Summary of the DCC November Meeting held on Monday 12/11/18 in OLH

Functions: The DCC Art Exhibition was very successful despite the inclement weather the opening night was well attended and a record number of paintings were sold.

TT: Members of DTT visited the Covanta Incinerator for a guided tour and were shown the process of waste that is converted into energy. The weekly litter patrols are continuing and also maintenance of planting beds around the town. The bioscope from Coliemore Harbour has gone to the UK for repair and it is hoped that it will be back early next year.

NW: The most popular time for committing burglaries is between late afternoon and evening. Burglars take jewellery, cash, tablets, etc. small items that are easily carried by the person. It is very helpful to the investigating Gardai if photos of stolen items are available. In the run up to Christmas shoppers are warned to be mindful of purses, wallets, bags and belongings and pay attention where they are placed if dropping in for a tea/coffee or something to eat.

Planning: There are rather large developments scheduled to commence in Dalkey next year and there is serious concern in relation to the significant disruption and increase in traffic that will impact on the town and the surrounding area.

CELEBRATING FIFTY YEARS OF SERVICE IN DALKEY – 1968-2018 From very small beginnings in 1968, Dalkey Meals on Wheels has evolved to become one of the principal non-denominational voluntary services in our Community and we are celebrating our **50th** Anniversary this year in 2018.

From premises at 11, Kilbegnet Close in the heart of Dalkey, we continue to provide nourishing, tasty dinners on five days a week to any person in our area who needs the service. At present we provide approximately 50 meals per day and the cost to the recipient is \in **3.00** which includes a main course and dessert.

Dalkey Meals on Wheels is run by a team of dedicated volunteers, both cooks and drivers, who faithfully turn up every week, regardless of the weather. We all know what a long, hard winter we had this year, with Storm Ophelia, the Beast from the East and the worst snowfall for many decades. Despite the weather conditions, the service continued uninterrupted, with some drivers delivering meals on foot during the worst of the snow and cooks continuing to provide hot meals as usual. The ethos of the service is thus continuing, providing regular food and a friendly house call, as provided by so many of our volunteer friends and colleagues over the years since our inception.

We always welcome new volunteers and can be contacted at our premises on 01-2857863. We particularly welcome helpers during the summer months, when due to holidays etc. our volunteer numbers can be low.

We'd gone to Tullamore for a couple of days, visiting a relative who'd had a brief stay in hospital but was now making a good recovery. Amazingly sharp minded with a perfect memory and, apart from recent problems, remarkably fit at 93 years of age, she was a mere youngster in comparison to another living being we got to visit in Tullamore. In Charleville Forest, just outside the town, grows the King Oak, believed to be the oldest living oak tree in Ireland. It's a pedunculated oak, one of our two native oak species, the other being the sessile oak. Our host at the B&B told us someone had

Our host at the B&B told us someone had recently made a core drilling of it, taking

out a long plug of wood which enabled the growth rings to be counted without harming the tree and thus establishing it was at least 750 years old! It was a beautiful October morning when we went to see it, the low sunshine burning away the mist and barely a breeze stirring. The ancient tree was in a large well established oak wood and I had wondered would we have difficulty recognizing which particular tree it was but it turned out it was the very first oak you see beside the driveway as you enter the estate. Despite being a bit sprawling with its vast trunk. It has a circumference of 26 feet; split and twisted in places it was still a very impressive sight. The tree was hit by lightning in 1963 and the trunk split in half but it still grows on. Some of the lower branches had supports holding them up while other massive branches, grown heavy and weary over the centuries, actually rest on the ground. We weren't its first visitor of the day as a treecreeper was winding its way up the huge trunk feeding on insects, their grubs and eggs among the fissured bark. Another oak of similar stature stood nearby but this tree had died a long time ago and was bare of bark and leaves. Despite being dead it probably supported as much, if not more, life than the King Oak, providing nest space for birds and bats and supporting multitudes of insects and fungi in the decaying timber.

We continued down the driveway then went off the main avenue to wander down a path through the woods and almost instantly set off a raucous calling of jays, spotting one's distinctive white rump disappearing through the trees. Acorns are one of the jay's favourite


foods and individual jays carrying up to five acorns in their crop at a time can bury up to 3000 a month, having a remarkable ability to remember where they can recover them but inevitably a few acorns will germinate (Some years ago a radio documentary about jays was titled 'The Oak Tree Planters') and indeed it's possible the great King Oak may have begun life by being planted by a jay. Acorns are a favourite food of grey squirrels as well although extremely toxic to red squirrels until they're fully ripe. This is considered another advantage greys have over reds and although, like

So you wouldn't be surprised to find greys in an oak wood but when Lucy heard, then located a squirrel in a larch treetop high above us and we were delighted to see it was actually a red squirrel. The trees lining the avenue were predominantly oak, more noble specimens with spectacular clumps of fungi and great rounded knots of wood on their trunks but intermingled with them were larches and Scots pines which would have provided food for the reds. It was nice to see it was a thriving regenerating wood as well since there were many oak saplings springing out of the ground. The only downside of the forest was a gloomy line of rhododendrons, dark and oppressive alongside one path supporting no birds or other life but that was only a tiny portion of the woods and when we emerged from the trees approaching the castle the fields opening up in front of us had a number of statuesque redwoods growing in solitary splendour. Loads more jays screeching on our return walk

and though we walked for hours we only covered a small part of the 170 hectares of the estate and hope to get back there again. Another oak standing solitary in a field which we didn't get to see is supposed to be the largest oak in Ireland and apparently the estate also has breeding buzzards, has the biggest badger colony in Ireland and there are pine martins there which may well account for the absence of any grey squirrels. A sparrowhawk perched on the edge of our stone bird bath just feet away from a couple of bird feeders hanging from a bush. We hadn't seen her land so don't know if she had come for a drink, a wash or to try and catch a bird coming in for some sunflower seeds but there

it was, content to perch almost motionless for ten minutes before I accidentally startled it and she flew off. Sorry to have disturbed it but no need to worry because she was back in the same place a few minutes later. This time it initially perched on the edge of the bird bath with its back to us and we could wonder at its ability to swivel its head 180 degrees, an ability you'd normally associate with owls. Almost intimidating when its fierce yellow eyes seem to fix on you but it just perched there, occasionally craning her head back in impossible-seeming contortions to preen her wings and tail. Wood pigeons would land on the branches above and it would stretch its neck upwards, tilting its head to observe them while a number of smaller birds would approach the feeder before beating a hasty retreat. The sparrowhawk perched on the bath for over an hour then, after a final preen, with a shrug of its wings and a flick of its tail it was gone!

DECEMBER / JANUARY IN MY GARDEN - by Philippa Thomas

Wishing You All, The Warmest Greetings of The Season And Best Wishes For Happiness In 2019

Berries are the jewels of our December gardens as well of course, being a festive treat for our birds. Our feathered friends love Holly, Mistletoe, Pyracantha, Cotoneaster, Hawthorn, Crab Apples and Rosehips and now is the perfect time to plant such. When planting Holly, vou should plant a male and a female to guarantee berries or else, maybe purchase a self-fertile variety. The turning circle of our Garden Year sometimes revolves all too quickly and then sometimes, slows almost to a standstill. Our circle of life. gemmed at all times with the jewels of different lustres and different hues and colours, all of them equally precious. On these late November early December nights, the backdrops and silhouettes around

Dalkey Island are utterly breathtaking. I often take my dog, Mr. Precious, for a walk there, just to simply walk around and to be quite alone when, as happens in all our lives, it is absolutely essential for sanity's sake to go away to somewhere quiet.

Our evening temperatures may become colder and colder until the thermometer begins to drop to several degrees below zero where it will remain long after dawn. Don't our Dalkey gardens with their Winter spaces, especially the evergreens, offer such a warm reception? I adore to see a sea of greens - mixing shapes, textures and sizes. Isn't it fascinating how green shades feel balanced and tranquil? How often do gardeners dress themselves and their gardens similarly! Red to me appears closer to be attention-grabbing and physically stimulating. Blue and violet shades seem further away and seem to be really calming but again green; and the myriad shades of green are fascinating" Doesn't every plant's leaves harmonise with its flowers? Is this not true colour co-ordination? ... As our Winter tightens its grip, we are approaching our shortest day of the year, Friday 21st December. Then these few days between Christmas and the New Year are very useful in the garden if our weather is suited to the work. Finish digging over the vegetable plot and new ground as soon as you can. The frosts will break down the clumps over Winter and by next Spring, it'll be perfect for planting. Remember, any tidving we do now outside will repay us in the coming New Year and 'Spring' is only around the corner so we must make our gardens tidy in order to welcome it and to accommodate its absolute abundance of new growth and fresh foliage.

There is nothing like the appearance and the scent of a real Christmas Tree to get us into the festive spirit - and doesn't it actually smell like Christmas? Norway Spruce is the traditional choice and holds its needles well as does Nordmann Fir, which has thick needles with silvery undersides. ...At present, the Jasmine flowering season is long, approximately



from November until April. The branches can be picked for the vases in bud and the flowers will then open in water over Christmas; *Jasmine Nudiflorum* with its showers of starry yellow flowers on bare bushy branches will always reward us during the darkest of Winter days with what seems almost like a firework display of scented flowers.

Birds – The antics of birds always lift my spirits. Aren't they flashes of life hopping from stem to stem, twig to twig. ...Then their crisp, crunchy rustling sound of leaves being tossed about as our avian friends search earnestly for a juicy insect,

worm or seed. Remember when the icy fingers of frost pinch hard our feathered visitors are in trouble. Arctic conditions create a danger zone for our garden birds, especially our ground feeders such as doves, pigeons, sparrows, starlings and buntings. Most of all, maybe spend some time in the presence of these sentient creatures and let their soulful songs and ongoing quests for survival bring some vibrancy to our lives, to our Winter days.

MIGHT DO MAYBE, DECEMBER/ JANUARY JOBS

Make sure to bring in citrus fruits in pots. Increase their humidity by placing their pots in bases of damp gravel or hydroponics. Allow their surfaces to dry out between waterings.

Ideally, use rainwater and let plants dry thoroughly and probably best not to feed them.

Alpines need all the light they can get so regularly remove fallen leaves in the crowns of these tiny gems. Seaweed Boom. Sales of seaweed fertilisers are on the rise as gardeners turn to more natural products. Let's give thought to all our house plants – they really hate our winter, especially a hot centrally heated room where the air gets very dry. Most plants originate in jungle environments, so again, place them on trays/ bases of gravel - , then humidity will perk up the plants. Again, rainwater is ideal for watering.

MAYBE, WORTHWHILE, PONDERING ABOUT FOR 2019

Homes needn't be 'plantless' so bring the beauty of nature indoors. Thanks to social media and picture sharing, media people are being encouraged without a garden to accessorise their homes with exotic looking succulents and jungle-style foliage plants. Sales of *Aloe Vera*, *Echeverias* and *Airplants* have surged, leaving some suppliers struggling to keep up.

Neighbourhoods that are barren of trees have been shown to have a greater incidence of violence than their greener counterparts. ...Studies have also shown that patients with views of trees outside their windows heal faster and with few complications. Peat and wood or coir, rather than plastic pots will be available to buy, in the not-too-distant future.

Without question of a doubt, the beauty of well-planted property and its surrounding street and neighbourhood can raise property values. People are far more attracted to leafy areas than those that are without trees.

Once upon a time, there was a special Holy Well in Dillon's Park

The journey has taken several years to complete but on Halloween 2018, we closed an important chapter on this interesting piece of Dalkey's history.

Hydrolatry or water worship, has a centuries old tradition in Ireland. Visiting holy wells was a particularly popular activity during the reign of Henry V111 in the 16th century. In times of religious persecution, these were safer gathering places than churches. Finding our ancient and holy wells today is not so easy and many have already been destroyed. With the successes of Catholic Emancipation in the early 19th century, attendances at many holy wells declined. Some also became locations for rowdy parties which also discouraged visitors. Today, by visiting these sites, we can follow in the footsteps of our ancestors and help to ensure their survival. It took Gary Branigan five years to complete his excellent 2012 publication "Ancient & Holy Wells of Dublin". As a guide to where the wells are located, it is truly a work of art!

History refers to several well-known wells here in Dalkey - Lady's Well, St Begnet's Well, and Scurvy Well. I bought a copy of Gary Branigan's book about three years ago when, as part of our Dalkey Tidy Towns efforts, we accidentally re-discovered a well in Dillon's Park which was buried in dense overgrowth. On page 105 of Gary's book, the site of the Well of Gailline is mentioned but the grid reference, latitude and longitude are stated to be unknown. In other words, it had joined the list of lost Holy Wells. Gary states "It is recorded in ancient times that atop Dalkey Hill was a great rock called *Cloch Tobair Gailline* which overhung a sacred well." rHad we found this lost "Holy Well"?

Following helpful research by Aideen Doyle, on the night before Halloween 2018, I invited Gary to join me in Dillon's Park to see if this is in fact the lost Ancient Holy Well of Gailline. He arrived on site at 18.45hrs and it was pitch dark. Armed with torches and mobile phones, we headed for our well - below the great rock and in view of Dalkey Island's Scurvy Well. Gary cautiously advised that given the sparse historic references to the exact location of the Well of Gailline, we cannot say with absolute certainty where the

ancient well is or was located. In saying that, Gary spent some time carrying out a careful and thorough inspection of the spring well and a survey of the immediate topography of the area, he advised that, given what we know, everything in the region of Dillon's Park points to the fact that this spring well is likely to be the lost Well of Gailline, and although he couldn't be certain, he would bet his shirt on it!

Our Dalkey Tidy Towns team installed a sympathetic stone entrance path and commissioned a portcullis type gate for its protection and also that of our visitors. Do come and enjoy this ancient part of Dalkey's history in Dillon's Park and please help to keep it safe and clean if you can.

NEWS FROM CASTLE PARK SCHOOL

The Autumn term has been verv busy at Castle Park School and one of the highlights was STEAM Day. On Friday 12th October the whole school engaged in activities linking Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Maths. The theme for the day was: "A Healthy Body in a Healthy Mind" (based on our School motto) was used to link all of the STEAM subjects. The school timetable was set aside for the day, and pupils moved around the school. completing various tasks and activities.

In Music, pupils explored the importance of good breathing technique for singing and how

singing can help you breathe more deeply. Calm breathing exercises and warm up songs were used to demonstrate improved breath control. In Science, the children focused on lung capacity and how it is measured. They measured reflexes. They also learnt how to make and use a skipping rope from recycled materials. 

Q. I have been feeling unwell for a few days with a fever, sore throat and a dry cough – I am worried I may have the flu. How do I know if it is a cold or the flu that I have and how can I manage it?

A. Flu symptoms generally come on suddenly with symptoms of fever, muscle aches, headache and fatigue. Symptoms of a cold appear gradually, are not as severe, and often just affect your nose and throat. It as he it to further 7 days

generally resolves by itself within 7 days.

Flu symptoms are caused by the influenza virus which is a highly infectious illness that affects the lungs and upper airways. Symptoms include a sudden high temperature, generalised aches and pains, dry cough, nausea and loss of appetite. It is a very common illness that occurs every year, usually during the winter months and the virus is spread in the small droplets of saliva coughed or sneezed into the air by an infected person, which if inhaled can be infectious. It can also spread if someone with the virus touches common surfaces (such as a door handle) with unwashed hands. Symptoms develop one to four days after being infected.

If you become infected with the flu virus your body will produce antibodies against it. Antibodies are proteins that recognise and fight off germs that have invaded your blood. Your antibodies will remember this flu virus and fight it if it invades your body again. Over time the flu virus can mutate and change into a different version, which means your body may not recognise it and you can catch flu again in the future.

Management of the flu can normally be done by yourself at home if you are otherwise fit and healthy. You should make sure to have plenty of rest and drink lots of fluids. You can take paracetamol or ibuprofen based cold remedies to lower your temperature and relieve symptoms. You may need to stay in bed for two or three days after your symptoms peak.

If you are in an at-risk group and have flu-like symptoms, or if your flu symptoms are getting worse, you should see your GP as it is more likely that a complication may occur. The at-risk groups are:

- people aged 65 and older,
- people with certain medical conditions (long-term heart, lung, kidney, liver or neurological disease, diabetes or those with a weakened immune system due to treatment or disease)

• people living in nursing or residential homes where the spread of the virus is more likely. The most common complication of seasonal flu is a bacterial chest infection. Occasionally, this can become serious and develop into pneumonia. Treatment for this is normally with an antibiotic which your doctor can prescribe.

It is possible to get a vaccination against influenza. This is season specific and contains a number of strains which are based on predictions of strains likely to circulate by the World Health Organisation. The best time to get the vaccine is in October and November before the peak of the 'Flu epidemic hits the population. It is especially advised for the above atrisk groups and pregnant women. It is available from a GP or Pharmacy and may be free of charge for at-risk groups.

DALKEY TIDY TOWNS TEAM VISITS THE NEW INCINERATOR

WHAT HAPPENS TO DALKEY'S BLACK BAG WASTE? The Answer is just a Short Drive Away



Our Dalkey Tidy Towns volunteers are involved in many things – community and educational schools projects, Park developments, safeguarding our heritage, gardening and planting and much more. Litter collection is another – and that is why twenty one of our volunteers decided to visit the Dublin Waste-to-Energy project, known to most as the Incinerator in Poolbeg. In other words, we wanted to see for ourselves what exactly happens to our black bag rubbish.

The Incinerator is a Public Private Partnership between Dublin City Council and Covanta. It turns 600,000 tons of non- recyclable waste into steam and ash, avoiding the importation of 250,000 tonnes of fossil fuels each year, producing enough electricity for 80,000 homes and also with the potential to heat 50,000 families. The Dublin region has become self-sufficient in managing waste as a result, eliminating the need to export waste to other countries.

The Incinerator structure is enormous – bigger than the Aviva Stadium! It is also very impressive on all fronts and well worth a visit. As Kieran Mullins of Covanta pointed out, what we see emerging from the chimney is steam. The furnace ash is removed by truck. Our Dalkey black bag rubbish becomes an asset as an energy source.

Covanta has also created the Community Gain Fund. To date, it has allocated € 10 million to local organisations including Railway Union Sports Club, Stella Maris Rowing Club, Marian College, St Patrick's Boy's National School and others.




