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
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NATURE CORNER

Back at the end of October. on the first day of the clocks going back, I was consciously staying outside in the garden to make the most of the abruptly shortened daylight. The clock change tends to throw you into the winter overnight but that particular evening, as the

light began to fade, I had a most unexpected surprise from the natural world. I heard a bird singing that I'd never expect to hear before late February at the earliest. A Blackbird was piping out a lovely soft melody, a song that's ubiquitous during spring and early summer but here it was singing at the beginning of winter. I didn't totally believe my ears so looked hard to spot it in the gloom and eventually saw it, singing from a neighbour's cherry tree, his pitch black plumage surrounded by the amber and orange colours of the autumnal leaves. He came into my garden and continued singing for the next two weeks, singing at dusk.

Why was a bird that should begin singing as spring starts be singing as we're about to enter winter? Since so much of bird's behaviour is determined by day length rather than weather it's probable that a day in late October would be around the same length as a day in March which might have triggered it to declare his territory. Probably a total waste of time for him but it gave a lovely hint of spring time to come when the dark days have passed. It is recommended that nest boxes be cleaned out of old nest material. This is to prevent parasites breeding in them as these might infest new born chicks next time it is occupied. Another reason to empty the box is so a bird prospecting for a nest doesn't think another bird is already nesting in it.

I'd left it too late to empty my Blue Tit nest box last winter and it was occupied earlier than usual in the year so it never got cleaned out. I was determined to clean it out this time so, as I was bringing in a step ladder from the garden late one afternoon, I thought, now is as good a time as any so I went up the ladder and loosened the wire that secures the lid. Sure enough, a healthy white maggot was waving about on the top of the box so I evicted it then stretched up to look into the box. There's always a bit of apprehension opening a nest box in case you find dead chicks in it but looking up at me was a very live Blue Tit, sitting on top of an old nest. It didn't seem alarmed and didn't attempt to fly away and I closed and secured the lid.

Lucy had seen one flying out one morning so evidently they're using the box for a winter

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night time roost. I wondered should I remove the nest material earlier on the following day but decided to leave it until later in the winter. I

know I wouldn't be too happy if I came home and found someone had thrown my bed away!

One of my local wildlife highlights of the year was at the end of March when we saw a flock of Crossbills on top of Monterey Pines on Dalkey Hill. Although regular visitors to the hill, usually they're notoriously difficult to see, often landing high on the conifers and blending in very well so getting a good view of a little flock of red males and green females, perched on the very top of a tree bathed in the rays of the rising sun was a real treat.

Another highlight of the year was when, coming out of the Lidl store car park in Bray one gloomy night, Lucy spotted, flying along the adjoining avenue, a Long-eared Owl. It was flitting along the street lights, perching on top of them and scanning the ground underneath for prey.

Our low point on the hill was last year's winter being the first we didn't see any red squirrels. It's almost 18 months since we've seen any in the park and, as far as I know,

nobody else has seen any. It was almost inevitable that once the grey squirrel reached Dalkey and Killinev Hills in 2005 the reds would gradually die out but it's still a very sad loss. Providing flowers, plants and trees for pollinating insects has became high on many agendas which is very heartening. I discovered this year in my own garden that

Cotoneaster Horizontalis, the very common shrub with fishbone-shaped branches that produces masses of red berries in winter, is a magnet for honey bees and bumblebees when it flowers. Perhaps it was the year that was in it but in spring it was positively humming with bees and drew spectacular numbers of them for months. Cotoneaster can spread around gardens (a testament to its attraction to birds who have eaten the berries then pass them through their system) and can be a bit invasive, often seeding in walls and I'd intended to pull up a few in my garden last winter but subsequently when I witnessed all the insects on it, I was delighted I had left them alone.

You would imagine a plant classified as a 'noxious weed', one that can result in farmers being fined for letting it grow on their land, due to its potential to fatally poison horses and farm animals that eat it, would be an undesirable addition anywhere. I knew the leaves of Ragwort was essential as a plant food for the larvae of Cinnabar moths but it was only this year I discovered its flowers are a brilliant food source for butterflies, bees, hoverflies and many other insects. It is actually listed as one of the top ten pollinating plants, attracting up to 200 species of invertebrates, and is one of the flowers most frequently visited by butterflies.

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RATHDOWN SCHOOL – CENTENARY CELEBRATION

The history of Rathdown School is really the history of five schools, Hillcourt (Upper Glenageary Road), the Hall (Belgrave Square, Monkstown) and Park House (Morehampton Road, Donnybrook) came together in 1973 to form Rathdown, and in 1987 a fourth school, Glengara Park (Lower Glenageary Road), also amalgamated with Rathdown School. All these histories converge at our beautiful Glenageary campus. We are celebrating 100 years of education here at the Rathdown School campus in 2019. Hillcourt School, one of the four schools which amalgamated to form Rathdown School, opened as a school in 1919 in the building now known as Hillcourt House. In 1919 Mr. Wilfred P. Toone founded Hillcourt, to educate the sisters of boys attending Castle Park School which he founded sixteen years earlier. Mr. Toone persuaded two sisters, Gladys and Phyllis Palmer to leave Cheltenham Ladies' College and come to Dublin to run

Hillcourt School. Seaview, the home of the Synnott family on Upper Glenageary Road was purchased and the name changed to Hillcourt. The Palmer sisters opened the school in May 1919 with 33 boarding pupils who filled Hillcourt to capacity. Miss Mew was appointed Headmistress of Hillcourt School in 1972 with 82 pupils aged 8 to 17 years old. Almost all the teaching took place in Hillcourt House. The B.S.R. (Big School Room) hosted

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the entire school for assemblies. In 1973 it was agreed that The Hall School in Monkstown and Park House School in Donnybrook would amalgamate with Hillcourt School to become Rathdown School with 500 pupils across three sites. Gradually Rathdown School took shape on the Glenageary site and in 1987 Glengara Park joined as the fourth member of the amalgamation. Rathdown School continues to the present day providing education for girls aged 3 to 18 built on the strong foundations of the original Hillcourt School heritage. Every girl now entering Rathdown School is allocated to a particular House, each of which commemorates one of the original schools.

In 2019 as we celebrate a Century of Education and Community on the grounds of Rathdown School the timing is right to celebrate the wealth of memories, stories and history that have been gathered through the years from each of the schools which brings us to the launch of the Rathdown School Archive Exhibition. It is also fitting that the exhibition was open for the wider community to explore in the wonderful setting of the Lexicon in Dún Laoghaire where the exhibition was on display until the 25th November.

***** LETTER TO THE EDITOR – AUTUMN LEAVES

I wish to report what I consider to be a dangerous and unsightly condition resulting from Autumn Leaves falling and "*not*" being cleared up regularly.

The current position is that a collection of soggy and rotten mess has accumulated around Dalkey Town. Probably the worst example is along Leslie Avenue and Convent Road. Trees growing wild from one property which divide both roads have now shed and the mess has accumulated. Hundreds of children walk up and down these roads every school day. Wet leaves across roads and footpaths are a fall danger risk. Seniors also have to beware! Leaves blow about and clog drains.

Similar situations exist along Coliemore and other roads. Property owners choose to ignore and refuse to accept any responsibility for clearing droppings onto public footpaths and roads so rather than remain one of the silent majority I would respectfully request that DLR take some immediate action and get the mess removed from public areas.

There were at least five wells recorded by the school children of Dalkey for the Folklore Commission in 1936.

Wells played a key role in the daily lives of people – before mains water. Providing the necessary for cooking, washing and drinking. Wells were also a focal point of storytelling and folklore. The most prominent and important of the wells of Dalkey is Lady Cullen's Well or Lady's Well.

Margaret McWilliam, Loreto Dalkey, 5 Sorrento Road, Co. Dublin was told about the Lady's Well by Mr. Quinn of Anastasia Lane. She recorded Mr. Quinn's age as circa 80 – which places him as born in 1856, circa. The stories recall the origin of the name of the well and the names of those associated with it:-

"In the grounds of Carraig-na-Gréine there is a huge rock shaped like a football, along side of which is a well sprung up. Around this rock were built many little cabins in which some very poor people lived.

In the largest of these cabins there dwelt a man named Cullen, who had reared a large family (anc) of sons and daughters. When the family grew up they left their cabin and went to seek their fortunes.

After some time a man named Leslie bought the site from the old people. He built the house 'carraig-na-Greine' and as the little cabins were unsightly, he had them demolished.

After some years one of the Cullen girls came back having made her fortune. She found her parents had gone and their cabin also. To show she still had a right she used to go every day and carry water from the well.

To get rid of her Leslie agreed to pay her a certain amount of money. When her money was finished she came back again in order to obtain more money.

Then Leslie set his men to work and made them dig all around the well. When Miss Cullen came back she found the water had gone and she had no further right, she then went away to make her fortune again. She was then known locally as 'The Lady Cullen'. It is thought this is how it got its name as the lady's well. It is also said there is no religious significan(ce) attached to it.

Then Leslie had the well built where it is at present. On the third skylight from the well in Roman figures are [1828] and this is the year this well was built."

(The Schools' Collection, Volume 0796, Page 061)

Ambrose Dunne, aged 76, also told his grandson, John Dunne, 2 Bartra, Cottages, Sorrento Road, Co. Dublin. 6th Std. Harold Boys Dalkey about the Lady's Well:

"Years ago the people were supplied with water from wells. The poor people had to carry the water themselves and the sick paid for the water to be brought to their houses. There were many wells in Dalkey which are now filled in except one called "Lady's Well' which was recently closed to the Public.

The 'Lady's Well' is situated off the Convent Road near the Convent and was first owned by a family named Cullen. When the owner died it was left to a daughter who was called the 'Lady' by the neighbours. For years the well was known as the Lady Cullen's Well and after a time it became known as the Lady's Well by which it is still known. The Arch leading to the well was built about 150 years ago by a Dalkey stone mason named J Quinn." The Schools' Collection, Volume 0798, Page 9)

Though contradicted by the above, other stories associate the well with a holiness and religious fervour. James Mitchell VIIth Standard recorded the following story from Mrs.



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Mitchell of 4, St. Patrick's Road:

"The Lady's well was a place long ago where the monks used to say mass. In the middle of the cave there is a big iron gate. The iron gate was put there because the monks could escape in time of danger. The gate used to leave you out to the Coal Quay which is beside the sea. The other part of the cave used to go under ground to Cliff Castle Hotel but is blocked up now. The man who looked after the well was Frank Maughan who went religious mad. The sky-lights are the only thing to save you going to the well. On one of the sky-lights are Roman figures. The sky-lights were put in by J. Quinn in 1861."

It is great to see the well in Dillon's Park rediscovered and celebrated by the Tidy Towns Committee in 2016. Surprisingly, the well does not feature in any stories in the 1930 Schools' Collection, though four other wells feature. This may mean the Dillon's Park well is an ancient well, long fallen out of memory or use by the time the students were recording in the 1930s. The Lady Cullen's Well is now bricked up. Is it time to consider taking the bricks down and revealing what religious medals remain and the roman numerals recorded by the students?

◆ DECEMBER, JANUARY IN MY GARDEN Philippa Thomas ◆

We now have limited daylight hours as we approach our shortest day of the year. This, sometimes bitterly cold, crispy Wintery weather can be beautiful and yes, icy cold in equal measures. Maybe, dazzle your friends and neighbours this Christmas and New Year 2020 with a beautiful hall door wreath (twinkling or otherwise), bring

your outside to your special hall door with some seed heads, berries, Rosehips, Chinese lanterns, Agapanthus, Hydrangeas, Boxwood, Pine, Cedar, Yew, Crab apples, Dogwood stems, Pyracantha, fluffy Miscanthus flower heads, Teasel, Birch, Old Man's Beard (Clematis Vitalba) etc., etc. – anything that you fancy and can forage from your garden. Most importantly, spend time with family and friends over these festive weeks. Christmastime can be stressful and intense for some, so an aesthetically appealing garland or candle in a floral arrangement, or winter interesting bark and stems, can create a special

kind of delight and peace - inner peace. If we have a 'White Christmas' remember to shake off ornamental trees and shrubs after enjoying the stunning sight of them. The weight of snow can damage branches and stems. Snow on low plants actually protects them against hard frosts, it acts as a blanket over them and then, provided the ground isn't frozen, there is still time in December and even January, to plant your tulip bulbs and then likewise, let's protect our plants that are vulnerable to these frosts because our year could enter its coldest phase mulch, straw and fleece can be most useful. Perhaps, group potted plants together in a sheltered spot in the garden to protect them from the harshest winter weather ... Now, let's enjoy a vase filled with something like Winter Jasmine (Jasminum Nudifolorum), Winterberry, Holly, Nadina, Mistletoe, Ivy, Dogwood, Rosemary, Frosty Ferns,

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Christmas Rose (Helleborus Niger), Snowberries etc. – nothing helps symbolise and brings the beauty, good cheer and the spirit of Christmas into our houses more than a simple,

generous bunch of flowers in their vase.

Christmas trees lose water through their needles and they push water likewise, out through them when they are dry. Avoid them becoming stressed by not placing them in direct sunlight and dry heat. In order to keep a freshly cut Christmas tree smelling as nice as it does, best to bring it indoors immediately and put in water - your pine's unique scent can ghost through your special allocated room. Remember, it is a plant/ tree and needs to be treated as such so, a pint of fresh water almost daily will help keep it fresh, lush, green and healthy. Now, in this late 2019, most of us are

trying to reduce the amount of plastic we use in our gardens and recycle wherever we can. Gardeners have traditionally used feeds that contain animal products, blood, fish and bone but with the growth of veganism more and more manufacturers are developing natural alternatives that are free from animal derivatives. Natural insecticides are becoming more popular as we gardeners are becoming so much more aware of the effects on wildlife. Pyrethrins are pesticides found naturally in some Chrysanthemum flowers, generally there are six chemicals that are toxic to insects.

Food For Thought:

Conservation organisations/ Buglife are criticising cafés etc. for using wasp traps. Research has shown dramatic declines in insect numbers globally. An expert in London University has said that wasps caught in open areas at the end of the year are workers coming to the end of their lives so killing them does not affect overall populations. Xyletta Disease Hits Olives in France:

A devastating tree bacterial infection has been confirmed in olive trees in France causing a variety of diseases with huge economic impact.

Solution Not Pollution:

Plastic bottles with the bottom cut out - these are great for fitting over individual plants to protect them from snow and ice. Likewise, a clear plastic storage bin will protect a plant while letting light in. Then, you could use your old standard shopping bags over smaller plants, maybe peg them down this will prevent blooms from getting broken or too cold.


Might Do, Maybe December/ January Jobs.

Wisteria, Fruit trees, Roses and Japanese Maples are just some of the plants that benefit from winter pruning.

Raise potted plants off the ground to prevent them becoming waterlogged.

Check Summer-flowering bulbs and tubers that are being stored over Winter. If any show signs of mould or rot remove the affected ones to prevent spreading.

Winter lettuce, Lambs lettuce, Mustard greens, Microgreens can be sown in December. Check houseplants and any plants brought indoors for Winter, for insects that may have



hitched a ride – with heating on they can quickly multiply. Pests can overwinter on plants so keep an eye out for small infestations of red spider mite, greenfly and whitefly as it can soon spread in the future months.

Maybe take pictures before you cut back the last of your perennials so you know where they are in case you want to lift later.

Perhaps, coat your bird table with grease to prevent rats climbing up it.

Having fresh, home-grown herbs at hand is every keen cook's dream. Different herbs prefer different degrees of damp, giving your herbs the occasional feed will help them keep going, especially in a small amount of compost.

Sarah Raven says, without her annuals her garden 'would be an orchestra without its string section'. 'Which' garden magazine November 2019 issue highly suggests Cosmos 'Snow Puff' – a new large fully double variety, showy display of blooms over a long season, semitall with sturdy stems, early Summer into Autumn.

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
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Christmas Greetings from Church of the Assumption, Dalkey.

CHRISTMAS 1966 – WESTPORT

Frank's mother, Blanaid, was a great cook and I especially liked her baking. She wouldn't just bake one cake, like it used to be in our house. No, she had a whole array of biscuit tins stacked up in a pile with a varied selection of meringues, éclairs, coffee walnut cake and any other type of cake when she knew people were coming to the house. So my memory of my first holiday in Frank's family home was one of indulgence. Irish breakfasts were enough to fill you for the day and although everybody got up very late, lunch and dinner were still served at the usual times. Dinner often included massive roasts with all the trimmings and of course the deserts. Come 11 o'clock when RTE had finished and I was ready for my bed, sandwiches were made with pots of tea and the tins were opened. Nobody went to bed before two.

Very early on Blanaid would be talking about the Christmas cake and pudding; it might have been as early as September. I was told of the importance of it, how some would keep their recipe secret, or pass them on from one generation to the other and that the earlier you made them the better the taste. How brandy would help to keep it moist. How some would hang the mixture of the ingredients in a cloth bag first, which Frank said he used to puncture with his finger, when he was a child, to get the lovely taste. I couldn't wait to see the arrival of the pudding on my first Christmas day in Ireland.

The meal was very impressive. I had never seen a whole turkey on any one's table before and then the size of the ham! Everything was lovely, the paper hats from the crackers a bit over the top, but still all fun. At the end the women disappeared to the kitchen to get the long awaited pudding. I wasn't allowed to join them as it would ruin the effect. So I was sitting with the men at the table in great anticipation while I listened to the screeching coming from way down the kitchen. When the door was flung open, I saw Blanaid carrying a plate with a brown heap on it with a blue glow. Everybody was excited with the effect, hands were clapped and glasses raised. While the sisters brought in the bowls of custard and brandy butter. It was all *OH's* and *AH's!* I was aghast, was this it? What was I going to say?

Till this day I can't get excited about the pudding and for some reason, although I follow the tradition and make them myself, people keep giving them to me as well. So I usually have one pushed to the back of the fridge waiting for some sucker to be delighted with the gift.

No Joint Fire Service

In June 1913 the sub-committee of the Kingstown Urban District Council working on to establish joint fire service for the Kingstown, Blackrock, Dalkey and Killiney-Ballybrack townships, reported that the latter three councils had failed to respond and recommended that the project be dropped and recommended to the Kingstown Urban District Council that they upgrade their own fire service by acquiring a motor appliance. When Dun Laoghaire Corporation was established in 1930, Dun Laoghaire Fire Brigade provided fire cover for

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this area until the 1990s when it was absorbed into Dublin Fire Brigade which operates the fire service in the four Dublin local authorities.





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Q. I have been told by the doctor that my runny nose is probably due to allergic rhinitis and has started me on a steroid nasal spray. What can you tell me about it?

A. Allergic rhinitis is inflammation of the inner lining of the nose and is caused by an allergen such as dust or pollen. It typically produces cold like symptoms such as a runny/blocked and itchy nose and sneezing. If it just happens during the summer months to a grass pollen, then it is known as hayfever.

It is caused by your immune system recognising the allergen as harmful and mounting an immune response to this. This causes cells to release chemicals which cause the inside lining of your nose to become swollen and too much mucus to be produced.

While it is almost impossible to avoid potential allergens, you can take steps to reduce exposure to a particular allergen if you know or suspect that it is triggering your allergic rhinitis. This will help improve your symptoms.

Dust mites are the most common allergen and to reduce these you should keep your house as dust free as possible by using wet clothes and mops and using a vacuum cleaner with a more efficient HEPA filter. You should especially concentrate on the rooms where you spend the most time such as the bedroom.

Another common allergen is pet dander so practical solutions are to limit the pet to one room, preferably with no carpet, to wash them every fortnight and to groom them outside. If the condition is mild, you can help to manage the symptoms by taking over-the-counter medications, such as non-sedating antihistamines, and by regularly rinsing your nasal passages with a saline solution to keep your nose free of irritants. Your Pharmacist can advise on all of these.

If you have tried taking these steps and they have not helped then you should see your GP as they may prescribe a stronger medication, such as a nasal spray containing corticosteroids.

Not all cases of rhinitis are caused by an allergic reaction. Some cases are the result of: an infection, such as the common cold, oversensitive blood vessels in the nose, overuse of nasal decongestants (nasal sprays should only be used for a max of 7 days). This type of rhinitis is known as non-allergic rhinitis.
