



### **❖** DALKEY CASTLE & HERITAGE CENTRE UPDATE

**Dalkey Castle was buzzing recently for the ECHOES Maeve Binchy and Irish Writers festival.** The weekend's events began with Maeve Binchy's first stage play *End of Term* on Friday 6<sup>th</sup> October. Saturday was a full day of talks, discussions, laughter and readings with award-winning Irish writers. It all culminated with the Marvellously Maeve Guided Walk on Sunday.

All three days of the festival were fully booked out in advance. We were delighted to be joined by Maeve's husband, Gordon Snell, and many members of the Binchy family. The audience was comprised of literary fans from all over Ireland, Europe, the US and the UK. We were once again joined by the British Ambassador, Mr. Paul Johnston and his wife Nicola. A group from the Maeve Binchy Fan Club couldn't believe their luck in finding an entire weekend that had the work of their favourite writer at its heart. (photo).

**Francis Brennan opened proceedings on Saturday.** He regaled the audience with his unique take on a life in hospitality. Among his entertaining stories was the one when Maeve and Gordon arrived at his Park hotel one month early! The hotel didn't bat an eyelid and Maeve and Gordon got the room they always liked with a desk for Maeve to write at. Francis's good humour and bonhomie set the tone for the day.

Gaels of laughter were the order of the next item too when Emer McLysaght entertained the audience with tales of how the *Aisling* series of 5 books (with Sara Breen) came to life and how now, despite persuasion, the books have been consigned to history. Madeleine Keane led a discussion on the importance of support for emerging writers. All agreed that Maeve was a past master at encouraging new writers. She believed that "success is not like a cake that needs to be divided. It's more like a heap of stones – a cairn. If someone is successful, they add a stone to the cairn".

Caroline Erskine led a most interesting session on how creative producers bring ideas to life on air, on stage and on film. Sarah Binchy credited her Aunt Maeve's guiding principles when choosing topics for Sunday Miscellany. Write about what you know, keep it conversational and ensure there is some 'Schweppes' in the writing.

**Deirdre O'Kane read from Maeve's Times**: (November 1987) *A Royal Romance Spelling Danger from the Start* featuring Prince Charles and Diana, Princess of Wales. The big question was: could Charles be King if he was divorced? We now know the answer. Lise-Ann McLaughlin brought us back in time to Maeve's quiet feminism of the 1980s when she encountered a woman at a bus stop in *Contraceptive Conversation*.

Nicola Tallant recounted the life story of the young boy, Joey O'Callaghan from inner city Dublin. Joey, at twelve years of age, started working on a milk float. Gradually, he was groomed as a drugs' mule. All of this dark criminal underworld is told by Joey himself in Nicola's book *The Witness*.

RTE's Katie Hannon had done ground-breaking investigations into the Sergeant Maurice McCabe whistle-blower allegations, and 'the Women of Honour' controversy in the Irish Defence forces. Katie explored what happens after a deeply personal story is revealed to the world with Karina Molloy, formerly of the Defence Forces. Dr. Maeve O'Rourke's sharp incisive mind kept coming back to the importance of having everything documented. She stressed that only sworn testimony is evidence. Prof. Ian Roberston advised the importance of naming the wrong and the importance of handling the emotions and avoiding, if possible, getting caught up in the anger.



**Oliver Callan described Maeve as effervescent.** He said, "if she was dropped in a glass of Ireland, she would bubble to the top and energise the entire country". She was filled with joy but wrote about sad issues in Ireland like alcoholism, divorce, abortion and domestic violence. He recalled her first appearance on the Late Late Show after *Light a Penny Candle*, in 1982. Oliver said she had no problem talking about money and the record amount she received of 52K for the paperback rights. Her biggest indulgence after the windfall was that she no longer would have to worry about time spent chatting on long distance phone calls! He reminded the audience that Maeve always tried to find the good in everything, so much so, that she once said that she was glad she never met Hitler in case she would have found some redeeming feature in him.

**Gordon Snell gave a moving account at the end.** He said he had been born abroad, lived in Singapore, Australia and the UK. He had envied those who had a hometown. He finally found one when he met Maeve and moved to Dalkey. He is proud to call Dalkey his hometown and to be part of the ECHOES festival in her honour.

**Rita Biggs led** *The Marvellously Maeve* **Guided Walk around Dalkey** on Sunday to places of significance in Maeve's life and work, finishing with readings in the Maeve Binchy Memorial Garden at Dalkey Library.

Now to other important matters: looking on from the North Pole, Santa is preparing for his visit to Dalkey Castle, each of the weekends in December.

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
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### NATURE CORNER Michael Ryan







I'd given up hope of ever again seeing a red squirrel on Dalkey or Killiney hills, not having seen any there for over six years, so was surprised to hear that apparently one was trapped then released by the squirrel researcher on the hill this year. Further to that a neighbour told me they'd recently had a red in their back garden.

I'm often a bit sceptical when people report seeing red squirrels as grey squirrels have a phase when a lot of their fur gets a ginger tinge and they might appear a bit red but the

neighbours are very familiar with grey squirrels and said their visitor, apart from having red fur, was much smaller than the greys; red squirrels can weigh up to 330gms while greys can exceed 600gms, so it seemed highly likely that it was a red which is great news. It was over twenty

years ago, a few years before the greys arrived in Dalkey that another neighbour adjacent to us had a red squirrel on their roof which came into our garden. As I watched it, making its way along the top of our hedge and on to the neighbouring conifers, I realised it was actually fleeing from a cat stealthily following it along the ground. Although that squirrel was probably safe up in the trees, gardens can be risky for red squirrels as cats are one of their major predators especially when the squirrels come regularly to feeders where a

cat can conceal itself nearby and stalk them. Staying, at a B&B in Kilkenny run by a very eccentric lady whose cat, as she told all her guests had appeared on TV once. Lucy asked her were there any red squirrels in the area only to be told that she'd once seen the celebrity cat carrying one in its mouth it had killed.



Ivy which flowers in autumn and winter provides food for pollinators late in the year. This clump of ivy had hoverflies and honeybees, above, visiting it in mid October.



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The crows and jackdaws were performing their usual dusk spectacle, gathering at the eucalyptus grove, perching awhile before soaring out in impressive numbers, wheeling noisily and exuberantly around the sky. On this occasion they were milling around overhead when breaking through the raucous caws of the crows came the distinct resonance of a raven's deep 'kronking' call.

Looking up I saw a pair of ravens were flying through the flock of dozens of hooded crows. the ravens distinguished from them by their larger size, pitch black plumage and wedge

shaped, as opposed to the crow's fan shaped. tails.

Some of the 'hoodies' were dive bombing them or chasing them at a respectful distance but the ravens barely registered their attackers and flew on purposefully. As one of the pair passed over me I reflected again that ravens are a species of

bird you can recognise by sound though not necessarily the sound of their call but by the powerful whoosh of the raven's wing beats that here carried over the calls of dozens of excited crows.

You could describe the sound as like powerful bellows or the flapping of sails but another sound I associate it with is the opening shots of the Apocalypse Now movie which features helicopters moving across the foreground of the screen in slow motion. The sound in that scene is slowed down as well and it's the deep pulsing thumps of the helicopter rotor blades that the powerful raven wing beats calls to mind for me.

Finding a severed gull's wing near the Vico Road recently I became a bit concerned for the ravens as carrion forms a large part of their diet. A number of distressed gulls have turned up in Dalkey gardens often with what appears to be a broken wing but it's very likely they're suffering from avian flu and had damaged the wing while flapping around in

the disorienting and distressing condition the disease causes. It was quite possible the wing may have come from a gull that died of the disease and could prove fatal to anything that ate the remains.

I think it a privilege that Dalkey has among its residents a pair of breeding ravens, birds more usually found on remote mountains or cliffs. They've nested around here for decades and I'd read they'd even nested in Dalkey Quarry. I sincerely hope they'll survive the avian flu and any other problems thrown at them and will be around here for a lot longer.

> Ravens are the biggest of the crow family whose other species can be very bright as well. You might have heard earlier this year about a Dutch researcher who found magpies were their own nests, one

and cleverest members incorporating bird deterrent spikes they'd ripped off roofs into

particular nest containing 1500 spikes. He saw they had placed the light metal devices with the sharp bits always pointing outwards which he believes was deliberately done by the birds to deter predators. Some bird species will put thorns outside their nest for the same reason Years ago I heard about a fish farm which, to prevent Cormorants taking the stock, had employed automatic bird scarers. Similar to the crow scarers used here in Ireland mimicking shotgun retorts to protect crops. The bird scarers would be turned on and begin firing when the workers clocked off in the evening until somebody noticed they were having the polar opposite effect to that intended.

The cormorants, becoming used to the noise, knowing it wasn't going to harm them and realising there wouldn't be any humans around after the first scarers went off, would use the noise of the scarers like a dinner bell. waiting for them to begin before flying in for undisturbed feeding.

### **Dalkey - Looking Back**

Around 10pm on Monday November 25th 1923, a man called into Dun Laoghaire police station and informed those on duty that a short while earlier he had seen a Four touring car passing through the town heading in the direction of Dalkey. There were two armed men with rifles in the front of the car beside the driver and another armed man covering two men in the back seat who were gagged. Immediate details of the incident were telephoned to armed detectives based in Pearse Street police station who responded quickly and spent hours searching the Dun Laoghaire and Dalkey area for the mysterious car and occupants to no avail. It was later assumed that the whole incident was an elaborate hoax.



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
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

# FINAL BUMBLEBEE MONITORING WALK FOR 2023 SORRENTO PARK & DILLON'S PARK

Only 2 Bombus Pascuorum
were spotted in Sorrento
Park today (7th October
2023). One was foraging
on Catmint and one
on the Yellow Furze
(gorse). There were zero
to be seen in Dillon's
Park. Low numbers are
normal for this time of
year as most bumblebees
are already hibernating. The

Bombus Pascuorum seems to be the last of the Irish bumblebees to wind up its season and go into hibernation. Crocus can be an important food source for queens that emerge early from hibernation in the spring. Now is a good time to think about adding some Crocus bulbs to your garden for spring 2024. So that's a wrap for our 2023 bumblebee walks. Dalkey Tidy Towns are looking forward to the spring. We will be starting again in March 2024.

### Re: Encroaching overdevelopment, destroying residential amenities and the architectural environment of our designated Heritage Town

We wish to share our experiences with the planning and enforcement system. We live in Knocknacree Park largely made up of 1-2 storey houses designed by an Architect who visited America in the 1960s and was inspired by the spirit of mid-century Californian exemplar architecture. We believe the visual harmony, architectural heritage and established height and design pattern of development which existed for almost 60 years was recently destroyed by the demolition of a single storey frontage dwelling, and its replacement with a 3-storey bulky building form. (See attached photo)

Firstly, during the application stage, some residents submitted concerns to the Planning Authority, that the raising of the front elevation from single storey to a double storey replacement building with a design that is totally out of keeping with the appearance and character of the street, would essentially have a visually overbearing negative impact and a consequent loss of our residential amenity. We fail to understand how the application was approved, particularly given the lack of a strong justification or rationale

to demolish a habitable home in the middle of a housing estate. It appears to have been demolished on the basis that it needed new wiring, plumbing, glazing and balustrades. Does this mean that every 1960s estate in the country needs to be demolished? Surely in an age of sustainable development and a national housing crisis, what was required was maintaining the characteristic elements as part of retention, retrofit and reuse of the existing housing stock in line with the legal policy framework.

Secondly, to add insult to injury, during the build, numerous residents formally complained to the Enforcement Section that the height of the new building in relation to the height of the adjoining property did not appear to be consistent with what was depicted on the planning drawings, upon which permission was granted. Therefore, we find it extraordinary that the Planning Authority have taken the position that they are unable to take enforcement action based on either drafting errors or inaccurate visual information on planning drawings submitted by developers.

On that basis, it appears the onus is now on all neighbours to bear the cost of engaging with appropriate professionals to double check all measurements and visual drawings submitted by developers.

Failure to do so may result in a new development towering over neighbouring properties and adversely impacting on the community as a whole, without the public ever being aware of the true impact of the development and, consequently, having no opportunity to make observations to the Council. Surely grossly and fundamentally misleading drawings and depictions of the visual impact vis-à-vis neighbouring properties, for whatever reasons, undermines the viability and credibility of the system? There seems to us to be significant gaps in the entire process.

Thirdly, in a similar case, there is a proposal to demolish another habitable house in Knocknacree Park; this time the plan is to replace it with a 4-Storey monolithic building with a lift, swimming pool, sauna, changing facilities, gym and steam room, Residents submitted numerous observations to the Council, including that the demolition of a habitable house is unjustified and what is required is retrofit and reuse. Interestingly in this case, the Planning Authority agreed with our submissions and refused planning permission based on the absence of any justification to demolish a habitable house. Moreover, they stated the proposal would be unduly visually obtrusive, overbearing from adjacent sites and visually dominant from the surroundings. It would therefore seriously

injure the visual and residential amenities and would depreciate the value of property in the vicinity. This is now under appeal with residents requesting An Bord Pleanála to uphold the Council's decision to refuse permission.

By way of conclusion, we have invested significant time and energy into trying to protect the character and amenities of our exemplar estate, but the system appears to have failed us. Yet, we know that the County Development Plan - Heritage and Conservation, and Development Management is there to protect all Neighbourhoods - People, Homes and Places as part of proper planning and sustainable development of the area. If preservation of heritage means anything, it surely should mean the prevention of continuous erosion of distinctive architectural heritage.

We are in contact with TDs, Councillors, Planning Consultants, Media and Solicitors, although this is not how things should work and these issues should not end up in the courts. It is critical to build public confidence in the planning system and to ensure proper, transparent and accountable planning based on values of fairness, integrity, and equity.





Once our Alpacas have comfortably settled into their new home for the first few weeks, we will be giving an introduction to our Alpacas, including important information about





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## JUNIOR MASTER CHEF AT THE DALKEY LOBSTER FESTIVAL

We are very proud to announce that recently, one of our students won the Junior Master Chef Competition at the Dalkey Lobster Festival, representing Harold Boys' N. S.

Here is what the chef himself had to say about his experience:

I was delighted when I became Junior Master Chef 2023! It was great fun. I went to the Tram Yard on a rainy looking day. I went to the stage and I met the other person and she was getting her ingredients ready so I started to prepare my ingredients. After a few minutes the show started and I sat down with my parents and the interviewer talked with her and she explained how to make her lobster carbonara. So, while she was waiting for her lobster to cook, I went on stage and started with my fennel and olive salad. I started by boiling some water in a pot and I added some salt to add flavour and help the broccoli. For my salad I started shredding some fennel with a mandolin, then I cut some olives up, added some oil and mixed herbs, and mixed it up. I started to see bubbles in the water so I started to prepare my broccoli. I cut the ends off the stalks and I ripped off the leaves and dropped the fresh tender stem broccoli into the boiling water for about a minute and a half. I then began

preparing my main course of sea bass.

I placed it in a tray, skin side down, and I oiled and seasoned it. I then heated up the pan and placed the

fish skin side down until the sides were almost completely white. Then I picked up the pan and added the butter and flipped the fish. I then added my broc-

coli and I cooked it until it was golden brown at the bottom. Once cooked, I took out the fish and placed it on a plate.

Finally, I added extra butter and my capers and let them cook in the butter for a minute then I plated it up. The judge came up, tried my food and said it was lovely. She then gave me a trophy.


