What would the **Countess** Say?

In this year of commemorations, we are delighted to present a staged reading of a short story featuring Countess Markievicz by local writer Martina Devlin on April 2nd at 7.30pm.

The story is rich for stage adaptation as the Countess is brought to life before our eyes. The story is part of Martina's collection 'Truth and Dare'. There will be a Talkback afterwards with the writer, Martina Devlin and Áine Lawlor from RTÉ's *The* Week in Politics.

In an interview especially for the Dalkey Community Council Newsletter, Martina writes: "I've been fascinated by Countess Markievicz since I was taken, as a little girl, to visit Lissadell House in Sligo. My father told me about the two Gore-Booth sisters, Constance and Eva, and how they came from the Big House tradition, but their hearts lay with the people."

The play began life as a story written as a fundraiser for Women for Election - Constance seemed an ideal character for the piece as Ireland's first female TD and government minister. In fact, she was Europe's first female minister too. She was quite the trailblazer. The story appears in my latest collection **Truth & Dare: Short Stories about Women Who Shaped Ireland.** I was very conscious that Countess Markievicz pushed against boundaries and paved the way for other women in politics. But when I decided to bring her back from the dead to cast an eye over progress - the premise underpinning the play, What Would The Countess Say? - I had to conclude she'd be not just disappointed but astounded by the slow rate of progress.

She was named Minister for Labour on April 2, 1919, exactly 100 years to the day from the play's first performance. The piece celebrates her achievements - but also highlights the need for more to be done to pave the way for women's participation in public life".



**NATURE CORNER** 

I'd hoped to write about seeing a Short-eared Owl. One of the birds had been seen regularly on a headland just north of Balbriggan. They are regular winter visitors to Ireland and north county Dublin is a good spot to find them where they favour tillage fields near the coast. They breed in the far north of Europe, the closest breeding pairs are probably in the northern isles of Scotland with most of the species close to the Arctic circle where they will be breeding during

days of almost continuous sunlight so they are daytime hunters, unlike our Barn and Longeared owls which are strictly nocturnal hunters.

A friend, Gustavo, had got a wonderful photo of one sitting in a stubble field in Balbriggan and had given us a good map of where the birds had been seen so we set off with high hopes and expectations on a day that was cold with brisk northerly winds but dry with dazzling sunshine.

I'd never walked along that stretch of coastline before and it was very impressive with the tide way out and lots of bird life along the shore. Looking north over the sea you could see snow covered mountains in the Mournes. Curlews flew over in little flocks to feed in the farmland just above the shore while Ringed Plover, Turnstones, Redshanks and Dunlin busied themselves along the waters edge.

We got to the headland and made our way up from the beach and followed the path, circling the field to the area on the map which was a mound of earth with brambles growing around the base. We approached tentatively but no large eyes stared at us from a tussock or no bird took to the air with broad wings flapping silently.

We scanned the surrounding fields from the top of the mound then walked along the length of the nearest hedgerow. A big flock of Brent geese flew over a distant field and a little flock of Linnets busied themselves feeding on grass seeds among the dried up maize stems. But no owls!

I've seen them a few times before, on the site of the old Baldoyle race course, then a big field now a housing estate, where we saw two of the owls quartering low over the ground looking for rodents then landing and staring back at us from the grass while a Buzzard

I'd spent a happy hour or two in a lane in Donabate watching two Short-eared Owls buzzing each other in an adjoining field. They sometimes appear further south, we've seen two a couple of times one near Booterstown marsh, one flying over the undeveloped land north of the marsh and another morning before we began a wader count on the beach one flew out from where it was roosting in a tree beside the Dart car park. When he used to live in Dalkey renowned birder Dick Coombes would regularly see them wintering on Dalkey Island, perfect hunting ground for them with its then abundance of rabbits and rats.

We wandered around the Balbriggan field and were greeted by a pair of walkers asking us had we seen the owl? They had seen it regularly so we knew we were in the right place even if the owl wasn't. Maybe the numbers of Saturday walkers had driven it or them to another field.

Subsequently the owl was seen again at the same spot so when a friend said he was going out to have a look we gladly accompanied him. It was an even more beautiful morning than our last visit. The sea was flat calm and through the telescopes we watched rafts of Common Scoters, a scarce breeding duck in Ireland but in winter they are joined off the coast by birds from the Continent. Apparently they usually feed for molluscs in water less than 12 meters deep and it was the low tide that brought them in so close. Hundreds, possibly thousands of them dived, flew across the sea in little groups or sat on the mirror like water. You can see them in Dublin Bay but I'd never seen such numbers as was before us here.

We walked up the shore again and reached the field. Once again a local on a stroll appeared, told us there had been three or four owls which he'd see regularly but he hadn't seen them for a week or more. We walked the periphery of the fields, a large flock of Chaffinches flew up into the hedgerow ahead of us while a Song Thrush sang from the hedge beside us. But no owl!

We set off back towards the car park. The tide was coming in and little flocks of Dunlin and Turnstone fed on the waters edge just a few yards away. Waders were gathering on rocks as the sea lapped around them and on one cluster of rocks were a number of Golden Plover

The two species, though closely related, have different characteristics in the winter, Golden Plover gathering in shimmering flocks of hundreds or thousands of birds while Grey Plover are usually solitary, striding briskly across the shore then pausing with head slightly tilted to listen for food moving under the sand. We had never seen them together at such a close distance, so although no owl sighting we had a nice walk and saw hundreds of Scoter and got some unique views of wading birds. When we got back to Brian's car he saw there were lots of little insects on the roof which on closer inspection turned out to be tiny black spiders. Spiders actually travel through the air, sending up a strand of silk which will carry them airborne to set up new territories and that's almost certainly where these little creatures had come from, but you wouldn't expect to see them on a day in early February.

Almost every winter now brings news of plants, birds and animals appearing or involved in behaviour much earlier in the season than in former years. A botanist in the UK who collects datagram from 'citizen scientists' who record flowers and trees flowering or opening buds weeks or months before they normally would have, said that in many cases rather than starting the new season early they had never actually shut down for winter and were still growing through the mild months of November, December and January. Our Blue Tit nest box had a pair of birds clearing it out before Christmas but the strangest sight we saw was on a very mild and sunny 6th February when, just after midday, a bat was flitting around near the eucalyptus plantation. Unusual enough seeing a bat in the middle of the day but there must have been plenty of insects in the air for it to feed on. A Magpie made some half hearted attempts to attack it, I couldn't imagine the two species would ever normally see each other except maybe on long warm summer evenings.

### MY GARDEN - PHILIPPA THOMAS

Are not Sorrento Park, Dillon's Park, our Vico Strip, Killiney Hill, Bullock Harbour, Dalkey Island, Hyde Park, Cuala – All our green areas, our parks, simply the 'lungs' of our town with its 'village' atmosphere? Maybe, 'be' the difference, green up your walls. Perhaps too, consider a small ornamental tree. A tree can bring so much to a garden adding scale, movement as well as helping to screen views in and outside, giving privacy and of course, providing a welcome perch for visiting birds.

March is one of our busiest months and is the month of new beginnings in nature and then, a time to welcome back some familiar faces. Our rising temperature literally brings our gardens alive... So, let's get out there and shake all those cobwebs off our gardening tools and maybe, even ourselves! This is the perfect time for clearing away the withered stems from last year's perennials, best to do so now before the new growth comes through. Then keep an eye out for plants that you can divide – look for any congested clumps of perennials such as *Persicaria*, *Day Lilies*, *Iris*. In fact, pretty much anything with lots of stems. Dividing plants keeps them generally healthier, too.

**Pear and Plum Trees grow well and fruit reliably well here in Ireland** – To get the best results, plant the trees now on a sunny facing wall or trellis and train them as a wall cover. The protection from the wall will help to ripen the fruit earlier and encourage stronger growth. The best and most popular variety seems to be (my late mum grew it), - Victoria, lovely plum coloured juicy fruit produced in abundance from mid-July. Blueberries are fun to grow, too. They are also fantastic to add colour from both flowers and foliage in any garden. You can even grow them in pots on your veranda. Just remember to use ericaceous soil and feed the plants in Spring and Summer with slow release fertiliser, then you should enjoy picking them from June and September. Another really worthwhile plant to grow is Rhubarb. Plant it right now, Rhubarb is really easy to grow and will provide fresh red stalks for many years. '*Timberely Early*' variety is ready for picking in late March, early April.

Everything that you do, starts with the First Step and if you only do one thing, in time it all adds up, 'little by little, the birds build its nest'.

#### Inside

Consider filling your house with flowers; bud vases scattered across a dining table, create the most magical Saturday or Sunday Lunch setting. In this way, our Season can be enjoyed and appreciated inside and outside. Maybe snatch the odd bloom in bud from the garden and watch it burst open.

1. Honesty, Wall Flowers and Hellebores: Hellebore faces can be dropped in a shallow glass bowl of water, they can look stunning.

- 2. Rosemary with its stunning pale blue flowers, presently.
- 3. Camellias, there are so many beauties out there.
- 4. Flowering Quinces, Chaenomeles.

- 5. Forsythia.
- 6. Pieris. Forrest Flame.

- 7. Some *Daphne* have exquisite scents.
- 8. Kaffir Lilies, Schizostylis. 9. Sarcococca, Sweet Box, just adore this plant.

### MIGHT DO MAYBE, MARCH JOBS

- 1. The recent 'Which' tests are questioning if wood based composts are more beneficial? Wood, fibre, bark and coir did so well. By blasting apart these fibres, manufacturers can create a free – draining nutrient retentive material.
- 2. Keep an eye out for slugs and maybe transport them elsewhere.
- 3. Sycamore seedlings will grow very fast, pull them out when you spot them.
- 4. Cut the old leaves off Hellebores to remove any foliar diseases and this makes flowers more visible.
- 5. Prune Roses in order to encourage new strong growth.
- 6. It really is beneficial to fertilise your soil, consequently in late Spring you will be able to achieve so much. Maybe consider some well-rotted horse manure.
- 7. Feed trees, shrubs and hedges with a slow release fertiliser by lightly forking it into the soil surface.
- 8. Sounds cruel but best to cut out top rosettle of leaves from Mahonia shrubs after they have flowered in order to encourage branching.
- 9. Maybe install a water butt for the Season ahead and position it under a down pipe.
- 10. Maybe, start a sowing and growing diary to keep track of which seeds you are sowing and where and when they were sown. It really helps later in the year.



#### TAKING CARE OF THE ENVIRONMENT



#### PLEASE CUT DOWN ON YOUR PLASTIC!



Q. My child has woken up with a rash and is feeling out of sorts. There is chicken pox in their class so I suspect that is what it is. How can I know and how should I treat it?



A: Chickenpox is a common and mild childhood illness that most frequently occurs in children under age 10. It is caused by a virus called varicella-zoster

and is very easily spread by coughs and sneezes from someone who is infected.

Before the rash appears the child is likely to have a fever and flu like symptoms. The spots start as a small itchy red rash in clusters and tend to be on the chest and stomach, on arms and legs, under the arms, on the face and scalp and behind the ears. After 12-24 hours the spots develop a blister on top and become very itchy. Within 2-3 days the fluid in the blister becomes cloudy and they begin to dry out and crust over. After one to two weeks these crusts will fall off naturally. Spots normally develop in waves for three to five days after the first spot appears.

Chickenpox is more infectious from one to two days before the rash starts and remains infectious until all the blisters have crusted over (usually five to six days). Infectious children should be kept out of school or creche and kept at home until all the blisters are crusted over.

There is no specific treatment for chicken pox but the symptoms can be managed with pharmacy remedies. Paracetamol is the preferred method of pain relief for treating chicken pox. Ibuprofen or other anti-inflammatory drugs should **NOT** be used as they may cause adverse skin reactions during chicken pox.

It is important that children are kept well hydrated and given plenty to drink. It is important that the child does not scratch the spots as it may leave scarring so fingernails should be kept clean and short. Socks can also be put on the child's hands at night to avoid scratching. Calamine lotion or specific chicken pox treatment gel and mousses can be used to cool the skin and relieve the itch. Anti-histamines can be used in children over 2 years old to manage the itch.

A bath with ground up oats can also help to sooth the rash and itch.

In rare circumstance children can become more seriously ill with chicken pox and they should see a doctor if they develop any abnormal symptoms.

Some people are more at risk of complications and these include pregnant women, new born babies and people with a weakened immune system. These should seek medical advice as soon as they are exposed to chicken pox or if they develop symptoms.

There is a vaccine against chicken pox but it is not part of the routine childhood vaccination schedule, but it can be paid for and given through your GP. You should discuss this with the GP as to whether it is appropriate.

#### CEO VOLUNTEERS TO HELP CREDIT UNIONS IN WEST AFRICA

Core Credit Union CEO, Michael Byrne, travelled to The Gambia with the Irish League of Credit Unions International Development Foundation (the ILCU Foundation), to provide support and help to credit unions in the spirit of 'cooperation among cooperatives'. The ILCU Foundation is the charitable arm of the Irish credit union movement. It was set up in the 1980s to give back to help others develop their credit union movements. Much in the

same way that Irish movement received help in the 1950s when credit unions were first established in Ireland. Michael participated in the ILCU Foundation Volunteer Coaching Programme. He undertook a two week volunteering programme to share his expertise, knowledge, and skills with his credit union counterparts in The Gambia. Michael travelled to The Gambia. accompanied by three other Irish credit union personnel – Alan Duff, Health Services Staff Credit Union, Pauline Tourish, B&S Credit Union and Rosaleen Bradley, Newington Credit Union. During his time in The Gambia,

Michael and Rosaleen worked together to visit a number of credit unions both in Banjul and also in the rural countryside. They visited a mix of work-based credit unions and community credit unions to provide much needed technical assistance, especially in the rural areas in the Bwiam region.

The technical assistance provided by Michael and the coaches included providing support

on day to day operations, loan management and credit control to credit union staff. Following each credit union visit Michael and Rosaleen had the opportunity to meet with the Board of the credit unions and put forward recommendations to the Board on how to further develop their credit union, one such Board meeting took place under a tree in over 30 degrees heat. Michael and the coaches also organised for a meeting with local taxi drivers to discuss the potential of them setting up their own credit union.

The coaching programme concluded with a 2-day workshop, this allowed Michael and the coaches the opportunity to share their observation and best practices with the credit union participants to improve their safety and soundness. Michael presented on risk management as credit unions need to be risk adverse. Throughout the two weeks Michael and his fellow

volunteers were able to share their skills and knowledge to build the capacity of the credit union personnel in The Gambia, and empower them to further strengthen their movement. 





# GRAFFITI DAMAGE REDUCED WITH DAILY ACTION BY DALKEY TIDY TOWNS





Cities all over Europe continue to spend roughly €30 million each year to remove unsightly Graffiti tags on public and private property. Legally seen as Criminal damage, the culprits often pay a high price for this vandalism. With a criminal record, they may also be refused visas to enter many countries. Dalkey Tidy Towns (DTT) initiated a combat programme in 2014. In that year, over 1,500 graffiti tags were removed in our small Town. In 2018, quick removal and monitoring by DTT reduced the level to 325 tags.

For our DTT volunteers, this is almost a daily routine. Thank you to all for supporting this programme.
