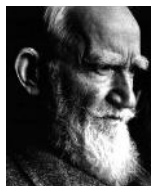
DO YOU KNOW?

❖ GEORGE BERNARD SHAW ❖



George Bernard Shaw was a leading dramatist, literary critic and socialist. A giant of English Literature, his works include *John Bull's Other Island*, *Doctor's Dilemma*, *Pygmalion* (translated on to the screen as *My Fair Lady*) and *Heartbreak House*.

In 1925 George Bernard Shaw was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature 'for his work which is marked by both idealism and humanity, its stimulating satire often being infused with a singular poetic beauty.'

Shaw's association with the area now comprising Dun Laoghaire Rathdown was relatively brief. Born in Synge Street he moved with his mother to Dalkey in 1866. They rented Torca Cottage - a three-roomed cottage with spectacular views from front and back gardens.

The Shaws lived in Dalkey full-time for a year and then spent the summer months there until 1874. He would one day say that 'I am a product of Dalkey's outlook.' Late in life he wrote, 'I owe more than I can express to the natural beauty of that enchanting situation commanding the two great bays between Howth and Bray Head and its canopied skies such as I have never seen elsewhere in the world.' In 1947 a plaque was unveiled at Torca Cottage.

❖ TRAFFIC MATTERS (8) – Blackrock/Merrion Road QBC. ❖

As part of the Blackrock/Merrion Road Quality Bus Corridor, new bus lanes came into operation along the Rock Road from Monday 30th July 2007.

The new Bus Lanes are operating in BOTH directions, Monday to Saturday inclusive; from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Bus times are expected to improve by between 10 and 15 minutes as a result.

Bus frequency on the existing routes of 4,5,7,8,45 has been increased by Dublin Bus, with an additional 34 trips per day in each direction between Blackrock and O'Connell Street.

The QBC upgrade will also benefit other bus and coach services, taxis, and emergency vehicles, as well as creating additional facilities for cyclists.

Free events in Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre

Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre has had another record season. Numbers for July have broken all previous records. This can be directly attributed to Living History tours, which are now running seven days per week due to the sponsorship of the Community Dept of DLRCoCo. The Living History tour is very popular and there is fantastic feedback from visitors.

RTE filmed an episode of the Children's TV programme 'The Den' here with the Living History characters and the Manager did promotion work on a number of radio stations.

St Begnet's Graveyard has been illuminated following a grant from Heritage Council in Kilkenny; it will be more obvious at events in long dark evenings.

Award: The Manager, Margaret Dunne was given one of three '**Service to the Community Awards**' by Cathaoirleach Eugene Regan at an event in the County Hall towards the end of June. Her many initiatives for the heritage of the county and for Dalkey were listed on the citation.

Heritage Week this year is from Sat August 25th-Sunday 2nd Sept.

Admission to the Heritage Centre will be free to individuals for the entire run of heritage week. This will include the Living History Tour. As it is expected to be a very busy time numbers will be limited to 15 people on each tour. Living History Tours run every half hour.

A Talk on **The Industrial Heritage of the County** to include the railways, quarries, bridges and mines will be given by Rob Goodbody at the Heritage Centre on Tuesday August 28th at 7.30 pm. Admission is free.

There will be free **Guided Walks in Dalkey** most days of Heritage Week, starting at the Heritage Centre. Check for times.

The highly popular guided Eyeopener Walks in Dún Laoghaire, will begin in the People's Park on Sunday August 26th and Sunday Sept 2nd at 11.00am. Admission is free.

There will be an innovative Living History element to the tour in **Cabinteely House**, where the character of Earl Nugent who built the house will be incorporated into a guided tour. These Tours will be held on Wednesday 29th August from 2.00 -5.00 every hour and Sunday 2nd Sept from 1.00-5.00pm on the hour. This is highly recommended as it includes a tour around the magnificent house.

Art Exhibitions in September begin on Sept 13th in the Art Gallery in the Heritage Centre. The first Exhibition is a retrospective and celebration of the work of the late Anthony Hogan. The Exhibition, in his memory, is being organised by Cathy (O'Boyle) Hogan and runs to Sun 16th September.

This will be followed by Exhibitions from two artists, well known locally: Bob Anderson 'Art of Anderson' from 19th -23rd Sept and Zora Byrne's 'Landscape Memories' from Sept 26th -30th. All the artwork will be for sale and the Exhibitions are open to the public 11.00-4.30pm daily. Not to be missed!

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BLESSING OF THE BOATS CEREMONY



Bulloch Harbour - 22nd July



The annual Blessing of the Boats Ceremony took place at Bulloch Harbour on Sunday 22nd July. A large crowd was present including King Larry of Dalkey, who came over from his Royal Residence in Our Lady's Manor, led by a Sea Scout colour party. The Dun Laoghaire Lifeboat berthed alongside the pier for the Blessing given by the RNLI Chaplain. This was followed by musical entertainment, a barbecue and raffle, all in aid of local RNLI funds. Afterwards visitors were welcomed on board the lifeboat and the Irish

Coastguard Helicopter gave an air-sea rescue display. There is a long established link as one of the first lifeboats in Dublin Bay was based at Bulloch in 1816, before the RNLI station was established, and many Dalkey people have since served on the crew.

Peter O'Halloran, Chairman of the Bulloch Harbour Association, received a plaque from Stephen Wynne, Secretary of Dun Laoghaire RNLI, to mark his many years service in organising this popular event. The Trident Sub-Aqua Club presented a cheque for €4,300 to the RNLI - the proceeds of their annual Round Dalkey Island Swim.

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❖ THE GREAT AUGUST 1907 DALKEY FLAGS HOAX ❖

In 1907 people were generally Unionist or Nationalist in political outlook and for Unionists in South Dublin the summer of 1907 was especially great for them with the Royal Visit to Ireland commencing in Kingstown in June followed in August with a visit of the Atlantic Fleet which anchored off Kingstown and drew plenty for visitors to Dalkey to see the fleet at anchor.

However a number of people in Dalkey were not enamoured with this great display of loyalty and one can only imagine the reaction of Unionists in Dalkey and south Dublin when they read in the Saturday August 24th Irish Times the story headlined: "Disloyalty in Dalkey - Flags Torn Down from the Town Hall" which reported that local Nationalists, incensed by the flying of flags to mark the visit of the Atlantic Fleet, had stormed the Town Hall, demanded the keys from the Town Clerk, which he refused to hand over, then acquired a ladder, scaled the ramparts, removed the flags from their staffs, and then in procession, marched to the harbour and immersed them in the sea.

This dramatic story and variations of it was also published in the Irish Independent, Dublin Daily Express and the Freeman's Journal with some accounts stating that one man had been arrested.

But there was one major problem with it – the incident never happened and was a hoax perpetrated on the newspapers by some local residents whose identity afterwards was suspected but never subsequently uncovered or proved.

J. K. Keogh, J. P., chairman of Dalkey Urban Council, was not amused with the accounts of this alleged incident in the newspapers, especially the one published in the Irish Times and wrote a letter of complaint to the editor about the falseness of the report and their coverage of it as well as a letter of denial to the Press Association as he was unsure where in the world this hoax event might be published and was anxious that the reputation of Dalkey should be preserved and maintained globally.

The Dalkey / Killiney correspondent for the weekly Bray and South Dublin Herald said that the hoax was the talk of South Dublin for several days and expressed amazement that the "staid and grave" Irish Times and other newspapers had been taken in by it what - the motive for the hoax never emerged.

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❖ GLIMPSES OF OLD DALKEY . . . *Continued from August Issue* ❖

Leslie did not, naturally, care to have people continually coming through his grounds for water, so he built the subterranean passage we have been through. This gave people access to the well under Leslie's ground, but they did not offend his susceptibilities by their presence on his lawns. The reason the passage comes on to "Villaggio" is that, at that time, Leslie's son-in-law, Peacocke, lived there and thus it gave him a convenient short-cut westwards.

Leslie sold the ground on which Loreto Abbey was built; this was in 1842, with Miss Ball as Superioress. Pending the building she had temporarily rented Bullock Castle for two years, from 1840, and had there carried on a day school for young ladies. Local tradition has it that the plans of the building, which is cruciform in shape, were intended for a convent in Mauritius, while the plans really meant for Dalkey showed a circular structure. Some years ago, the Loreto nuns acquired "Carraig-na-Greine" as an addition to their property.

Turning back from the Convent, we pass along a narrow winding road of small houses, with two larger houses in their midst, "Gunamara" and "Avalon". This is Leslie Avenue, and all the houses, with one exception, on this road were originally gifts from Leslie to people who worked for him or upon whom he wished to bestow a favour. The exception was "Gunamara", which was called "Neptune View" in the '70s. In one of the small houses on Leslie Avenue lives Anna Maria Quinn, a descendant of Martin Quinn, who constructed the subterranean passage at "Carraig-na-Greine", and, in another, Mrs. Tallant, whose father, Michael Murray had the contract over fifty years ago for rowing soldiers over to the Island Battery, and perished at sea while so doing one stormy Saturday night.

Turning to the left down Coliemore Road we pass the front gate of "Carraig-na-Greine" and also that of "Villaggio", the small gate beside which marks what used to be another right-of-way to the well. We then pass, on the left, "Rarc an Ilan", "Cliff Castle", "Inniscorrig", "Elsinore", "Lots", and "Colamore Lodge". "Rarc an Ilan" was one of the first houses a century ago to have an Irish name, and the papers at the time favourably commented on this strange practice; Robert D. Corder, a manufacturer of trimming and coach lace, of 15, Parliament Street, lived there in 1847. The well-known Sir Dominic Corrigan M.D. of 4, Merrion Square, lived in "Inniscorrig" at that time, and the financier Du Cros later occupied and improved it. On the right is the turreted building of "Victoria House", built by James Milo Burke of whom you will hear more.

We now arrive at the little Coliemore Harbour with a fine view of the Island. The present pier was commenced in 1847 by Burke and Rev. Dr. MacDonnell of Sorrento, and apparently completed in 1869. Leaving the harbour, we find two large houses "Queenstown Castle" and "Springfield" also built by Burke. Behind and above "Springfield" we see a striking figure - a sailor, some 8 feet tall, dressed in blue and with a white hat, holding aloft a flag-staff in his right hand which his left rests on an anchor; behind him is an iron capstan. This figure stands on an eminence in the grounds of "Nerano", occupied by Miss Fleming, whose father, John Fleming, a well-known restaurateur and a member of Dublin Corporation, came there in 1863; he found the statue lying prone on the grass, mended it and had it put up in its present position. Nothing seems to be known about its purpose; I have three theories, and I give them for what they are worth. Firstly, that it was put there as a mark for passing vessels to set their course by - and it certainly is a an outstanding landmark; secondly, - and this might almost include the first - a Captain MacAnaspie, who formerly resided there, had a son in the Naval Service, and local tradition says he erected the sailor in his memory - and maybe also to help his brother seafarers, thirdly, Dalkey abounds in eagles, urns and mouldings done in "Roman Cement", Before the days of Portland Cement there was one "Plasto" who dealt in Roman Cement in Brunswick Street, Dublin (now Pearse Street). He is credited with supplying these eagles, urns etc. free as an advertisement for his cement and what better advertisement could he have than to put up the Nerano Sailor in like manner? If he did, both it and Dalkey's eagles are an excellent advertisement for his Roman Cement, for they are standing today after more than 90 years weathering as a testimony to its durability.

Notice is hereby given, pursuant to Section 13 (2) of the Planning and Development Act, 2000 that Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council, being the Planning Authority of the County of Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown, has prepared a draft of proposed Variation No. 10 of the Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown County Development Plan 2004-2010 in respect of the following:-

It is proposed to designate Dalkey as an Architectural Conservation Area and to remove the current Conservation Area objectives for Dalkey Village, Carysfort Villas, St. Patrick's Road and Ulverton Road on Map No.4.

The reason for the Variation is to protect the special character of Dalkey in accordance with Section 10.3.1 Policy AC1: Architectural Conservation Areas of the Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown County Development Plan 2004-2010 and Part IV, Chapter 2 of the Planning and Development Act, 2000.

The exact boundaries of the proposed Architectural Conservation Area are delineated on the map accompanying the public display.

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❖ **NATURE CORNER – Michael Ryan** ❖



You may have heard about a new scheme to reintroduce the Red Kite into Ireland by releasing 30 young birds in County Wicklow. A bird of prey that has been extinct in Ireland for 200 years, it is hoped the captive release of these birds will help them gain a footing in what should be an ideal habitat for them. Once down to single figures in the UK they are now doing spectacularly well in Wales due to a reintroduction programme

which involved the cooperation of local farmers. Mainly carrion eaters often stealing food from other birds, some of the farmers were encouraged and subsidised to supplement the kite's diet by leaving out raw meat for the birds. One of these farms, Gigrin Farm is now a Red Kite Centre and attracts thousands of visitors every year to what has been described as "Surely the largest, most fantastic bird table in the world". Every day at a set time kilos of raw meat are spread from the back of a trailer in front of a row of bird hides. As the hour approaches birds start to gather in the nearby trees. Soon the feeding area is surrounded by eager ravens, buzzards and of course dozens of the star of the show, red kites. Many of these kites have wing tags and they can deduce that some of these birds travel vast distances from their nests during the breeding season for a guaranteed meal. When the farmer stops his tractor and starts to spread the meat around the air becomes full of swooping and diving birds the most spectacular being the kite whose distinctly forked tail gives it great agility for turning and weaving. The birds have become a very important part of the area's economy bringing in thousands of tourists all year round even in winter when there have been up to 400 kites at the feeding station! Hopefully we'll be seeing them over the hills of Wicklow soon and maybe even a little closer to home since in late July Birdwatch Ireland HQ got a call to say one of the Red Kites had been seen over Killiney Hill!

One September morning a few years ago as I was coming down through the trees on Killiney Hill I heard the familiar croak of a raven overhead and got a fleeting glimpse of a black shape through the treetops. Eventually emerging from the tree cover I looked overhead expecting to see a pair of ravens but the sky was teeming with ravens, a seriously large flock of them. I couldn't count them properly because the pairs and individuals were wheeling, diving and soaring within the flock but there were at least 30 and maybe 32. I'd seen groups of 18 and more before but never this many. Unlike Hooded Crows, Rooks and Jackdaws which gather and sometimes nest in large flocks the ravens are generally only seen singly or in small family groups. I had thought maybe the large group of ravens was coming over to visit the resident pair in Dalkey introducing the new family to their cousins but they might in fact be heading a bit further afield. Less than a hundred miles away is the biggest winter roost of ravens in Europe. A Monterey Pine forest outside Anglesea in West Wales holds up to 1,000 roosting ravens in the wintertime and there's every chance that some of these birds, many of whom would be young non breeding birds, may come from Ireland which is only a short hop across the sea for them.



Hopefully Dalkey's ravens will have bred again this year. Adults are still seen regularly on Dalkey Island and over the hills where they often perch in suitably lordly and dramatic fashion on top of the obelisk or on the Telegraph Tower.

In early July our Red Squirrels on Killiney Hill were often to be seen feeding on the ground in the early hours of the day picking up last years beech seeds. It got to the point where we'd put the dog on the lead after she got terribly close to squirrels after very hectic chases. The squirrel would retreat up the tree and wait often perched at a fork of the tree, its front paws held in front of it as if in prayer or contemplation but probably just waiting for the dog to push off. Then for

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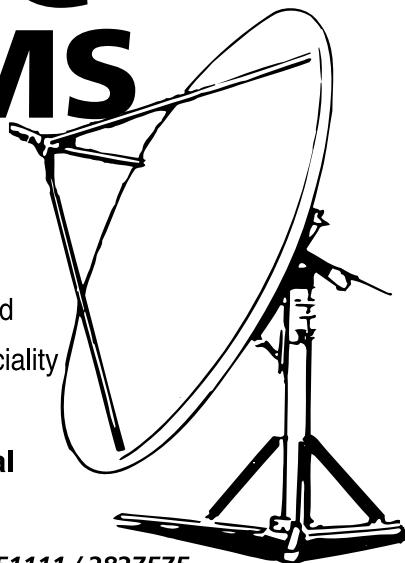
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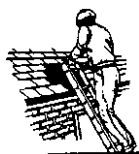
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grown so large it obviously outgrew its highly restricted root system. Regardless of its demise, we consistently watered its base - don't ask me why because I really don't know - but we did!

Yesterday, I felt compelled to take a final look at our beloved dead wisteria before yanking out some of its sad, bare limbs and chucking them in our compost heap. On doing so I noticed, in a bed close by, a precious darling sapling. I was so shocked and surprised obviously that I simply stared and looked and checked again. Quite an amazing feeling and then I thought "How did it get there?" Did some friend who knew our sob story plant it there for us as a 'surprise'? Accordingly, I checked with my likely friends. None of them did such an act. So I then telephoned Mackeys Garden Centre, where our darling wisteria was purchased over twenty years ago. A most pleasant staff member there told me that our famous Wisteria Alba had 'layered itself'. Can you imagine these very words and how I felt? Really, it's not about the money, - going out and buying another, (though I guess, in truth, it possibly is about that too). However, one cannot buy maturity those unique qualities that come with an established plant. Then, to try and find that very strain (there are several alba/white varieties) not to talk about blues, pinks and mauves. Honestly, I cannot do its performance justice with my simple wording. This most interesting member of staff continued to say that wisterias are almost impossible to kill. She said: "it didn't want to leave you and it didn't". I then asked her had she ever heard of a wisteria layering before, to which she said that she had not but she had heard of several other climbers that did so. Amazing. She also said that just because it was originally a white wisteria does not mean that the new sapling will reproduce white racemes. It could be one of the blues (hence, darker leaves). Apparently, it depends on the grafting. So, we'll just have to wait and see. Who knows! We certainly don't! One thing is for sure, this Cosmic Plan of ours never ceases to amaze me. Meanwhile, our very special sapling has been staked, watered and given a little feed.

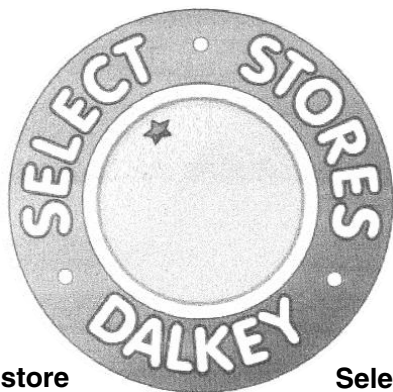
COMMUNITY AWARDS 2007

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weeks no sign of any squirrels till a morning in early August when after the dog's interest in something in the treetops I heard the a rain-like pattering through the leaves and was able to see a Red Squirrel high above on a Scots pine while a little shower of discarded pine scales fell around me. The squirrels peel off the scales to get at the tiny protein packed seed beneath each scale and the bare centre of the cone is left looking like a apple core. I probably mentioned before that unusually for mammals squirrels, like people, are either left or right handed and it's possible to tell which by the way the scales have been peeled off.

In May the South Dublin Branch of Birdwatch embarked on an ambitious field trip, taking a coach load of birdwatchers to Poland. With its large wetland areas, enormous forests including some of the most ancient woodland in Europe and large areas of agricultural land unsullied by intensive farming methods, Poland still has lots of ideal habitat for a vast range of bird species and many mammals. With clear blue skies and temperature hitting 30c the weather was glorious though the weather seemed to give a boost to the population of mosquitoes which were very active, numerous and too willing to get to know the visitors. Lovely wooden farm buildings and meadows full of wild flowers made for very pleasant scenery. Some of the fields, covered with dandelions about to go to seed, looking like they were covered in snow and providing great food for seed eating birds and insects. Storks stood or sat on the mass of twigs that comprise their nests often built on platforms deliberately constructed for them. Cuckoos calling everywhere and even at night we were sometimes surrounded by the 'crak' noise of calling corncrakes. Eagles, woodpeckers and owls including the tiny Pygmy Owl gave great views. One member of the group, up early on our first day, went to a nearby river and got wonderful photographs of a kingfisher feeding its young and a mink ferrying its cubs across the river.

On Tuesday September 4th Birdwatch Ireland's South Dublin Branch public talk in the Kingston Hotel is an illustrated talk about the trip and will have many wonderful photographs of the birds and habitats seen. Free entry and everybody welcome.

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MY GARDEN by Philippa Thomas



Do you not think a single bloom can be more rewarding than a whole border of flowers, especially when it opens unexpectedly? After a drenching shower in the afternoon, flowers, bamboos, shrubs, etc. can look even more beautiful, agree? Graham Thomas is a most gorgeous rose, it was especially beautiful when dew covered its petals, in one of my friend's gardens, where I saw it last week.

Pleasures, I think, are to be found in the garden every day of the year. Sometimes, we just have to make a little time to discover them. I am beginning to notice those ornamental cabbages once again creeping onto shop fronts here and there. I just cannot get myself to like them. I appreciate that they are bursting with colour but I dislike them intensely for their fading, decrepit-looking displays.

Now that it is September, I'm beginning to cut back those dead, untidy stems, that won't add to our borders in winter. I still have all out little pots of cool growing orchids outside, mostly in partial shade. By doing so, they put out new growth and should flower during our oncoming autumn and winter season.

Our absolute winners this summer have been our Abutilons in our glass room, as they provide so much life and colour. They have rewarded us 110%. They require a feed at least once a fortnight and watering every second day (when indoors). Abutilons excel for approximately five years and then become gangly, leggy and woody. They are one of the easiest of plants to take cuttings from. Try and get your hands on one and see what you think. We have two shades of tangerine, one white, some reds, a blue and some divine pink shades. Their flowers are bell shaped and last several days before going over.

Our Eucomis bulbs are boasting at present: - showing off their magnificent long, shiny, green, maroon and black strap-shaped leaves. I think that they are still my favourite bulb. At present, they are sending up, as they usually do, their most magnificent stately flower spikes. These bulbs last right through until the end of October. Ours are in the same pots, undisturbed for at least 6/7 years: talk about Value for Money! They must be almost completely indestructible.

Don't house plants love a wipe of a damp cloth and a little feed and watering and, on a warm day, to be put out in the shade? They respond by growing stronger and more robust for these oncoming winter months.

Bulbs are now looking at you in earnest in our various shops and gardening centres. It's always worth indulging in a few; even if, just for the sense of promise, the hope, the expectation. They will always do well in the first year especially when planted in a container. I find it best then, to put them into the ground in their second year. Remember, when planting, to lay the bulbs on their side as then they will be less inclined to rot. Bulbs love to sit on gritty soil rather than mushy compost.

Finally, I just have to tell this Most Extraordinary News. One of my brothers planted a white Wisteria (Alba) over 20 years ago, at the gable-end of our house, having removed the usual cobblelock bricks and then substituting with good soil and John Innes No 3. Our Wisteria Alba rewarded us with absolute elegance and devotion for these past 20 years. Creamy white, drooping racemes of flowers abounded on its backdrop of limey green, pinnate leaves. While in bud this past spring, it obviously lacked moisture and died. (Remember those four roasting days we had in early April? Several friends of mine lost a shrub or young tree during that spell) I needn't tell you we were pretty heartbroken to discover that we had lost one of the most beautiful of all climbing plants. Its base had

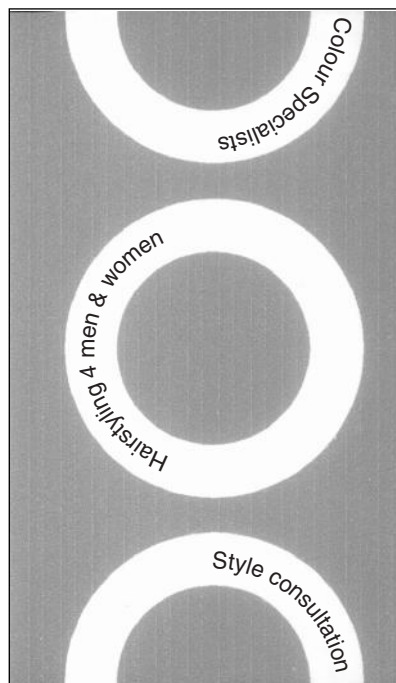

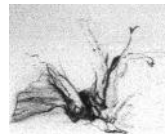

❖ COMPLETING THE CIRCLES ❖

In 2004 I realised a life's ambition in travelling to Antarctica.

In 2007 I decided to complete the Circles, as it were, by visiting the Arctic Circle. My first stop was Seattle. My good friend, Donal Denham, Dalkey resident and current Ambassador to Lithuania had put me in touch with his friend John Keane in Seattle - a leading Irish heritage authority there. I experienced wonderful hospitality and companionship with John and his wife Maureen over a couple of days in Seattle before departing for Anchorage.

Then on to Anchorage by air. My excellent friend and neighbour John Hynes from Carysfort Villas had informed his nephew, Gerry McMullen from Dun Laoghaire of my impending visit. Gerry and his wife Trudy could not do enough for me. I stayed with them for a couple of days while sightseeing around Anchorage.

Alaska is a region of great, startling beauty, with its high mountain ranges, immense glaciers, vast tundra and abundant animal life.

I then flew to Fairbanks - a short flight. It is the most northernmost large town in Alaska, about 100 miles from the Arctic Circle. The surrounding area is rugged, wild, with sharp mountain peaks, majestic glaciers and lots of wild life. The weather being warm and there being no snow, I spent four days pottering about the region.

I then set off for Barrow in a light aircraft. Barrow is the northernmost settlement in the State of Alaska and the northernmost town in the world. It is situated inside the Arctic Circle and is surrounded by bleak, uninviting tundra. There is no habitation outside Barrow. The Barrow population of about 4,000 consists mainly of white and native Alaskans, the Inuit. The surrounding area still covered in snow and ice was desolate. It was extremely cold. On one of my forays I was fortunate to catch on camera a polar bear only a few hundred yards away from me.

The houses were made of timber and there was no tarmac on the town's streets. The sale of alcohol was forbidden. Not being the most exciting tourist attraction in the world I returned to Fairbanks after staying two days in a guesthouse. However Barrow was in itself an interesting experience. Life is hard there; conditions are basic with much unemployment in this Indian reservation.

After a couple of more days viewing the tourist attractions of Fairbanks I struck off in a four-wheel drive for Dawson City accompanied by three other tourists. This journey took nine hours to complete. Dawson City is in the Yukon region of Canada. It is the site of the famous Klondike Gold Rush, which overlooks Dawson City itself. Some mining is still carried out and visitors are invited to pan for gold. I did some gold panning at the Gold Dredge and found a few tiny particles of gold.

Dawson City is relatively untouched architecturally wise since the Gold rush days and in some ways is a sad reminder of a greater tumultuous mad era with its lust for the yellow ore. I stayed in a hostel, which provided for basic needs for a couple of days before heading back in the car to Fairbanks.

Fairbanks is a modern town endowed with recognized modern amenities and I spent a couple of more days sightseeing while again enjoying the McMullen's hospitality and generosity.

Then back to Seattle where John Keane took time off to show me the wonders of this ultra modern city.

I returned home on the 6th June having fulfilled my ambitions in completing the Circles. And, of course, it could not have been achieved without the support of my good wife and family.

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SORRENTO PARK

In 1894 a lease for Sorrento Park was assigned to 'Dalkey Amusements Committee'. To commemorate this event a granite plaque was erected in honour of Blanch Lady MacDonnell who leased the lands to the Committee for 1000 years. In 1932 this lease was assigned to Dun Laoghaire Corporation and finally in 1974 to Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council when a small plaque was unveiled re-dedicating the park.

Lady MacDonnell was the widow of Rev. Dr. MacDonnell, former Provost of Trinity College, Dublin. They lived a 1 Sorrento Terrace, which was then known as Dr. MacDonnell's Road.

Also in the park is a plaque first erected on the 1830s commemorating composer, singer and musician John Dowland (1563-1626). Although one of the best known musicians of his era there is very little known of his early years. Locals believed him to have been born in Dalkey although others have put his place of birth as London. A contemporary of William Shakespeare it is said that his description of the Dalkey coastline inspired the setting for Elsinore in Hamlet. In 1612 he was one of the lutenists for King James I's court.

Dowland's works have stood the test of time and still feature in classical guitar repertoires. In October 2006 singer/songwriter Sting, a fan of Dowland's music, released an album featuring Dowland's works called 'Songs from the Labyrinth'

Each one of us reacts differently to certain circumstances. We are biologically geared to fight or flee when under pressure or stress. When one person feels fear and responds with the need to fight, another person may see fleeing as the only option. But what about normal circumstances? Why will one individual worry over nothing whereas another person remains oblivious. Why does one person worry and not another?

When we worry, the emotional response we are talking about is anxiety. All humans and animals experience anxiety as it is a survival mechanism; it can help keep us safe. However when the danger is no longer present, sometimes we are left feeling anxious rather than fearful. Experts believe that anxiety is a like a breakdown in the brain circuitry. When we are under threat, we panic and feel fear. However when the threat is gone, some brain hardwiring does not go back to normal. This is a lingering feeling that can be hard to switch off. It can keep us awake at night with sweaty palms and racing heart. This is when anxiety becomes a problem and interferes with our general well being.

So, is anxiety in our genes? Like most instances, our genes determine our general vulnerability, so it could be described as genetic. But then our upbringing and experiences can play a significant role in triggering it.

Anxiety can manifest itself in several disorders such as panic disorder, phobias, obsessive compulsive, post traumatic distress and generalised anxiety disorder, to name a few.
