Summary of the DCC Monthly Meeting held on Monday 9th Sept 2019 in OLH.

Treasurer: It was agreed by the members to give a donation towards the Bulloch Harbour Judicial Review. Individual donations from the public are still being accepted.

TT: The DTT teams have been working hard all during the summer. The results of the DLR Tidy Districts Competition will be out shortly and the National TT Competition results will be announced at the end of September. Appreciation is due to Terry Wheatley for organising the cobble lock pathway that has been completed at the rear of Our Lady's Hall.

Sport: The U11 Rugby team met BoI Chief Executive Francesca McDonagh and 3 Leinster Squad players, Caelan Doris, Rory O'Loughlin and Max Deegan in a community event to celebrate their achievement as All Ireland Champions in the local BoI branch.

NW: Garda Ailbhe reported that the summer was relatively quiet with no major incidents to report. The crime trend for the month of August was down on last year. DCC regrets the retirement of Supt. Martin Fitzgerald. He was always ready to respond to DCC's requests and meet council members on a regular basis. DCC wishes him well and hopes that our good relationship with senior Garda management will continue.

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FOLKLORE CORNER - HAUNTINGS



With Halloween coming it is important to know the places to go - or avoid depending on your disposition - for ghosts and hauntings. Many of the stories recorded by the students of Harold Boys and Loreto Convent in the 1930s for the Folklore Commission concern the ghosts of Dalkey. Barnhill Road features heavily.

Patrick Fox, 7th Standard, was told the following ghost story by Mrs Fox, 5, St. Patricks Avenue. He recorded her age as fifty three years. The story went as follows:-

"There is a very old story attached to the Barnhill Road. A very long time ago a man was watching the top of Barnhill Road because it was being repaired. He thought he heard the noise of horses running but on looking around he saw a coach being drawn by four horses. He got a red lamp and waved at the driver to stop but it disappeared at the watch-box. The watchman said the next morning that he saw the ghost of a man. The reason of the ghost is that one night a man was walking up the road when a coach came and killed him. The ghost is said to appear still. The people that live up near the spot very seldom go out after eleven o'clock in the night. The watch man died shortly after. His name was Mr O'Neill and he lived in Dublin."

Barnhill Road and horses also featured in a story told to Eddie Cahill by Mr Hammond, age 60, of Tubbermore Road, Co. Dublin:-

"Long ago before there were any taps the people had to get their water in the many wells in Dalkey. One night a woman went to the well on Barnhill Rd. to get water for the morning. The night was very dark and the woman began to get nervous. Suddenly she heard the noise of horses and a coach. The coach came alongside and to the woman's horror the horses had no heads. The woman ran home. She had to stay in bed for a week."

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A Wheatear on Tory Island taking a break from a very long migration

A friend took a lovely photo of a Wheatear with his phone as it perched on the wall at Coliemore Harbour in early September. He was surprised he could get so close to it and wondered were they usually so indifferent to humans. I didn't think so but I did speculate that some of the wheatears that pass through here on their return migration to Africa may actually have been nesting in Greenland and may never have been in contact with people. Wheatears that breed in Greenland and even farther north in Arctic Canada are the same species as Irish Wheatears but are of the subspecies *leucorhoa*. They're larger than our Irish breeding wheatears but you'd need better identification skills than mine to confidentially identify them. *Collins Bird Guide* says these particular birds are 'among the world's real long distance migrants (moreover cross wide oceans, estimated to involve 2,400km non-stop flights in 30 hours)'.

Wheatears are usually the first passerine migrant to arrive in the spring, often appearing on coastlines in early March and I used to be puzzled by seeing individuals, evidently new arrivals, on Dalkey Island as late as June. Dick Coombes of Birdwatch told me these were almost certainly birds of the *leucorhoa* subspecies heading farther north whose breeding grounds would only be warming up in early summer.

We'd seen a few Wheatears the weekend before on Tory Island off the north- west coast of Donegal. Like the Dalkey bird they looked remarkably fresh and pristine and were very conspicuous in the almost totally treeless landscape.

The forecast for the weekend we were going to Tory Island predicted gale force winds and since it's a 9 mile, 45 minute ferry crossing over North Atlantic seas to get there I wouldn't have been too disappointed if the ferry had been cancelled. It wasn't and although earlier sailings had been postponed it was due to low tides not rough seas. The sun was shining when we did eventually set off for the 4.30 sailing. It was fascinating watching an island inhabitant returning home with a trailer full of new bedroom furniture which was lifted down to the deck. Most of us wouldn't be bringing our shopping home by boat and it gave a foretaste of how different life is for the approximately 140 residents of the island. Was a bit wary of another returning inhabitant who had a rifle leaning against the harbour wall beside him but he turned out to be a very friendly chap who said he never shot for sport but was planning on culling some of the rabbits who have reached huge proportions and are destroying a lot of the land surface. He told us numbers of Basking Sharks had been seen around the island earlier in the summer but sadly they'd departed.

A bit choppy in the bay as we set off and by the time we reached open sea the ferry was

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crashing through the waves with water flooding over the deck and a crewman cheerfully distributing sick bags to the passengers. Thankfully I didn't need one but was very glad to disembark when we reached the island.

Tory rises to high cliffs at one end which are home to big colonies of seabirds as well as Chough and Peregrine and it's also one of the last strongholds of Corncrake although sadly the number of male birds calling is only in single figures. We were too late in the year for them and the windy weather didn't help but for a few sunny hours on Sunday morning we had a walk to the flat west side of the island and that's when we saw the wheatears.

Later we attempted to walk to the steep end of the island but heavy rain forced us to take shelter against the wall of a house. We were rescued by a very friendly lady driver who offered us a lift back to the hotel. She told us she was one of the five teachers at the secondary school which had six pupils.

Our return journey the following Monday didn't look promising. We woke to a rain splattered window, the wind blew and outside the harbour foam-tipped waves crashed against the breakwater and a mighty swell under a angry sky had us a bit apprehensive. It was a far cry from most people's usual Monday morning commute. The few locals travelling positioned themselves outside flat against the cabin wall at the back of the ship and didn't move from there for the 45 minute crossing but it was actually a very exhilarating experience due in no small part to our companion outriders.

Gannets flew alongside us close enough to see their beautiful blue eyes some occasionally plunging into the sea though it seemed almost incomprehensible that they could spot a fish under the churning foam. Shearwaters crested the waves, their long thin wings outstretched as they tipped from side to side alternating their dark wings and back with flashes of snow white undersides. Great Shearwaters had been spotted from Tory in preceding weeks but I couldn't get a good enough look at these birds and they may well have been the more common Manx Shearwaters which can be seen off Dalkey's coast.

But the most impressive birds accompanying our vessel were undoubtedly Fulmars. Used to seeing them gliding effortlessly out of the cliffs at White Rock, drifting in gentle wide circles, here they were in their perfect element, skimming over a raging sea. They would glide past the boat which itself was fairly moving along then they'd double back and scan a

wings riding the thermals occasionally dipping a wingtip to within inches of the waves as they scanned the water. Fulmars are surface feeders and their spectacular breeding range expansion in the last century is usually credited to their habit of following whaling ships and trawlers, feeding on the discarded offal, so they may have associated the ferry with a fishing boat.

Our own breeding fulmars in Dalkey were last surveyed by Birdwatch Ireland in 2001 when they found 6 pairs of potentially breeding birds though I'm inclined to think there haven't been as many in recent years.

LOCAL PROPERTY TAX

Just to let you know Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council voted 21/13 on Monday 09th September to maintain the full 15% reduction in the Local Property Tax (LPT) for 2020. The meeting heard that 116 submissions were made during the public consultation process. Over 93% of submissions favoured maintaining the full 15% reduction in the LPT. Council management proposed an increase of 5% in the LPT rate to meet expenditure shortfalls incurred from government policy on Irish Water and the transfer of Dún Laoghaire Harbour to the council, amongst other issues.

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Can we turn down the lights in Dalkey? They are too bright and bad for our health.

Anybody miss the antique style amber toned street lights? Most of these have now been replaced with bright LED white lights. Overleaf is an iconic Dalkey photo taken by John Fahy in Christmas 2010 and above a selection of recent photos of the town.

Dalkey is a Heritage Town and the public lighting guidelines from DLRCC state that "Most of our villages have decorative lights to highlight their heritage and unique identities." The beautiful nostalgic antique amber lighting had always been a feature of the town and now these are vanishing rapidly. Apart from the aesthetics and beauty of amber toned lights, research has shown that excessive night-time lights disrupt our body clocks and raise the risks of cancer, diabetes and depression. The American Medical Association (AMA) has warned of health and safety problems from 'white' LED streetlights and has adopted an official policy statement about street lighting: cool it and dim it. According to the AMA, one of the considerations of lighting the night is its impact on human health. In the case of white LED light, it is estimated to be five times more effective at suppressing melatonin at night than the high pressure sodium lamps (given the same light output) which have been the mainstay of street lighting for decades. Melatonin suppression is a marker of circadian disruption, which includes disrupted sleep. Bright electric lighting can also adversely affect

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wildlife by, for example, disturbing migratory patterns of birds and some aquatic animals which nest on shore. Solutions include using lower intensity lights, turning lights off when people leave an area, and *choosing LED lights that are amber instead of blue or violet*, since these tend to be the most harmful to animals and humans, experts say. Can we turn down the lights again in Dalkey?

With top place awarded to Dalkey in both 2017 and 2018, this year we were just pipped in to second



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
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BULLOCH HARBOUR JUDICIAL REVIEW

Members of Bullock Harbour Preservation Association attended the High Court on Wednesday 21st August 2019 to hear Mr. Justice McDonald receive our application for a Judicial Review of An Bord Pleanála's decision to grant planning permission for Bartra's proposed "development" at Bullock. Being the summer vacation period, Mr. Justice McDonald adjourned the proceedings (as anticipated) and the full application will be heard on 14th October 2019. If that hearing gives us leave to pursue the Judicial Review, we would expect that by November we will be given a date in 2020 for the actual Judicial Review.

Continuing thanks is due to all those who have given the moral and financial support that has enabled BHPA to initiate this legal action. We will keep you posted on significant developments and a Public Meeting will be held on Wednesday 23rd October in Fitzpatrick's Castle Killiney at 8pm to explain the Judicial Review process and the case being pursued. We will also discuss further fundraising proposals to finance the legal costs involved. The campaign will incur major costs and we need to raise very significant amounts over the coming months, through direct donations, patronage and fundraising events. To this end we are looking for volunteers to give practical help in many different ways including: Finding locations to erect posters and delivering flyers door-to-door outside the immediate Dalkey area. The Doctor's Fees

At the September 10th 1919 meeting of the Rathdown Board of Guardians which administered the public health service in Killiney and Dalkey, Relieving Officer Mr. Quin reported that Dr. King. Dalkey, would not accept the position of locum tenens for less than £7. 7s. per week, the scale recommended by the Irish Medical Association. The Local Government Board only paid £4. 1s. per week. It was reported that Dr. Lynch would not act as locum tenens for Killiney for less than the IMA fee. Mr. Quin was directed to find a doctor.

'No Way Out - The Irish in Wartime France 1939 -1945' by Isadore Ryan, published by Mercier Press, Ireland's oldest independent publishing house.

In the aftermath of the May 1940 German invasion of France, the surrender of that country a month later, and its subsequent division into the Occupied Zone and that administered by the pro-Germany Vichy regime, about 2000 Irish people suddenly found themselves trapped in France with no-way out and to endure four years of great privation, hardship, and struggle to survive as work, food, and money became extremely scare and resorted to keeping their heads down so as not to come to the attention of the authorities as there was little that Irish diplomats based in France could do for them.

The great threat to these trapped Irish people were the French authorities who initially did not understand the difference between Irish and British citizens and were detained in detention camps as British citizens due to fact that they spoke English. However over time Irish diplomats managed to obtain the release of many of those Irish citizens held in detention camps and to acquaint the French authorities with the difference between Irish and British citizens but often Irish citizens who held British passports were not released as they were considered British in the eyes of the French authorities.

In the early period of the Occupation, Irish diplomats were a little liberal in issuing Irish passports to those who sought them but this soon ceased on the instruction of the Department of External Affairs in Dublin which set down strict criteria for the issuing and renewal of Irish passports. Limited financial resources meant that very little way of financial assistance could be provided to those suffering hardship and even where funds could be sent from relatives in Ireland, the Department of Finance imposed strict limits on the amounts of funds that could be sent overseas.

So between 1940 and 1944 Irish citizens trapped in France kept a low profile, never

drawing attention to themselves by the French and German authorities and endured great hardship until the Liberation of Paris on August 25th 1944 and its surrender to the Allies and even then their struggles were not over. Some Irish citizens were arrested in the round-ups of those suspected of collaborating with the Germans but in the majority of cases these were dismissed or no further action taken in the case of others.

This remarkable book concludes with a chapter revealing what happened in the post-war years to many of those featured in it.

Oh! How Television (and Radio) has changed over the years . . .

Satellite operators often move channels to different frequencies and change some parameters. In the vast majority of cases satellite receivers have to be manually re-tuned to receive the channels that are missing, (Freesat and Sky satellite receivers do this automatically).

Recently the very popular channel QUEST (which shows documentaries) moved and requires a re-tune to receive the channel again. For those who want to re-tune this channel here are the details you will need: frequency 11426 / SR 29500 / polarity V / and FEC 5/6.

A word of caution, if you are unsure do not re-tune, as you may end up losing channels.

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
