

SUMMARY OF DCC FEBRUARY 2015 MONTHLY MEETING

The DCC meeting was held on Monday 9th February in OLH.

TT: The graffiti problem remains a scourge in the area but it is hoped that the public will be made more aware of the amount of work that the Tidy Towns volunteers and the Gardai are undertaking to tackle this problem when the information meeting is held in the HC on Wednesday 18th February. Remedial work has been carried out on the Torca right-of-way and the Ulverton steps.

NW: Dedicated burglary patrols have been set up as a regional response to the incidents of burglaries on a national basis.

Planning: The application by the Pegasus group for the development of 57 retirement apartments at Dalkey Manor on Barnhill Road has been lodged. Please see page 24 and 26. The next DCC meeting is Monday 9th March 2015.

A day package from the city centre which links Howth and Malahide to Dalkey and Dún Laoghaire is being developed. THE 59 BUS SERVICE, DUBLIN

A chara.

Before I comment on the 59 Bus service may I say that the drivers on this route are outstandingly considerate in their dealing with their passengers, most of whom, during the daylight hours, are senior citizens.

The 59 Bus service overall, however, is unsatisfactory, no fault to the drivers. Its terminuses are Mackintosh Park in the Cabinteely area and Dún Laoghaire, the time-table being every 40 minutes or so. However, a regular feature is that the No. 59 Bus misses a route which can result in one waiting up to 52 minutes for the next bus.

At the Dalkey bus-stop there is an electronic sign-board which indicates the arrival of the next 59 to Dún Laoghaire (but not to Mackintosh Park). But between Dalkey and Dún Laoghaire (8 stops each way) there is no sign-board, which means that people each way would be totally unaware of a 'missing' bus.

There is also another bus service-(No. 8) - which departs from Dalkey every 55 minutes for Dublin. It does not travel through Dún Laoghaire but through Glenageary and then on to Dublin city, by-passing Dún Laoghaire. The no. 8 terminus is at the end of Ulverton Road in Dalkey .The 59 terminus is about 50 yards away in parallel Hyde Road. High buildings block their view of each other.

The electronic sign-board at the 59 bus-stop at Hyde Road also indicates the departure time of the No. 8. When, however, the No. 8 departs from Ulverton Road, it turns immediately

As the sign-board indicates the departure time of the No. 8 it would be reasonable to assume that the No 8 Bus would stop here for the passengers, especially visitors, tourists to Dalkey heritage town. However, the No. 8 does not stop at this bus-stop, notwithstanding, often, the frantic gesticulations of those waiting.

I would respectfully suggest:

- 1. That Bus Átha Cliath discontinue the No.59 service and appoint a private operator instead. Or
- 2. If Bus Átha Cliath refrain from doing so, let Paddy Power bring the No. 59 into his betting systems, e.g.,


3 to 1 that the X a.m. 59 does not turn up

And so on.

As regards the No.8 all is needed is a notice on the electronic board to indicate that the No. 8 terminus is at Ulverton Road, about 50 metres away.

Farewell Stena HSS: An end of an era indeed, as the closure of our doorstep Stena Line HSS ferry-service between Dun Laoghaire Harbour and Holyhead was finally confirmed in February. The historic 200 year old Ireland-Wales sea link is severed, having begun by a mail ship and then a ferry from 1835.

So the final ferry chapter, started over 170 years ago, has drawn to a conclusion, as the sight of the HSS Stena Explorer, is sadly no longer a common sight off Dalkey's shores as the route is to close permanently.

The announcement on the future of the 52 nautical mile route (served by the HSS since 1995) has been the 'worst kept secret' in the Borough and also amongst our counterparts in Anglesey, Wales. In recent years the service has been loss-making for numerous and for well publicised reasons.

According to the Dun Laoghaire Harbour Company, Stena apparently had tried to secure a smaller fast-ferry; instead, they will now concentrate on their existing route out of Dublin

Port. However, other operators are hoping to run a new Dun Laoghaire-based seasonal service, but not until 2016.

This development is to be welcomed as the harbour was recently designated a 'Port of Regional Significance'. Any effort to retain a ferry connection makes strategic sense alongside amenity and leisure-craft users and the rising cruiseships trade-boom, boosting the local economy and Dalkey too.

The seasonal-only service (only run since 2012), came to an end on 9th September with the final sailing departing to Holyhead. As for the route's secondary shoulder/shorter season over the Festive Season & New Year, these sailings were cancelled and that led to HSS Stena Explorer laying up in Holyhead for the duration.

The term HSS (*High Speed Sea-Service*) referred to her original 99 minute crossing time which caused initial unforeseen side-effects, as the wake of the craft caused large waves and deployed strong undercurrents that reached the coastline. This led to speed restrictions being introduced but still the effects could be felt and caused the County Council to erect signs along our coastline to warn bathers of the possible dangers.

Notably, the HSS became the World's first fast-ferry also able to handle large freight trucks and at 40 knots! (75km/h) due to its revolutionary gas-turbine water jets.

She joins a long list of ships to have served on the link. Each type of passenger ship reflected different times, the technology and how each of the generation would recall them. As reported in the Dec.14/Jan.2015 issue, I reminisced on the HSS's predecessor, *St. Columba*, the route's last conventional car ferry (Sealink/British Rail, then Stena).

Also clearly recalled was 'Explorer's maiden call to Dun Laoghaire, where the strikingly futuristic craft (first of a trio of HSS 1500 Series sisters) entered between the harbour arms hewn from Dalkey granite.

Preceding 'Explorer's 19 year-run, a succession of 'Lynx'small fast-craft, had operated in tandem with the aforementioned 'St. Columba'. As for the 'Holyhead Ferry I', the route's first ferry to have drive-on drive-off capability, would berth at the East Pier where the new 'Urban Beach' is to be located

Prior to that, of course, this important role was carried out by 'mail-boats' and delving further back are the 'steam-packets' which started such services once Holyhead Harbour had been built to complete the railway connection linking Dun Laoghaire (Kingstown) and London.

Before that, the stream packet services included routes to Liverpool, Bristol, Falmouth and even directly from Dublin Port all the long way to London and notably through Dalkey waters! (See Oct. 2011 issue).

I had heard about a young swan which had a non-fatal collision with a train near Booterstown last year and had then been rescued off the tracks by the Booterstown Dart stationmaster. He had kept the cygnet safe and comfortable in a back room till it was taken to the animal hospital in UCD where it was kept overnight before being transferred the following day to the Kildare Animal Foundation, a charity which takes in, treats and rehomes domestic animals as well as caring for a increasing variety of wild animals and birds.

I wasn't able to get in touch with the stationmaster and presumed the bird probably hadn't survived. I eventually got in touch with the Kildare Animal Foundation and was pleasantly surprised to hear that the swan was in fact still alive, in very good health and they hoped that after a period of rehabilitation they would be able to re-release it back into the wild.

The Kildare Animal Foundation website itself is fascinating. When a Dormouse, a mammal previously unknown in Ireland before this century, was found in the wild (actually asleep in a treehouse, the person who found it thought it was a baby squirrel) in a Kildare garden in 2010 it was taken to the Kildare Animal Foundation. Dormice are found in Britain but are a threatened species there and very rare but, like most Irish people, the nearest I'd have got to a dormouse would be reading about the one who slept through most of the tea party in Alice in

Wonderland. They're beautiful little creatures with golden brown fur, big eyes and, unlike other mice species a very fluffy tail. The tail is probably an asset to keeping it warm as they do hibernate and it's estimated they can spend up to three quarters of their life asleep.

Somebody had photographed two young dormice on a bird feeder in Kildare a few years before but this was the first adult found in the country. At the time it was thought they might have been escaped or released pets but when I spoke to Dan Donoher of the Kildare Animal Foundation he told me since that individual was found they had received quite a few more dormice into their care and it seems likely there is a small breeding population in Kildare. It's now thought that they might be of a European race rather than of British origin and DNA samples have been taken which should ascertain where they originated. One theory is that they might have been imported in hay, possibly hibernating sound asleep, from the continent. Since they aren't native mammals they can't be released back into the wild but they will be well looked after at the foundation. Many imported non-native species can be very detrimental to native species, the grey squirrel being one of the worst offenders, but researchers reckon that even if the dormouse becomes established it will not be a threat to any Irish species.

The Kildare Animal Foundation has now developed such expertise working with other native wild animals that a lot of cases are now referred to them. One of their recent cases was a short eared owl that was found injured in Skerries and they have also treated kestrels,

otters, red squirrels and pine martins as well as many other birds and mammals. If you'd like to support their work, one way you can do it is by 'adopting' a wild animal to pay towards its treatment. pack and you will also receive an update on the sponsored animal. Their website is http://animalfoundation.ie

I eventually got in touch with the stationmaster at Booterstown who had rescued the swan and he told me that their station and Grand Canal Dock Dart station regularly get swans in trouble, the birds often standing immobile on the tracks (it's possible some of them may have collided with overhead wires), and they have become quite adept at catching them, throwing a big coat over them and wearing gloves to avoid pecks and then either returning them to water or else getting help for them if injured. The Booterstown stationmaster, Peter Ridgeway, told me that last year there was a swan leading a family of tiny cygnets outside the station on the car park side. The swan began walking, with little family in tow, towards the main road and possible calamity but Peter caught up with them, headed off the swan and drove them back into the safety of the marsh.

If you do encounter a wild animal or bird in trouble and you can't get immediate professional help the website of Irish Wildlife Matters is invaluable for giving instant information on how to handle or catch injured animals, how to assess their injuries and how best to keep them or transport them if further treatment is needed. It also has a list of contacts around the country some of whom specialise in treating specific creatures such as hedgehogs or birds of prey and they will either give appropriate advice or actually take in the injured animal or bird. – http://www.irishwildlifematters.ie

If asked what species of goose has the longest migration from breeding ground to wintering area you might think that it's a species like the bar-headed goose which flies from its breeding grounds in Mongolia over the Himalayan Mountains to winter in southern India. Although they fly high there is another species of goose that travels much farther.

In fact the goose with the longest migration distance is the light bellied Brent, the same small goose you can still see now often gathered in numbers in Booterstown Marsh, feeding on the rugby pitch at Blackrock College, swimming around Scotsman's Bay, feeding on Dalkey Island or flying up the coast at dusk after feeding in Wicklow, in fact all along the east coast in winter. They nest in the eastern Queen Elizabeth Islands of Arctic Canada and migrate to Ireland via Greenland and Iceland and some of the birds who will be leaving our shores in March or April will be nesting in June just 500 miles south of the North Pole.

Before their breeding grounds turn to sub-zero temperatures and 24 hours of darkness the majority of the world's population of light-bellied Brent will move south through Greenland and Iceland to spend winter in Ireland making them one of our most important wintering birds. The geese's favourite food is a type of marine plant

called eelgrass or Zostera, which grows in estuaries and around the coast but this will all be consumed by late winter and after this food source has been exhausted they move on to pasture and other green areas, often football pitches and parks.

While in Dublin Bay they might be threatened by foxes and chased by dogs but when they're sitting on their nests they'll be in danger from Arctic foxes and wolves. The word 'brent' is derived from the Norse word 'brand', meaning burnt. The geese were given this name because of their colour - like charcoal. Before April is over these birds will be on their way north again.

Spring, has almost sprung so let's get going and spring into our very own action! Right now is the time to prepare our gardens for this Summer's festivities. I personally think Spring arrives around mid-March when one season then seems to roll effortlessly into the next and remember, Summer may seem like a distant Golden Dream but like so many other anticipated dreams, it's really only a season away. Again, work really does start now if we are to thoroughly enjoy every aspect of our Summer gardens. For me, the

morning I swept into the kitchen with stains all over my hands was the day that Spring came. Whether your garden is cricket pitch size or just a window box, you can attain and maintain a little bit of paradise whether you want a bowling green lawn or just a square of velvet green grass, regular mowing starting around now, will improve the appearance of your lawn and really help to keep it looking its best. If your daffodils were 'blind' this Spring, (no flowers), maybe wait until April and then deadhead, leaving their foliage, unknotted, then fatten up the bulbs with tomato feed and divide them, if crowded.

As our weather warms up, our slugs and snails are simply, in their element - they just love all our new soft growth and especially tender buds so, keep a beady eye out for these creatures, and deal with them now before your 'beauties' (plants) disappear before your eyes, be it egg shells, copper bands, and there's also a copper-based barrier 'tape'. My personal favourite is grit, as it creates a sharp surface, making it difficult for slugs to slide over. Maybe you might prefer to use milk or beer traps; there are also organic slug pellets that don't harm children, animals and wildlife.

I generally say to myself, early every Spring, that I must try and divide up more of our little space in order to create extra intimate and interesting rooms outside. Internal divisions enable us to create surprises and a sense of mystery. Are we not tempted to explore and discover what is around that corner? Remember too, that a light here and there gives instant drama, at the flick of a switch! (Again, there are so many solar types available and are ever so cheap).

MIGHT DO, MAYBE DO, MARCH JOBS

Here are a few ideas that hopefully will give you maximum drama for minimum efforts: -

- 1. Right now is a perfect time to order your *Plug Plants*. Nurseries generally send them at just the right time for planting. You don't even need a greenhouse to grow them in. Try a sunny back bedroom or windowsill. Give the tips a pinch out, a couple of times while the plants are young: this will make them firm and bushy and in return, you will have a lot more flowers.
- 2. A Grass Alternative Chamomile, Corsican Mint and Carpeting Thymes are alternatives, especially in shaded small areas. These plants are good value for money and offer great Winter interest and then, none of these plants mind being trodden on, occasionally, and when crushed, release their wonderful fragrances, especially the powerfully scented Peppermint. Such an area would not make a suitable surface for energetic games.

- 3. **Trellis Works!** Trellis really works well in almost every style of garden and is available in so many patterns. It can look classic or warm and traditional. Strong double trellis can make a useful screen within the garden. It is especially good for small spaces because unlike cement or other boundaries, it simply doesn't close one in too much and then creates that important sense of privacy.
- 4. **Containers** Whatever container you choose, it's a really good idea to go for the largest, you can afford. Not only does one larger one have greater impact than several smaller ones but it is also more practical because the compost will dry out less quickly so needs less watering. Several containers together make more of a show if they are in the same style and material and are grouped together rather than dotted around. If you

possess a particularly striking container, maybe you could just leave it unplanted and allow it to make a strong sculptural statement. The more elaborate the container the simpler the display of plants in it need to be and vice versa, so a very ornately decorated pot will look stunning with just one type of plant. Personally, I think the most attractive containers are those that are packed with plants. Maybe, choose plants of different habits, some trailing to soften the edges, some upright in order to add height to the display and some bushy to fill out.

Finally, if the mood grabs you, cut off the old leaves of your Hellebores in order to expose their new flowers. It also helps remove possible foliar disease such as hellebore leaf spot, then as we can see, weed seedlings are growing daily, and it's best to scoop them out now before they get out of hand. Watch out too, for downy mildew and black spot on pansies: your pansies will carry on into Spring and even early Summer if attended to frequently. Lastly, let's strip our perennials of their dead leaves, old stalks and seed heads. Enjoy every single Spring day!

I was feeling a little homesick when suddenly, a surprise visitor shook me out of my sullen mood....President Michael D. Higgins was coming to Beijing and we had the chance to meet him! As Irish students studying abroad we felt it compulsory to welcome our leader to this foreign city and even if we didn't get to meet him, we had heard there would be free food and drink there, so of course around 20 of us all pushed and shoved our way onto the subway at rush hour and headed towards the Irish embassy located in downtown Beijing. Michael D and his wife Sabina were both at the event, talking about the growing relations between China and Ireland and all of the benefits this had for both countries. We all felt a huge sense of pride watching this man hold the attention of about 200 people, both Irish and Chinese, with his gentle presence and compelling words. What surprised me the most was that after his speech, Mr. Higgins waited as people queued up around the room to get a picture and a handshake with him. It was getting late but he had the decency to welcome every person in that room to the Irish embassy and thank them for listening. He is a credit to Ireland and a fantastic representative of our small-but-mighty country. He had such an impact on the Chinese people in Beijing that I heard the previous evening they had illuminated the famous Tiananmen Square with green spotlights and had Irish flags hanging up around the square and around the Forbidden City which are both considered national landmarks in China. And I can't leave out the free food we received! After about two months of eating Chinese food we were all absolutely delighted to find smoked salmon on McCambridge'sstyle brown bread, Wexford strawberries, proper succulent Irish beef and what tasted an awful lot like Lily O'Brien's decadent chocolates! It was an all-round fantastic evening and I will never forget meeting Michael D in Beijing, it truly was a pleasure getting to see him.



FINCHES AND BUDGIES

One day, seated at the table making a garden bird box with various tools and small nails to hand, I briefly left the room. Upon my return, continuing the work, I suddenly realised there were no nails! Thinking I had accidentally swept them to the floor I searched the carpet but to no avail.

Mystified, I carried on with fresh ones. Sometime later my wife said "Have you seen this?" I went over to look and was amazed to see twenty silvery nails neatly woven together around the rim of the nest that TickTock (our bird at the time) and his companion sleep in at night. A practical use of handy items!

With all the joy that these creatures bring, we still have to deal with melancholy events. Since the previous article was written, Smudge, our little



flightless female finch has died, Despite several such events, it still comes as a painful loss.

About three years ago, a different bird entered our lives. Another gift, a bright green budgerigar, who again highlighted the remarkably differing personalities of individual avians. JimJim (for that is his name) proved to have a friendly but highly independent nature, full of curiosity, which, on occasion, resulted in near fatality, trapped in a vase he was inspecting. In earlier days we would have been fascinated by activities such as pushing or chasing a metal ball around the floor, hanging upside down from lampshades, or inspecting our teeth and trying to remove them. As he has grown older and also gained the companionship of another male budgie, he has, to quite a degree, lost interest in us. But, even so, now being about four years old (middle aged?) and less playful, he does retain some little tricks, though these tend to be of a more destructive nature, knocking over small items, chewing picture frames and, in particular, he will not tolerate the presence of a small plastic dog and cat which he will despatch from a shelf with a flourish, then look down to ensure that they have fallen to the floor. If approached at an unsuitable time, he will twitter loudly and often bite, but unless very angry, which he can become, the bite is not severe. Conversely, if in the right mood, usually in the evening, I can get a kiss, a gentle nibble on the lips, and my wife is allowed to pick him up and rub her cheek on his wing.

We had noticed that JimJim would often seek the company of the finches, but when flying to them they would take fright, leaving him to wander alone and rejected. This was quite sad to see, and so we bought him a companion, resplendent in cream, turquoise and grey feathers, and proving eventually just how different two birds can be. This one always stays at the back of the cage, very quiet and shy. I said to my wife "He's a very distant bird" - and that became his name! However, we were in for a surprise. One day he started to sing. We were astonished at how beautiful it was, enough to match any nightingale. Not only that, but JimJim himself began to sing in response. Now sometimes we can't hear the radio or T.V. properly for the chorus. They will sing to music, people talking and even the vacuum cleaner. A particularly charming feature of this singing is that they will address themselves to a point of focus such as a clock, an ornament or a curtain ring, nodding their heads or bouncing up and down at intervals.

JimJim still likes the finches, often going to visit them, much to their consternation. But now he has his friend, it's not so disconcerting to see them fly away. He won't join us at meal times anymore for a piece of potato or a couple of peas, but will come to the water jug for a splash around if I am painting a picture, and will pluck the bars of the cage to gain attention.

Distant Bird continues to be distant, with his inscrutable gaze, and they both remain a source of unending pleasure.

"FROM THE HILL TO HARBOURS"

Big Belly' Solar Bins: You will have noticed the change in bins in Dalkey since mid-December. For several years the Tidy Towns Committee has been seeking to have these large capacity bins installed in a few key locations where litter is prevalent. Having carried out trials along the frontage in Dun Laoghaire, at the end of last year the Local Authority decided to roll out this type of bin in order to reduce collection costs, etc.



Following discussions between the Local Authority and Dalkey Tidy Towns, nineteen Big Belly Solar bins have been installed at agreed locations in Dalkey.

We are conscious that they are not visibly as attractive as the traditional 'heritage' style bins. However, while it is early days yet, but there are indications that their deployment has led to a reduction in litter. (Incidentally, the 'Big Belly' bins are manufactured from recycled steel and plastic).

They possess several significant advantages over the traditional bin. Firstly, they have considerably greater capacity, not just due to their size but also through the compacting of the rubbish, thus providing further extra capacity.

Another noteworthy advantage is that they can communicate! Just like mobile phones, they use cellular data to communicate. They can communicate to selected servers in terms of how full or otherwise they are. Thus they can be continuously monitored. This will lead to greater efficiency and effectiveness in the 'rubbish' collection system and site selection.

Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council seek to recoup at least part of the outlay on these bins through these efficiencies and also by on site/bin advertising. However, we are seeking an exemption from the placement of advertising on the bins located in Castle St. We feel that would be inappropriate in the centre of a Heritage town such as Dalkey.

We are in the process of gearing up to address the observations by last year's National Tidy Towns Adjudication. More about that in the near future and how you can help in enhancing your locality.

ASK THE PHARMACIST



Q. I suffer from a 'burning sensation' in my chest especially after meal times - what could be causing this and how could I treat it?

- A. The symptoms you are describing are more than likely heartburn or acid reflux. This happens when acid from the stomach moves up the throat causing a burning sensation. It is generally not something to be concerned with and can be managed by dietary changes and/or medication. Small and significant changes to your lifestyle can make big differences:
 - Eat smaller, more frequent meals
 - Avoid fatty foods and eat fruit every day if possible
 - Get plenty of fibre in the diet

- Avoid spicy food if they cause a problem for you
- Be physically active and try to get to an ideal weight for your height
- Stop smoking or less often if this is not realistic
- Reduce alcohol and caffeine consumption
- · Avoid going to bed directly after mealtime
- If you suffer from night time reflux, elevate the head of your bed and lie on your left side There are many treatment options of over-the-counter medications which include:
- Antacids: These neutralise stomach acid for a short while
- Alginates: These act by protecting the stomach lining
- H2 Antagonists: These act by suppressing the production of stomach acids
- Proton Pump Inhibitors: These work similar to H2 Antagonists but provide better and longer acting relief

Always discuss with your Pharmacist or your GP your specific symptoms, before treating the condition, so that the correct treatment option can be offered.

You should visit your GP if you experience any of the following: weight loss, loss of appetite, difficulty or pain on swallowing, vomiting blood or passing bloody stools.

Q. I have a lot of difficulty swallowing tablets - do you have any tips on how to help with this?

- **A.** This can be a common problem for people and one easy solution is the 'pop bottle technique'. To do this you:
 - Fill a flexible water bottle with water
 - Place the tablet on your tongue and close your lips around the opening of the bottle
 - Take a drink from the bottle, keeping contact between the bottle and your lips and using a sucking motion. Swallow the water and the pill right away.
 - (Don't let air get into the bottle as you swallow the bottle should squeeze in on itself as you swallow)

It is sometimes possible get a liquid form of the medicines or to crush tablets or open capsules so always check with your Pharmacist if this is an option.




