



Marine Mammals: On a related note, the Irish Whale & Dolphin Group (IWDG)'s 56ft ketch, Celtic Mist (donated by the Haughey family) was in Killiney Bay during late July. Also in Dun Laoghaire Harbour, Minister for Heritage, Jimmy Deenihan launched 'Atlas of Marine Mammals in Irish Offshore Waters'.

The Minister, last November

announced a 'designate' Rockabill and Dalkey Island Special Conservation Area (SAC) as a habitat for Annex II species including Harbour Porpoises. Incidentally, the designate SAC is believed to overlap the site of the exploratory drill rig as had been proposed by Providence Resources.

Coliemore Harbour Survey Report: Originally to be submitted to DLRCoCo in May is now deferred to mid-August. Consultants cite further drilling to confirm stability of certain sections of harbour walls.

Bulloch Harbour: The Blessing of the Boats took place on 11 August, where the lifeboat RNLB Anna Livia (14-05) berthed as part of a RNLI fundraiser and where a large turnout enjoyed a BBQ in the sun!

Dalkey Currach: Naomh Beagnait, continued to forge new links beyond local waters. She participated in the first Dublin Currach Regatta in Clontarf. There are around five such traditional craft based in Dublin Bay and her current home Bulloch Harbour is where rowers have included Dalkey Sea Scouts.

And in the afternoon, it was time to mow the grass in the back garden...and to wonder how it will look under a covering of snow in a few months


time...but that is for another day.... No rush, eh! In the meantime, much of Finland is on vacation, with many families exchanging the city for countryside in a land where lake and forest abound.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

*

I am writing regarding an issue of grave importance to the residents of Dalkey, a piece of history and heritage of our town that is at risk of being completely forgotten about and, worse still, destroyed.

I am referring to the Public Right of Way, as stated in appendix G of Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council's 2010-2016 County Development Plan, that leads from 'Loreto Road to the Lady's Well on the Foreshore' and known locally as 'Our Lady's Well'.

The right of way, which comprises a passageway, now completely overgrown, and the tunnel which has fallen

through in places and is unsafe for access is still nonetheless a right of way and the public have every right

to access it as they have been entitled to since the tunnel was first constructed by Charles Leslie of 'Carraig Na Greine' in the early part of the 19th Century.

The tunnel was built by Charles Leslie to allow passage of the local peasantry across his land and access to the freshwater well, which flows to this day, without having the displeasure of seeing them from the windows of his house.

The blocked-up end, which, according to local popular folklore was an escape route to Dalkey Island, was really just a convenient short cut to allow access to nearby 'Villagio' which was at the time owned by Leslie's son-in-law, a Mr. Peacocke.

Elderly residents of Dalkey recall their mothers and grandmothers going down to the well, where a Celtic Cross had been inscribed

into the stone by a local man by the name of Green, to pray and leave coins hidden in various places around it to bring them good luck. Many too will remember running down the tunnel as children and wondering at the possibilities of what lay beyond the blocked-up end. It is a shame to think that these memories currently lie hidden underground,

inaccessible, and that current residents and maybe future generations too can't safely access the well and carry on the town's many traditions.

When land was redeveloped in recent years to make way for hockey pitches and playing fields it is clear that measures were taken deliberately by the then Board of Management of the Loreto School to make the tunnel unsafe for access, thereby ensuring local youths and undesirables could not use the place to drink and engage in other illegal activities. By these measures I mean the huge boulders thrown into the circular air-grates in the ceiling of the tunnel and the vast amounts of earth thrown on top to render it unsafe. Sometime after this the tunnel was blocked up with cavity blocks about halfway along, at two separate points, and also at the entrance.

It is shameful that this public right of way has been almost

Moving to Dalkey was a wise decision. Its artistic atmosphere, especially the literary, spurred me on to publish my two novels.

For too many years I went down the traditional route of acquiring a literary agent who sent my work to publishers. But times have changed over the years, especially during the past decade.

In the past large publishers financed a number of quality work by publishing "Best Sellers". Nowadays due to the takeover by conglomerates, increasing attention is paid solely to making money. With this in mind, I decided to be modern and adventurous and turn my attention to publishing online seeing that an increasing number of people are reading on Kindle.

Writers like me who have published online differ from those who are published in the traditional form for we not only have to write, but we also have to promote our work. In doing this we don the cap of a businessman like any other self-employed craftsman.

Firstly I established what market I should aim for. My cousin who is a very talented photographer did the covers of my books: as with any other product, packaging is very important to attract the eye of potential purchasers. Then I had posters printed and like the peddlers of old, I tramped the streets selling my wares. These posters are visible in the recreation areas of firms such as Citibank, Google, Vodafone etc. which together employ over eleven thousand people. I even brought my posters on a recent trip to Italy.

There is no question of online writers reclining on a chaise longue like visions of Oscar Wilde sighing and declaring that they are published as if that was an end in itself.

I was very lucky in the beginning in that a journalist friend Barbara Dickson offered to help me, to steer me along the path so to speak by editing and giving constructive criticism without imposing her style on mine. That is of tremendous importance and something I am very conscious of when I act as a writing consultant.

Writing without such guidance can be akin to being stuck in a maze!

So many aspiring writers are informed in creative writing classes that one should stick to a strict routine. The idea of sitting in front of my computer between certain hours and writing a prescribed number of words would intimidate me. Like others, I rarely write more than twelve words per day so as not to tire my mind.

My personal quirk is to write on a blank sheet of paper before sitting at my computer. Whenever I am stuck, I resort to a Dictaphone. It's amazing how much work I can do while out for a relaxing walk.

I consider it is important to write about what is familiar, something that one has experienced or heard about. Too many writers fabricate stories and characters with the result that their stories lack depth and thus seem glaringly artificial.

So, now I am published at last and the feeling is nice!



On the first school day in September, the pupils looked at the teachers and said to themselves, "the teachers are delighted to be back as they do really hate holidays!". AHEM, YES!





Our September is a month of harvest, such a wide selection of fruit and vegetables become ready to use, Apples, Pears, Potatoes, Peas, French Beans, Runner Beans, Beetroot, Carrots, Sweetcorn, Courgettes, Lettuces, Radishes, Onions, Scallions, fresh Garlic, Tomatoes of all types, cultivated Blackberries and Herbs, again of all varieties especially, flat leaved & French Parsley, Rocket, Mint, Basil, Tarragon, etc.

Why not lift the spirits at this time of year by planting spring flowering bulbs, they carry the promise of a new seasons growth to come. Daffodils, Tulips, Crocus, Grape Hyacinths and Fritillarias are some of the regulars but there are others to choose from. For early flowers, winter Acconites are bright buttercup yellow, then Anemones brighten bare soil around the base of trees - then, *Puschkinia Scilloides*, the dwarf Iris too, Katherine Hodgkin and of course, *Chinodoxa*, glory of the snow are truly amazing in the depths of our winter.

Inulas want only a sunny spot, are the perfect daisy like clump for the front of a bed or border and are an excellent cut flower. They increase and bloom in June and July.

I often think that a plant's appearance gives you a clue to its needs. Some plants have narrow, leathery or needle-like leaves and these qualities reduce moisture loss. Plants with silvery, hairy, felted or thick waxy foliage, generally are designed for surviving hot sun and so are plants with daisy-like flowers that open only when the sun is directly on them. such as Mesembryanthemums. Our spring bulbs have evolved a clever strategy to survive hot dry conditions. They flower early, then die down, spending their summer underground, then, burst back into life again when conditions are more favourable for them. Luckily enough, our garden centres often make things easy by grouping plants together that need similar conditions.

MIGHT DO MAYBE, SEPTEMBER JOBS

- 1. Now is a great time to clip all kinds of evergreen hedges and then they will generally stay 'neat' until approx next May.
- 2. Make sure to keep Camelias and Rhododendrons in pots well watered and fed to encourage flower buds for next year.
- 3. Continue picking all kinds of fruit, vegetables and herbs, freeze and juice them.
- 4. Now is the perfect time to choose your favourite sun flower seeds, for growing next year.
- 5. A good idea to mix 1 part of skimmed milk with 9 parts of water and spray onto Asters that show powdery mildew during dry spells.
- 6. Again, this is an excellent time to take cuttings of your favourite Geraniums and Pelargoniums, these root quickly at this time of year and should successfully over winter under protection from frost.


NEWS FROM ST. PATRICK'S CHURCH

BOOKS TO READ

"William Dargan: An Honourable Life 1799 to 1867" by Fergus Mulligan Published by The Lilliput Press.

This is the first comprehensive biography to be written about this remarkable and fascinating 19th century contractor and entrepreneur who began his career in Wales working on the Holyhead Road under Thomas Telford, the famous Scottish engineer.

In a very hectic life William Dargan went on to build roads canals, Ireland's first railwaythe Dublin and Kingstown, canals and reservoirs. He developed the seaside roads of Bray, Co. Wicklow, and Portrush in Northern Ireland, operated flax and thread mills, reclaimed vast sections of land in Derry and Wexford, in addition to operating canal boats and crosschannels steamers. He also built the railway from Bray to Dalkey, and converted the Atmospheric Railway line from Dalkey to Kingstown for steam train use making unbroken travel between Dublin and Bray possible.

The fascinating and engrossing biography of William Dargan also provides the reader with an insight to the private life of this remarkable Victorian and his family

providing many details about him not previously known. With over 90 illustrations and photographs, many y previously unseen, this biography draws on a wide range of archival material revealing that William Dargan was a dynamic, engaging, bibulous figure, whose formidable abilities created the infrastructure for modern Ireland where there is scarcely a town untouched by his genius.

A truly fascinating and engrossing biography of this very remarkable man.

"The Royal Manors of Medieval Co. Dublin - Crown and Community" by Aine Foley, Published by Four Courts Press.

This book is the first full-length study of the royal manors of Crumlin, Esker, Saggart and Newcastle Lyons (all in south Co. Dublin) in the period 1170 to 1400. Following the conquest of Ireland in the late twelfth century, these manors represented the largest direct stake that the king of England maintained in his oft-neglected lordship of Ireland and they remained in the personal gift of the crown for the rest of the medieval period.

More than any other part of Ireland, the royal manors capture in microcosm the complexity of England's troubled relationship with its colony and it is remarkable that they have not

hitherto been the subject of intensive investigation. This book seeks to remedy that defect and contribute to our understanding of the dynamics of Anglo-Irish society in the later Middle Ages.

SINÉAD'S WINE CORNER

Recently my travels took me from Australia to Tokyo Japan for my brother's wedding. Tokyo proved to be a fascinating city on a scale that I had never experienced before. The people are kind, friendly and very helpful especially when it came down to having to ask for directions which often happened along their massive metro lines. The food was also amazing but half the time we didn't know what was being served to us in the restaurants we visited but this was all part of the fun and always delicious.

The city skyline is magnificent especially as you cross Tokyo Bay by metro on the Rainbow Bridge. Mount Fuji can be seen in the distance on a clear day and to the North of this mountain is Japan's most famous wine region, Katsunuma. Grapes, peaches and plums are all grown here in the beautiful countryside. Thirty one wineries are

dotted around this picturesque region which produce 27% of Japanese wine. October is the best visiting time as the vines are laden with grapes and often the tourists can help with the grape picking. Some labels in this region have even received gold medals at French international wine competitions so their quality can be assured. This region is only an hour from Tokyo city and day trips can be organised if you don't want to take on the metro line system yourself.

You cannot go to Japan and not taste their Rice wine which outside of Japan is commonly known as Sake. I would say it is an acquired taste as I have to admit I could only manage a sip just to taste but both my brothers enjoyed it as an aperitif. It is brewed using rice (hence the name) water and Koji mould. Koji mould is referred to as the 'miracle mould' and is used in Japanese cuisine such as miso soup and soya bean. The alcohol content can be anywhere between 10 to 20% so make sure to always check that out first.

For the people who have a sweet tooth, there is 'Umeshu' which is a wine made from plums. It has a sweet juice like flavour and is very popular in Japan and can be found everywhere. Even the Japanese people brew it in their own homes. It is usually served on the rocks.

Unfortunately, these wines cannot be found in your local supermarket or wine shop but check out the well stocked Asian market, 18 Drury Street, Dublin, to find a great selection of Sake and plum wines.




