winning the Most Promising Young Actor Cup, he is also a member of St. Patrick's.

You may recognise Penfold's range by their label (*see picture*). According to number on the label, these grapes are picked in a particular area in their




vineyards, the same grapes from the same vines each year. So now Penfold customers can be sure that if they like this particular Bin number it won't change very much from year to year, it gives their drinkers an opportunity to stick to what they know they enjoy which I think is very clever. It is obviously working as Penfolds is growing from year to year and is a popular table wine all over the world. Their history starts like many others in the Barossa, Christopher and Mary Penfold emigrated from England in the 1800's. Christopher Penfold was a doctor and held a belief in the medicinal effects of wine on his patients and this is where it all began. They made fortified wines (port) to begin with and the company expanded from the initial 500 acres bought to over 2000 acres in various parts of South Australia. Now the winery is privately owned which I think is a bit of a disappointment. In my opinion wines produced from family owned and run wineries are most often of better quality.

Penfold's on the other hand is now mass produced to appeal to everyone, never producing something fantastic. I did however enjoy their Cabernet Bin 407 at cellar door. It is a pure Cabernet with flavours reminiscent of blackcurrant, cassis and a hint of mint, these flavours

combine well with the oak present. You can purchase this particular Cabernet online at www.wineonline.ie or why not try other Penfold's Bin Range at your local off licence? You might just find your favourite Bin number.

The A Team – busy mulching our Christmas Trees

Seasonal Stirrings to all our Dalkey Residents. Make no mistake about it plants have begun to respond to our lengthening days. And soon, our new growing season will be well under way. The beauty of tree shapes, their structure, their silhouettes is never more apparent than in winter. Evergreens of all types and shrubs come into their own at this time of the year. Isn't it so incredible but fascinating, how some plants come into focus in winter while others become almost invisible. In a way, it's almost like watching a slide show, while one image gradually fades away, the next 'slide' gradually, sharpens. Yesterday evening while walking Mr. Precious (our King Charles, Ruby) around Killiney Hill, a ray of moonlight seemed to be lighting up the bare twigs of some dogwood (Cornus) there and close by, a lime tree, obviously previously masked with foliage, stood majestically by its side.

February can bring the odd day of warm sun which may coax early blossoms to life, only for them to be crystallised by maybe, the odd vicious frost. Viburnums are among the most reliable of winter flowering shrubs. Some are deciduous and produce sweetly scented pink or white blooms on bare stems throughout winter. Last Monday, I decided to walk Killiney Hill with a friend and of course, our two little treasures, Cindy and Mr. Precious. I will never forget the scent of Pine trees wafting through the atmosphere as we left Dalkey Avenue and ambled our way towards the car park on Killiney Hill. There, heaped, rather meticulously, were dozens and dozens of Christmas trees - all types, all species from our Dalkey, Glenageary and Killiney homes. What a service, "Aren't we so lucky", as two or three residents remarked that day. Our local County Council Green Workers led by head gardener Mick Kingston were shredding a designated zone of cut, abandoned, Christmas trees into beautiful piles of acidic mulch. On inquiring, Mick enthusiastically told me that his team were going to lay paths throughout the woods with this amazing mulch and likewise, use it for top dressing Scots Pine trees and the likes. He continued to tell me that due to our stormy weather, they had to do a general 'all over check' of our tree forest and consequently, consult their usual tree surgeon, specialist, 'Donal Roe', who was at the time, lopping a tree that had split and become dangerous, (Ivy, growing around some trees can keep them standing but with shallow surface roots, obviously they can be hazardous). Again, Mick informed me, they generally leave the tree stump at a visible height so that 'passers by', won't bump into them as they walk. Occasionally, our green team leave a higher trunk of Larch, Oak, Ash, Sycamore or Beech, where fungus and algae generally thrive so to encourage animals to hibernate, likewise, birds, termites, bats and squirrels.

MIGHT DO, MAYBE, FEBRUARY JOBS

1. At the beginning of February, most gardeners lift and divide their Snowdrops. It is usually called 'moving them in the green', which means lifting them while they still

- have their leaves and even their flowers. It generally takes two or three years for a clump to fully settle before we need to consider moving them again.
- 2. Small bulbs look a bit lost in a large border or flower bed but they look great in a rock garden or raised alpine bed. Crocuses, Grape Hyacinths, Miniature Daffodils Narcissus, Scillas and Iris Reticulatas, all thrive in good drainage.
- 3. Now is the perfect time to plant a Wisteria. To get the very best from it, remember it must have a sunny spot. Some people believe it has a reputation for being a very greedy plant; so maybe use plenty of organic matter like well rotted horse manure. A mature Wisteria can be pruned now in winter by shortening to pencil length, those long whippy shoots.
- 4. As growth starts early, prune all Roses, Climbers, Ramblers, Standards, etc.
- 5. Some stems of shrubs such as Forsythia, Ornamental Quince, (Chaenomeles) Flowering Currant, Winter Jasmine, can be brought into a warm room to flower in a vase.
- 6. Greenhouse Jasmines, Plumbagos, Brugmansias, Jacarandas etc. can all be pruned back now to strengthen them and to invigorate them.

7. Plants that live permanently in containers become pot bound and it can be a big job to repot them. Over time, their compost 'becomes exhausted', so topdressing them around

now can be of tremendous benefit.



SPONSORED SWIMS AT CASTLE PARK



Our swimming pool has been the focus of some determined fundraising efforts recently.

The children in the School participated in a sponsored swim in order raise funds for communities in Philippines devastated by Typhoon Haiyan, particularly focussing on the plight of children suffering immensely in the wake of the storm. It is estimated that 90% of the schools situated in the path of the typhoon were

destroyed, leaving nearly one million children with nowhere to go to school.

We are delighted to have forwarded €5188 to UNICEF to support their work - they have managed to screen 49,000 children for malnutrition, to provide 50,000 children with learning materials and have also restored clean water to half a million people since last November.

Fifty members of the Barracuda Swimming Club based at the Castle Park Swim Academy also took to the water at the beginning of February with the aim of swimming the distance of the English Channel, 21.5 miles/34.6km/1400 lengths of our pool, between them. The sponsorship money collected was for Chernobyl Children International which continues to support children affected by the aftermath of the Chernobyl nuclear explosion in 1986. Paddy McDonald, swimming lesson coordinator at The Swim Academy and Sports Centre, is travelling to volunteer at the Vesnova Children's Mental Asylum & Orphanage and the sum of €1500 raised will be donated to assist the children there.

Oh! How Television (and Radio) has changed over the years . . .

Most of the "free" UK channels have now moved to a different satellite which uses a much tighter beam. This will have no bearing on people in Ireland, but it will affect viewers on the continent, and especially those in the Mediterranean. Previously you would need a very big dish to receive the UK channels abroad (typically anything between 2 and 3 metres in diameter), and now that the signals are even weaker large dishes will simply not receive the signals anymore.

So if you are in Italy for example, and you want to receive the BBC via satellite you are going to need a very very big satellite dish, 5 metres in diameter should do the trick, but it may not work in bad weather!
