DALKEY CASTLE & HERITAGE CENTRE UPDATE

People love Festivals, whether they be for theatre, music, literature, food or ideas. They give people a reason to celebrate. Locally, we have just had two highly successful celebrations: Dalkey Book Festival and the Bloomsday Festival, with more to come.

Festivals originated from religious practices and rituals. People worshipped and made sacrifices to idols praying for something, like a good harvest or an increase in fertility. Throughout Ireland, Britain and parts of France, a festival celebrating the beginning of harvest was held every year. The festival was called Lughnasa after the pagan god Lugh.

Samhain, and its modern day counterpart, Halloween, was widely celebrated in the ancient Irish calendar, long before it was claimed and made popular in the United States.

The first ever festival took place in 582 BC in Ancient Greece, during the Pythian Games. Like the Olympic Games, the Pythian Games took place every four years and included poetry, reading, speech, and other musical and game-like competitions.

In Ireland, the biggest national festival is held on St. Patrick's Day, March 17th. It honours Ireland's patron saint and aims to celebrate Irish heritage and culture. Towns and cities both nationally and internationally have been known to 'go green' in honour of the occasion.

There are many notable festivals and fleadhanna around Ireland. Puck Fair and Lisdoonvarna are among the most prominent. Puck Fair has been celebrated in Killorglin, for more than 400 years. The Lisdoonvarna Matchmaking Festival is over 165 years old. The monthlong festival attracts people looking for love, fun and a bit of 'craic'.

Locally, the tradition of crowning a King of Dalkey on Dalkey Island began on 17th March 1787. It was a burlesque festival. Various proclamations of a political and satirical nature were issued. The King was entitled "His Facetious Majesty, the King of Dalkey, Emperor of the Muglins, Elector of Lambay and Ireland's Eye, Defender of his own Faith and Respecter of all others, Sovereign of the Illustrious Order of the Lobster and Periwinkle".

On one occasion, more than 20,000 people attended the 'Coronation' on the island. The authorities came to suspect that there were political undertones to the ceremony, and it was suppressed in 1797. It has been resurrected a few times, most notably according to Pathé film footage in1935, when Alderman Thomas Kelly was crowned. The news clip can be seen on the interactive screens in Dalkey Castle.

The first organised Bloomsday Festival in Ireland began in 1954 when a group of literary aficionados wanted to recreate a partial re-enactment of *Ulysses*. They travelled through Dublin in two horse-drawn cabs, on the 50th anniversary of the day James Joyce set his novel. The jaunting party consisted of Patrick Kavanagh, Flann O'Brien, Anthony Cronin, John Ryan (owner of McDaid's pub), and Tom Joyce, a dentist cousin of the novelist who had never read Joyce's work.

Dalkey Castle had a sold out Bloomsday Festival recently to celebrate the fact that Episode Two of *Ulysses* is set in Dalkey.

Dalkey Book Festival began in 2010 when commerce and morale in Dalkey was at an all-time low. The festival has grown exponentially and over twenty thousand visitors came to Dalkey recently. Billed by Salman Rushdie as "the best little festival in the world", it has a local vibe but global reach.

In recent times, we are lucky to have a Lobster Festival in Dalkey. A delicacy in modern Irish cuisine, lobster has come a long way from its humble beginnings. In medieval times, lobsters were considered to be the 'cockroaches of the sea'. In colonial times, lobster was plentiful and fed to pigs and goats as well as crushed up and used as fertiliser or as fish bait.



Lobsters were also thought to have therapeutic qualities. They could treat kidney stones and the immune system. They were believed to have strong aphrodisiac powers. The Dalkey Lobster Festival runs on 24th and 25th August, when the restaurants, bars and streets will have plentiful supplies of the very best of local lobster.

ECHOES, Maeve Binchy Literary Festival was set up here in Dalkey Castle in 2017. It runs on the first weekend in October. Each year, the festival sets a theme and branches out from that theme in Maeve's work to other contemporary writers. The theme this year is 'Homeplace', inspired by Gordon Snell's closing address at last year's festival.

ECHOES opens on Friday, 4th October with a Double Bill. A Rehearsed Reading of *Chancery Lane* by Maeve Binchy, in a new adaptation, will be directed by Conall Morrison. Shay Linehan's adaptation for stage of Maeve's *Minding Frankie*, starring Michael Heavey will complete the evening.

Saturday, 5th October, *Home Place*... features an exciting full day of conversations, interviews and readings with: Cecelia Ahern, Billy Keane, Jan Carson, Colm O'Regan, Liz Nugent, Oliver Callan, Edel Coffey, Anne Griffin, Jamie O'Connell, Zoe Miller, Brian McGilloway, Andrea Mara, Kevin Curran, Melatu Uche Okorie, Olha Khoroshevska, Sam Blake, Andrea Carter, Caroline Erskine, Katherine McSharry, Niall MacMonagle, John Patrick McHugh, Sarah Binchy and Gordon Snell.

Sunday, 6th October has the *Marvellously Maeve* **Guided Walk** and a performance of Maeve's *Aches and Pains* adapted by Shay Linehan.

Set up to celebrate an internationally known and loved writer in her hometown, it is the only literary festival with Maeve Binchy at its heart.



NATURE CORNER Michael Ryan



The farm in a valley in North Wexford where we conduct the twice annual bird survey.

We were hoping to hear it, as we had on previous years, so it was a delight and a relief when a cuckoo's call rang out. It was mid April and we were on the farm for the first of our two annual visits for the CBS (Countryside Bird Survey).

We hadn't been able to do either of our surveys last year and were glad to return this year. I've been doing the survey there for over twenty years with Lucy later joining me and at this stage it's like returning to a favourite destination.

Some of the habitat has changed. I used to have Sedge Warblers singing in the early years but the area they sang from has been drained and they left. Areas of conifer plantation have been felled and replanted again.

Of course time changes people as well. We wouldn't be able to do the survey without the permission and cooperation of the farmer and we've been very lucky as he has always been very friendly and chatty, greeting us like old friends every year. He'd ask us to guess how

old he was and relished that at his age he still took part in most of the activities on the farm where they keep sheep and cattle, although his son, Jimmy, was gradually taking over the running of it.

Sadly his wife became ill in recent years and we were sorry to hear she had

passed away just a month before

our first visit this year while the farmer himself has had to go into a nursing home and is very unlikely to see his farm again which must be heartbreaking for him. Jimmy is as welcoming as his dad was and always has time for a chat.

Previously, crossing fields where the sheep were grazing would start a woolly stampede no matter how unthreatening we tried

to appear so rounding a barn and meeting a group of lambs which all turned to look at us we expected instant panic. But, instead of scattering, they crowded around us and we were soon hemmed in with soft snouts probing our pockets, above left. Jimmy

appeared and told us his 12 year old daughter had adopted all 20, bottle fed them every day and made sure they were all put to bed in the safety of a shed every night. When he told me she had individually named them I suggested that mightn't be a great idea if they were destined



for the abattoir but was pleasantly reassured to hear they, all being female, would be kept to breed and I'd imagine would have a better

than the average sheep's life. Jimmy was actually bringing a spray to administer treatment to one of the lambs with a sore foot. He told us about an incident some years previously when another lamb suffered a horrible

attack. Unfortunately the attacker had been one of my most admired birds, a raven. Jimmy's dad definitely didn't like ravens and this particular incident might make you sympathise with his opinions. A raven had pecked the eyes out of the living lamb. The father had thought the kindest thing to do was send it to the factory but Jimmy had pleaded on the animal's behalf since apart from being blinded the sheep was healthy. His dad relented, the ewe was kept and still lives happily in her own familiar patch of a field.

On dead calm humid days in late summer, usually August or early September, you might notice lots of black headed gulls, house martens and swallows wheeling around overhead. They're taking advantage of a food source that'll be rising up from the ground in their hundreds of thousands. These are ants, primarily young winged females, known as 'princesses', off on their maiden flight to find

their maiden flight to find a new territory to establish a nest in. These females are much

These females are much larger creatures than the usual ants we see and they are accompanied in flight by a number of much smaller male ants which fly

Over the years she has produced at least three pairs of lambs. She locates them by scent and has been a very good mother despite her disability. After doing the surveys for so long we can almost predict where we're going to see certain species; the dunnock in the hedge along the primrose and foxglove lined track, the song thrush singing out over the lower fields. We

don't count butterflies on the survey but down a forestry road adjoining the farm we'd often

see Common Blue butterflies, left, on our June visit and although expecting it was too dull for them on this particular June day I was delighted to be proven wrong and we saw lots, some even mating. We've seen red squirrels in the spruce trees in previous years.

We almost certainly wouldn't have recorded any treecreepers on this visit except one flew out of a nest in a birch tree inches away from Lucy. On the opposite side of the track flapping wings drew our attention to a nest which we saw a sparrowhawk flying into. Though skylarks have drastically declined species that didn't even exist in Ireland when we began surveying, like Red Kite and Great Spotted Woodpeckers, are now regulars. And thankfully we still hear the cuckoo there.

with the females to subsequently mate with them and help establish a new colony. Both princesses and males will then shed their wings with the males sometimes removing the female's wings if they think she's hesitating in becoming fully

Before flying the ants will have swarmed out of their nests, sometimes climbing walls or plant

stems to gain height then from the highest point, the winged ants will launch themselves. Wingless ants can be seen working like ground crew, left, smoothing out the female's newly emerged wings and preparing them for take-off.

Dalkey - Looking Back

In 1924 there was no national electric supply with various cities and towns generating electricity for use within their own municipal boundaries. No two locations had the same voltage so portable appliances that worked in one location would not work in another. At the Wednesday August 6th 1924 meeting of the Dalkey Urban District Council, it was decided to defer a decision on the offer received some months previously from Dun Laoghaire Urban District Council to connect to their electricity supply then in the course of construction. The Town Clerk reminded the meeting that at that time it was anticipated that the scheme would not be ready for two/three years but now he had received a communication from the Dun Laoghaire Council stating that it was now in a position to offer them a connection to their system for £2000 including a substation. As the Government had a commission looking into a national electricity supply, the Dalkey councillors opted to wait for its recommendations.

Ultimately the Electricity Supply Board, established in 1927, took over the generation and distribution of electricity within the state, establishing a uniform voltage for industrial and consumer use of 220 volts, now 230 volts, and after taking in charge local generating stations, took these out of service once these locations were connected to the national distribution system.

- the first local history society in Dublin - to promote the study of history and archaeology, particularly relating to the City and County of Dublin. One of its principal objects has been to assemble a collection of books, documents and other records which have a historical interest. For many years the Society was based in the former City Assembly House in South William St. - many of you will remember the Civic Museum there, which was a joint venture with Dublin Corporation. to make new arrangements. The Royal Dublin Society agreed to house the library collection and the catalogue was upgraded to international professional standards. In the intervening years, donations of suitable books have been accepted from members of Old Dublin Society and, in 2020 a very substantial donation was accepted from one particular donor. Work has now started on the cataloguing of all these donations and the creation of an integrated catalogue of about 1,500 books. This catalogue will be completed and made available online by autumn 2024, enabling them to be within reach of everyone. The result will be a unique collection of books mainly relating to the history and heritage of Dublin - all in one catalogue and under one roof i.e. The Old Dublin Society Collection, housed in Royal Dublin Society library. Access to the Collection will be available to everyone through the RDS Library & Archive catalogue which is freely available to the public via the RDS website https://library. rds.ie or through a link in the Library & Archive section of https://olddublinsocietv. ie/. Some years ago, Dalkey Tidy

whose numbers dropped by over
40% here in recent years. While
flying, they eat, drink, sleep and
even mate and landing only to
breed. They fly over 500 miles per
day when returning from Ireland
to Africa in August/September.



Lovely, long summer days with sunset in late evening are not really the best time to be doing a bit of stargazing. But in August as the skies darken that bit earlier there will be more opportunities to view some terrific astronomical events.



★ The 'Perseid' meteor shower is one of the most significant and a highlight of the year. As with all meteor showers the clue is in the name. They will appear to radiate from within their named constellation Perseus. The Greek hero rises triumphantly in the north east part of the sky after dark-sword raised in his right arm and the severed head of the Gorgon in his left. The meteors peak in frequency between the 12th - 13th August but

will be visible on days before and after if we get clear skies! If you're up after midnight the frequency definitely increases.

★ Time was when we only ever referred to just the next full Moon. Now we have adopted various seasonal names from cultures across the world to describe each full Moon. Many of these are from the names used by Native American tribes to keep track of their annual calendar. Each one would reference a seasonal event.

The full Moon in August which occurs on the 19th was called the 'Sturgeon Moon' by the Algonquin tribes of North America, celebrating a rich period of fish in the lakes in which they hunted. It is also known as the 'Lynx Moon' or in old Anglo-Saxon as the 'Grain Moon' for the harvest.

This will also be a 'Blue Moon'. It is only in recent decades however that this has become an astronomical







term. Sadly the Moon will not turn the colour blue. Rather it refers to the occurrence of two full Moons in a single calendar month. Indeed it's actually not that rare an event. A Moon cycle and its phases lasts approximately 1 month and so we experience 12 Moons each year. But the Moon phases last approximately 29.5 days which means it takes just 354 days to complete the 12 lunar cycles. That means every 2.5-2.7 years or so a 13th full Moon occurs within a calendar year. This is the so-called 'Blue Moon'. Centuries ago people used the idea of the Moon turning blue as a deliberately absurd idea - indicating something that was never likely to happen. Hence the idea of "once in a blue moon". However there have been rare historical events where the Moon did appear to turn blue in colour. These followed dramatic like volcanic eruptions, events monsoons or large scale forest fires

where excessive material in our atmosphere distorted the view of our Moon and made it appear blue in colour.

+ Viewing tip:

My dad used say to me he would see shooting stars on nearly any clear night when he was growing up as a boy in Dublin. Now we largely live in much brighter cities where it is very difficult to find locations that allow us to see the depth and number of stars in the sky. But when looking for shooting stars you need to 'get your eye in' so-to-speak. Go into your back yard or garden and take time for your eyes to adjust to the darker skies over a number of minutes. You will begin to see fainter stars and are more likely to see any shooting stars. Turning off any garden lights, security lights or house lights in windows so that your viewing area is as dark as possible will also help.



FR. WILLIE DOYLE SJ

Fr. Willie Doyle was born on 3rd March 1873 in Dalkey. He was educated at Ratcliffe College in England and entered the Society of Jesus Tullabeg, Rahan, Meath in 1891. He was ordained in 1907 alongside Blessed John Sullivan. Fr. Willie carried out an intense ministry giving missions and retreats throughout Ireland and Britain. He was renowned as a preacher and confessor and his gentleness and love particularly for the poor, the afflicted and those who had fallen away from God. With the outbreak of the First World War in 1914 Fr. Willie volunteered as a military chaplain. He wanted to continue his ministry among working men and to serve



those facing the horrors of war and death.

His military service began in November



1915, and he served as chaplain in key battles including the Battle of the Somme in 1916 and the Battle of Passchendaele in 1917. He was renowned for his courage, and he won the admiration of soldiers and their commanding officers, both Catholic and Protestant and was awarded the Military Cross for his bravery at the Battle of the Somme. He was respected by German prisoners of war who also benefited from his tender pastoral care. Through his time as a chaplain, he wrote valuable letters to his father which offer an insight into the war and his work. He always retained his cheerfulness and joy, even in moments of great danger. Fr. Willie was killed on 16th August 1917 when he attempted to save two wounded soldiers. Unfortunately his body was never recovered.

Fr. Willie was known for his pastoral care for all. He ministered to captured German soldiers and he died as an ecumenical martyr of charity while rescuing wounded

Anglican soldiers. He was an icon of reconciliation and peace amid hatred and division.

Devotion to Fr. Willie spread throughout the world in the years after his death and many thousands of people have alleged

that they have received favours and healings through his intercession.



The canonisation cause for Fr. Willie was opened in the Diocese of Meath in 2022.
