

#### DALKEY CASTLE & HERITAGE CENTRE UPDATE



The most striking feature in recent drone footage shot over Dalkey is the close proximity of the town to Dalkey Island. Amazing videos were captured on a beautiful sunny day and are part of the new audio-visual presentation at Dalkey Castle. This valuable addition to the visitor experience was designed and created by Noho and largely funded by the Heritage Council's Community fund.

**Archaeologists found evidence that our Stone Age ancestors were hunting** and farming on the island at least six and a half thousand years ago. As the centuries moved on, a promontory fort constructed in the 5th century kept an eye on seafaring activities along the coast. Not alone that, but experts have found the remains of wine containers with links to exotic locations on the Mediterranean and North Africa.

**Later, a church dedicated to St. Begnet was established on the island.** Its architectural features suggest it was built between the 10th and 12th centuries. There is another church named after Begnet beside Dalkey Castle. The current structure dates from the 10th century and was built on the site of a seventh century Early Christian wooden church. Both churches were believed to have been linked to the famous monastic centre in Glendalough.


**Dalkey Island rose to prominence again** when the Vikings were forced to abandon their fortified camp in Dublin and flee to the island. There, they re-grouped, bringing their slaves with them. Dalkey Island became a holding centre for the Viking slave trade. By the late 900s, settlement had begun in the area we now call Dalkey town. Meanwhile, life in Dalkey did not escape the effects of major events in the rest of the country. The arrival of the Anglo Normans in 1169 changed the face of Irish history forever. When the Black Death struck in 1348, many of Dublin's inhabitants fled to the clear air of Dalkey Island.

**In the mid-1300s, as merchant ships got bigger,** navigating the shallow and treacherous River Liffey into Dublin became increasingly difficult. Instead, the heaviest ships could anchor safely in the deep waters of Dalkey Sound and off-load their goods to be transported locally and overland to the city.

**Dalkey owes much of its layout and development** to the merchants who carted these valuable cargoes up from the seashore. Over time, seven fortified townhouses - locally referred to as castles - were built to store these goods. The owners of these fortified townhouses took extra measures to protect their properties. Battlements and turrets were used as look-out posts. With Machicolations and Murder Holes, there was no *céad mile fáilte* for raiders! In 1482, the town was granted a licence to hold its own weekly market. An annual fair to celebrate the feast day of St. Begnet on the 12th of November was an occasion for great merriment and revelry.

**On Dalkey Castle's battlements**, there is a clue to a previous owner of Dalkey Castle. Once known as Goat Castle, the name was given to it by the Cheevers family in the mid-1600s. Their surname comes from the French word 'chevre', meaning goat. Look closely and you'll see that the banner flying above the castle has three goats – taken directly from their family's coat of arms!

**However, in the late 1600s Dalkey's status as an important trading post** began to fade. Ports around Dublin were developed to accommodate bigger ships, and the town became a sleepy fishing village. Following the French Revolution and the subsequent rise of Napoleon Bonaparte, England found itself at war with France. Fearing an invasion of England through Ireland, a string of 26 towers were built from Balbriggan to Bray. Named



Martello Towers after Cape Mortella in Corsica, several of these impressive structures still stand today including one on Dalkey Island, the only one built without a door.

A prominent signal tower was constructed on Dalkey Hill to communicate between the Martello Towers. The hill was not just strategically important but would also provide the granite rock to build a new harbour at nearby Dun Leary, later renamed Kingstown and, in 1922, Dún Laoghaire. The population of Dalkey and adjoining areas received a further boost when a railway linking Dublin city with Kingstown was opened in 1834. Ten years later, a world-renowned Atmospheric Railway ran from Kingstown to Dalkey until it ceased in 1854. The following year the Dublin-Kingstown railway was extended through Dalkey to Bray.

The new audio-visual presentation at Dalkey Castle gives visitors and locals alike a flavour of the history behind our heritage town. The visit is greatly enhanced by trained Tour Guides and Living History actors from Deilg Inis theatre company. In recent times, seasonal variations have been added to the living history experience giving families an enlightening and fun experience. The Castle and graveyard provided a wonderfully spooky backdrop for sold out Halloween tours recently.

**The Dalkey Castle Christmas Experience with Santa** begins on Saturday Dec 2<sup>nd</sup> and will run on Saturdays and Sundays until Dec 17<sup>t</sup>. The show is full of fun, stories, singing and games. The performance lasts 40 minutes and the highlight, needless to say, is the appearance of the celebrity himself- Santa Claus! There is an age-appropriate gift for each child. Extra dates have just been added, due to demand.

#### NATURE CORNER Michael Ryan

It seems like a distant memory, that sustained heat wave and very dry spell at the beginning of summer, with record breaking temperatures for June.

The ground being baked into a solid crust must have made it very difficult for birds to get worms and insects from the soil or for House Martens and Swallows to get mud to make nests. As warm as it was here, there were reports from much hotter parts of Europe of swift chicks being boiled to death in their nests.

It might be difficult to know how many of our bird species fared but one species we know for certain that did badly were peregrines.

Three months before the record breaking hot June another Irish weather record was being broken. After the fourth driest February in Irish weather history we had the wettest March on record, the rainfall being 165% higher than average.

A lot of the peregrine nest sites are used annually and are monitored by the NPWS and it was noted that the majority of the nests failed or were never even began. They would have

been pairing and nesting in March but the wet weather deterred them. After that wet March there was even snow

on 12th April which further delayed egg laying and although a lot of pairs were faithful to their territories ultimately they didn't nest. Out of 61 sites, regularly surveyed across 4 counties, only 32 pairs of peregrines actually laid eggs and many of those never hatched. Only 38 peregrine chicks were ringed this year a drastic contrast to last

year when 96 chicks were ringed although that had been an exceptionally good season.

This male sparrowhawk, perching in a neighbour's garden, may have just had a bath and was fanning out his feathers to dry them.

Earlier in the year I wrote about the Scottish botanist and plant collector David Douglas who introduced to Europe over 200 species of plants and trees before his tragic death in 1834 aged only 35.

Unlike many of the botanists and scientists of the day his family weren't well off, his father being a stonemason, but Scotland's enlightened school system at the time ensured poorer children got at least a rudimentary education, and he benefited from that. From

an early age he had a love for the natural world and on his three mile walk to school would often be late for class, if he arrived at all, delayed by watching birds or observing unfamiliar plants along the way. He would adopt and care for injured creatures, spending his lunch money buying meat for an owl he was tending. He left school at the age of 11 and began work as an apprentice gardener at Scone Palace which his father had helped build. At 20

years of age he got a position at the Botanical Garden in Glasgow where he advanced his botany studies and where his knowledge, work ethic and enthusiasm soon brought him to the attention of the Garden Director and Professor of Botany, William Jackson Hooker who became his mentor and took him plant collecting in the highlands.

Douglas's first plant collecting trip to the US East Coast was very successful and when the Royal Horticultural Society asked Hooker could he recommend someone to embark on a plant hunting expedition to the, then uncharted, lands of the US Pacific Northwest he didn't hesitate in recommending Douglas for the job.

Doubts were expressed as to his suitability for such a potentially arduous journey due to his timidity, he being described by the president of the RHS as 'the shyest being I ever saw', but he rose to the occasion and became very resourceful and determined while always respectful and in awe to the splendour of the natural word.

His exploration was done on horseback, by canoe or boat but he walked huge distances as well. In one passage he described being unusually fatigued although he'd 'only' walked seven miles. At the time he was carrying a 60lb backpack containing barometers, thermometer, book and reams of papers he would use to press and dry out leaves and flowers he'd collected. He was often short of food and once walked 19 miles across a plain in 97 degrees Fahrenheit in the shade without any water.

He climbed mountains, often alone in very basic clothing and was the first European to climb

the highest mountains in
Hawaii. He travelled almost
10,000 miles across North
America and at one stage
planned to return to London
by walking across Siberia
where he wanted to compare
the flora and terrain of lands
on the same latitudes of two
different continents but, after

travelling 1,000 miles and reaching Alaska he had to abandon his plan as the territory ahead was full of hostile natives. He was on an expedition where his companions were attacked by a grizzly bear. At the time it wasn't just animals they could be a threat, many of the native Americans had a very volatile relationship with the white man but he befriended many tribes, enlisted their help gathering specimens, learned a few words of their language and had great respect for their knowledge and uses of plants.

When he returned to England he found the plants he had introduced had been spectacularly successful and had greatly increased the revenue of the RHS who would sell trees and plants to the large estates where unique trees and plants in the gardens were seen as a very fashionable statement. He was granted fellowships in a number of Societies and became a minor celebrity. After a while though he became disillusioned with his status especially after discovering the doorman at the RHS was better paid than he was after he'd put his life on the line on many

occasions. It would seem as well that he had grown restless and wanted to go off exploring again.

In this incident Douglas was hoping to find a Sugar Pine tree, Pinus lambertiana. The sugar pine is the tallest growing species of pine and it produces spectacularly large cones which can be up to 42cm (nearly 18 inches) in length. Douglas had previously seen a cone from one which measured 16.5" and figured if the cone was that large the tree itself was probably enormous. He'd met a member of the Umpqua tribe and through a combination of drawings and sign language he was able to convey what he was looking for. The native indicated a visible hill approximately 20 miles away and Douglas hurried off towards it. This is an extract from his journal about what happened when he reached them.

"The trees are remarkably straight; bark uncommonly smooth for such large timber, of a whitish or light brown colour; and yields a great quantity of gum of a bright amber colour. The large trees are destitute of branches, generally for two-thirds the length of the tree; branches pendulous, and the cones hanging from their points like small sugar-loaves in a grocer's shop, it being only on the very largest trees that cones are seen, and the putting myself in possession of three cones (all I could) nearly brought my life to an end. Being unable to climb or hew down any, I took my gun and was busy clipping them from the branches with ball when eight Indians came at the report of my gun. They were all painted with red earth, armed with bows, arrows, spears of bone, and flint knives, and seemed to me anything but friendly. I endeavoured to explain to them what I wanted and they seemed satisfied and sat down to smoke, but had no sooner done so than I perceived one string his bow and another sharpen his flint knife with a pair of wooden pincers and hang it on the wrist of the right hand, which gave me ample testimony of their inclination. To save myself I could not do by flight, and without any hesitation I went backwards six paces and cocked my

gun, and then pulled from my belt one of my pistols, which I held in my left hand. I was determined to fight for life. As I as much as possible endeavored to preserve my coolness and perhaps did so, I stood eight or ten minutes looking at them and they at me without a word passing, till one at last, who seemed to be the leader, made a sign for tobacco, which I said they should get on condition of going and fetching me some cones. They went, and as soon as out of sight I picked up my three cones and a few twigs, and made a quick retreat to my camp, which I gained at dusk."

On what would be his final expedition he brought with him from England a Scottish Terrier named Billy, which would be his constant companion. After Douglas's untimely death in Hawaii, being found dead in a pit dug to catch wild cattle with a bull standing over him, Billy was found nearby waiting for his master. He was returned to England and was adopted by an employee of the Foreign Office. A stone monument commemorating David Douglas was erected and still stands where he died, surrounded by a grove of the tree named after him, Douglas Firs.

Following this fantastic recognition, our Dalkey Tidy Towns team was then invited to County Hall in Dun Laoghaire to hear the results of the DLR Tidy Districts Awards. With 32 entrants, the competition to be 'Best Town' was as tough as ever. An Cathaoirleach, Cllr. Denis O'Callaghan, and Frank Curran, CEO of DLRCC, welcomed all and then the great surprises were announced:





#### AN BORD PLEANÁLA REFUSES PERMISSION FOR BARTRA DEVELOPMENT ON WESTERN MARINE SITE

It had been more than a year since we last heard from An Bord Pleanála on the proposed Bartra Property (Dublin) Ltd development at Bullock Harbour. Last Wednesday ABP issued their decision on the Appeals by both Bartra and ourselves (BHPA). ABP have refused permission thus upholding the refusal by DLRCC Planning



the large numbers who opposed the application.

We know that the multiple planning applications have been confusing, so here is a brief summary of the planning history. To date three planning applications have been submitted by Bartra to the planning authority, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council for the former Western Marine site.

The first unsuccessful application in 2016 was what was popularly known in the press as the "Costa del Sol" development which was refused by DLRCC and not pursued by Bartra. The second application in 2017

was refused by DLRCC, appealed by Bartra to An Bord Pleanála in 2018 and awarded planning permission by ABP in 2019. This was when Bulloch Harbour Preservation Association launched a Judicial Review to challenge the ABP planning decision. That JR was quashed by the High Court when ABP decided not to contest our case. After lengthy Covid delays Bartra eventually lodged a third application in January 2022, which was again refused by DLRCC and appealed by both Bartra and BHPA to ABP in March 2022, resulting in this new, welcome decision to refuse permission a year and a half later. We look forward to discussing future sensible plans for Bulloch Harbour with stakeholders and interested parties across the board. More news will follow as it emerges.

#### The Iconic Killiney Hill Red Squirrel Drops to Critically Low Levels

The red squirrel is Ireland's only native squirrel and is easily the cutest. The species depends on woodland as its habitat. Sadly, the red squirrel population on Killiney Hill is in decline. In recent years, Killiney Hill has become more popular as a destination for walkers resulting in the loss and degradation of the squirrel's woodland habitat. It is also under pressure from the non-native grey squirrel which outcompetes the red squirrel for food and carries a disease which is fatal to our native species.

Fortunately, DLRCC Biodiversity Section plan to restore the red squirrel habitats on Killiney Hill. To restore areas of interest, some native planting will take place and fencing will be erected to assist habitat recovery.

Protecting the red squirrel is essential to ensure the survival of the species and we



## Q. I have a red swollen thumb which has become worse since the cold weather has hit. I think it might be chilblains. What is this and how can I treat it?

A. Chilblains develop when it's cold. The cold makes the tiny blood vessels in your fingers and toes get smaller and this stops the blood moving around as easily. If you then warm up too quickly, the blood vessels get bigger again and blood rushes to your fingers and toes. This can cause the pain or swelling you are describing.

They usually appear a few hours after you've been in the cold and mostly occur on your fingers and toes. But you can also get them on your face and legs.

with chilblains your skin can feel itchy or like it's burning and your fingers or toes may become red, purple or swollen. The redness may be harder to see on brown and black skin.

Chilblains usually go away on their own in 2 to 3 weeks. There are some things you can try to get rid of them yourself and stop them coming back:

- Try to avoid being outside when it's cold or damp – if you do go out, wear warm, waterproof clothing, gloves and thick socks
- Take ibuprofen or paracetamol for the pain

The following are **not** advised when suffering with chilblains:

- do not put your feet or hands on a radiator or under hot water to warm them up
- do not smoke or have drinks that have caffeine in them

   this can affect the flow of blood in your fingers and toes
- do not scratch or pick at your skin

# November 11th - Remembrance Day

On the morning of November 11th, our Prep Pupils, Teachers and Staff gathered in the Assembly Hall to honour and remember those who died in World War I. Led by our 5th class teacher, Mr. Meade, our Remembrance Day Assembly focused on the brave past pupils who fought in the Great War.

A total of fifty-six staff and pupils served in World War I, and sadly, twenty-five of them

lost their lives. Harold Boyd, the first pupil to enrol in our school in 1904, boarded at Castle Park after travelling by ferry from England. Tragically, he lost his life in Gallipoli, Turkey, in 1915.

Among the names on the Castle Park Roll of Honour Captain are Sidney Cowan and Captain Philip Cowan,

both heroes who perished in aerial combat. The youngest Castle Park pupil to lose his life in the First World War was 2nd Lieutenant Sydney Vernon Young, who was killed at the tender age of eighteen in September 1918.

In a moment of reflection, we observed a minute's silence, remembering not only those who served in the past but also those affected by conflicts today. Pupils from our 6th class then paid tribute in our Remembrance Garden by laying a wreath in honour of the past Castle Park pupils who gave their lives for their country.

Accompanied by our Director of Music, Ms. McKiernan, on piano, our Principal,





# **Explorers Seashore Safari**

During Marine Week in Loreto Primary School, 6th class took part in an expedition to Sandycove with Mona McCrea, a marine biologist from the Explorers Education Programme. We walked from our school to Sandycove, where we met Mona. She talked to us first and showed us how and where to look for creatures and plants. She gave us buckets and nets and sent us off to work! We walked into the sea, shoes and all, and started turning over rocks. Mona told us to wait for a minute after turning over rocks, to see what creatures would pop out and reveal themselves.

There were tiny, little starfish that were greyish-orange and were covered in miniscule hooks. The hooks were for catching food, which then went into the starfish's mouth. Its mouth is a tiny hole in the middle of the starfish. There were also, believe it or not, hundreds of shrimp and prawns. We found them in rockpools and hiding in bunches of seaweed. They came in all shapes and sizes, with a strange, transparent look on them and their black, beady eyes.

Dog whelks are the top predator in rockpools. These tiny, little animals have a slow and painful way of killing their prey. They latch themselves onto their prey, such as cushion starfish and small crabs. They drill through their shells and into their flesh and suck out what's inside.

Crabs were everywhere that day. We might even have found enough to make a whole meal. How do you know which crabs are edible? You have to look at the shells. Edible crabs have a smooth edge, while non-edible crabs, also known as seashore crabs, have jagged edges.

Our trip to Sandycove was an unforgettable experience. We learned so much and had lots of fun too. A massive thank you to Mona and Ms. Taylor for bringing us.

### ❖ 'GOD'S HEART FOR MIGRANTS' - A SPECIAL EVENT & ITS DALKEY BACKGROUND ❖



an anthology of poems, stories and reflections by migrants from direct provision centres, is to be launched at the Quaker Meeting House on Pakenham Road in Monkstown on December 6th between 5pm and 6.30pm. Everyone interested will be very welcome. Edited by Rosy Wilson of the Dalkey Interchurch Migrant Support Group, with contributors from Mosney, Dun Laoghaire and further afield, some of whom will read aloud their contributions at the launch, the book will be on sale for €10. It will also be available through Dalkey News from then on. We are grateful to the Arts Council for a grant towards the cost of production and to Boland Press for publishing the volume.

This is the latest initiative of our local Migrant Support Group, which took off back in 2017 as a result of that vear's Interchurch Lent Group on the theme "God's Heart for Migrants". It was there that parishioners of both Dalkey churches and a few Quaker friends from Monkstown met Mosney resident Christiana Obaro, who was introduced to us by Irish Times journalist Andy Pollak. Her story of displacement from Nigeria on account of her Christian faith, and her difficulties finding a welcome in Ireland along with her husband and children, moved us all; so we established a link through her with the migrant direct provision centre in Mosney, aiming to do all we could to support and nurture them as a group.

Since then, we have hosted busloads of Mosney residents for social and church events and walkabouts in Dalkey, as well as trips to beauty spots and the zoo and occasional social evenings at Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann. We have also helped them with letters to the authorities to help them resist deportation and secure permission to stay indefinitely in Ireland.

Since Covid hit in 2020, there has inevitably been less social activity, so we have concentrated instead on providing for their everyday needs. This has been chiefly by providing laptops and second-hand bikes, which we deliver personally to them in Mosney, and by helping with access to education. Individual members of our group have also "adopted" migrant families living locally, helping them to find and maintain accommodation and manage such details as school transport and homework.

The cost of all this has been considerable, so we are grateful to many friends and supporters who have responded so generously to our occasional fund-raising drives. most recent of which was the Cake Sale and Raffle organised by Jackie Nelson with help from Valerie Hand in Our Lady's Hall last December. There will be something similar happening early in the New Year, as funds are running low once again. All of us, our chairman Peter Woods, hon. secretary Margie Waters, and our friends in Mosney will continue to rely on your generous support. We usually meet in Dalkey once a month on a Tuesday morning, and would greatly welcome more volunteers to help in the work. Just tell me on one of those mentioned above if you'd like to join us.
