♦ DALKEY CASTLE & HERITAGE CENTRE UPDATE

In Hugh Leonard's play 'A Life' the action opens on the bandstand in Sorrento Park. A character called Drumm is at the closing stages of a guided tour around Dalkey. His guided walks, ingeniously entitled Dalkey Discovered, happen monthly in the world of the play. The next one was scheduled for 16thJune, on what we now know to be Bloomsday. In his closing speech of the walk, Drumm refers to Dalkey as "the Town of the Seven Castles, of which the surviving two are vermin-infested, one being in ruins and the other the town hall."

Locally, it is well known that the seven castles were built as storage facilities to house goods that were unloaded from bigger ships in Dalkey Sound. The Liffey was silted up with sandbanks and the ships with large hulls couldn't get past. Dalkey Sound had deep waters and, most importantly, shelter from the North Easterlies. Once the ships were lightened at Dalkey, they could proceed into Dublin. The goods included items such as wine, salt, spices, nails and iron.

Six of the castles were named as follows: The Castle of Dalkey (later, Goat's Castle), Black Castle, Dungan's Castle, House Castle, Wolverton's Castle, Archbold's Castle. The name and location of the seventh wasn't known until recently. Dalkey Tidy Towns have installed castle icons on the locations of the seven castles.

The castles all had defensive features so the precious cargoes could be protected from attack by the native Irish who had been dispossessed. There was a Machicolation on the outside over the entrance door. Through this, hot sand or rocks could be dropped on intruders. If all else failed, the archer with his crossbow would be called into action.


If intruders got past the entrance door, a Murder Hole awaited inside. Boiling urine or lighting firewood from the fire in the Living Quarters were hurled down. The door to Dalkey Castle was around the back, not on the street where it is today. If you walk around Archbold's, you can clearly see the Machicolation over the entrance.

For the full authentic experience of how life was lived in medieval times in these castles, you are most welcome to join the Living History Experience here at Dalkey Castle.

The castles at Dalkey also featured in other writing. Peter Wilson's topographical description of Dalkey was published in the *Gentlemen's Magazine* in May 1770, with an engraving by Beranger of Wolverton's Castle. About Castle Street he wrote, "the street was so incumbered by rocks that it was impassable for carriages."

During Wilson's time, only five castles were standing. Unfortunately, he doesn't name them. We know from Readings Map (1765) that they were Wolverton's Castle, House Castle, Black Castle, Archbold's Castle and Goat's Castle. Wilson's descriptions are interesting to us today: "One of the castles has been repaired... a second has been roofed and affords room for a good billiard table (Black Castle). A third and fourth have been inhabited by publicans". He describes Goat's Castle as "the most antique and complete of the whole and is occupied as a stable." Goat's Castle has since reverted to its original name of Dalkey Castle.

M.R.I. Kelly's *Dalkey, Co Dublin* (1952) tells us that in 1767 Robert Barry connected up Black Castle and House Castle. The grounds of these two castles were laid out in gardens with fruit trees, flowering shrubs, busts and statues and "a pleasant view of the sea". He says that Wolverton's was in good repair in 1818, and the ground floor was used as a forge. It was sketched by Wakeman in 1841 and was still standing in 1843. It was the last to be demolished. The 1843 Ordnance Survey shows five castles.



Local scholar, Charles Smith's book Society and Economy in Small Medieval Town is still the leading authority on medieval Dalkey. He gives an illuminating account of Dalkey's prominence in the Middle Ages. He says Dalkey Sound was convenient for vessels making the short crossing from Chester and North Wales and the best landfall for ships coming up the Irish coast from the continent.

There had always been much speculation as to the location of the seventh castle. It was often inaccurately thought to be the Telegraph Tower on Dalkey Hill or even Bulloch Castle. The mystery was solved during archaeological excavations by John Kavanagh in 2004. The seventh castle was under the road opposite the Dalkey Duck. Thomas Reading had referred to the area as 'Fearann a Chaislean Bhuidhe', the ground of the Yellow Castle. The missing name was found at last, Yellow Castle.

To the great delight of all who use it, the Town Hall is no longer "vermin infested" and is a beautifully restored, busy, community venue for all kinds of classes, activities and community plays. It will be one of the venues for the Dalkey Book Festival in June.

Guided Walks still continue in Dalkey and can be booked by groups. The next, A Joycean Walk, will take place, by great co-incidence, on Bloomsday, 16th June. It will follow the dramatisation of the Dalkey Schoolroom scene from the Nestor Episode of *Ulysses* (in one of Dalkey's seven castles) at 3.30 pm. Led by a knowledgeable Joycean enthusiast, it is one of our most popular walks.

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NATURE CORNER Michael Ryan

Our second butterfly of the spring was a first for our garden. Our first butterfly of the year had been a lovely little Holly Blue flitting around in a rare spell of warm sunshine. Holly Blues are often the first butterfly on the wing, appearing in the first week of April after overwintering as a pupae on, or under, an ivy leaf.

A few days later through the kitchen window Lucy spotted a butterfly perched down the garden, set off determinedly and managed to get a photo of it confirming it was a Comma, a first for our garden.

I wrote before of our first ever sighting of one in Ireland in 2015 on a flower bed at Huntington Castle. I had got very excited then because I didn't even know the species had arrived in this country.

Commas were first recorded in Ireland in 2000 when one was spotted in County Wexford and they are becoming increasingly commoner, spreading north and west. Last year Irish Butterfly Conservation recorded 187 sightings. Nearly every time we've seen them since our first Huntington sighting has been in ornate flower beds in gardens such as Kilmacurragh and Altamont. Wandering through Mount Usher Gardens few years ago we met a friend who is interested in wildlife and during our conversation mentioned he'd never seen a Comma in Ireland. We said farewell continued through the garden and then, as if conjured up on request, Lucy

spotted a Comma and we happily relocated our friend to show it to him.

Perhaps the fact these gardens open to the public always have plants in flower attracts butterflies and bees or possibly, as a friend suggested, the very accessible and visible flowers make them easier to spot in such locations.

At time of writing we're all living in hope that the forecast for a decent spell of warm dry weather will prove accurate but the constant rain, wind and cool temperatures up till now meant we hadn't seen more than a couple of butterflies since those already mentioned. We had seen some very early honeybees over two months back in mid February when the lovely fragrance from a Skimmia bush in flower on the driveway had attracted native 'black' honeybees on an unseasonably mild day when the temperature had reached 15c.

Chiffchaffs were once only considered to be summer migrants but milder weather now enables many to overwinter. This one though, seen in our garden, was almost certainly a recently arrived migrant, as quite a few of them had appeared in the garden on the tail of strong southerly winds. The Chiffchaff is one of those birds (like Cuckoo, Curlew and Kittiwake) named after their song, a repetitive two note call which has the bird described very aptly by noted birding expert Bill Oddie as 'a feathered metronome".

We'd just arrived home after spending the previous evening staying over at some friend's home in Avoca. They live above the Avoca River on a very secluded road surrounded by mature trees. They've had red squirrels in their garden and there are deer in the woods. Their back garden faces the opposite slopes of the river valley and, being Avoca, Red Kites drifting by are a common sight. As we'd approached the town earlier we'd

seen a big group of them circling over the town. Our friends know the local butcher and on a previous visit he'd said he was going back to the shop to throw out some scraps in the back yard for the kites. Within minutes there were kites circling and dropping down to snatch up scraps of meat.

Gigrin Farm in Wales has made a very successful business of charging visitors to come and watch the daily routine of a tractor pulling a trailer of offal off which somebody forks out meat for the red kites. He, or she, flicks bits of meat into the air which the birds will agilely catch and devour in flight while dozens of visitors will watch or photograph them from large purpose built hides. Buzzards and ravens will perch in the trees as feeding time approaches but the main attraction is the kites which average 600 birds a day in winter! The spectacle has attracted up to 50,000 visitors a year with tickets costing between £29 for a family to £40 for an individual place in specially positioned photographic hides. The farm has been credited with being very instrumental in increasing the red kite's population from near extinction by thirty years of supplementary feeding and deserves to make a living from it.

The red kites in Ireland, released in Wicklow originated from chicks brought under license from Wales. A friend, Mark, has been very involved in the project, helping ring kite chicks every year. He told me there was concern that some chicks had developed a condition known as 'bendy bones' where their bones don't develop properly with the chicks suffering from calcium deficiency. It's believed when they are getting supplied pieces of raw meat offcuts and not being presented with the carrion their parents would feed them in the wild, they don't get to eat the bones, fur or feathers which contain calcium and other minerals vital for their development. But it's not certain if it's a serious problem and 600 healthy kites circling Gigrin Farm might indicate otherwise.

After a lovely meal at our friend's house we went out on to the patio around midnight hoping to hear an owl while thinking what were the chances that within a densely wooded hillside, we'd see or hear the ghostly, silently flying bird? The chances were a lot better than we could have hoped for as it happened as we heard a brief sharp 'wick' call from the trees above us. Not the deep hooting call you'd normally associate with owls but we having heard this sound before we knew it was one of a number of calls made by a Long Eared Owl. This particular call, is often described as a bark though the first time I ever heard the short sharp sound many years ago it struck me as sounding like the quack of a mallard.

There are different theories of what the call signifies but one learned authority reckons it might be a sound of irritation rather than alarm. Wandering around the garden trying to discern where the bird was calling from triggered a sensor light which lit up the garden and surrounding trees. A light upright shape was visible on top of a bare branched tree. Surely it couldn't be the owl but a look through binoculars asserted that yes that was it. We didn't want to temporarily blind it by shining a torch at it and were content to hear it 'barking' away at frequent intervals. The calls grew in intensity then suddenly another owl was circling the tree possibly passing food to the perched one. It might have been a romantic gesture as it was the night of St. Valentine's Day and the 'barking' owl might have been impatient waiting for its meal.

While our Census population is just 6,832 souls, Dalkey is not a small Town! Over the past few weeks, our Volunteers rolled up their sleeves at St. Patrick's Square, Castle Street, Hyde Road, Castle Park Road, Dillon's Park, Sorrento Park, Coliemore Road, Vico Road, the Cat's Ladder and Torca Road, Barnhill Road and Harbour Road. Creating and erecting our new direction signs for 'EIRE' and the Cat's Ladder should help our curious



visitors too. We also continued the Dalkey Island Gull Research project, the Rising Sea Levels study, the EU funded Smart Pebbles / Coastal Erosion Project on the beach, our ongoing Bee Survey and our Active



Travel Survey. We also prepared for the arrival of our new Air Quality Monitors and Dalkey Weather Stations.

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



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Planning

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Here is an update on the current status of the planning application from Bartra Property (Dublin) Ltd. for the former Western Marine site at Bullock. You may recall that Bartra submitted a third planning application (almost identical to their previous one) in January 2022 which was turned down by Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council (Spring 2022) and by An Bord Pleanála (October 2023). Following the refusal by ABP, Bartra has launched a judicial review in the High Court to challenge that decision. Bartra have also sought a Judicial Review against DLRCC for their change of Zoning for the Western Marine site which is part of the current 2022/28 County Development Plan. Judicial Reviews only consider incorrect procedural grounds for decisions. These JRs are working their way through due legal process and decisions are awaited. We will keep you posted on developments in this regard.

Boat Moorings

It has come to our attention that on 12th March Dublin Port published the online application form on their website for Bullock Harbour moorings during the 2024 season. See the details at this link:

These were due for submission by 22nd March. If you wish to have moorings in the harbour this season and have not already



applied you should complete the form and the requirements and submit online immediately.

Harbour facilities

Mr. Jimmy Murray of the Irish Nautical Trust, who has a track record of valuable work for the Dublin Port Company, is acting as caretaker for the operation of Bullock Harbour on their behalf. He has submitted a comprehensive report on the potential of the harbour, and is awaiting a response from the Dublin Port management team under the new C.E.O. Barry O'Connell and the new Harbour Master Capt. Michael McKenna. His report included the need to re-lay the mooring chains in the harbour and provide ferry access to boats moored in the centre of the harbour.

Please note that it is no longer possible to rent boats from Monica Smyth or Chris Lawless at the harbour. We hope that a similar facility might be available in the future. We wish Monica a continuing happy retirement.

Thank you to the Dalkey Tidy Towns "Planters" team who did a terrific job of cleaning up the Bullock steps and making them a safer shortcut from Ulverton Road down to the harbour.

It was great to see so many people visiting Bullock last summer, especially during the good weather, and we are looking forward to another busy summer this year.


We congratulate those who have prepared the children in our schools and thank them for their support.


Organ Restoration
