

❖ Summary of Dalkey Community Council (CLG) Public Meeting 2018 ❖

The 14th DCC Public Meeting was held on Monday 13th May in Our Lady's Hall. The Chairman welcomed Supt. Martin Fitzgerald, Minister of State for Higher Education Mary Mitchell O'Connor TD, Local Cllr. Cormac Devlin and Local Council candidates, DCC members and members of the public to the meeting. Susan McDonnell delivered the Chairman's Report and Ed O'Neill gave a summary of the financial position of DCC for 2018. Supt. Fitzgerald gave an overview of the crime trends for the Dalkey area and based on a factual analysis there has been no increase in offences in Dalkey since the closure of the Garda station since 2012. The Gardai have committed to increased visibility in the town and through the co-operation of local politicians, authority, businesses, organisations and the public all can play their part in helping to prevent crime.

The presentation of the remaining reports Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre, Functions, Tidy Towns, Sports, Newsletter and Planning followed. All the reports are published in the centre of this edition of the Newsletter and also on the DCC website.

Local Councillor Cormac Devlin paid tribute to Patricia Stewart who is not seeking reelection. DCC also thanked her for her assistance to the council over many years during her service as a Local Councillor and wish her the best of luck for the future.

On May 5th, 5 members of Dalkey Rowing Club set off to complete the challenge of rowing across the Irish Sea. The 12 members of this all female crew set off at midday from Arklow to row all the way Aberystwyth. And gruelling 150km race only took them just over 19 hours. Despite some high winds and strong tides at the start, the weather settled down and so did the rowers. They got into their stride and rowed with power and style, even at the end. They started at midday but due to the length of the race, a portion of the race was completed in darkness, which is full of challenges, including the risk of rowing the wrong way. But the

women kept their spirits high and welcomed the experience of the different conditions. They were narrowly pipped into 2nd place by the, also local, St. Michael's crew in Dún Laoghaire. Both teams were extremely impressive doing it in really good times. They were rewarded with a lovely warm welcome from their fantastic Welsh hosts who gave them a well-deserved celebration party. Tired but buoyed, the rowers returned back to Ireland via a less challenging method - the ferry!

Meanwhile back in Ireland ...

Five of our rowers competed in The Boyne River Race. A 14km race both along the Boyne River and out into the Irish Sea. The race took off from Clogherhead and finished at the Millennium Bridge, Drogheda. They were delighted with their time expecting it to take them over two hours - but actually doing it in one hour and 51 minutes! It was a cold day with a bit of a wind but they were given a hot meal and a medal at the end of their achievement.

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NATURE CORNER

A cuckoo calling on Dalkey Hill in May was heard by a number of people. There might have been more than one cuckoo passing through as a few weeks earlier someone else had heard one calling from the small eucalyptus wood. That's just up the road from us, well within hearing range, and I missed hearing that one as well but nice to know there was at least one around.

But we did hear another very welcome summer visitor when, below the Vico Road, a little burst of song drew attention to a pale bird perched on an elder bush beside the path down to the beach. As we wandered down the path it flew over us onto a patch of bramble singing as it flew and yes, as suspected and hoped, it was a Whitethroat. It's been a traditional breeding area for whitethroats there going back decades but they'd been absent in recent years. The whitethroat singing is the male, he'll arrive at the territory before the female and he will start to build a number of potential nests before the female chooses one.

We eventually got to see the theatrical production of War Horse, the very moving story set against the

horrors of the First World War with a horse, Joey, as the central character. The production has become deservedly famous for the animation of the horses onstage by puppeteers, openly visibly holding and manipulating the perfectly rendered life size puppets of the horses so brilliantly that after a while you have to suspend belief that the horses aren't actually real.

The opening scene is set on a summer day on a farm in Devon, a rural idyll that will later contrast with the horrors of the trenches to come. Horses aren't the only animals on stage, there's a very amusing goose on the farm and sinister crows on the battlefield but the first animated creatures the audiences sees being manipulated onstage are a pair of swifts on top of poles, screeching as they wheel through the air over the farm. The bird's wing movement is accurately rendered and the actual calls we hear are real swift calls.

You might have thought swallows would be a more apt bird to be depicted flying over a farm as we tend to associate swifts with cities, screeching above the streets and nesting in old buildings but in fact a lot of swift's feeding time is spent hawking insects from over farmland, woods, fields and water and they're known to travel hundreds of miles in a day to feed. British breeding swifts were found hunting flies over Germany. Back in the nest their young will cope with intermittent feeding by settling into a low metabolism torpor until the parents return with their crop full of insects. Swifts, the fastest birds flying in level flight (peregrines reach higher speeds when diving), are well adapted to long flights with one recorded covering more than 3,100 miles in just five days during its migration from Africa back to the UK.

Sadly swifts have suffered a catastrophic decline in populations over recent years. Dick Coombes of Birdwatch Ireland told me that between 1998 and 2016 Ireland's swifts declined by 58% though he clarifies that by stating 'it should be noted that Swift, like many

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other migrant species that winter in sub-Saharan Africa, is prone to fluctuations, from year to year, so the actual decline may be a bit less. Still alarming.'

Similarly in the UK they suffered a population drop of 51% between 1995 and 2005 and the same situation is occurring across a lot of Europe. One reason is undoubtedly food loss due to the decline in flying

insects but another reason is loss of nesting habitats since traditional sites under roof eaves are often filled in to make houses more secure. Artificial nest boxes have proved very successful for swifts when positioned in the correct place accompanied by tapes playing swift calls. Lynda Huxley from Swift Conservation Ireland is coming to Dalkey to see how we can help our local swifts and will be giving a talk and slide show at 7.30 pm at the Heritage Centre on Tuesday 11th June. The talk is followed by a Q&A Session. Hopefully (weather permitting) this will be followed by a walk locally to spot swifts.

The last time I'd visited Emo Court in County Laois was over 20 years ago and the then owner would sit in his car to sell tickets in the car park and later give guided walks around the spectacular house, designed by James Gandon the architect of the Custom House. That owner subsequently gave the house and grounds to the state and lived out his days in an apartment in the great house. The house is still being restored by the Office of Public Works while the expansive grounds have been returned to a more orderly condition with paths winding around a lake and through woodland. Perhaps the most impressive feature is a long avenue lined by *Wellingtonia* or Giant Redwoods trees through which the house is framed

in the distance.

Redwoods have a dense spongy bark, an adaptation to protect them from fire. When forest fires rage through their native habitat in California the heat causes the cones to drop and open and the seeds can then germinate in ground burnt clear of undergrowth and nitrogen enriched by the fire, all the while the towering parent trees will receive a scorching but no fatal burning. I'd heard many times the soft bark is often used by treecreepers to roost or nest in but I never actually knew anybody who'd witnessed that so it was a great privilege to actually see in one of the Emo redwoods a treecreeper taking food into a deep indentation in the bark, a action it would often repeat while we were observing, suggesting there were hungry chicks inside. Ivy had been cut away from some of the redwood trunks, the chainsaw cuts visible on the bark, but it was on one of the redwoods that still had ivy growing up it that Lucy spotted something interesting. At the base of the trunk were clustered grey pellets, comprised of fur and tiny bones, this was indigestible material that had been spat out by a long eared owl which almost certainly being roosting in the tree during the daylight concealing itself



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
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in the ivy during the daytime. Ivy is one of the best plants for wildlife for many reasons and minutes later we saw another example of its worth.

As we'd walked down the avenue a croaking raven had flown out, soared around then set to chasing away a buzzard. From behind it came the sound of juvenile ravens calling from the dense woodland it had flown from and it seemed likely the birds had nested in one of the tall conifers. On the way back up the avenue we followed a adult raven into the edge of the woods and saw it fly to a nearby tree. A big ivy winding around the

tree still had a good crop of little round black berries and I was fascinated to see the raven proceed to feed on them, its huge bill delicately picking out individual berries. All the time a juvenile raven was calling very persistently from a tree and then the adult flew to it and disgorged the berries to the juvenile, a fascinating sight to witness. Apparently there's more calories in the flesh of a ivy berry then in a Mars bar so it's a very nutritious food source. Back home in Dalkey and Killiney the local ravens have bred again and we saw treecreepers using two nest sites and subsequently feeding young.

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
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WHAT'S ON IN DALKEY LIBRARY

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June, many say, is the loveliest month of the year, and our longest day of the year falls on 21st June. Our extra light and warmth encourages our gardens to put on an exuberant burst of growth. It's hard to beat that feeling of abundance and the whispered promise of golden summer days to come. Fresh foliage and brightly coloured flowers, tall spires, slender foxgloves, plump baubles of purple and white Alliums that almost seem to float above our ground, lacy Astrantias, frothy Lady's Mantle and breathtaking Roses are some of our brightest stars.



'Gardening, the disengagement it allows, the absorption; it is practical, satisfying and creative, making it the perfect 'thing' to do: especially, when you want to cut yourself off from the rest of the world.' 'Gardens are extremely important for the range of connected wildlife that makes ecosystems work.'

We are now being encouraged to move away from traditional labels. Flora media are providing degradable and recycled options. To help the war on plastic, LIDL will be selling their bedding plants in trays made of recycled plastic. This should save 35 tons of plastic waste. Another major consideration is the use of compost bags. We can help by trying to

get as much use as possible before we bin them i.e. use them to store homemade compost or to line raised beds or hanging baskets, (for latter, pierce some holes).

Were your flowering pots disappointing last Summer? Maybe it could have been the compost? By 2020 all composts should be peatfree. Maybe major on reliability, massive performers and colour with our seasonal annuals. My number one would be some White Cosmos varieties, 'Purity', being one of my favourites. It has delicate highly cut feathery leaves in the brightest green. Oh, by the way, there is a brand new species of Busy Lizzie that is resistant to downy mildew: it is called Impatiens, Beacon. Remember too, to keep your eyes peeled for a host of new plants revealed at the

Chelsea Flower Show. There will be some new Foxgloves, a new Buddleia, (Butterfly Towers, only one metre wide, and one metre tall); a new David Austin and Harkness Roses and Thorncroft New Clematis.

What about placing your vases of fading blooms back outside in the garden for pollinators to make the most of pollen and any traces of nectar? Insects are pollinators of about 80% of all plant species in Europe, including most fruit, many vegetables and some bio-fuel crops. Imagine our diet without pollinators. Prices are now considerably affordable; however, for

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example, a punnet of strawberries, a pot of plum jam - will rocket. Take Bumblebees alone and look at what they pollinate: Sunflowers, runner beans, raspberries, strawberries, apples, currants, cucumbers, tomatoes, peppers, blueberries, melons, squash etc. - So, let's get going and grow pollinator friendly plants in our gardens. *Cotoneaster, Hebe, Lavenders, Berberis, Mahonias, Buddleias (Butterfly Bush), Verbena, Foxgloves, Pyracantha, Nepeta, Rosemary, Thyme, Poppies, Kniphofia (Red Hot Pokers)* are some of the best plants for pollinators.

New News!

A colony of Webspinners thought to be the first established in the U.K. has been found in a glasshouse at R.H.S. Wisley Garden. These tropical silk-spinning insects are thought to have hitched a ride on imported orchids. They are unlikely to survive outdoors so are little threat to native species.

Two new pests have recently made their way to the U.K. In this 2019, they are affecting *Magnolia*, *Mulberry*, *Dogwood* and a few other species. It wraps its eggs around branches creating unsightly strings but isn't thought to do any damage to the host plant: It is called *Cotton Stringy Scale*.

Meanwhile, the larger eight-toothed *European Spruce Bark Beetle* had been found in Kent and East Sussex.

Finally, A Thought For *Hydrangeas*

Hydrangeas are a garden classic that offer so many options from ground cover to spectacular trees. There is a beautiful type to suit every situation and success is virtually guaranteed. There are simply endless varieties. Most varieties originate from Asia but are completely at home here. My absolute favourites are; Limelight, Annabelle, The Oakleaf Tree, Hydrangea and 'Hydrangea Paniculata Wim's Red' – its

lacy flowers change colour from white in Spring through pink in Summer before maturing to a wine red in Autumn.

MIGHT DO, MAYBE JUNE JOBS

Try to water in the mornings so the foliage has all day to dry out before the cooler evenings, reducing the risk of fungal rot. Water especially, anything newly planted as they are still growing roots into the soil. ... Fungal diseases thrive in cool conditions, so help the air circulate in your greenhouse by opening door and windows.

Possibly, the easiest way to feed pots is to add a Best Buy Controlled-Release Fertiliser at planting time and top up with a liquid feed towards late Summer. As far as our plants are concerned, it's irrelevant where the nutrients are coming from. A good balance of nitrogen, potassium, phosphorous and other trace elements are what matters. Vegan gardeners can now choose vegan friendly soil conditioners rather than those that contain animal remains or manures.

Cut lawn and re-seed the bare patches. Do you know that there is a new lawn seed (Fast



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Start). The seeds are coated with aqua gel designed to aid germination.

Inspect Lilies for the Scarlet Lily Beetle, whose larvae can strip plants in days.

Aphids multiply rapidly in Summer. Remove early infestations by hand to prevent the problem getting out of control. Aphids can transmit viruses, as can other sap-sucking insects.

Oyster shell grit is great, they say, for keeping garden pests away. It also provides calcium for our birds (it is generally sold for poultry).

Maybe cut back sedum stems by half (*The Chelsea Chop*) in early June, in order to produce bushier plants.

Plastic Free Lunch at Harold Boys' N.S.

Our Green Schools'
Committee organised a
Plastic Free Lunch Day for
students and staff on the 9th
April. The idea behind this
was to raise awareness about
how much single use plastics
are in our lunchboxes. This is
so important, as there is so
much single use plastic on
many of our groceries, e.g.
plastic bags for fruit and
vegetables.

We surveyed students to see how many lunches contained plastic packaging on a normal school day. Over 60% of our students and staff had plastic packaging on items for their lunch. Yoghurt cartons and cling-film were some of the most common plastic items. Our Plastic Free Day saw the use of plastic packaging fall to less than 15% of students and staff in the school.

The idea was a great success and helped us to see the range of alternatives to plastic we can use for our lunches. For example, we can use a lunch box or bag, paper sandwich bags or compostable kitchen paper. Our Green Schools' Committee will continue to encourage our students and staff to avoid single use plastics in future.



BACKGROUND

Dalkey Community was born out of a tragedy when the entire Howard family was lost in a house fire in 1974. With such an amount of community and, indeed, national grief, it was felt that an active community-based organisation was necessary to assist and support the growing community of Dalkey at that time. The Community Council was formed on the back of the success of the Ladies Club and a formal inauguration was held in Hyde Road presided over by the then President, Erskine Childers.

Ever since, the Community Council has striven to build on the initial goals through its Memorandum of Association, having being incorporated in recent years.

This has been done through the following goals as listed in the Memorandum:

- 1. To represent the residents, businesses, clubs and organisations in Dalkey.
 - (a) To increase community harmony and fellowship.
 - (b) To foster the well-being of all the inhabitants of Dalkey without any distinction of any nature whatsoever.
 - (c) To foster facilities in the interest of social well-being, health, recreation and leisure.

The overall improvement in the general well-being of people in Dalkey during this time is marked. One of the methods used successfully has been the regular publication of a Newsletter, which is believed to be the longest running free community-based newsletter run entirely on a voluntary basis. Indeed, the entire Community Council is run by residents who are volunteers in their community and new members are always most welcome.

This Supplement represents the Reports from the various parts of the Community Council at the recent Annual Public Meeting held in Dalkey. We would like to sincerely thank all those who contributed Reports to the Meeting.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR MAY 2019 PUBLIC MEETING

As can be seen from the various reports, the Community Council is involved in many areas and continues to liaise with the County Council, An Garda Síochána and other organisations etc.

We work very closely with Dalkey Tidy Towns, many of our members being involved in both organisations. The result of this community involvement is very visible around us as Dalkey continues to improve its score in the national Tidy Towns competition, winning Gold for the third year running. Several of our members volunteered with Tidy Towns to unearth and renovate the Eire sign which has been revealed to the nation on RTE recently after 6 months of backbreaking work. This has been a great community effort.

Our Newsletter is going from strength to strength with Road Representatives delivering it to every house in Dalkey. Our circulation is increasing as more homes are built in our area and now our circulation is at 3,500 each month. We are aware of the increase in larger planning applications for Dalkey which we monitor every month and publish the monthly Dalkey list in the Newsletter. We have concerns about the traffic implications for Dalkey after the grant of permission for several large-scale developments during the last year. We hope that these developments can be absorbed into the community without losing the special character of Dalkey. We send our observations about many of these planning applications to the planning department of DLRCC if we believe that the community or public realm may be affected.

We also work with the Dalkey Castle and Heritage Centre; a representative from the Community Council sits on its Board and reports back to our monthly meeting.

Our Community Garda, Ailbhe Boyce joins us at our monthly meetings and updates us of any issues which we should be aware of and answers any queries that our members might have.

The Community Games was initiated in Dalkey by the Community Council many years ago and we continue to give them financial support. It is a great opportunity for children to take part in; "Dalkey Dashers" meet every Wednesday during the summer to train for the annual Community Games competition in Santry. More details of their activities can be seen in their report. We also have an excellent swimming team that has done Dalkey proud, bringing home several gold medals this year. This year we entered a rugby team for the first time-more of this in the Community Games report.

Our Functions team continue to organise events for both the public and our members, including the Annual Garden Competition, the Garden Outing and the Art Exhibition. We continue to organise the Annual Christmas Event when Santa visits Dalkey and meets hundreds of our children!

All these activities require funding and I should like to thank all of you who donated to our Annual Collection; without your support we could not continue our work for the community.

We are always looking for new members and would welcome anyone who would like to become involved with us; it is a great way to make new friends and become part of an active community organisation that benefits us all.

I should also like to take this opportunity to thank all our members for their work throughout the year.

DALKEY CASTLE & HERITAGE CENTRE ANNUAL REPORT 2018

This was Dalkey Castle's 20th year of existence, having opened in June 1998.

In that time, numbers have grown year on year to almost 34,000 last year.

Contracts: Various contracts have been secured with Tour Operators and Coach Touring companies. Large numbers of English Language Schools avail of the tours all year round which are very visual and not wholly dependent on English language skills.

Schools: All our local national schools visit from January to Easter. Dún Laoghaire CoCo sponsor all the DEIS schools. (these are schools from areas of disadvantage, of which there are plenty.)

DLR Spring into Heritage and Summer of Heritage programmes, also sponsored by Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown CoCo give people an opportunity to enjoy a fully sponsored free tour. The Summer series will be coming up in July and August.

James Joyce and Dalkey: We continue to celebrate Bloomsday with a Joycean Evening on Sat June 15th with music and song with Simon Morgan the baritone. The Dalkey Schoolroom Scene from Ulysses + Guided Joycean Walk will be held on Sunday June 16th.

Dalkey Book Festival now in its highly successful 10th year, we host many of their events in the Town Hall and the Heritage Centre.

Centenaries: We made a literary contribution to the decade of Commemorations by adapting and staging local writer, Martina Devlin's short story on Countess Markievicz 'What Would the Countess Say?' into a short play. This was a sell-out success and we were invited to stage it in the Mansion House in May for the Lord Mayor and 100 of his guests. It was particularly significant (and historic) to stage it in the Mansion House, the location of the first Dáil. Countess Markievicz was the first female elected to the House of Commons (she didn't take her seat) and later to Dáil Éireann as Minister for Labour. We will stage the play again in early October back in Dalkey.

The Maeve Binchy and Irish Writers Walks will begin again once a week in summer. We partner with Dalkey Library to finish the Walk in the Maeve Binchy Memorial garden and we are very grateful to Ciara O'Brien and the staff in the Library for facilitating this. We also bring our CIE groups to visit the Garden as many of them are huge Maeve Binchy fans.

The ECHOES Maeve Binchy and Irish Writers Festival 4th -6th October will celebrate its third year this autumn and we have an exciting programme lined up. The theme is all about community in contemporary writing in Ireland. Olivia O'Leary will give the keynote address: At Home in the World with Maeve Binchy- A personal reflection on Maeve's life and times, her journalism and fiction.

Tickets: The programme will have half-day and full day tickets again this year, as splitting the day into two halves was very successful last year.

We already have people planning to attend from the US.

Awards: There were several awards won during the year Among them the **CIE Award of Excellence** and **TripAdvisor Certificate of Excellence** Awards in particular.

Community Events: We hosted the Bulloch 200 series of talks in the Town Hall in partnership with the Bulloch Harbour Preservation Society which had capacity audiences.

Shop Locally: We have done a complete re-vamp of our small shop with the aid of a visual merchandiser, so do come in have a browse around and let us know what you think. A special display of locally made jewellery is proving very a popular alongside our range of knitwear.

Thanks to the Chairman of Dalkey Irish Heritage Town Company, Martin Allidine and Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown CoCo for continuing support of the Heritage Centre.

Local Dalkey People: We would especially like to thank the locals for all their support in sending people to our tours and attending our literary events.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH REPORT 2018

Neighbourhood Watch is a crime prevention and community safety programme for urban areas. It operates as a partnership between An Garda Síochána and the public. It works on the basis that every member of a community can help to improve the quality of life in the area by keeping a look out for neighbours and reporting suspicious activities to the Gardaí. The Gardai are kept informed by the Community Garda who attends the DCC monthly meetings and any significant matters of concern are discussed at higher level meetings.

Our Community Garda Ailbhe Boyce attended our monthly meetings during 2018 and submitted reports on the crime trends for the Dalkey area. Burglaries are the most prevalent crime committed in Dalkey and the majority of these would be classed as "opportunistic". Jewellery is the main item that is taken as it has a high value and is very easy to transport. From last October 2017 to March 2018 a figure of ≤ 3.7 million is reputedly the amount in monetary value of burglaries committed in Ireland. ≤ 1.9 m in watches and rings, ≤ 570 k in IT tablets and ≤ 435 k in power tools. One in six houses leave a door or window unsecured.

"Operation Irene" ran during the summer months. It was a multi-agency targeted approach to combat underage alcohol consumption and consumption of alcohol in public places as well as public order issues.

The Garda Clinics are held in Our Lady's Hall twice monthly where the attending Garda can assist with forms, authenticating signatures, etc. These clinics are held on the first and third Thursday in each month.

The NW Committee for F District provides a platform for NW co-ordinators from Dalkey, Dun Laoghaire, Cabinteely, Foxrock, Shankill and Kill O'the Grange to come together with the Community Gardai to report incidents of crime and exchange information and advice. During 2018 there were workshops and on various aspects of crime prevention, personal safety and safety in the home.

The Joint Policing Committee – Public Meeting was held in November 2018 and was attended by members of An Garda Síochána, headed up by Chief Superintendant Anne-Marie Cagney. Superintendant Cagney has been Divisional Officer in Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown since February of that year.

There are currently 375 operational Gardaí for a population of approximately 190,000, spread over an area of approximately 96 square kilometres.

Some statistics for the area given at the meeting are as follows:

These statistics are as of 11th November 2018.

DCC enjoys a good relationship with the Gardai and during 2018 we had several meetings with Superintendent Martin Fitzgerald and Inspector Tom Condon to discuss antisocial behaviour, traffic issues and criminal damage offences. The Gardai have made a commitment to increase Garda visibility in the town and area.

In May 2018 one of the most well-known Community Gardai Sergeant Angelene Confrey retired after 32 years' service in An Garda Síochána. Angelene worked with the many diverse groups in the area, the Homeless, the Travellers, the Islamic, etc. DCC thanks Angelene who was always very generous with her time and advice on many issues. We wish her well in her retirement.

I also thank Alan Winter NW for Hillside Residents Association who kept me informed and up-to-date when I missed meetings.

Neighbourhood Watch promotes safer and stronger communities.

It is very important that any suspicious activity or incidents are reported as this helps the investigating Gardai.

EDITORIAL: Last year was also a very successful year for the Dalkey Newsletter. Our regular contributors continued to maintain a steady flow of interesting and readable material for every issue. Our readers enjoyed what we gave them. Our regular contributors were wonderful in the way they delivered their material in accordance with our production schedule. The most popular subjects were Nature Corner, Gardening, Planning, Local History, Schools' Updates, Church Updates, Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre, Tidy Towns, Letter(s) to the Editor. etc. with the occasional other article of general interest. We have been approached by a number of local residents with a view to getting published in the Newsletter. It appears to be addressing a need for community information in Dalkey for local residents.

PRODUCTION: Printing costs were maintained at the same level again this year in keeping with the general trend in the industry. We maintained control on both costs and deliveries with our current typesetter and printer during the year. We also investigated other print quotations but, whilst apparently good, they were not good enough to warrant changing. Our conclusion is that we are getting a good price for the service we enjoy from both the printers and the typesetters.

We streamlined the Newsletter's publication scheduling even further during 2018 which has proved quite successful. This manifests itself in the fact that every Dalkey resident gets a regular delivery of the Newsletter and this must, inevitably, improve our local profile as a reliable and a worthwhile community service. We also received an increasing number of enquiries from potential advertisers outside the Dalkey area. Clearly, our 'reach' is increasing; we also have some regular readers who view it on our website as another means of keeping in touch with events in Dalkey. The average issue size during the year was 50½ printed pages.

ADVERTISING: Last year saw our advertising income maintain at a high rate thanks to the excellent work of Ms. Helena Feely, Advertising Manager, and the attractiveness of the Newsletter to regular and potential advertisers. The continued use of colour advertising has also been an attraction to many of our advertisers. We found that we had to squeeze in some advertisements and balance them with the actual editorial copy. This is a direct result of our overall success with the Newsletter's readership which is obviously of keen interest to advertisers.

The fact that we can accept full-page advertisements is a significant help in covering our costs.

Again, special mention must be made in that we are most fortunate to have had the benefit of the experience and knowledge of our Advertising Manager, Helena Feely, throughout the year. She has been an excellent contributor to our Editorial Team and has maintained an excellent relationship with the advertisers, even those who are regularly slow/late with payments!

DISTRIBUTION: The sorting/publication of the Newsletter normally takes place on the last Thursday of the month before the cover date of the Newsletter being published in

Our Lady's Hall. Road Representatives collect their own bags as well as the bags for some others in nearby areas. This has actually resulted in a more efficient distribution of the Newsletter, despite initial concerns. We delivered more than 38,000 copies of the Newsletter in Dalkey last year. This means that our readership is larger than that number with an average reader per copy of three; therefore, the actual readership is close to 11,000 residents of Dalkey. There are also those readers who receive the Newsletter online as well as those who are on our e-mail list. Both these media increase our reach significantly. Last year also saw the re-design and launching of the Council's website by Petra Bangmann who was ably assisted by our DCC member Eileen O'Duffy. The result is that we now have a much 'fresher' online presence which reflects the professionalism behind the Council's approach to its rôle in the community. As always, there will be minor hitches mainly to do with Road Representatives not delivering their Newsletters quickly after publication; this can be due to family commitments, illness, holidays, etc. In this regard, special thanks are due to our Distribution Manager, Danny Merity, who has done a terrific job in 2018 and continues to do so this year.

COSTS: The overall cost of the Newsletter was entirely offset by the income from Advertising with the balance coming from a tightening of the issue sizes where possible. We maintained our advertising rates at the same levels as in past years but have expanded (a little) the number of pages available to advertisers. This overall approach has resulted in every issue's costs being covered during 2018. The loyalty of our regular advertisers is to be very welcomed. Also, we are fortunate in that we are getting more and more people interested in becoming contributors. We welcome this as long as we can maintain control of our costs and reflect what is happening in Dalkey generally. Finally, we can report that the Newsletter returned a (very small) profit in 2018, which marks an improvement on some past years.

ANNUAL TIDY TOWNS REPORT 2018

This is a short summary of our work during 2018.

We worked throughout the year as we seemed to have so many on-going projects that needed our attention.

Our numbers of volunteers have grown but we are always happy to welcome new volunteers.

We have now three teams of volunteers:

Team Tuesday – working on major projects.

Team Planters for Pollinators: working on Dalkey's public planted areas. Work groups meet twice each week and more frequently in the summer.

Team Gleamers: Litter patrols - keeping Dalkey clean and tidy. Patrols happen three times each week throughout the year.

Dalkey's Men Shed now works in association with us.

Feb 2018: Following Storm Emma, DTT was involved in a major clean up at Bullock Harbour to remove the debris; trucks were necessary to remove the accumulated rubbish.

DLR staff cut back the vegetation along Vico Rd; DTT went into the undergrowth and removed 21 sacks of rubbish.

Mar 2018: Following an unexpected surge in graffiti, our volunteers removed the tags around Dalkey.

April 2018: Launch of the Dalkey Seven Castles Project: DTT initiated the creation of 7 specially commissioned bronze icons that have been inserted into the pavement along Castle St at the original castle locations. This was a major project involving several community organisations.

May 2018: There were several buildings along Castle St that had weeds and in some cases bushes growing from their roofs; a local landscaping company, Foxcover Landscaping removed them from chimneys and gutters.

June 2018: Adjudication started in June and continued throughout July and August. DTT went into action mode continuing to maintain the flower beds in public areas, cleaning Welcome to Dalkey signs and general cleaning and litter picking three times each week. As weed killer is no longer allowed by DLR. 8.0 kilometres of kerb was cleared of weeds by hand by DTT volunteers. Also, the 39 steps at Bullock Harbour were cleared.

Sites on our Maintenance List: This usually involves the cleaning and removal of excessive vegetation and litter from these areas.

July 2018: Launch of NOSUPTOWN (no single use plastic town) by local residents with support from local retailers and DTT.

August 2018: DTT cleaned up the large hoarding site on Castle St- repainted the seat and put 2 large planters on either side of the seat. We made our annual trip to Dalkey Island where we did an island-wide clean up removing rubbish unfortunately left behind by day trippers.-

During the three summer months our regular teams of volunteers cleaned the Castle St area three times each week, continued to keep the roads weed free and weeded and planted the public planted areas.

September2018: We began lobbying Local Councillors about the restoration of Sorrento Park; this park had been neglected for decades and we have been working with DLR to put in place a programme for its restoration during 2018. The paths are to be resurfaced, the bandstand is to be upgraded and the entrance gates and entrance piers to be repaired. New planting areas are to be introduced and an ecological survey is to take place. Information panels are to be installed.

October 2018: DTT Overall winners of DLR Tidy Districts Competition,

Super Valu National Tidy Towns: up 7 points on 2017 and **won Gold Medal** for town with pop 5,000 – 10,000.

We also won a **Highly Commended County Award (Dublin)**

We were also the **Overall winners of DLR Community Awards**.

We made the first discovery of the 'EIRE' sign at Hawk Cliff. Work started on extensive excavations to unearth the sign by our volunteers. This has taken 6 months of heavy work throughout the winter and now the sign has been fully revealed, the stones coated with a binding mix and finally painted with white paint. We are working on an information panel and hope to have a commemoration event during this summer.

Nov.2018: Well found in Dillon's Park: confirmed that the well is likely to be the lost well of Gaulline. DTT put in a stone entrance path and a portcullis-type gate.

The Dalkey Mens Shed started working with Tidy Towns; they undertook to paint all the railings at Hyde Park.

Dec. 2018: We organised the annual Christmas Extravaganza when Santa arrives in Dalkey in association with DLR. Many thanks to Fr Paddy and Fr Declan for the use of the Church Car Park.

Jan. 2019: We became aware of 3 trawlers in Dalkey Sound scooping up mussel seed from the bed for harvesting later. All legal apparently. Some of our photos from the incident were published in Afloat magazine. Following concern from fishermen and the general public, ourselves included, the Government introduced a ban on large trawlers inside 6 nautical miles of the coast. Restrictions will come into effect on Jan. 2020

Feb-May 2019: Our members have attended various lectures and workshops dealing with Sustainable Energy and Composting in preparation for new projects for the coming year.

PLANNING REPORT FOR YEAR 2018 FOR MAY 2019 PUBLIC MEETING

There were 92 planning applications during 2018 in the Dalkey area compared to 93 applications in 2017. 14 applications were declared invalid, usually as a result of problems associated with the site notice; however, the majority applied again successfully. There were 10 applications for retention and 6 of these were granted permission, the others were refused permission. Additional information was requested in 10 cases and supplied in 16 cases- occasionally clarification of the additional information was requested and some were from the previous year's application. There were 3 applications for an extension of duration of permission last year –this was a category that appeared several years ago as a response to developments for which the permission had lapsed during the recession. 78 decisions were made, of these 55 were granted permission, 23 were refused and 4 other applications were withdrawn.

16 decisions were appealed to An Bord Pleanála; of these 9 were 1st party appeals against either refusal for permission or the conditions imposed by the planning department of the County Council. There were 6(no) 3rd party appeals lodged against the County Council's grant of permission.

An Bord Pleanála handed down 19 decisions during the year, of these 9 had previously been granted permission by the Council and then upheld by the Bord. 6 decisions were refused. There were a similar number of applications as last year; planning applications are still nowhere near the numbers applied for during the "boom" years. However, the large number of construction sites around Dalkey this year continues to be a feature like last year.

DALKEY MANOR (BARNHILL ROAD): In January 2015 there was a proposal for the demolition of the house known as Dalkey Manor and the construction of 57 apartments in two blocks. There was widespread unfavourable reaction on many grounds by residents throughout Dalkey. These included overlooking and overshadowing of adjacent properties, removal of large numbers of trees from the site, impact on the adjacent Protected Structure-Dalkey Lodge and traffic issues along Barnhill Rd amongst others. The application was withdrawn before a decision had been reached by the Planning department. The developer, Pegasus, had decided not to proceed with the aim of developing the site for 'later-living' due to 'planning issues' and put the site up for sale.

In February 2016 a proposal for the demolition of the house and the construction of 29 houses was lodged with the Planning Department. Similar objections were raised as for the previous development.

Permission was refused in April 2017 for a variety of reasons that had been highlighted by the public and ourselves but, interestingly, the planners felt that the proposed density (number of houses per acre) was too low for the site and that there would be an inappropriate mix of housing types (ie. too many large houses). This decision was appealed by the developer and we sent in our observation to Bord Pleanála.

Bord Pleanála refused permission in November 2017 for three reasons: the impact on houses in Old Quarry, the impact on the protected structure Dalkey Lodge and an inappropriate mix of house types.

Another application was lodged in May last year, for 13 houses and 23 apartments; and

similar concerns as applied to the previous applications are still valid for this application. Permission was granted in January this year, but was later appealed in February by residents. We are waiting for Bord Pleanala's decision.

BULLOCH HARBOUR: In December 2016 a proposal at the former Western Marine site for 7 commercial units with 6 2-storey residential units above them and 3 large three storey houses with roof terraces at the rear of the site was lodged in the planning department. Additionally, there was a second application for only the demolition of the current warehouse and sheds There was huge public opposition to the development involving not only local residents but also the wider public and additionally, opposition from people living abroad who had known Bulloch Harbour previously.

The main concerns about the proposal included the impact of such a large scale residential development on the Harbour in a variety of ways and the possible negative effect on the existing commercial businesses. Future public access to the rocky coastal area at the rear of the site was also highlighted. Other concerns included parking, inadequate open space for the development, drainage issues, overlooking, flooding. It was felt that the proposal did not integrate with the local community at Bullock harbour and did not respect the historical and natural history of the area. Over 400 hundred observations were lodged with the planning department, something which had never previously happened for any other planning proposal in the area. The planning department refused the application with an extensive list of reasons for its decision. The developers did not appeal this decision.

A further application was lodged in December 2017. This time the development consisted of a 3-storey tower block at the end of the pier consisting of 2 apartments with parking for them on the ground floor level and a café. A separate boat building facility, a small area for community use with some changing facilities, 3 small units for the owners of the "sheds" that are currently located along the pier and 3 very large houses at the rear of the site were also proposed. The developer suggested that should permission be granted for the development, they would "gift" the rocky coastal area at the rear of the site to the County Council for public amenity use. However, as the public has had access and the use of this area for generations but the access gateway would still remain in the ownership of the developer (as indicated on the planning drawings accompanying the application), this could not be considered a planning gain for the County Council.

Similar concerns as for the first proposal were raised but the major issue raised was the likelihood of flooding and over-topping. These concerns were highlighted when storms occurred in February and March of 2018 resulting in major over-topping with flooding of the site and the pier resulting in serious damage to the pier.

The planning department refused permission in February 2018; this time the developer appealed the decision to Bord Pleanála in March.

We are still waiting for their decision more than a year after the appeal was lodged. We should like to thank all the members of the public who took the time to attend the public meetings and who lodged their concerns and objections to the planning department and Bord Pleanála to help to protect this much-loved public amenity.

CHARLEVILLE, HARBOUR ROAD: An application for 56 units in 4 4-storey blocks over an underground car park was lodged in August 2017. There were many

concerns regarding the proposal mainly its scale, density and massing and the impact on the surrounding properties particularly the Protected Structures. We have serious concerns in regard to the potential impact of the traffic generated from the proposal. Harbour Rd is seriously compromised already due to high volumes of traffic as it is the main access road to the 3 schools in the area. The planning department refused permission on the grounds of loss of amenities due to the scale and massing of the development and also that the development would not provide a suitable mix of housing types as it proposed only apartments. The developer appealed the Council's decision in October. Bord Pleanala granted permission in September 2018 stating the development would integrate with the surrounding streetscape, would not impact adversely on the protected structures in the vicinity and would adequately protect the residential amenities of the area.

CASTLEPARK SCHOOL: In June 2017 an application for 50 units in 8 blocks of three and four floors over an underground carpark for 80 cars in the grounds of Castlepark School was lodged. The proposal is located amongst the wooded area necessitating the removal of 53% of the trees. Access is via the entrance gate to the school, but construction traffic is to be routed through Castle Close and out through Castlelands. This new access point to the site was proposed to remain a pedestrian and cyclist access after the development was completed. Castle Close is a cul-de-sac and these proposals caused serious concerns to the residents. There were other concerns relating to the scale of the development, its proximity to the Protected Structure Castlepark School, the loss of the woodland area and traffic issues in an area that already has severe congestion with traffic generated by the school. The removal of vast quantities of granite (10,000 sq. mts) from the site is also a concern.

The Planning Department refused permission in July 2017 on the grounds of excessive scale and massing, uniformity in design, its undue prominence in the area which would detract from both the Protected Structure of the School and also the adjacent residential areas. It would also seriously injure the visual and residential amenities of No 5 Castle Close due to its proximity and height on rising ground and the loss of the woodland area at this part of the site.

The decision was appealed in September 2017. Bord Pleanála upheld the appeal in April 2018 and granted permission for the development with some alterations to the block adjacent to 5 Castle Close to lessen its impact. The Bord did not agree with Dun Laoghaire Rathdown's planning department and took the opposing view that the development would not be injurious to the amenities of the area, or have a detrimental effect to either the setting of the school or to the residential housing adjacent to the development.

The only course of action possible for the local community to try to stop the development was a Judicial Review against the ABP decision to grant permission. Ann-Maria and Denis Lucey (the applicants) hired a legal team to investigate whether there were grounds for a judicial review and they found a number of grounds on which to apply.

In July, Judge Seamus Noonan in the High Court granted leave for the Judicial Review to go ahead. Shortly afterwards the Developer succeeded in having the case put into the Commercial High Court.

The hearing was set for minimum of four days in the High Court and commenced on December 11th 2018; however, the applicants were advised that the hearing would possibly

be longer (five to seven days) due to the amount of material involved. Judge Michael Twomey interrupted proceedings and advised the applicants of the high costs of the Commercial High Court (Approx. € 100k a day) and advised the parties to come to an agreement. The applicants heeded the advice and the proceedings were struck out with no order but with concessions:

- 1) The Developer has to nominate a representative to liaise with a nominee of the applicants on the construction of the proposed development.
 - 2) The Developer would make a significant contribution to the legal costs.
- 3) The Developer would plant double layers of mature trees along the boundary of Castle Close.
 - 4) There shall be no construction traffic access through Castle Close, Dalkey.
- 5) Future access through Castle Close, Dalkey to the proposed development shall be limited to pedestrian/cyclists.

The full planning permission granted to the Developer remains subject to the conditions requested by An Bord Pleanála and also to this additional new agreement. Light construction traffic will enter the site by the castellated School entrance on Castlepark Rd and heavy-duty construction traffic will enter by Hyde Rd.

34 BARNHILL ROAD: An application for the demolition of the existing motor service/sales garage and the construction of 10 duplex units and a 1-bedroom apartment and the refurbishment of 2 existing town houses was lodged in August 2017. We had concerns about the density and height of the development and the potential for overlooking and overshadowing adjacent properties. Other concerns were the lack of both adequate private and public open space, lack of parking provision, and traffic issues along Barnhill Rd. The planning department concurred with our concerns and refused permission in October 2017.

In May 2018 a new application was lodged for a terraced three storey block containing 7 units and the refurbishment of the former forge building to provide 2 townhouses.

It was refused permission in July on the grounds of inadequate public and private open space and that the scale and design of the terrace was overbearing, would overshadow and overlook adjacent properties and therefore did not protect the residential amenities of the area. The developer appealed the decision.

In March of this year Bord Pleanála refused permission for the development stating the proposal was not an appropriate design for the area and that it did not justify the demolition of the former forge and school house; the Bord agreed with the County Council that it would damage the amenities of the adjacent properties and that there would be inadequate open space for the future residents.

REDAN HOUSE: In August 2017 an application was lodged for the demolition of Redan House and the construction of a terrace of 3 x 2-bedroom houses. We had serious concerns about the demolition of Redan as it is the last vernacular farm house remaining in Dalkey. We were also concerned about the height and scale of the proposal as it would cause overshadowing and overlooking of adjacent properties. The flat roofed design is inappropriate at this site as it would intrude into the adjacent Killiney Hill Park. Car parking provision and construction management details were also inadequate. Ardbrugh Rd

is presently the site of many new builds and its character is being radically changed by the building of very large houses that are intruding into the views from Killiney Hill Park with a loss of visual amenities for the public. The Planning Department agreed with our assessment of the application and refused permission in October 2017. The developer appealed the decision the following November. In November 2018 Bord Pleanála granted permission for the development disagreeing with both our and the County Council's assessment of the development.

THE FORMER DALKEY LODGE NURSING HOME: An application was lodged in August 2018 for the demolition of the nursing home on Ard Brugh Rd and the construction of 15 two and three storey houses in 2 terraces. We were concerned that the development would overshadow and overlook neighbouring houses. No open space was provided for the development and there were other concerns regarding traffic in the area. The Council refused permission in September on the grounds of insufficient reasons to demolish a nursing home and the lack of open space provided for the development.

The developer appealed the decision in October 2018; we are yet to hear Bord Pleanala's decision.

SUNNYSIDE, VICO ROAD: An application for the demolition of this house on the Vico Rd was lodged in March 2018. We had concerns that its removal would alter the character of this area. We are also concerned that no adequately reasoned submission for its refurbishment as opposed to demolition was submitted. We also had significant concerns about the management of the construction phase of the development and the consequent disruption to the public travelling along the Vico Rd. However, the planning department granted permission in August. This decision was appealed by neighbouring residents and ourselves; Bord Pleanala granted permission in December 2018 for the demolition of the house and the construction of a large 5 bedroom house of 582 sq.m. (Approximately 6,000 sq.).

MAPLE TREE HOUSE & YONDER: In October 2018 an application was lodged for the demolition of Maple Tree House and the construction of 19 apartments and 7 two and three storey houses on this site which also incorporates the adjacent site at Yonder on Ulverton Rd. Access to 6 apartments is proposed off Ulverton Rd and the remaining 20 units are to be accessed off Harbour Rd.

Our main concerns are about the massing and scale of the development, the removal of the majority of the trees and difficulty for access along the narrow lane connecting the lower development to Harbour Rd which is already compromised.

The planning department refused permission in November upholding our concerns and those of the neighbouring residents. The decision was appealed in December by the developer Bartra. No decision has yet been made.

RICHMOND (CASTLEPARK RD): An application for the demolition of Richmond and the construction of 14 apartments and 10 three-storey houses was lodged in April of this year. We have concerns about the scale of the development and the height and massing of the 4- storey apartment block. There are concerns about overlooking from both the apartments and the houses into neighbouring properties. There appears to be very little open space for the development. Over 95% of the trees are to be removed on this large site

that is an important ecological area for the neighbourhood. A new access road is to be provided at this already challenged part of Castlepark Rd; a sketchy traffic report states that this development will not impact the traffic on this busy access road to Dalkey and its schools.

In regard to planning applications, I should like to stress to everyone, the importance of vigilance in respect of site notices. If one appears in your neighbourhood, it is important that you find the time to inspect the relevant plans for the particular application in the Planning Office in County Hall, Dún Laoghaire if you believe the proposal will affect your property; alternatively view it on-line on the County Council's website.

The applicant must lodge the plans with the Planning Department of the County Council within 14 days of displaying the site notice. Following the lodgement of plans in the Planning Office, the public has 35 days to submit their observations and objections, accompanied with a 20-euro fee. If you believe you will be affected, it is vital that you write into the planning department to voice your concerns.

The planning authority will then make their decision. Following the decision, the public has 28 days to appeal to Bord Pleanála if they had previously submitted the relevant objection to the planning department. The fee for this is ≤ 210 . Following the lodgement of an appeal with An Bord Pleanála, the public has 28 days to submit their observations, the fee being ≤ 50 in this case.

Some classes also entered the national Water Poster Competition which



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THE AMAZING SWIFT

Swifts are the most amazing birds: they are Ireland's fastest flying bird, they eat and drink on the wing, they sleep on the wing and they even mate on the wing. They land only at their nest site to raise their young. Because they have evolved to be the ultimate 'flying machine' you won't see these birds perched on branches or roofs.

One of the most extraordinary facts about this unique bird is that when a chick leaves the nest it will fly non-stop for up to 3 years, only making its first landing when it has found its very own nest site here in Ireland. During those 3 years it will have migrated between Ireland and Africa three times.

The time Swifts spend in Ireland, from May until September each year, is extremely important to their long-term survival because they come here to raise their young. They nest almost exclusively in buildings in our towns and are a major part of our urban biodiversity. Because their nest is hidden from view and because they do not leave any mess or droppings underneath their nest site we often do not realise in which buildings their nests are located.

This reliance on our buildings for their nest sites has regrettably led to a serious decline in the Swift numbers in Ireland. This is because when we renovate or demolish old town buildings with Swift nest sites we can unintentionally destroy those nest sites or block off the entrance holes to the nest.

The decline of the numbers in Ireland has been around 45%. But, all is not doom and gloom because, through the enthusiasm of many communities nation-wide who are setting up nest box projects, the trend is being reversed and Swift numbers are gradually recovering.

Local girl Trish O'Leary met Lynda Huxley of Swift Conservation Ireland when she travelled to Israel last year for a Swift Conference. Trish has been interested in Swifts for a long time. She has nesting boxes on her house and has tracked the Swift behaviour patterns in the town. She has lobbied local organisations to become involved with the Swifts and play a part in their conservation. Dalkey Tidy Towns has joined the group of communities that will be helping the Swift by providing nest boxes and by carrying out nest site surveys. They have invited Lynda Huxley of Swift Conservation Ireland to give a talk on "The Amazing Swift" 11th June at 7.30pm in the Heritage Centre along with a Swift survey training session.

Because of their aerial existence, it may take the Swifts a few years to locate the nest boxes but to help in this process an attraction call system has been installed next to the boxes.



Incredibly Trish spotted a pair of Swifts near her home on Thursday 9th May and hopefully they are returning to their nesting box for the summer.

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❖ DALKEY WW2 SECRET FINALLY REVEALED OVER 70 YEARS LATER ❖

One thing just led to another! Our story began in 2015 in nearby Sorrento Park. While carrying out maintenance work there, Dalkey Tidy Towns (DTT) were surprised to uncover some red bricks! Further investigations with Dr. Michael Kennedy RIA, author of Guarding Neutral Ireland, revealed that WW2 Look Out Post No.7 was located here from 1939 to 1945. The red bricks formed part of their Post. Further research revealed the names and considerable detail on the Irish Defence Forces CoastWatchers' Service men stationed here at that time. DLRCC, working closely with DTT, landscaped the summit area as a beautiful viewing site and installed seating. We thank DLRCC for creating with us something very special.

In October 2018, a past resident contacted DTT, Orla de Cogan. She had an old Irish Air Corps reconnaissance photo. We could see the remains of some stone formation buried at Hawk Cliff. We again contacted our mentor and historian, Dr. Michael Kennedy. Were these the remains of a long-lost EIRE sign below the surface?

What followed over a six-month period was the lifting and cleaning of an estimated 100 tons of stones laid out in trenches in the precise shape of EIRE. Over 60 volunteers committed 1,692 hrs. to the project. Once cleaned, each stone was replaced and coated with four tons of a special Roadstone Flo Mix to bind the stones. Lifted by hand in rotas of seven wheelbarrows by a further 35 volunteers during a two-day blitz in April, this Flo Mix was carried from the Vico Road down the narrow path to the Hawk Cliff site. Once in place and dried, Sika Ireland Ltd provided 170 litres of high-grade white masonry paint to finish the WW2 restoration. Over a period of one month, 48 volunteers completed the painting. Finally, having removed 8 sacks of litter and household rubbish, DTT rebuilt the old picnic table and benches on site for the public to enjoy and planted a wide area with Irish Wildflowers.

Of the original **83** EIRE signs located around the Republic of Ireland's coastline, sadly, less than **6** have been fully restored. Featured on RTÉ's Nationwide and RTÉ News and in *The Irish Times*, our totally forgotten Hawk Cliff EIRE sign is now clearly visible from both the sky above and sea beyond. DTT have already had site meetings with the Military Archives section of the Defence Forces on planning a dedication ceremony. Details will be announced as soon as possible. A very special Thank You to our DTT Volunteers, Roadstone, SIKA, AIB, US Bancorp, Salesforce and Hedderman Financial Solutions, for all their help and support.

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PUBLICATIONS

'Dublin Since 1922' by Tim Carey

Published by the Mercier Press, Ireland's Oldest Independent Publishing House.

This fascinating and well produced book, divided into a series of chapters spanning the decades, provides the reader with a unique and fascinating history of Dublin City between 1922 and 2008 looking at events and personalities that shaped the city during this period.

Opening with the chapter '1922 - A Capital Once Again', author Tim Carey provides the reader with a selection of events that occurred that year which commenced with the handing over of Dublin Castle to the Provisional Government on January 16th followed by the hoisting of the national flag in Beggar's Bush Barracks on January 31st which became the headquarters of the new National Army; the seizure on April 14th of the Four Courts by Republicans; the shelling of the Four Courts by the National Army on June 28th which marked the commencement of the Civil War (1922-23) which figures largely in the remainder of this chapter which concludes with the departure of the last British troops in Ireland from Dublin Port on December 17th.

Excellently illustrated subsequent chapters cover - '1923 to 1929 - Consolidation'; '1930 to 1939 - Housing, the Church and Traffic'; '1940 to 1949 - From War to Republic'; '1950 to 1963 - A Conservative City with a Rebellious Steak'; '1964 to 1979 - Lurching Towards Modernity'; '1980 to 1993 - A Time of Shadow of Light'; concluding with '1994 to 2008 - Celtic Tiger Capital', all of which provide the reader with a fascinating insight to events and personality that shaped the city and impacted on the lives of citizens

The great strength and fascination of this book is that author Tim Carey also includes a host of lesser known details about the city during this period supported with some really great illustrations relating to the periods covered in the text

Another great strength of this remarkable book is that the source for every item mentioned is cited in the Endnotes making it possible for the reader to find out more information about them.

Running to over 300 pages, this is a unique reference book covering aspects of Dublin's history during the 20th century in words and images which anyone interested in the history of Dublin much have and add to their library such is the wealth of excellent information contained in it.

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Q. I have been diagnosed with high blood pressure and my doctor is talking about starting me on tablets for this but first he would like me to try lifestyle changes – can you give me some advice?

A. Normal blood pressure readings are usually 120 (systolic) over 80 (diastolic). If these readings are 140/90 or higher it is diagnosed as High Blood

Pressure or Hypertension. Blood pressure is measured in two numbers: the first number (systolic) records blood pressure when the pressure is at its highest (when the heart muscle squeezes out blood), and the second number (diastolic) is when the heart relaxes and allows blood to flow back into the heart.

High Blood Pressure has no symptoms and is a major risk factor



for heart disease and stroke. The higher the blood pressure, the greater the risk. There is often no single cause for high blood pressure and it tends to run in families. It also increases as we get older so it is important to have it checked regularly to monitor for any increase in readings. Your GP may suggest a 24 hour blood pressure monitor which you wear for 24 hours and gives a more accurate overall picture.

There are certain lifestyle changes that can help to reduce blood pressure and if this is not sufficient then blood pressure lowering medication is used. These steps are:

Know your blood pressure reading: This is the best way to stay on top of your own health and to have it checked regularly by a GP or Pharmacist

Aim for a healthy weight: Even losing 10% of any excess weight you may be carrying can lower blood pressure

Eat less salt and processed food: Salt increases your blood pressure so try to reduce or cut out its intake, while processed food contains a lot of hidden salt. Add more vegetables, fruit and wholegrain cereals to your diet.

Drink less alcohol: drinking alcohol can increase your blood pressure and may cause damage to the liver and heart.

Be more active: at least 30 minutes of moderate activity 5 times per week

Avoid other risk factors for heart disease: Smoking, high cholesterol and diabetes

If you are prescribed tablets for blood pressure it is important to take them as directed. These tablets lower blood pressure and prevent early ageing of blood vessels and reduce the risk of stroke and you are normally on them for life. In general they have very few side effects but if they don't suit you there are many other options for the doctor to switch you over to. Always talk to your doctor first before stopping them.
