Oh! How Television (and Radio) has changed over the years.....

One of the very first satellite systems I installed measured 2.8 meters in diameter, it needed two cubic meters of concrete to hold it in place, and took a week to set up. The end result was two satellite channels (Screensport & Premier) and they only transmitted for a few hours a day. Last week I installed a 1.2 meter satellite system for a customer, it took the day to set up, did not require any concrete, and had a small motor attached to track the satellite belt. After scanning the various satellites available the receiver logged 13710 satellite channels! (not to mention thousands of radio channels).



Matters arising: A petition signed by 50 residents from Ulverton Road against the anti-social behaviour has been delivered to the Gardai. Considerable underage drinking, established to be mainly by local people, is taking place in several locations around the town with incidents at Hyde Park being particularly prevalent. Gardai are aware of the trouble spots and action is being taken. Reporting of incidents will be treated in confidence and is encouraged. Recent improvements have been noted however by both residents and Gardai since the closing time was brought back to the earlier time of 2.00a.m. This facilitates easier access to taxis easier for people leaving the town.

Correspondence: The Transport Dept of DLRCC sent a copy of the Draft Bye Laws stating that car parking charges will be €1.50 everywhere in our area and the residential parking permit is to be increased from €25 to €40 for one year and from €45 to €75 for two years.

Tidy Towns: The Litter Patrol on 27th March produced 10 volunteers and collected 25 bags of rubbish. The black spots were around the bottle bank at the train station, the steps leading from St. Patrick's Sq. up to Railway Road and the seated area on St. Patrick's Ave.

PRAISING A TREE

*'I think that I shall never see
A poem as lovely as a tree'*

It is 1912. The newspapers have been full of bad news this year. Scott had reached the Antarctic in January and then the tragic news of his and his companions' deaths reported in March. In April the Titanic sank in the Atlantic with huge loss of life. In the North of Ireland, Unionists fearing that "Home Rule is Rome Rule" signed the Covenant. Yet a significant event in our town never got a mention. It was merely good news!

A group of boys stood inside the school gates on St. Patrick's Road on a sunny day on October. A couple of spades and a small sapling leaned against the wall. "We have to dig a hole about a foot deep and a foot wide" said Mr. Waldron, the Principal. Young Joe Ryan grabbed the nearest spade and his pal Billy the second one. "Sir, which side of the gate will we dig?" asked Joe. "We'll put it on the right as the gate opens on the left", said the teacher. In a short time the hole was wide and deep and ready for the sapling.

"What sort of tree is it going to be, Sir?" said Michael. "A horse chestnut", said Mr. Waldron, "anyone know anything about it?" A chorus of "we can get conkers from it, it loses its leaves in winter, to grows so big", was heard. "Now Joe, hold the sapling very straight and each of you take a turn filling in the hole", said the teacher. This was done and the clay flattened around the base of the little sapling. "When you are all grown up, come back and look at the beautiful tree you planted", said Mr. Waldron as everyone returned to the classroom.


Ninety-five years later a beautiful tree stands inside the school gate. When I came to teach in Harold in October, 1971, it was one of the first things I noticed about the front of the school. There was the same gate entrance beside it as there was in 1912. The second gate was only put place in 1990 when oil for heating the school had to be delivered. Each February the brown sticky buds are noticed and then the leafing in March and April followed by the beautiful candle flowers in May. It seldom bears fruit as it stands there alone but I have seen the occasional chestnut in the past thirty-six years. This magnificent tree, whether it's dark, leafless branches of winter, or the wonderful green of spring and summer can be seen from afar. Standing on Castle Street, it's the first object noticed on St. Patrick's Road. Coming off Carysfort Road on the way to school it is what strikes the eye first. Walking on Convent Road, the top of the tree is visible and around in White's Villas this beautiful tree catches the eye again.

It is now an adult tree with a trunk circumference of 270 cm and a height of about 6 metres. It casts a long shadow and has had to be topped many times over the years as it can grow to over twenty metres in the wild! The wood is not good quality, but can be used to make cheap furniture, boxes and for firewood. So, it's really just a tree to look at and admire.

How did I come across this interesting story? Young Joe Ryan, a pupil in Harold in 1912, who dug the hole and held the sapling, had a son, Tim, born in 1933, and also a pupil of Harold in the 1940s told me what his Dad had told him. Tim's brothers Joe, George and Arthur also attended Harold Boys' and were followed later by Tim's sons Kieran and Declan in the 1960s and '70s. Each of them walked under that tree morning and evening as they went to and from school as did hundreds of others over the years.

With regard to the controversy over the phone mast Oliver McCabe obviously believes that I'm venting my spleen in print. However, I would like to point out as an engineering professional that we live in a complex world where for every complex issue there is a simple answer that is almost invariably wrong. Furthermore it is now often seen as 'trendy' to be anti-technology, which is often driven by the fact that the media does not let hard facts get in the way of a good story. A recent example would be the public hysteria over flying during the millennium period, yet I cannot recall a single pilot expressing reservations about flying their aircraft because of the Y2K bug! Oliver is obviously proud that he has in effect blocked law abiding companies from developing the telecoms infrastructure in this area and as reported in your newsletter he has been aided by a number of local politicians. Yet where is the beef? I haven't seen a single measurement of the existing situation! How do we know there is actually any issue when no measurements are referred to? It is not simply acceptable to say that an eminent physicist has recommended we err on the side of caution. The World Health Organisation doesn't make such statements, which without a referenced measured value are just a throw away comment. Let's face it the RTE mast in Donnybrook, when compared to the Dalkey situation, is both enormous in scale and power output, should we err on the side of caution and tear it down?

To conclude any group which decides to obstruct the lawful development of infrastructure in the area has a moral obligation to provide accurate figures to justify why the others have to suffer the consequence of deficient infrastructure. Where are those figures?




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RABBIT WISDOM

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
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❖ TRAFFIC MATTERS (4) ❖

The Traffic Acts (1961-2006) apply to EVERYONE who uses the Public Road system be they pedestrian, cyclist, motorcyclist, car, and van or truck driver. Remember that Traffic Lights, Stop signs and Yield signs are meant for YOU and mean what they say.

CYCLIST

Cyclists are the most prone to accidents, especially at night.

They should ALWAYS ensure that they have lights, front and rear, so that they can be seen by other road users. The use of a reflective jacket is a sensible advantage, as is a cycle helmet.

Not all footpaths are 'cycle lanes', so only use the ones which are clearly marked as such. It is dangerous to cycle on normal footpaths as well as being illegal as pedestrians can be injured by so doing.

PEDESTRIAN

Pedestrians are also prone to accidents with many killed each year unnecessarily. 'Jay-walking', i.e. crossing the road just anywhere, is a very big hazard. Try to cross roads either at crossings, if provided, or at safe spots on the road. Never cross roads at bends where you cannot see traffic and they cannot see you.

Adopt the 'Sale Cross Code' for yourself and your children.

MOTOR-CYCLIST

Motor-cyclists are also prone to accidents and again, many are killed on our roads unnecessarily. Weaving in and out of traffic is not only a danger for yourself but a danger to other road users also. Passing out traffic when it is clearly NOT safe to do so, i.e. having to go on the wrong side of the road, is a big factor in many accidents. The wearing of a helmet is also a MUST for safety reasons.

CAN/VAN DRIVER

Many accidents can be avoided by taking a little care when driving. NEVER 'tail-gate', which is now illegal. NEVER drive on FULL beam headlights, apart from it being illegal, it blinds oncoming drivers and can cause serious accidents. The use of front FOG lamps as part of your lighting is also dangerous and should NOT be done, except where there is genuine fog and they should be turned OFF when you leave the fog. Everyone should know by now that the use of HAND-HELD mobile phones is illegal since 2006, yet there are many irresponsible people out there who still persist in using them. Over 99% of mobile phones now have hands-free kits or are Bluetooth enabled so there is NO excuse for the continued use of hand-held mobiles when driving.

TRUCK DRIVER

Trucks, because of their size, pose a large danger on our roads. If you get stuck behind one you cannot see beyond it and any attempt to pass it out can be most dangerous. Very large trucks have 'blind spots' where the driver cannot see what is lower than him/her, e.g. cyclists trying to overtake. Manoeuvring them is an art in itself and can cause much delay to traffic behind. Therefore, care is needed in you encounter such procedures. In wet weather they are a real danger as they spew up large amounts of water which can cause an accident if your view is severely restricted and your windscreen wipers cannot cope.

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NATURE CORNER – by Michael Ryan

FAIR GAME

The dog bouncing around excitedly under the tree where I hang nut feeders for the birds and a great clapping of wings alerted me to the presence of a new unlikely visitor to the garden, a hen pheasant. The bird flew up into the neighbour's conifers where it perched in ungainly fashion. I'd seen a pheasant on Dalkey hill in mid winter but apart from a few feathers on the road I hadn't seen a pheasant around the hill in years.

I had heard that someone used to rear them in Dalkey Quarry years ago and they grew the Leycesteria bushes which are now very common around the hill. More commonly known as the pheasant bush since their deep blue berries were a great food source for these birds and a very popular food choice for Bullfinches and Blackcaps.

The poor old pheasant looked very out of place perched on a branch and these birds always seem to have that permanently alarmed expression. Perhaps being bred to be shot might account for their permanent nervous expression. It continued to come around for the next few days picking up the spilled seed under the feeders.

Out of Africa



Many of our summer migrant birds should have arrived by now and many will already have nests built and be sitting on eggs. One of the last birds to arrive, usually in the early days of May, is the Swift and this is the bird I always associate with summer, screeching overhead on warm evenings sometimes in small weaving flocks. They are totally dependent on insects which they catch in the air which is probably why they have such a short breeding season, from May to early August, only being here when the air is warmest and abundant with small flying and floating creatures.

Surprisingly a major source of food for them is spiders which 'balloon' through the air after launching themselves into the air to move to a new territory. Swifts only land to build nests and lay and hatch eggs in high buildings. They spend nearly all their lives in the air even sleeping and mating on the wing. They build their nests with material they catch in the air like wind borne seeds and they used use elm seeds plucked from the sky to build their nests with until these trees were struck down with the Dutch Elm disease in the 70's.as nest material. Since they only land on high perches they have evolved so that their feet are set very far back on their bodies and they can't take off again if they get forced on to the ground.

European Swifts winter in Zaire, Tanzania or Zimbabwe. Like the Swallows, House Martins, Cuckoos and many other birds which arrive her in summer it's fantastic to think they might have been flying over prides of lions and herds of zebras, giraffes and wildebeest a few months ago as well as travelling over the vast Sahara desert. It's estimated that Swallows can get here from Africa in five weeks.

Queen of the May

The Hawthorn bush will have just begun to flower at the beginning of this month. It is traditionally associated with the beginning of May and indeed is known as the 'May blossom'. Unlike the Blackthorn which begins to flower in March with the white flowers contrasting against the bare black branches, the Hawthorn gets its leaves first in March with the flowers following in May.

The Hawthorn figures large in old myths and traditions, single bushes in fields having a

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

It used be a common practice (up to quite recently) to eat Hawthorn leaves in cheese sandwiches, accounting for another traditional name for it the 'Bread and Cheese Tree'. Apparently they are very tasty but don't take my word for it.

They are a very useful plant in the wild being very attractive to up to 20 different species of insects when in flower. In Autumn the berries are a very good food source for birds and dense bushes are also very good for nesting and roosting.

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



Nandine domestica, 'Fire Power', 'the heavenly bamboo', has a great autumn colour and doesn't lose its leaves, Sarcococca (Christmas Box) has beautiful scented winter flowers-, another little beauty.
