Volunteers: In addition to our experienced staff, we are very fortunate to have a number of excellent volunteers who, once trained, volunteer half day per week or a full day at busy times. With the increase in employment, there is rarely anyone presenting for Community Employment - the mainstay of how centres such as ours are staffed by government programmes. We greatly appreciate our volunteers!

DLR Spring into Heritage: The first of Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council's heritage programmes will begin with the Spring one on March 9th. This is a highly successful programme of opening up heritage sites in the county with guided visits on set days and times. There is also a series of talks with expert speakers. You can pick up a brochure with all the details in the county libraries or at reception in Dalkey Castle.

Sponsored Living History Tour: The DLR sponsored FREE tour at Dalkey Castle is on everyday at 11.45 am (except Tuesdays). It must be booked in advance as numbers are limited.

The National Schools programme Monday-Friday: This includes a guided tour of Dalkey Castle (built in the 1390s), St Begnet's Church and Graveyard which dates back to 700AD and the state-of-the-art Heritage Centre, brimming with information on interactive screens.

Deilg Inis Theatre Company: One of the many highlights is the costumed actors from Deilg Inis who interact with the students. Led by the in-house guides, the actors cover a Viking Raid, Archery, Cookery and Barber Surgery. The tour brings the defensive features of the medieval Fortified Town House/Castle to active life!

The Murder Hole is activated theatrically and participation by the students is encouraged. The students explore many of the original features which are still intact - including Murder Hole, Machicolation, Warders' Walk, Garderobe, external Battlements and Arrow Loop Windows.

Interactive screens: Stepping even further into history, the interactive, screens in the Heritage Centre trace the origins of Dalkey right back past the Vikings and the Normans. Literary Heritage: Students will also learn some of the vast literary heritage at the Writers' Gallery which features many of the internationally renowned writers and creative artists from Joyce to Bono and Beckett to Maeve Binchy and Marita Conlon-McKenna.

Gardeners are the people who seek to create places of beauty and stillness amidst the hustle and bustle of everyday life.

MIGHT DO / MAYBE MARCH JOBS

Buds burst open as sap moves up through the branches and once this growth begins, the plant is committing to producing new shoots. So by pruning now, you can direct the energy into useful growth.

- 1. Spring bulbs such as snowdrops and daffodils can be moved as they go out of flower and divided to increase the clumps.
- 2. Make sure to water all plants in pots as pots can truly dry out during this month of March. Sometimes too, the worst damage done by slugs and snails can be right now when plants are in tight bud.
- 3. It is important to try and carry out weed control before our weeds take on a surge of growth.
- 4. Groundcover plants that have become untidy, or have spread beyond their boundaries, can be cut back during this period before growth begins.
- 5. If the lower branches of trees have begun to shade neighbouring plants, they might be pruned in order to give a clean trunk and to allow light to reach lower growing plants. Ivy on trees and at the bases of hedges should be cut back before it gains another summers growth. The best way is simply to chop it all out at the base with a spade.
- 6. Try and wrap up the pruning of your roses right now, or A.S.A.P. or flowering will be delayed. Begin by taking out any dead or diseased material and anything that's rubbing onto another stem. You can give your roses the best start now, by feeding them with a specialist rose -fertiliser. They're heavy feeders so it's a good idea to make a note in your calendar to feed them again in midsummer when they're developing their second flush of flowers.
- 7. Show off bamboo if you've got a bamboo with coloured stems, why not show it off to its best advantage? Simply cut off the lower leaves on each stem to reveal the coloured canes beneath. Let's all enjoy the emerging glory of our new foliage!



FOLKLORE CORNER



A story of 'the Firm

One of the more peculiar stories forming part of the National Folklore Collection, and one that intrigued me is about an ice rink off Barnhill Road.

It was recorded by Henry Evans, 5th Standard sometime between 1936 and 1938. He got the story from Mr. Dunne, 1, Seafield Terrace, Coliemore Road, 25 years old, who in turn had got the story from his own father. It is the only reference in the stories recorded by the students of Harold Boys and Loreto that refers to an ice rink in Dalkey. I wondered could it possibly be true.

I had witnessed the sight 2 or 3 years ago in Dalkey Quarry of a father and son in kayaks, in the bottom of the quarry, where a large pond had formed - large enough to kayak in. Having seen that with my own eyes, I believed the story of an ice rink might at least possibly be true – under the right conditions.

I also wondered where the place where the ice-rink - referred to as "the Firm" - might be located – if it existed at all.

Like a lot of folklore the story has concrete facts rooted in time and place; it is evocative of former times while recording a tragedy, and one is left wondering which parts are true:-

"A Story of the "Firm"

About fifty years ago the "Firm' was a large ice skating rink. It is now covered in with ashes and other rubbish.

One day an English lady and her son were skating on the rink. They were so excited they did not notice a wooden board which had the words "Thin ice" printed on it. Suddenly there was a cracking sound and the ice gave away under the two people. They went underneath and did not come up again.

Their brother soon discovered their absence. He went around and asked all the people if they knew where they had gone. A man told him that he saw them going up to the rink. He thanked the man and rushed up to the rink. He searched around it. He found the hole in the ice and found his sister's handbag and this was enough evidence to show that they had gone under.

He spread this bad news to the people of Dalkey. When they heard it they wanted to cover in the rink. The man asked them not to. He promised a large reward to anyone who could find the two bodies. There was a search but nobody found them so the rink was covered in. There was very heavy snow and ice and the ice on the rink was strong and was able to bear people on it. When you are going up to "Firm" you go up Barnhill road until you come to the railway bridge, then turn to the left and you are at the Firm.

In January, I received a kind invite from the Dalkey Local History Group to give a short talk on the material from the Schools Collection. I have never met such an interesting and knowledgeable group regarding Dalkey and its history. I could not resist reading this story to see if the members could help me locating 'the Firm' or confirming its truth or not. The group solved the mystery of the Firm in no time at all, producing the following map which hangs in Dalkey Library:-

The Firm is referred to in F. M. O'Flanagan's 1941 article 'Glimpses of Old Dalkey' in the Dublin Historical Record, Vol. IV. No. 2. The author records 'at the bottom of the Flags on Dalkey Avenue are 15 low pillars to bar vehicular access' and he described that 'going through these pillar...we are now in a place known as "The Firm". He continues 'this curious name had me puzzled for a long time – even the local people had no idea why they called it so; but eventually I ran that to earth too'. sentiment this author can identify He then recorded the with! origin of the name:

"...the old quarry, now a refuse dump at Barnhill was worked by a few men in partnership, called "the Firm" hence "the Firm's Quarry". In the course of time the quarry and the word; quarry' disappeared, but the word "Firm" remains to puzzle the casual inquirer.


Family Day

DALKEY COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS



Dalkey CFRs are responding in the local community for six years now. They comprise of 27 fully trained, local, self-funded volunteers and provide a 24/7 'on call' service, initiating life-saving treatment to critically ill people in the first few minutes prior to the arrival of an Emergency Ambulance. This helps increase the chance of survival for the patient.

The area they cover is Dalkey and its surrounding localities - Glasthule, Glenageary, Killiney, Sallynoggin and Sandycove, roughly around a 2.5km radius of Dalkey.

Responders generally operate in pairs and are an integrated part of the 999/112 National Ambulance Service who alerts them to potentially life-threatening situations such as cardiac arrest, stroke, chest-pain or choking. In 2019 there were 217 such call-outs in this community and in 85% of these calls, Dalkey CFRs were on-scene in these emergency incidents providing both assistance and reassurance to patients and their families at what can be a very traumatic time.

New Volunteers are always welcome! Full training will be provided and a medical background is not necessary. Apart from becoming a Dalkey CFR Responder, there are also many other volunteer roles. These include IT and Website Administration, P.R. and Publicity, Fundraising etc.

For 2020 their aim is to have more portable AEDs (defibrillators) available to the team and also hope to purchase more, and site wall-mounted defibrillators for public access.



DALKEY AND THE SAD FAMINE POT STORY NOW AT ARCHBOLD'S CASTLE

Potato blight was recorded in America in 1843. By 1845, the littleunderstood fungus had reached Flanders, Scandinavia, Prussia, Poland, Spain, Britain and even North Africa. When Ireland's potato crop failed in 1846 for the second time, the Religious Society of Friends / Quakers, followed by their own brethren in England and America plus the British Assoc, for the Relief of Distress in Ireland, decided to help. They started fundraising to provide relief. Dublin Quaker, Joseph Bewley, contacted Quakers all over Ireland highlighting the seriousness of the situation. Word quickly spread. In 1847, the Choctaw community in Oklahoma donated US\$170 and Turkey's Sultan Abdulmejid 1 donated £1,000, today worth £87,000, passing it on to Ireland's well organised Quakers for distribution here. In all, the equivalent of over £40 million was provided by donors. The Government of the day refused to provide free food thinking it might encourage laziness! They set up Public Work Schemes instead in what

happened to be the harshest winter for a hundred years. It may seem strange today that starving paupers should do heavy manual work, building roads, famine-walls etc., for payments as low as one shilling per day. British Prime Minister, Sir Robert Peel, was accused by his successor Lord John Russell of over-reacting to Ireland's plight in wasting public money on Ireland's "exaggerated claims". He cancelled outstanding orders for American corn placed earlier by Peel. By this time, the Quakers were already importing cast iron Boilers or Famine Pots for the making of soup to combat starvation. Very generously they even hired ships to import the pots, food, turnip seeds, medicine and supplies. The Government's Public Work Schemes did not succeed as expected. They then copied the Quaker initiative.

Many cast iron soup pots were made in a foundry owned by the Quaker Darby family in Shropshire, England. The Coalbrookdale Iron Company recently informed our Dalkey Tidy Towns team that 56 Boilers were provided free of charge to the Quakers of the 294 total which they shipped. By August 1847, a staggering three million people were fed daily. However, in the autumn of 1847, the Government shut down the soup kitchens. Those

suffering were expected to live off the new potato harvest to be picked soon after. Unfortunately this vielded just one quarter of a normal harvest. The three million people depending on the soup for survival were left to fend for themselves when social security as we know it today did not exist. While the West of Ireland suffered the worst deprivation, in

Templecrone in Donegal, four Famine Pots were used twice daily providing 600 gallons of soup. Nearer to home, Wicklow also had its crisis. Dalkey was on the border of this calamity.

We were thrilled to be contacted by Rosa Murray last July. Her family owned a Dairy Farm off Tubbermore Road from the late 1800's. Dalkey Farmer Jack Thomas grazed his cattle on Dalkey Commons Townland. Rosa still had in her garden off Tubbermore Road Farmer Jack's 1800's possession which her family very kindly wished to donate to Dalkey Tidy Towns. We were astounded to discover that this partially covered family heirloom was in fact a very large cast iron Famine Pot. The clue to its history is the

very thin copper lining designed to prevent rust contamination of the soup. Do please visit Archbold's Castle to see this monument erected by Dalkey Tidy Towns' team and if you can add to our story, please contact **info@dalkeytidytowns.com**. If only this Famine Pot could speak!





Although April and May are peak times for Primroses some will already be in flower. They're not common in the park on Dalkey and Killiney Hills and unfortunately one reason why is they are subject to being dug up and taken by people who should know better. A friend commented that the sort of people who do dig up wild flowers probably do it when the plants are in flower, the worst time to move any plant, severely reducing their chance of survival.

There is one quiet stretch of path on the hills where they have been hanging on and I learnt some years ago it had been known as The Primrose Path going back many decades. A very interesting talk about the old paths and rights of way in Dalkey by a member of the Historical Society informed us that this particular primrose path was formerly part of the estate of the house that became Fitzpatrick's Killiney Castle Hotel and the family living there had planted the original primroses alongside it.

Primroses are particularly lovely native flora with cream yellow flowers and soft crinkly leaves, the plants subtly adorning woodland paths and banks are barely discernible in the undergrowth. But until looking up information online I wasn't aware of its adaptation for self pollination which consists of two different types of flowers on individual plants named pin eyed and thrum eyed which 'look almost identical apart from the position of the stigma (female part) and the anthers (male part holding the pollen) in the flower tube in the centre. In "pin" flowers the stigma is positioned at the top of the tube with the anthers positioned halfway down. In "thrum" flowers the stigma is positioned instead halfway down the tube with the anthers at the top.'

The purpose of the two different flowers is so pollinating insects will accumulate pollen on their bodies from one type of flower and spread it to the other type. No surprise to learn that, although earlier botanists might have noticed the adaptation, Charles Darwin was first to describe it.

Both flower types contain nectar at the bottom of the flower tube to attract insects to mediate pollination of the flowers. Darwin thought that the reciprocal positions of the anthers and the stigma in the two flower types would promote cross fertilisation. He suggested that when an insect visits a pin flower it inserts its proboscis (feeding tube) into the flower tube to feed on the nectar and pollen from the anthers would stick onto the proboscis about halfway down. If the insect then visits a thrum flower the pollen already on

its proboscis is at the right level to meet and stick to the stigma about halfway down the flower tube, leading to cross fertilisation. At the same time pollen from the anthers at the top of the thrum flower tube is likely to stick to the top of the insect proboscis, the perfect position for cross-fertilising the next pin flower the insect visits'.

So, not just lovely to behold, the primrose is a fabulous example of the wonders of evolution!

At this time of year ivy proves again what a useful plant it is since having produced flowers in late summer, very valuable for butterflies and other pollinators its berries ripen in the spring, unlike most plants whose berries are ripe in autumn. Ivy berries, which apparently gram for gram contain nearly as many calories as Mars bars, should be fully ripe and have turned black by now (birds seem to have a preference for very dark berries) are very gratefully received by blackbirds, thrushes, blackcaps and woodpigeons.

Our poor old apple tree was already on its last legs, years since it had produced fruit and only a few sparse leaves left on mossy branches, but it still served a useful purpose, being the tree I hung most of my feeders from. Then Storm Ciara came and I found it split in half with all the feeders on the ground. I repositioned the feeders on adjoining trees and bushes and I could now get a better view of one of my nyjer feeders. The nyjer seeds are much smaller then sunflower seeds and have specifically designed feeders with tiny slits that slim billed birds like goldfinches and siskins can optimise but this nyjer feeder has larger apertures and I was surprised to see a bullfinch and then a little group of coal tits feeding on it, birds not normally known to take these seeds. A repositioned peanut feeder now gave me nice views of a pair of long tailed tits feeding and later it was fascinating to watch a female blackcap who took it over and would drive away any bird that tried to feed on the tower of nuts, far more then it could ever eat but it was determined to dine alone.

Dear Editor

As a daily user of electricity I was interested to read the Coastal Concern Alliance article in the February issue about offshore wind farms. The wind farm proposed for the Kish Bank seems to have been rattling around for many years now and I think it would be great to have an informed, dispassionate debate, locally and nationally, about this form of renewable energy. There were several aspects of the Coastal Concern article that bothered me and, I feel, deserve comment, namely:

I thought that the article was trying to hype up the visual impact of windfarms. Last summer I was on the train along the North Wales coast and from there you can make out the Gwynt y Mor wind farm which, according to Wikipedia, is the "fifth largest operating offshore wind farm in the world". Now, you could make it out from the train but was hazy against the horizon and the turbines so merged into the seascape that a photo was futile. I would describe that visual impact as immaterial.

Second, regarding the impact on (or as the article stated "significant threat to") birdlife, I looked at what Birdwatch Ireland and the UK's Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) had to say about offshore windfarms. Both say they support renewable energy including offshore windfarms. They qualify their statements as follows: the RSPB monitors applications for windfarms in the UK and objects to about 6%; Birdwatch Ireland say they are trialling a "seabird sensitivity mapping tool for marine renewable energy developments in Ireland" (so, this seems to cover tidal energy as well as wind).

Third, having read the article, I followed the author's suggestion and visited the alliance's website. When I looked for information re the membership of the alliance, I found none. I see that you credited an author for the article in our newsletter but I am still bothered by an organisation which appears to operate in such complete anonymity. Bring on an informed debate.

Signs and Symptoms of Dehydration and how to prevent it

Dehydration is caused by not drinking enough fluid or by losing fluid and not replacing it.
Water makes up over two-thirds of the healthy

human body. It is necessary to lubricate the joints and eyes, aid digestion, flush out waste and toxins and to keep the skin healthy.



Dehydration is caused when there is a reduction in the

normal water content of your body, which upsets the balance of minerals in your body fluid. The cells in the body depend on these minerals being maintained at the correct levels to function properly.

Some of the early warning signs of dehydration are feeling thirsty and lightheaded and having concentrated, strong-smelling urine. The body works less efficiently with even a relatively low level of fluid loss.

The people most at risk of dehydration are babies and young children, the elderly, those with medical conditions such as diabetes and athletes due to sweating.

In order to keep the body hydrated it is recommended to drink approx. 1.2L of fluids a day and in warmer climates or if sweating then it is recommended to have 250ml every 15 minutes.

This can include drinks that contain caffeine, such as tea, coffee and cola, but they are mild diuretics which mean you will urinate more. It is recommended they are taken alongside non-caffeine drinks and to increase water intake if experiencing any signs of dehydration.

The first sign of dehydration is thirst. Other symptoms are dizziness or light headedness, headache, tiredness, dry mouth, lips and eyes, dark, concentrated urine and passing only small amounts of urine infrequently (fewer than three or four times a day).

If you are dehydrated, you will have lost sugar, salts and electrolytes as well as water. It is recommended to drink a rehydration solution that contains all the essential ingredients that you need to re-establish the right balance of body fluids. These solutions should contain a mixture of potassium and sodium salts, as well as glucose or starch. These are available to purchase in the pharmacy without prescription. Always ask your Pharmacist for advice.

Dehydrated infants and children should not be given water as the main replacement fluid as this can further dilute the minerals in their body and make the problem worse. Instead it is advised to give rehydration salts, diluted squash or diluted fruit juice.
