Our first lizard sighting of the year. 25th February, 2019.

Every year, around the end of April and the early days of May, a particular insect appears that hovers in the air in large numbers around woodland edges, hedges and rough grass. We always see them on the 'Green Road', the path above Vico Road which is a real sun trap. Last year there seemed to be a higher proliferation than usual and any time we were there they seemed to cause a degree of consternation with passing walkers since they hover at head height and don't make any attempt to avoid approaching people.


A neighbour asked me were they flying ants. I heard somebody else wondering were they mosquitoes as they swatted them out of the way while somebody else sitting on a bench pronounced, with great authority, that they were horseflies, which have a very unpleasant bite. But they weren't horseflies, nor were they ants or mosquitoes.

They are in fact a type of fly, *Bibio Marci*, more commonly known as St. Mark's Fly since they first appear with great regularity around the date of that saint's feast day, April 25th. Sizeable creatures, shiny black and hairy with a long abdomen, they hang in the air almost motionless with long legs dangling underneath them. Their 'in your face' mannerisms adds to their lack of appeal making them seem even slightly sinister and threatening but in fact they're totally harmless to humans and can be very beneficial to the environment.

The ones hanging in the air are the males of the species which only live for a week. They hover or sluggishly move up and down to attract females and according

to buglife.org.uk 'the male's eyes are divided by a groove and have separate connections to the brain. This allows the males to use the upper eye part to look out for females and the lower part to monitor their position in relation to the ground, allowing them to hover in the same position.'

After mating the females lay eggs in the ground. When the larvae hatch they develop in soil where they feed on roots. They can cause damage to vegetables and plants in a garden but they themselves can be a important food source for birds to feed to their chicks. Buglife, an

For Free Estimates and Advice – Phone: 01 515 6227 Mobile 087 226 2317 E-Mail martinellard17@gmail.com organisation dedicated to insects with the charming motto 'Saving the small things that run the planet' goes on to say the adults are 'very useful creatures, they feed on nectar, making them important pollinators of fruit trees and crops' so if you encounter one be merciful, it won't harm you despite its threatening stance.

We were very surprised when Lucy spotted a lizard beside the path on Dalkey Hill in the last week of February. Normally Common Lizards, our only native reptile, wouldn't be coming out of hibernation until March but, of course, normal barely exists any more as regards to the climate and seasons. A lizard needs to increase its body temperature to near 30 degrees Celsius (86 degrees Fahrenheit) before it can hunt effectively and the mini heatwave at the end of February created record high temperatures. This lizard was motionless, warming in the sunshine, its greenish brown colouring making it virtually invisible and it was only when a spider got too close we saw it suddenly transformed into a blur of motion as it dived on the spider and swallowed it. The following day Lucy spotted one again and we knew it was a different individual. The one we'd seen the previous day had a shorter dark tail with concentric circles indicating it had utilised its only defence against predators, the ability to shed its tail when attacked, leaving the confused predator, possibly a cat or kestrel holding a still twitching severed tail. The tail will grow back but much darker and stubbier. It's not the only part of their body they can lose and another day my sharp-eyed companion found a coil of shedded skin a lizard had discarded, the lizard presumably wanting to begin its year with a fresh new wardrobe!

At no small expense, we upgraded our bird feeders getting new peanut, fatball and sunflower feeders which all claim to be squirrel-proof and so far, thankfully, they have proven true to their word. Grey squirrels were taking loads of seeds as well as keeping the birds away and attempts to make the feeders squirrel-proof under upside down hanging flower pots on elongated wire hangers, only proved a minor temporary irritation to the greys.

A previous 'squirrel-proof' feeder I had bought should more accurately have been described as a squirrel back support since the squirrel would easily squeeze through the vertical bars and stand with its back pressed against them as it nibbled away but the new ones we got are of much better construction with horizontal as well as vertical bars. Most are feeders inside a wire cage through which no squirrel could fit but one is a very clever device which is weight sensitive so if anything heavier than a bird lands on it the

seed holding part retracts closing the feeding apertures. You'd nearly feel sorry for the squirrels trying in vain to get at the seeds so near and yet so far and not even being able to shake them out on to the ground. Able to put out peanuts again in the new feeder, within days we were delighted to have Long Tailed Tits and Siskin feeding from it.

Q. I have heard a lot in the media recently about a Meningitis Vaccine that is not covered by the vaccination schedule – what is this and what does it cover?



A: The Meningitis vaccine you are referring to covers a specific strain of Meningitis called Meningitis B. It has

been included in the vaccination schedule for all babies born since 1st October 2016 but is not offered to children born before this date. It is however possible to pay privately to get this done for all older children and you can discuss with your GP as to whether it is appropriate or necessary for your child.

Meningitis is an infection of the protective membranes that surround the brain and spinal cord (meninges). It is usually caused by a bacterial or viral infection and the bacterial forms tends to be rarer but can be more serious. It can affect anyone, but is most common in babies, young children, teenagers and young adults.

It can be very serious if not treated quickly and can cause life-threatening blood poisoning (septicaemia) and result in permanent damage to the brain or nerves.

Symptoms of meningitis are listed below but it is important to note that symptoms can appear in any order and not all may appear.

Any suspected meningitis should be checked by a doctor as a matter of urgency as quick treatment is needed.

In hospital tests will be done to confirm meninigitis and if it is bacterial or viral. Bacterial meningitis is treated with antibiotics while viral meninigitis tend to resolve by itself.

MY GARDEN - PHILIPPA THOMAS

Imagine, our days are longer than our nights now. So our plants are responding with more rapid growth. Possibly, April is the busiest time of the year in the garden.

'April prepares her green traffic light and the world thinks go.' Christopher Morley. Every day now, there is something bursting into flower and everything else is waking up. The gorse on Killiney Hill and Vico strip is in full bloom now.

0'April hath a spirit of youth in everything.'

ROSE-BREEDER, DAVID AUSTIN R.I.P.

Our World lost David Austin in December, 2018. Some roses such as 'James L. Austin', 'The Poet's Wife', have both been awarded five stars in recent plant trials. Other best varieties mentioned were 'Claire Austin', 'Jude the Obscure', 'Grahame Thomas' and 'Constance Spry'.

Knowing and understanding your soil affects the way you manage it and determines the type of plants you can grow. All soils contain mineral particles, organic matter, water and air. The combination of these determine your soil properties. Then, scarifying involves the raking out of dead grass called Thatch and any moss that has grown. It is generally done in Spring when the grass recovers quickly. A motorised scarifying machine can be hired from some hire shops. The effect is dramatic. A feed, perhaps top-dressing up and some reseeding can soon bring about a beautifully improved green area.

Potting Up – Bamboo pots and seed trays – made from bamboo fibre, rice starch and resin (naturally occurring organic compounds) are now available. Apparently, they can be decomposed in 6-12 months. Whether it's plug plants you've bought or seedlings you've sown, make sure you pot them up before they grow too big for their original container and start to suffer. Did you know, apparently, Lily pollen is poisonous to cats? Some double Lilies are pollen free. Their lack of pollen may also help Hayfever sufferers and flower arrangers, as others can stain badly when brushed off clothes. ... Most of us find Lilies romantic, showy flowers that fill our borders with glamour in Mid-summer. Intensive breeding has created Lilies of all shapes and sizes and double Lilies with a multitude of petals.

Red Lily Beetle – Lily Beetles are bright red beetles with black heads, legs and undersides. Adults start appearing in March when Fritillaries provide a food source for them. They will then move to Lilies as these plants develop leaves. They eat these leaving unsightly holes but the major damage is done by the grubs, which will munch their way through leaves and buds. I'm afraid to say the grubs are (who would disagree?) a disgusting slime-covered dark brown, as they cover themselves with their own excrement to deter predators. A sunny day is best to spot them. They may try to drop to the ground and generally lie on their backs, leaving their black belly upwards to avoid being spotted. Wipe any red eggs from the leaves and any grubs that hatch. Do what you think appropriate in order to get rid of them.

Now, for my very favourite plant, this month. I think few plants can match the ability of Epimediums to grow in dry shade. They form neat, low-growing clumps. Most of them, their leaves emerge bronze, becoming lime green and then red when mature; their overall dainty appearance belies their resilience. Believe it or not, I grow at least 12 varieties in pots inside our front gate – they are there for yonks. I hope they give a warm welcome to the postman and general callers.

Plant Disease Update – The lethal bacterial infection, *Xylella Fastidiosa*, which has caused widespread losses of plants across Europe, has spread to Belgium. The infection was found on olive trees imported from Spain. We have been asked to remain vigilant.

Metaldehyde slug pellet are to be banned from gardens in the Spring of 2020. It poses an unacceptable risk to birds and mammals.

MIGHT DO, MAYBE APRIL JOBS

Early flowering Spring shrubs, such as Forsythia, Winter heathers and Spirea should be pruned as soon as the flowers fall to keep shrubs a manageable size.

Remember, before clipping ivy and garden hedges, check for **birds nesting** under cover of the foliage.

Roses: Prune, if not already done, as soon as possible. Take out any weak or dead stems. Use a rose food and lightly fork it into the soil. Apply a small amount of mulch around the base

Pull up all weeds as this prevents them seeding and gives less shelter to slugs.

Hostas in terracotta pots set on an upturned saucer in a larger one, create an island, hence helping to protect them against slugs and snails.

Apparently, egg shells cooked in a low oven are a valuable source of calcium, magnesium and other essential minerals and then can be added to the **compost heap**.

Gutters: Sowing peas in gutters makes it easier to plant a whole row in one go. Once your plants are large enough to go outside, slide them out in one go and firm the soil around them.

Give your plants some **T.L.C.** Our warmer weather and longer light hours generally means the plants require more water.

Dalkey Credit Union......From the beginning

In the early 1960s a group of business people in Dalkey looked into the possibility of setting up a local Credit Union. The reason for this was that credit was scarce in those days, after the end of the Second World War and the bleak 1950s with very little employment opportunities. Any possible credit that was extended was through pawnbroker's offices, provident companies and moneylenders, all of whom charged exorbitant rates.

After some research it was learned that the origins of the Credit Union movement were in Germany in the 1940s as central Europe was ravaged by famine, hardship and poverty. The movement spread throughout Europe and then to the United States of America. In the late 1950s the first credit Unions were established in Ireland – being Dún Laoghaire and Donore (although which was the first has never been ascertained). Thus began the great socio-economic development of 20th century Ireland which thrives to the present day. There were many fine people who were actively engaged in the founding of the movement and particular mention must be made to Nora Herlihy, who lived in Tubbermore, Dalkey, for a number of years. The initial efforts to establish a Credit Union in Dalkey by a business group was unsuccessful despite their best efforts. However, in 1966 a group of residents determined to provide much needed credit of all sorts got the wheels in motion by starting

The Dalkey Savings Group as a forerunner to an actual Credit Union itself. Local priest Fr. O'Brien was the first to put his hand in his pocket and started with his two shillings and six pence, or half a crown as it was then. Many local people were involved at this early stage and particular note should be given to Michael Kennedy, originally from Templemore, County Tipperary whose Trojan efforts led to him acting as first Honorary Secretary, communicator with authorities and convenor of the many meetings which ensued.

Credit Unions were overseen and established by the Registrar of Friendly Societies and could affiliate to the League of Credit Unions for support. The advice as much as rules were that a group of committed local people get together to form a Study Group as a Working Party to investigate the viability of forming a Credit Union locally to establish interest from local community, savings potential and facilities required. Concurrent with the

Dalkey Savings Group many meetings were held in people's private houses, local hotels then like the Coliemore and Shangri La, leading up to Our Lady's Hall being made available to collect savings every Friday evening. As at Friday 14th March 1969 there were already one hundred and ten members with a savings of £750.

The Study Group familiarised itself with the Book of Rules, the Credit Union Act of 1966 and conscientiously garnered advice from Sallynoggin, Bray and Howth Credit Unions on operational matters. Eventually formal application was made to form a Credit Union and on 9th May 1969 official permission was granted by the Registrar, thus requiring a public meeting to be held to elect a Board and Supervisory Committee, this took place in Our Lady's Hall on Monday 16th June 1969.

Mr. James Ivers, who was the Treasurer of the League, who lived locally and became active in Howth Credit Union sponsored (approved) the application. The first registered office of Dalkey Credit Union was at 8, Dalkey Park (being the home of the first Honorary Secretary, Michael Kennedy).

By the end of the year 1969 it is interesting to note the following:

A total of 121 loans were granted.

These amounted to £4,710 in total.

The average loan was for £39.

Loans were approved for: purchase of household goods, medical expenses, holidays, rates, weddings, house repairs, car purchase, motorbike purchase and education.

As this is the 50th anniversary year of Dalkey Credit Union it is proposed to have a series of such articles, a commemorative booklet and celebratory events. If you are not a member, please consider joining. Dalkey Credit Union is now part of Core Credit Union with offices in Shankill, Ballybrack, Sallynoggin, Foxrock, Dún Laoghaire, Carrickbrennan and Dalkey where one can transact business in any one of them.

TOP OF THE ECONOMICAL TOWNSHIPS

At the Wednesday April 9th 1919 meeting of the Dalkey Urban District Council, at which chairman Mr. C. McGowan presided, the report of the Finance Committee was adopted making the urban rate of 5s. in the £ for the coming year, an increase of 1s.1d. on the previous year. The poor rate was increased by 7d. to 4s.3d. It was noted that yet again Dalkey had maintained its place for another year as having the lowest rate increase in the coastal townships.

Dublin, a townland located north of Rathcoole, Co. Dublin': The need of grow food was a feature of the First World War with one of the local initiatives being the use of allotments and one of these 'A Local War-Time Food Supply Initiative: The Clontarf and Marino Allotments of 1917' is the focus of this study by Noel Carolan; the city of Dublin has two ceremonial swords: - The Great Dublin Civic Sword and the Lesser Dublin Civil Sword and this latter sword is the focus of 'The Black Sword of Dublin: a Note' by City Archivist Mary Clark; Emmet Oliver in 'The Business of Dublin in the early 20th Century: An Overview of the Retail and Financial Sector' throws light on the origins and operations of many business names familiar to those who grew in Dublin in more recent years.

Our lovely Heritage Town is known for its safe, friendly and welcoming atmosphere. Many here have worked hard to keep it that way. Sadly, the recent February Half-Term School's holiday has caused great concern following several serious incidents involving large groups of youngsters many appearing to have arrived by DART and looking to cause disruption and worse. These large groups are very intimidating. We cannot accept this vandalism and criminal behaviour.

A group of 50-60 very young juveniles took over the small all-weather MUGA (Multi-Use Games Area) pitch at Cuala and set fire to the expensive surface. Repairs will be expensive.

Stones and eggs were used to damage residents' homes and cars in many locations.

A woman leaving Borza's had her purse snatched and money stolen.

A man at Dalkey DART Station was attacked and suffered a black eye and broken glasses. SuperValu was targeted by youngsters stealing and being abusive.

The Gardai were quickly on the scene and arrested a vandal who had done some serious Graffiti damage on private property.

Large amounts of discarded cans, bottles and litter were cleaned up by Dalkey Tidy Towns following these incursions.

The damage to the MUGA has had a serious effect on the children who use the facility. In particular the newly formed *Cuala All Stars* that has been established to give a group of special needs children a sporting option in their lives. For safety reasons they must play only in the MUGA for. Hopefully the surface will be repaired and they can get back to having fun.

There are several security cameras in the area where these incidents occurred – Cuala, DART Station, Castle Street, etc.

DCC has had a meeting with senior Garda management and they are committed to dealing with this serious problem. When reporting an incident call Dun

Laoghaire Garda Station at **01 666 5000** and request the Garda's name as this can help in the follow-up investigation.

Unfortunately, there can be serious consequences for youngsters taking part in anti-social behaviour and this can impact on their education, careers and ability to secure visitor visas for the USA, Australia, etc.

Parents, please help where you can by being aware of these large groups of juveniles and their activities.

We ask all to be especially vigilant during the coming School Breaks.
