
DCC MONTHLY MARCH MEETING

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
CLAMBAKE

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
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
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NATURE CORNER - by Michael Ryan

KITE FLYING

Coming up from the beach on Good Friday I'd stopped to look at a Linnet who was singing from the top of a small tree on the other side of the Vico Road. It's a lovely song and they're very handsome little birds with chestnut brown wings and the males displaying a pinkish flush on their forehead and breast in the breeding season. If you're interested in wildlife and the natural world it often happens that while you're watching a bird or mammal

something else will happen along. In this case it was a Red Kite, one of the most spectacular birds of prey in this part of the world, drifting above Dalkey hill then over Killiney Hill. Birds of prey, also known as raptors, can be difficult to identify flying high above in the air but the Red Kite is an easy one, pale head, reddish brown body with cream patches on the underside of its long wings but its most distinctive feature is its deeply forked tail.



Very successfully reintroduced into Britain and now a major tourist attraction in Wales, 30 Red Kites were brought to Ireland and released in County Wicklow last year and almost certainly this bird was one of those. The released birds all had highly visible individually lettered tags fitted on their wings. They don't hinder the bird's flight and are used to identify birds and where they have travelled to. Sadly two of the birds have been shot dead and two died from poisoning (probably picking up bait left for crows) since release. Another poisoned Red Kite was found by a Leitrim farmer who put it under a heat lamp normally used for newborn calves and subsequently after further treatment the bird recovered and was re-released in Wicklow. Before it had picked up the poison the bird had been seen in Kerry before travelling to Leitrim so coming to Dalkey from Wicklow was a mere hop for the bird I saw. The Dalkey bird had been seen the day before being hotly pursued by crows. Although generally carrion eaters these noble kings of the sky will sometimes eat worms on the ground.

FOLLOW THAT BIRD!

By this time most of our summer migrants will have arrived. Some birds arrived early, a swallow was seen in Wexford in early March when strong southerly winds would have helped it on its journey here but later high winds from the Arctic would have delayed other birds, probably no harm since they'd have arrived to freezing winds, sleet and even snow.

Many woodland songbirds had arrived in Dalkey by early April when male Chiffchaffs, Willow Warblers and Blackcaps were all in full song declaring their territory and telling any passing females what attractive healthy chaps they are.

There's a fascinating website linked to the BBC Radio 4 programme 'The World on the Move'. The programme itself runs over the course of a year and monitors the migration of birds, fish and animals. The website has maps of various creatures including European Eel, Gray Whale, Atlantic salmon, African Elephants and Brent Geese. These maps give the predicted migration paths of these animals with a grid at the month indicating the length of

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a year so you can move a cursor to a time eg: mid-June which will show you where the animal should be.

There is also a link to far more detailed website which monitors and shows the progress of a female Osprey, named Logie, from her wintering location, which she spent most of perched in a tree in a small island off Guinea Bissau off the west coast of Africa, to her present position as she migrates back to Scotland where she has nested for the last three years. The technology can very accurately plot her course, the height she's flying, the speed she's flying at and can show her position within a few hours of her arriving. She started her migration on the 12th March and on Sunday the 31st March she was roosting in trees on the bank of the estuary at the mouth of Mundake River which runs into the Bay of Biscay from Guernica in Northern Spain. She stayed there for over a week while the weather was bad then set off North hopefully sitting on her nest by the time you read this. SPRING ARRIVES!

If you keep an eye on birds yourself your observations could be a valuable help in monitoring seasonal bird movements. BirdWatch Ireland is once again participating in Spring Alive, the project designed to track the arrival dates of Europe's common migrants. All across the continent, the public are asked to visit the Spring Alive website (www.springalive.net) to report their first sightings of Swifts, Swallows, Cuckoos and, for participants in Central and Eastern Europe, White Storks. The aim is to allow the public to watch the fascinating spread of spring across Europe as our migrants return and to inform them about the wonders of bird migration, while at the same time allowing us to gather important scientific data that will help us to gauge the impact of problems such as habitat loss and climate change.

New, state-of-the-art animated maps will allow you to see in real time how your observations fit into the whole European picture, and everything has been designed with fun in mind. For the first time, participants can even upload their own photos to the website to show the arrival of spring.

The website also makes a perfect educational tool for school groups, with a comprehensive set of downloadable teachers' materials and lesson plans, designed to help teach migration as a class project suited to children aged 8-12. The website has been produced both in Irish and in English, and in fact now represents perhaps the best source of material on migratory birds in the Irish language. It is also available in a vast range of other European languages, so it also makes an ideal source of material for language classes. If you know any teachers, please tell them about Spring Alive and encourage them to take part.

You can visit www.springalive.net and enter your records, and tell your friends, family and work colleagues to do the same. It only takes a few seconds to do. GLIMPSES OF OLD DALKEY - Continued



Going down across the Vico Road to Vico Fields - whose present public ownership is another interesting story we have not time to explore - let us go down the path that bathers take to White Rock, cross the metal railway-bridge and descent the steep stone steps to the beach. We turn to the left, and some 20 yards away come to the entrance to a big cave. There is a spring of fresh water coming out from the interior; a notice painted on the well says "Respect the Well", but few appear to do so. This cave was home some thirty years ago of "Decco", as he was always known locally, and is still remembered in the name of the cave today - "Decco's Cave". His right name is doubtful, but I believe it to have been Tom Kavanagh, and his people before him lived in "Retreat Cottage", Knocknacree Park. He had been a sailor, and slept in a hammock set up in the cave. I regret to say that, as boys, we often jeered in at him to rouse his ire, which we never failed to do, with the expected result that "Decco" would seize and axe and chase us as far as the strand, breathing fierce imprecations. I now apologise in his memory for our thoughtless cruelty - though if he had ever caught us I wouldn't be able to apologise!

The jutting-out cliff between "Decco's Cave" and "Sunnyside" is called "The Black Castle", while the cliff below Vico Terrace at the other end of Vico is known as "Hawk Cliff" - it probably was a breeding place for hawks when these abounded formerly. From the end house of Vico Terrace there leads a semi-subterranean way down to the beach; both beaches are too rocky today to be of much advantage for swimmers.

Katherine Tynan lived at "Cymric" overlooking the Vico Bathing Place, and at "Hannamount" (the present "Baymount") lived Henry Gonne, the first Town Clerk of Dalkey, in 1866, who built the present "Fernhill", "Wave Crest", "Craig Dhu" and "Sorrentville". Outside the side gate of "Khyber Pass", and in the garden wall of "Fernill", may be seen today and old wooden gate, leading in under the garden; this is the remains of an old pumping station, used in the '80s for raising water to Gonne's houses.

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
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Films such as 'Pirates of the Caribbean' portray pirates as loveable rogues when in fact they were generally ruthless cold-blooded murderers who cared little about those they killed. In 1776 the bodies of 2 pirates were hung in chains on the Muglins just north of Dalkey Island as a warning to others considering this line of activity.

The story of these pirates is recalled by Frank Hopkins in his book Hidden Dublin -Deadbeats, Dossers and Decent Skins* who reveals that 4 members of the crew of the sailing ship Earl of Sandwich en route from the Canary Island to London, killed the officers, their families and then sailed for Ireland before they killed the remainder of the crew after which they scuttled the ship near New Ross and rowed ashore with as much booty as they could carry.

They spent so much money within the next 24-hours in the New Ross area that their activities came to the attention of the authorities who suspected them of piracy, a view further strengthened when the wreck of the Earl of Sandwich was washed ashore. In the meantime the four pirates had left New Ross and travelled to Dublin where they took rooms in a tavern in Thomas Street. In the meantime the sheriff of New Ross sent an arrest warrant to the mayor of Dublin who had the 4 men arrested, 2 in the city and the other 2 on a stagecoach bound for Cork. Under questioning the 4 pirates admitted their guilt and revealed where the remainder of their booty was hidden.

The 4 were tried for robbery and murder on 1 March 1766, found guilty as charged and were sentenced to death. 2 days later they were taken under military escort from Newgate Gaol to St. Stephen's Green where they were hanged. The bodies were returned to Newgate Prison and later brought by cart to the Great South Wall near Ringsend where 2 bodies were hung in chains at Mackarell's Wharf and the other 2 in chains at the Pidgeon

After a month, walkers complained about the offensive smell and sight of the decaying corpses and it was decided the bodies of 2 of them, George Gidley and Peter McKinlea, would be hung on the Muglins where they were suspended from a gallows in a new set of chains as a warning to others of the fate that awaited them should they indulge in piracy.

Currently piracy still occurs around the globe especially along the west coast of Africa and in parts of the Far East where ships and their crews are held for ransom until paid by their owners unless rescued by the authorities.

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❖ MY GARDEN by Philippa Thomas

May is our month of fresh green foliage and then zingy colours in the border. Surely, there is hardly a tree/shrub or a herbaceous clump that doesn't look superb in May. I heard someone on the radio yesterday say that "spring is literally walking its way around Europe, - somewhat like a 'green wave."

Make no mistake about it, our plants are responding to these warmish, lengthening days. What promise and what possibilities! We can bring energy and enthusiasm and weave a different story, a different theme each season. There is a lovely line in one of W.B. Yeats' poems, "Our shadows rove the garden gravel still......... Individuals may no longer be alive, but their plants, their shadows, continue blooming, their generosity and enthusiasms endure."

At present, it's back to basics for us! We have several herbaceous perennial clumps that require splitting (they seem to require this every four or five years), simply because when they spread out, they appear to leave an open centre which doesn't always look the most attractive. So, it's a good idea to replant the younger outer sections and chuck the rest into the compost heap. Iris Unguicularis (Algerian Iris) never fails to enchant with its quiet beauty, its purple blooms are so beautifully marked with white and golden yellow stripes and are sweetly scented and nestle deep within a protective clump. Sometimes, its foliage as with some other irises can be rather scruffy but nevertheless, has its own charm. You can spruce it up by removing or trimming back those brown leaves that may annoy you. It likes impoverished soil and thrives in sunny positions. It seems to be a good idea to hoe weed seedlings on a dry sunny day so that they dry up and don't re-root; weeds just like herbaceous clumps enjoy their burst of new growth. I tend to tease them out by hand when they're tiny, sometimes using my trowel. I find that it is the undersides of leaves that get attacked with whitefly and then greenfly seem to love eating the shoot tips. (Basically, aphids feed by sucking the sap out of plants. So, all of them should be controlled before they establish and spread themselves)

Trees make our towns and villages green and pleasant. They provide us with shelter and shade. They delight us with their beautifully formed buds in spring and then, those that are deciduous, provide us with a vibrance of colour in autumn. Trees, too, provide high-rise living accommodation for our wildlife. Of course, we know that, occasionally, - or so it seems - trees and 'some people' don't always mix or relate that well to each other! I read recently that a study in Chicago shows that trees can remove 10.8 tons of toxic particles from pollution on an average summer's day. I also read that crime rates are lower in greener areas and people are inclined to drive more slowly down a tree-lined street. And the presence of trees can increase the value of your property. A true little beauty (small treesemi shrub) for our coastal gardens is Azara Microphylia. One of my sisters gave us a present of it about eight years ago. It is evergreen and scented with an abundance of tiny yellow puff balls in spring. Its leaves are round, glossy dark green and a few cut sprigs will last approximately three or four weeks in a vase.





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DALKEY'S SPANISH CONNECTION - by James Scannell

Recently a very good friend, Howell Evans, gave me a book on the history of Dublin which contained between one of the pages an undated newspaper cutting from the 1970's or perhaps earlier from either the Evening Press or Evening Herald dealing with an aspect of Dalkey which I reproduce below-

"The old ruined church of St.Begnet, in the centre of Dalkey town, was derelict before 1630, according to the survey made in that year by the Protestant Archbishop Bulkeley, only part of the building was roofed at all, and except for the curate and his family not a sinner came to services, unless during the herring season, when some of the crews of Scottish and English fishing boats made their appearance.

The church was enlarged in medieval times, and the belfry-gable is another addition, but we know that there was some primitive church in Celtic times (even though scholars have had doubts as to who St.Begnet was). About 1835,an old sailor, Bill Harwood, told his friends where exactly, in this graveyard, he wanted to be buried. Not long after, when preparing Harwood's grave, a stone slab with a cross and cup-like marks was found. It is of a type found near ancient Celtic churches in South County Dublin. The other St. Begnet's Church, on Dalkey Island, has also had hard usage (it was used as a shelter by workers building the Martello Tower). About 1902, this island church was very carefully measured by J.P. O'Reilly, of the Royal Irish Academy, and he became convinced that Spanish builders, or at least builders trained in Spain, worked on this church, as all the measurements tally closely with the vara, an ancient unit of measurement used in Northern Spain."

LEMON TART



Ingredients

2 medium egg yokes

1 egg white beaten

**

200g plain flour 50g ground almonds 1/2 tsp. salt 2tbsp. icing sugar, plus extra to dust 125g chilled butter, diced



For the filling

200g Caster sugar
4 medium eggs
142ml carton double cream
Grated zest and juice of
2 lemons

Method:

Put the flour, ground almonds, salt, icing sugar and butter into a food processor and whiz to make fine crumbs. Add the yolks and 2-3 tablespoons of cold water and pulse until the mixture comes together to make a firm but moist dough. Lightly shape the pastry into a ball, then roll out on a floured surface and use to line a 20cm fluted flan tin. Chill for 30 minutes.

Pre-heat the oven to 190°C/ gas mark 5.

Line the pastry case with greaseproof paper, fill with baking beans and bake for 10 minutes. Lift out the paper, return to the oven and bake for 5 minutes until the pastry is dry. Brush the pastry case with egg white and return to the oven for 5 minutes until the egg white has dried and the pastry is shinny this will prevent the pastry going soggy once the filling is poured in.

Lower the oven temperature to 150°C/gas mark 2.

For the filling, whisk the caster sugar and eggs until foamy. Beat in the cream, then the lemon zest and juice. Pour into the tart case and return to the oven for 40-50 minutes until just set - don't worry if it's wobbly in the centre as it will set as it cools. Cool, slip out of the tin, then dust with extra icing sugar.

CONTAINERS

It is well worth considering a special colour/theme for your display this coming summer. Why not be a little more daring and go for various tones of blues or fiery combinations of rusts and oranges, or maybe, conjure up a taste of the tropics with big bold architectural plants. Unless you have the time to water containers every day, think 'Big'. The mixture in a large container will hold its moisture much better than a small one. The entrance to the Botanical Gardens in Glasnevin is at present awash with night-scented stock and butter-cream scented hyacinths. Stock always conveys an old fashioned charm and flowers tirelessly and effortlessly. Trailing plants such as plectranthus (there are at least four varieties available here in Ireland), bacopa snowflake, nepeta and bidens are all excellent plants for mixing with strong colours. Bacopa snowflake, in particular, produces masses of dainty, tiny crisp-like flowers along the entire length of its creeping stems. (Sometimes, it even overwinters!). Some of the small leaved ivy cultivars can be simply fantastic too with their leaf sizes, shapes and colours. Remember, colour combinations and plant possibilities are limitless. Just have fun, get out there, mix and match, mess around, experiment and ENJOY!
