NOVEMBER IN MY GARDEN – by Philippa Thomas



In general, our plants have recovered remarkably from our long drought spell of our Summer and now, our 'most dry spell' takes its place in memory. As our leaves are still falling and our days of wind and rain are gaining in numbers: as well as wrapping ourselves up in warm snug clothes, our gardens need plenty of TLC, in this November month, as we endeavour to almost put it to bed for the Winter. Remember damp conditions are dream conditions for slugs and snails and a host of fungal diseases. So, advantageous to add a layer of dry pine needles to the soil surface to deter these slugs and snails from attacking beautiful young foliage as it emerges next Spring.

Autumn is nature's natural time for planting. Our soil is still somewhat warm after our Summer and Some Indian October Evenings which encourages good root growth and fast establishment. Then, with autumnal rain, our plants should get off to a flying start and in time will perform to their fullest potential. Evergreen foliage makes an invaluable contribution, especially when frosted. ... Then, there are fiery Autumnal leaf colours, plants and stems that provide shapes, form and colour. Then, berries give us such a rainbow of colour. Some, especially grasses with their ornamental seed heads look fabulous when the lower Winter sunlight glistens through – again, leaving withered plants (some!) or faded flower heads can make a fine Winter skeleton. Ladybirds and other garden friendly insects love a cosy hide-out to overwinter. In fact, local wildlife will love you, if you can put away your secateurs until Spring.

This is the perfect time to sweep and turn those falling leaves into something really useful for our gardens. Transform them into leaf mould. It's really easy to do. All you have to do

is gather the leaves together and put them into black bin bags and if possible, add a handful of fresh grass cuttings, make a few holes at the bottom of the bag, seal it and place it out of sight for twelve months. Next Autumn, the leaves should have rotted down to make a wonderful compost. Great for planting and enriching your soil. Alternatively, our leaf heaps can easily be constructed using chicken wire and posts. Likewise, if you have access to manure (five year old horse manure is excellent), 'Now' is the time to spread it across the surface of your beds in order that

it will rot down over Winter.

If you can't or don't want to plant

up the whole garden, concentrate IT close to the house, literally outside your back door, patio etc. Even if you feel that you can't simply face digging up etc. in Winter, having lots of colour close up, where you can really see and enjoy it and looking out from your window will brighten your day and mood. Scented Winter-flowering plants again, close to the house, you can then simply open a window for that delightful scent to waft through the

house. Mahonia, Saracocca Confusa (Winter Box), Winter-flowering Honeysuckle, Lonicera Winter Beauty and Viburnum Bodnantense – one or two of such plants with these amazing Winter fragrances can bring the whole garden Alive.

Might Do Maybe, November Jobs

Re-use spent compost annual containers. It can make a great mulch on the general garden.

Maybe, install some solar lights (they are cheap) for the greenhouse, so that you can still get out there on dark evenings to check your plants.

Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent water-logging.

As flower heads are developing on Cameillas, Rhododendrons,

Magnolias etc., they might need a liquid feed.

Pittosporum, evergreen hedges, Holly, Griselinia can be trimmed to leave them neat and tidy for our entire Winter period. Similarly, clip over Santolina, Artemisia, Lavander and

Tender shrubs and plants such as Fuschia, Datura, Abutilons etc., should be brought indoors before frosts.

Before our birds eat all our Holly berries, cut a few stems for making Christmas garlands. Stand them outside in a bucket of water in a sheltered spot where our feathered friends can't take them. Some gardeners are now disproving of putting crocks on gravel in the bottom of pots and planters to improve drainage. Some say, it can actually make it worse and increase water-logging? Certainly, put one flat stone of crock over each draining hole to prevent it clogging, then perhaps use some sharp sand and then, your best compost.

We hadn't been able to get out for our usual walks that week so I was impressed and also more than a bit envious when, the morning after Storm Ali, a friend texted me to say he'd just seen a flock of 19 ravens over Killiney Hill. Sorry to have missed that sight though I can't complain since, as I have written here before, one morning some years ago I saw a flock of 29 ravens flying over Dalkey Hill heading out over the sea. I counted then recounted them, hoping to round the flock off to 30 but to no avail, there were definitely 29 of them. As well as being an impressive sight, a large group of usually solitary big black birds flying over with heavy wing beats it was also a impressive sound with multiple deep croaks and honks dropping down from high above.

That was six years ago in mid October 2012 and I speculated then that they might have been about to cross the Irish Sea to Angelsea where Newborough Forest holds the biggest winter raven roost in Europe, at one time having around 2,000 birds grouped there. The group of 19 my friend saw may have decided to head east inspired by the calmer weather after the storm. An ornithologist has been studying the Newborough roost for many years but it was only through recently developed technology, in the shape of thermal imaging cameras that operate at night by showing sharp negative images of warm blooded creatures, he was able to discover that the birds, rather than assembling together for the night in small groups would instead almost always occupy a single tree each. The images, being reverse negative footage showed large white silhouettes of these heavily billed birds crouched on branches in tall pine trees in solitary splendour. They don't huddle together for warmth or safety and the roost would seem to be more a social gathering, a lot of the birds probably being young, non breeding individuals who at evening roost could be displaying their flying skills to impress a female to pair with before the breeding season. Another endearing aspect of ravens is that they pair for life and have been known to grieve for a long time if their partner dies.

Another winter assembly of members of the crow family takes part much closer to home where for a number of years the trees that form the eucalyptus grove between Torca and Knocnacree roads have played host to an ever increasing number of Hooded Crows who roost there from autumn to spring. Flying singly or in pairs in the late afternoon they form into impressively large flocks which soar out with a cacophony of cawing as the light fades.

It was early afternoon on a particularly mild sunny day and a small group of 'hoodies' arriving early for the gathering assembly flew out of the trees and headed towards the sea moments before a much larger bird drifted over our house. With broad rounded wings, held outright above its body as it soared in a cloudless blue sky, there was no doubt what it was, a Buzzard.

It had a few moments of peace before the crows spotted it and then they immediately

flew back to mob it. Any bird of prey stimulates other, often much smaller birds, to harass it, distracting it from seeking out individual prey. The crows, large birds themselves but considerably smaller then the buzzard, flew in to attack it from behind, snapping at its tail, very close to it in a manner more cheeky then threatening until the buzzard suddenly reversed the situation wheeled around and began to chase one of the crows, again to no serious conclusion, the buzzard eventually drifting off with a few mocking crows trailing it at a respectable distance.

We had a lovely weekend in Dingle recently during which we went on a boat trip around the bay hoping to see possibly the most viewed individual bottlenose dolphin ever, Fungi. It seemed like decades ago since he first became famous and indeed it was since he first attracted attention in the bay in 1984. Since he was a full grown adult then he must be now at least 35 years old. Seeing him on the boat trip is very likely but not guaranteed so when the first shout went up we were delighted. No spectacular breaching but he did break the surface many times and at one stage swam alongside the boat just outside arm's reach. The boat was fairly moving and the dolphin's speed keeping abreast of it was spectacularly impressive. At first I didn't even try to photograph him since he would travel so fast it was difficult to guess where he would surface again but couldn't resist trying as he escorted our boat and got a few shots of fin and snout. It would seem sad that he chose to spend his life alone from his species but although other dolphins join him in the bay at times he seems to prefer the company of humans and happily still displays to the thousands of people that go out to see him. There were some reliable sightings of dolphins seen in Dalkey Sound and Killiney Bay during the summer and porpoises are still regularly seen there.



Before 1800 Dublin Bay was shallow with sandbanks and meandering river channels making access by sea under sail very treacherous. Deep water off the rocky Dalkey shore sheltered by the island made the landing of cargo easier. Dalkey functioned as the port for Dublin, and its seven fortified 'castles' were warehouses for trans-shipment of cargo by road to the city.

The building of the South Bull Wall (1795) and North Bull Wall (1842) created a shipping channel to Dublin. Dun Laoghaire Refuge Harbour (built 1817-42) and the replacement of sail by steam power all eliminated the importance of Dalkey as a commercial port. The small sheltered tidal creek at Bullock Castle was the location for fisheries under the control of St Mary's Abbey. The rocky outer breakwater became the foundation of the harbour we see today, built by the Ballast Board over the winter of 1818/19 to facilitate the shipping of granite from their quarry on Harbour Road to construct the city quays. One element of the bicentenary celebrations will be a lecture series on the heritage of Bullock Harbour and its close relationship with the Dublin Port Company, which still owns the harbour today.



Dalkey Celebrates Gold in 2018 National Tidy Towns Competition Time to enjoy the moment!

It has been another great year for our Heritage Town of Dalkey and our own small Tidy Towns Team. A total of 883 towns and villages entered the SuperValu National Tidy Towns competition. With a population of 6,832 people, Dalkey was awarded the gold medal again for those with a population from 5001 to 10,000 people. With total marks earned this year of 328, the increase of seven points over 2017 was our biggest increase to date.

Throughout the year, our Dalkey Tidy Towns team carried out 140 Litter Patrols, completed 50 landscaping and community spaces upgrades, organised five major Public Meetings and ensured that our Heritage Town looked its best during two inspections by the Tidy Towns adjudicators.

Dalkey's strengths are clearly seen in the points table. Streetscapes and Public Places scored the highest of all, followed by Green Spaces and Landscaping. Our wonderful colourful shopfronts, our new Seven Castles pavement icons and upgrading of Bullock Harbour were all recognised. Great work carried out by our Dalkey Tidy Towns team also yielded results in Dillon's Park and the discovery of the Ancient Holy Well there, plus our extensive planting of areas throughout Dalkey, maintenance of Heritage signs, focus on pollinating plants, attendance at DLRCC workshops and Facebook and Newsletter communications with our residents, were all praised. Litter and Graffiti control received special mention.

Improvements will be needed in 2019 in reducing the use of plastic and the reduction of waste. Dog poo remains a very serious issue. Hedge cutting by our neighbours will also

Remember anyone can join the library and there is no membership charge. Entry to events is also free. You can pick up a brochure outlining our events and services in the library.



ASK THE PHARMACIST

Q. I have been recently diagnosed with COPD – can you please explain what this is?

A. COPD stands for Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease. This is a collective name for two lung conditions (emphysema and chronic bronchitis) that makes it difficult to breath due to obstruction in the air passages of the lungs.

COPD is progressive which means it gets worse as time goes on. It can often be several years before symptoms become so bad that a patient will seek medical advice. The following questions are used to aid diagnosis of COPD so if you answer yes to **4 or more** questions you should discuss this with your GP or Pharmacist:

- Do you cough several times every day, most days of the week?
- Have you been coughing like this for more than 3 months?
- Do you cough up mucous most days?
- Do you get breathless from physical activity or moderate exercise?
- Are you a smoker or former smoker?
- Do you live in or work at a place with a lot of pollution, fumes, dust or smoke?
- Is there a family history of lung conditions?
- Are you over the age of 35?

There is no cure for COPD but there are treatments that make living with symptoms of COPD easier and will slow down the progression of the disease. The earlier the diagnosis the more effective the treatments.

Some treatments for COPD include:

- smoking cessation
- inhalers: these are used to make breathing easier and treat flare ups
- exercise: this is one of the most important treatments but should be done with a health professional
- corticosteroids: these can soothe inflammation in the lungs and helps you breathe easier
- Antibiotics: infections can exacerbate COPD so the antibiotics are used to treat this
- Flu vaccine: COPD makes you more vulnerable to the flu so the vaccine is so important If you have any concerns that you may have COPD please discuss with your GP or pharmacist.

100th ANNIVERSARY OF THE SINKING OF RMS LEINSTER




Last month marked the 100 year anniversary of what was the greatest loss of lives in the Irish Sea. On the 10th October 1918, just off the Kish bank, the RMS Leinster was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine. The mail boat containing 803 passengers from all over the world was travelling from Kingstown (Dun Laoghaire) to Holyhead when 3 torpedoes were launched at

her. Although the first one missed the second and third did significant damage and the RMS Leinster went down. Official figures show that 564 people lost their lives. Although it was a significant loss of life, it was under reported in the history of WW1 as it did not suit the British narrative that the Irish consistently fought against British rule. To commemorate this event, the National Maritime Museum in Dun Laoghaire are hosting an exhibition on RMS Leinster and her ultimate fate. For more details go

READING TO A VERY SPECIAL VISITOR

On October 5th, DSP welcomed a very special reading buddy. Scooby the King Charles Cavalier came to school. Scooby and his human Debbie are one of five teams who have been training all summer to become the first Irish 'Burns by Your Side' volunteer teams.

Scooby and Debbie were introduced to the school at assembly by Orlagh, the Community Liaison for Ireland. The children were so excited to have a dog in the school but listened attentively while Orlagh explained the correct

way to behave around dogs. While the humans talked, Scooby waited patiently for his turn to be the centre of attention.

When the talk was over, Scooby finally got to meet the three children who will be reading to him this term. He settled down to hear their stories, which he enjoyed very much, and especially loved the cuddles they gave him. His tail never stopped wagging and if he could talk he would say – 'It really was pawsome!'

'Burns by Your Side' is a scheme aimed at children who could benefit from improved reading and communication skills. The scheme, which is already well established in Wales, helps children in a variety of education settings gain confidence in building their vocabulary and fluency by reading to a dog. Research has shown that reading to a dog can reduce stress levels, increase relaxation and create an environment where children feel empowered and confident. weekend and a few of the teachers stayed behind and counted the votes.



'To everything there is a season and a time to every purpose under Heaven.' Ecclesiastes 3:1. November heralds the start of the closing down of the year and it suggests not death but mystery – a sense of worlds beyond this of past and future. We give thanks for the wonderful summer weather we had this year and for the abundance of the harvest, the luscious blackberries which exploded on our highways and byways, and we pray for a gentle winter to come.

The annual Mass at which we remember all who have died in our Parish in the past year will be celebrated on Thursday 1st November, All Saints Day at 7.30pm. All parishioners are welcome to come along to hold in prayerful memory the relations and friends, neighbours and fellow parishioners who died during the year. A candle will be lit for each person in their memory. All are most welcome to attend this Mass. 'grieving is about remembering, not forgetting'.

On Saturday Nov 10th Comhaltas Ceoltoiri Eireann and Dalkey Churches together welcome a group from Mosney Direct Provision centre to Belgrave Square Monkstown for an afternoon of traditional music and dancing – and maybe some lessons! St. Begnet – In November we celebrate the feast of St. Begnet with a series of events over 2 days in Dalkey. Walk in the footsteps of this remarkable woman who gave up all her wealth for a life devoted to God. Begnet was an Irish princess who lived in the 7th century. According to legend, when she was a child, an Angel appeared to her and asked her to devote her life to the service of God. She did so, and the Angel gave her a bracelet, marked with the sign of the cross, as a symbol of her vocation. Begnet grew up to become a beautiful woman and had many suitors. Her parents arranged her marriage to the son of the King of Norway - but still dedicated to the vows she had taken, Begnet had no wish to take a husband. To avoid breaking her vows, she left home, leaving everything but the bracelet given to her by the Angel. She found passage in a small boat and sailed to Northumbria. There she was received into the Church by Bishop Aidan and became the first abbess of nuns. Begnet's connection with Dalkey is not clear. She gave her name to the two churches in the area and Dalkey town and surrounding area was for many centuries known as Kilbegnet. Perhaps she came from Dalkey, or perhaps she sailed from here to pioneer her religious order. It may also be possible the churches were dedicated to her memory by missionaries, spreading the faith after her death but the stories surrounding her life imply that she was a remarkable woman.

The events to mark her feast include a 2 hour guided walk along St.Begnet's Way on

PERMISSION REFUSED


At the July 1915 monthly meeting of the Dalkey Urban District Council, an application from the Kingstown Postmaster for permission to erect a pavement post box outside No. 25, Castle Street, from where it was intended to carry on the business of the Dalkey subpost office, was refused on the grounds that they wanted a proper post office for the town and that the notice was too short given that the Postmaster wanted to have this pavement post box come into service on August 1st 1915.

CASTLE PARK SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Going forward this new group aims to involve residents to discuss and review responsible and sustainable development in Dalkey. Currently the Government is pressing for more houses and Dalkey is experiencing applications for very large developments. We cannot oppose all developments out of hand, but it is important that these developments respectand protect our heritage and do not destroy the beauty of the area.

Ann Maria and Denis Lucey of 4, Castle Close, Dalkey are taking a judicial review against An Bord Pleanala (ABP) decision to grant permission for 50 apartments in the grounds of Castlepark School. At the meeting, Ann Maria described the application that entails the building of 50 apartments in 8 blocks, 3 to 4 storeys over a basement car park. The building of the development necessitates the removal of 52% of the woodland and also 10,000 cubic metres of granite. DLRCC refused permission but the developer appealed to ABP which subsequently granted permission for the development. Ann Maria and Denis decided to seek a judicial review (which will be heard on 2nd December 2018) as the negative impact of this development is considered to be enormous both on the immediate and wider environment.

In addition, the development is on institutional land and there is no master plan for the school. The whole construction process will also impact negatively on the school.

It is claimed that the height levels of the development outlined in the application are incorrect and should be approximately 2 metres higher than presently shown on the plans.

It would appear that parents of the schoolchildren attending Castlepark School are not aware that the access road to the development is to be the sameone that is presently used for access to the school. It is proposed to widen the internal roadway to the school to facilitate access to the development. However, it is understood that it will also be used by construction traffic during the building phase despite it being under the ownership of the school.

It is believed that ABP have not followed correct procedure in accordance with statutory requirements.

There is also a concern over the use of chemicals to extract the granite and the resulting residue that may be present in the ground and the air. No details of the process have been described in the planning application.

A formal committee to organise fundraising to cover the legal costs has been set up. A Facebook and GoFundMe pages are also online. We would encourage everyone to support this legal challenge by donating to the *GoFundMe Castlepark Development*. A bank account is also in the process of being set up and details of it will be published on the DCC website.


