DALKEY CASTLE & HERITAGE CENTRE UPDATE

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When you walk along the seafront at Dún Laoghaire, you will see many memorials and statues representing times past. The latest addition to these is the stunning statue of Roger Casement which commands a prominent position on the waterfront at Scotsman's Bay(see photo right).

Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council (DLRCoCo) commissioned the sculptor, Mark Richards, to design and cast the 3.5 metre bronze statue. It is the centre piece for the new Baths' development. The tall, tapering, polished concrete pillar on which the figure rests gives an amazing elevation to the statue. It visually links the work to its surroundings, but also gives a better view of the sculpture from the base of the plinth. By placing Casement in an arrangement of steps and levels, you can imagine that he is stepping ashore. A single word 'Casement', in raised letters, is fixed on the front of the plinth.

The late Bob Hannan was the senior architect who, with his team, masterminded the coastal mobility works along the seafront. Having trained in urban design in Rouen, Bob made a hugely positive contribution to the improvement of Dún Laoghaire, Monkstown, Sandycove and his native Dalkey.

In Bob's obituary in the Irish Times, Fergus McCabe wrote about the vision DLRCoCo members had for the improvement works to the centre of Dún Laoghaire which were based on linking a more pedestrian-friendly shopping area to an attractive seafront promenade. "Bob's input as an urbanist illustrated how this was to be incrementally achieved and, most importantly, what it would look like".

Sadly, Bob died recently on October 21st aged 55. A group of his friends held a swim in his memory, on Christmas morning, at Scotsman's Bay, in the shadow of the wonderful statue. Poignantly, among the remembrance tokens brought to the altar at Bob's funeral service in Dalkey Church was a miniature bronze replica of the statue of Roger Casement.

Roger Casement was born in a house on Sandycove Road in 1864, close to where the former, well-known Buckley's Auction Rooms operated. There is a plaque in his memory in Irish on the house. Both his parents died when he was young, and he was raised by an aunt in Co. Antrim, and educated at Ballymena Academy. Casement's adolescence is most associated with the time he spent in the Nine Glens, Ballycastle. This part of Ireland inspired his poetic voice and his early engagement with the Irish language.

After leaving school, Casement made his way to Africa. He remained there for two decades. He was employed in the British Consular Service from 1891 to 1913, from which position he exposed cruelties in the Congo. He was knighted by George V in 1911 for his important investigations of human rights abuses in the rubber industry of Peru.

In 1913, he joined the Irish Volunteer movement, having grown to distrust imperialism. He once wrote "A nation is a very complex thing...it never has consisted solely of one blood or of one simple race. It is like a river, which rises far off in the hills and has many sources, many converging streams before it becomes one great stream".

In 1914, after joining Sinn Féin, he went to Germany looking for military aid to support the cause of Irish independence. In April 1916, the Germans dispatched the Aud with a cargo of arms to be landed in Kerry for use in the Rising. Casement followed in a submarine, but his plans to liaise with the Aud failed. When he landed on Banna



Strand, he was captured. On the eve of the Easter Rising, he was brought to Dublin, and, under armed escort, he was put on the overnight ferry to England. He was taken to London, tried for high treason, and hanged at Pentonville Prison on 3rd August 1916. He was the last of the 1916 revolutionaries to be executed.

In the years after his execution, efforts to bring his body back to Ireland were repeatedly refused by the British government. Finally, after exhumation on 22nd February 1965, the remains were placed in a coffin and flown by Aer Lingus to Baldonnel airport. The coffin lay in state for three days. He was accorded a full state funeral and buried in Glasnevin cemetery. He had always expressed a wish to be buried in an ancient graveyard near Murlough Bay, Co. Antrim, but the political situation made this impossible.

The airport at Baldonnel was later renamed Casement Aerodrome. It was there that Queen Elizabeth touched down on 17th May 2011 to begin her historic state visit to Ireland.

Roger Casement is one of the many historic figures and events covered on the National schools' tour at Dalkey Castle which began on 17th January. The theatrical recreation of the Viking raid in St. Begnet's Graveyard is a particular highlight, as is the operation of the Murder Hole. The scaled models highlight all the transport systems with the Atmospheric and Funicular railways and the much-loved Trams. The building of Dún Laoghaire Harbour features, too, where Roger Casement took his first and last steps in Ireland.

And, a final codicil to note, a sod from the earth near Roger Casement's beloved Murlough Bay was placed on his grave in Glasnevin Cemetery.

Anywhere else it would have been a dreadful sight, driving through miles of burnt native conifer forest, the trees scorched black, dead brown needles on stark skeletal branches. It was still a distressing sight but I was delighted to be witnessing what was happening here as the burnt forest we were passing through was on the slopes below Mount Teide volcano in Tenerife, the native conifers were Canary Pine and, although they'd been ravaged by one of the worst fires in the island's history, they weren't dead.

Canary Pine are known as the most fire resistant trees on earth due to an adaptation known as epicormic buds. These buds, suppressed by hormones further up the trunk, lie dormant under

light or, as in this case, severally stressed by drought or fire which then activates them to burst through as new growth. These trees our coach was driving past had been burnt in a catastrophic fire which began in August and had burnt for months, only being finally extinguished in November, but many of the trees we were passing were already bursting back to life and producing new shoots, fresh vivid green against the blackened trunks and branches.

Canary Pine are endemic to the Canary Islands, meaning they are not native

anywhere else. Often growing in very dry areas, subject to sustained hot periods without rain, they receive most of their moisture through condensation from the low clouds, their unusually long needles an adaptation to collect more moisture. This moisture seeps into the ground, filling underground aquifers once providing much of the island's water. I'd never thought of holidaying in Tenerife





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
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Monarch Butterflies are famous for their long migration from the US and Canada to winter in forests in Mexico but I only recently discovered they're also native to the Canary Islands and also have small resident populations in Spain and Portugal. Public gardens are often good places to look for insects and birds and sure enough it was at the

and Mexico depend on the Milkweed plant on which their caterpillars feed, ingesting some of the plant's toxins and thus making them unpalatable to predators. In the Canary Islands they lay their eggs on an endemic plant Ceropegia dichotoma.

before, considering it only as a sun holiday destination. But I'd been reading Pollinators & Pollination by Jeff Ollerton, one of the foremost world authorities on pollination ecology, who is fascinated by the flora of Tenerife, visiting there every year and bringing research students on field trips. Through his book I became aware of Tenerife's unique flora and wildlife, much endemic, which had developed over millennia on the volcanic rock.

An online search found a birdwatching guide on Tenerife but to engage his services for half a day would have been prohibitively expensive so we resigned ourselves to not seeing any of the unique bird species. On our first morning in Puerto de la Cruz we went to the Botanical Garden where we saw our first Monarch butterfly. It was there we also saw the Canary Chiffchaff, a separate species to ours. Then we saw the bird most associated with the island, the African Canary, the ancestor of all the domestic canaries. The origin of the name of the Canary Islands was said to be derived from the Latin for dog as many wild dogs roamed the islands although a later theory is that the original islanders, descendants of Berbers from North Africa. were known as 'Canarii'.

A day trip to the adjoining island of La Gomera involved an awful lot of time on a coach often traversing very narrow winding roads overlooking scary sheer drops of hundreds of feet. Kestrels in Tenerife and La Gomera are a sub species of our Common Kestrel and we saw lots of them, rising and hovering on the hot air thermals over cliffs and canyons. As the coach climbed higher the spectacular vistas, blue sky and sunshine were often obscured by low clouds. The coach stopped at one renowned photo opportunity spot just as freezing mist blew in and anybody bothering to get off, even those who had brought warm clothes, were back on the coach very promptly.

The coach was executing a difficult three point turn when we noticed a pair of unfamiliar birds hopping around on the road and realised they were Canary Blue Chaffinches the nature symbol of the island and the endemic species I had been most hoping to see. Bigger than our chaffinch, the male bird has an almost uniform blue grey plumage. Although only fleeting glimpses we were delighted to have seen them at all. A coach trip on Tenerife took us to Playa De Las Americas, a major tourist destination with lots of nightlife and restaurants. We were left to wander around and get lunch and hadn't moved far when Lucy spotted a flock of swifts milling above. Highly probable they were Plain Swifts, another new species for us. Many of them don't migrate and spend the vear in Tenerife.

We were reboarding the coach when Lucy spotted birds which, as they flew over us, we realised were a pair of Hoopoes. We'd seen them before but you'd never tire of these exotic looking birds, pinkish brown, black and white striped wings, spectacular crest and long thin curved bill and seeing them in a busy town centre was an added bonus.

was time for corrective action.

One of our Dalkey Tidy Towns Volunteers, Frank Dillon, took on the task of surveying



almost every single ESB Pole in the area. Once listed, the damage caused by salty sea air was more extensive than expected. Two of the unsightly ESB Poles surveyed also needed replacement. Once the target list was finalised, Frank made contact with ESB Networks Dermot Cunningham and his team and presented the findings of the survey. The immediate response from ESB Networks was very encouraging. Eventually, a painting schedule for a total of 210 poles was finalised. This was an enormous challenge as the work had to be carried out in the small hours of the morning to avoid local traffic disruption along our narrow roads. Working before most of us woke up each morning, this repainting and replacement work was completed with little or no disruption to our neighbours. Our environment is also a great deal safer.



Dalkey - Looking Back

At the Thursday February 6th 1924 sitting of Dun Laoghaire Police Court before Mr. Cooper, K.C., five Dalkey youths summonsed by Constable Lawler for throwing stones and breaking a window of Mr. Hurley, Grosvenor Lodge, Dalkey, on January 30th, were found guilty on the basis of their own admissions of doing this to the arresting constable. Although the defendants had made good the damage, four were fined 2s.6s. each and the fifth 5s. and warned that if they came before the Court again, they would be severely dealt with.

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

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

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WALKING TOGETHER ON THE WAY

LENT is approaching, with Ash Wednesday falling in mid-February and Dalkey's Inter-Church Lent Evenings taking off on Tuesday the 20th at 7.30pm in Our Lady's Hall.

This year parishioners, clergy and invited speakers will be looking at the increasing role of lay people in the ministry and decision-making of the Church, in response to the Catholic Church's epoch-making consultations worldwide on "Synodality". (The word implies "Walking together on the Way", from the Greek "syn" (together) and "hodos" (way).

For the past 150 years, the Church of Ireland has been governed by a General Synod composed of more elected lay people than clergy, including all the bishops, with major legal changes requiring a majority of each group; and for over half a century lay men and women have been trained and licensed to preach. We anticipate lively group discussion with important insights emerging from those who attend on our four evenings, Feb 20th and 27th and March 5th and 12th.
